





EXTRACT FROM A LETTER OF THE SECRETARY

OF THE

SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL,

To the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

NOTICE.

The Church Society was established in 1842. Its objects are:

1. A Mission Fund to aid in paying missionaries to strug-

gling congregations.

2. A General Fund to aid in the erection of churches and parsonages, in the education of the children of the Clergy, to aid struggling congregations in maintaining schools for their children, and for the general expenses of the Society.

3. A Widows' and Orphans' Fund for the Clergy.
4. A Pension Fund for aged and infirm Clergy.

5. To provide bibles, prayer books and religious publications, either gratuitously or at reduced prices.

Its affairs are managed,

1. By the Central Board and its sub-committees.

(a) The Central Board is composed of all the Clergy licensed within the Diocese, the Church-Wardens, and others elected by the Society, being Members of the Corporation.

(b) The sub-Committees are the Finance, the Land, the

Investment, and Education Committees.

2. By the Clergy Trust Committee, which manages (a) the Bishopric Endowment Fund; (b) the capital arising from the commutation of the Clergy Reserves, and (c) the Endowment Funds of the several missions and congregations.

3. By the Diocesan Board of Missions, composed of clergymen and laymen elected by the Church Society and

by the Synod.

This Board pays all the missionaries of the Diocese, and receives for this purpose (a) the annual grant of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, (b) the Mission Fund of the Church Society, (c) the contributions or assessment of the congregations served by the missionaries, (d) a grant from the Clergy Trust Fund, (c) the interest of the Sustentation Fund.

All letters referring to the assessment or contributions of congregations should be addressed to the Rev. A. A. Von Iffland, the Secretary, or to Mr. John Hamilton, the Hono-

rary Treasurer of the Diocesan Board.

All other letters and contributions should be addressed to the Rev. M. M. Fothergill, the Secretary, or to Mr. J. Bell Forsyth, the Honorary Treasurer of the Church Society.

ANNUAL MEETING.

The Annual Meeting was held on Wednesday afternoon, 6th February, in the National School.

The Lord Bishop of the Diocese in the chair.

The reports of the Central Board, Diocesan Board, and Clergy Trust Fund were presented, adopted and ordered to be printed. The accounts of the Clergy Trust Fund, Local Endowment Funds, the Bishopric Endowment Fund, the Church Society, and the Diocesan Board were adopted and ordered to be printed.

A report from the St. Francis District Association was read by the Secretary when it was moved by Mr. W. G. Wurtele, seconded by Mr. W. H. Carter:

"That the report from the District Association of St. Francis be referred back to that Association with the request that they eliminate from their report those portions which have reference to matters not directly connected with the St. Francis District."

Moved in amendment by Rev. A. A. Von Iffland, seconded by Rev. M. M. Fothergill:

That the report of the St. Francis District Association be printed in the Annual Report with the following heading: "The following report has been transmitted to the Parent Society by the District Association of St. Francis, and is printed as received from the Association."—Carried.

One Life Member and twenty-three Members of Corporation were elected. The Vice-Presidents with the omission of the name of Mr. H. S. Scott, deceased, and the Lord Bishop of Huron were re-elected. The Members of Diocesan Board and Clergy Trust Fund Committee were also

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re-elected, and twenty Gentlemen were elected to serve on the Central Board.

The following Amendments to the By-laws, were brought forward for final adoption, viz.:—

Moved by Rev. C. Hamilton, seconded by Mr. W. II. Carter:

That Article XIV be amended by adding the following words after the sentence not less than \$600 per annum:—
"Provided nevertheless, that in the case of Missions possessing Local Endowment Funds, the scale of payments to the Missionary shall be reduced in each instance by the amount of the available revenue of such Endowment Funds provided also that this clause shall not be held to apply to those Missionaries who were in receipt of the revenue of any such Local Endowment Funds at the time of the enacting of this Proviso; or of Missionaries in charge of Missions, whose Endowment Funds shall have been brought up from \$1,500 or less, to the sum which yields \$200 per annum interest."—Lost.

Moved by Mr. W. H. Carter, seconded by Dr. Marsden:

That in Article VI:—The words from annual meeting (line 4, p. 27) to "January," be struck out and the following be substituted " and in the 3rd week of each month of the year, except June, July, August and October," and to substitute the words " the January " for " the last " in the 9th line.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. W. H. Carter, seconded by Rev. C. Hamilton:

That in Article XIII:—"Sustentation" be substituted for "Mission" in 11th line, page 33; also on page 34, 3rd line to strike out all the words after "augmented" down to "Fund" and insert the following: "By as much of the revenue of the Clergy Trust Fund, to the extent of not more

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bstituted e 34, 3rd down to h of the than one-half of the surplus revenue, as may be necessary for the purpose aforesaid, which the Clergy Trust Committee is hereby authorized and required to pay over to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Board."

Also, to strike out all the words from Diocesan Board in 5th line, p. 34, down to "currency per annum."

Also, to strike out all the words from "so augmented," 14th line, p. 35, down to "\$700," and to substitute the following: "That from and after the first day of January, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three, the scale of payments to the Clergy, serving under the Diocesan Board, shall be raised so that the income of every clergyman who has served in this Diocese twentyfive years and upwards, shall be not less than seven hundred and fifty dollars per annum; of every clergyman who has served fourteen years and under twenty-five years in this Diocese shall be not less than seven hundred dollars per annum; of every clergyman who has served in the Diocese over five years and under fourteen years shall be not less than six hundled and lifty dollars per annum, and of every clergyman who has served in this Diocese less than five years shall be not less than six hundred dollars per annum."— Carried.

Moved by Mr. W. H. Carter, seconded by Rev. C. Hamilton:

That Article XIV, be repealed.—Carried.

Moved by Rev. M. M. Fothergill, seconded by Mr. W. C. Wurtele:

That in Article XIII:—after the words "Lay Secretary of Synod" line 14, p. 34, the following be added "of the Treasurer of the Clergy Trust Committee."—Lost.

Moved by Mr. W. G. Wurtele, seconded by Mr. Geo. Veasev:

That the following resolution, passed at the Annual Meet-

ing, 3rd February, 1875, be printed in the report of the proceedings for this year.—Carried.

Resolution carried in 1875.

Moved by Mr. W. G. Wurtele, seconded by Rev. M. M. Fothergill:

"That the attention of the Diocesan Board be drawn to propriety of paying the stipend of the Clergy of its Missions from the funds under its control, without making a deduction on account of any sums to which the elergyman may be entitled from Endowment provided by the Mission."

Moved by Rev. C. Hamilton, seconded by Mr. Geo. Lampson:

That the opinion of the Hon. Geo. Irvine, as Honorary Counsel, be sought as to whether the Constitution, Rules and By-laws of the Society are in such form and so authentic as to be valid in the eyes of the Courts of the Country.—Carried.

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ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CENTRAL BOARD FOR THE YEAR 1883.

Presented to the Church Society, February 6th, 1884.

The Central Board, in presenting the Forty-Second Annual Report, would desire to call special attention to some of the regulations of the Society, which seem to have been overlooked.

The Society particularly desires to press upon the attention of the Clergy and others, the necessity of remitting to the proper Treasurers the sums of money which belong to their several departments.

Many may be of opinion that it would be much simpler to have but one Treasurer in charge of all the funds of the Society, but they fail to remember that the work of the Society being so large, that to have but one Treasurer, it would be necessary to pay him a large salary, which the Society cannot afford, the work therefore has to be divided; and the Society is most fortunate in having secured the services of gentlemen in every way competent to fulfil the position of Honorary Treasurers.

From the City of Quebec and Rural Deaneries of Gaspé and Quebec, all moneys for the Church Society should be sent direct to the Honorary Treasurer, J. Bell Forsyth, Esq., Quebec; from the Rural Deanery of Saint Francis, all moneys for the Church Society should be sent to the District Treasurer, C. E. Wurtele, Esq., Sherbrooke, with the exception of Clerical subscriptions to the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, which in all cases are due at the Quebec office, on or before the 1st May in each year.

All moneys due for assessment, should be forwarded to John Hamilton, Esq., Honorary Treasurer, Quebec.

All moneys, for either Domestic or Foreign Missions, should be sent direct to the Honorary Secretary-Treasurer, Rev. G. G. Nicolls, Quebec; the collections should be forwarded immediately after they have been made.

By Domestic Missions is meant our work in Algoma and the great North West, by Foreign Missions, our missionary work through the S. P. G. and amongst the Heathen outside the Dominion of Canada. Great care should be taken in remitting money, to specify very clearly the object to which the money is to be applied.

This branch of Church work is now thoroughly distinct from the Church Society, and is only noticed by Your Board in order to put the Clergy and others on their guard against mixing their remittances for Domestic and Foreign Missions with the Society's fands. The Rev. G. G. Nicolls closes his books on the 15th of June, in order to enable him to make his annual statement to the "Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Church of England in Canada," on the 30th of June. Full reports of the work throughout the Dominion, will be furnished by the Board of Management, recently established by Canon of the Provincial Synod.

It is gratifying to know that the good seed sown by the Church Society, in endeavoring in years past to bring this subject prominently before the Diocese, is bearing good fruit to the honour of God and spread of His Church. We shall flourish best at home, when we do most abroad, and truly it can be said of us, freely we have received, freely we should give.

The Revd. T. Richardson, Quebee, has been appointed by the S. P. G., its organizing Secretary for this Diocese, in order to promote that active interest in its work and welfare which it has a right to expect. We may well join with our sister Diocese of Fredericton and tender "to the Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Missions, Treasurer, ald be for-

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Geo. Veasey, Esq., is the Treasurer of the Bishopric and Local Endowment Funds and is also Registrar of the Diocese having the custody of deeds and conveyances.

Walton Smith, Esq., is Honorary Secretary-Treasurer of the Church Book Depository, St. John St., within the Gates, conducted by Miss Wood.

Clergy and others desirous of any particular publications of the S. P. C. K., should put themselves in communication with Mr. Smith, in order to procure their importation.

All applications for grants of prayer books, &c., should also be sent to Mr. Smith.

The Church Society requires three annual offertories to be made in each congregation, viz.: On Quinquagesima Sunday for the General Fund; On the Sunday nearest to Michaelmas for the Mission Fund, and on Thanksgiving Day for the Pension Fund. The amounts collected at each of these offertories should be remitted at once to the Hon. Treasurer, Mr. Forsyth, or in the case of the St. Francis District Association to Mr. C. E. Wurtele. Sherbrooke.

Your Board notices with regret that (not including the Missions of St. Sylvester, Sandy Beach and St. John's Melbourne Ridge, which have been vacant during the greater part of the year) thirty congregations have failed to make an offertory for the General Fund, Thirty-four for the Mission Fund and Thirty for the Pension Fund.

The omission of offertories, and especially when omitted altogether, which has been the case in 14 congregations, is much to be deplored as not only signifying an indifference to comply with the desire of the Society but moreover because it deprives very many of all opportunity of sharing in the work of the Church Society; however poor a congregation may be it would not be excluded from the privilege of being allowed to contribute in the Church's ap-

pointed way for the several funds which are all managed for the well being of the Church in the Diocese.

It may seem to some superfluous and out of place to make the above statements especially as the pith of them may already be found in the "notices" published in the last annual report, but the experience of the past year seems to make it at least prudent thus to repeat in a more formal manner the wishes of the Society acting under the authority of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

The following is a comparative statement of the receipts for the five funds:

GENERAL FUND.

(To aid in the erection of Churches and Parsonages, in the support of Schools, in the Education of the children of the Clergy, in the formation of Local Endowments, and for the general expenses of the management of the Society.)

The outstanding grants of \$50 to the Church at Spooner Pond, Kingsey, and \$100 to the Parsonage at Stanstead, referred to in the last report have been paid off.

The following grants made during the year have been paid in full, viz:

\$100 to the new Parsonage at Bury,

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400 towards maintaining Schools in certain districts.

The following grants have been made, viz. :

\$100 to new Parsonage at Cookshire. \$100 to complete the Church at Little Gaspé.

There has been a deficiency in the receipts for the General Fund compared with last year of \$11.86 which may be accounted by the fact of the failure of many Congregations making the usual Quinquagesima appeal.

EDUCATION OF THE CHILDREN OF THE CLERGY FUND.

Again it has been found unnecessary to draw upon the General Fund for assistance. There are at present seven children receiving aid. The sum of \$314.50 has been contributed throughout the Diocese during the year, being a small increase over the receipts of last year. Robert Hamilton, Esq., still continues to aid in a most liberal manner this portion of the Society's work.

MISSION FUND.

(For the payment of the Stipends of Missionaries in conjunction with the Annual Grant from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, assessments from the Rural Congregations, and a Grant from the Clergy Trust Fund, the Interest of the invested capital of the Sustentation Fund, administered by the Diocesan Board.)

A full statement of Missionary operations in the Diocese will be found in the report of the Diocesan Board.

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The following Clergymen have, according to the terms of the By-law, made the required number of payments,

and are therefore entitled to the benefits of the fund without further subscription, viz.: Revds. Smith, Lyster, Dr. Ker, Fothergill, Dr. Roe, Kemp, W. King, Von Iffland, Burrage, Vial, Housman, Jenkins, Washer, Thompson, Foster, Debbage, Hepburn, Richardson, Boyle and Allnatt.

The following are in course of completing their payments, viz.: Revds. Ball, Harding, Chambers, Thorneloe, Colston, Brown, Richmond, Stevens, Dinzey, Blaylock, Parkin, Scarth, Dr. Lobley, Sykes, Ker, Wurtele, Chapman, Nicolls, Judge and Smith.

Your Board is happy to record the fact that no change has taken place since last report in the number of widows and orphans receiving aid from the fund.

The receipts during the year were \$818.22 shewing an increase of \$410.47.

PENSION FUND.

(For aged and infirm Clergymen.)

This fund has again been largely increased during the year, having received the sum of \$2,322.69, being \$211.78 in excess of the previous year.

No change has taken place in the number of participants in the benefits of the fund.

The Hon. David Evan Price, a life-member and liberal annual contributor not only to the various funds under the 'Society's control but to all church objects in the Diocese, has also died during the present year.

We have also to deplore the removal by death of Mrs. Hamilton, also a life-member, whose life was passed quietly and in the retirement she loved, but whose unostentatious liberality was ever ready at the Church's call.

William J. Newton an active worker also disappears from our records. For many years he held the position of Honorary Secretary-Treasurer of St. Matthew's Parochial Association with credit to himself and advantage to the Society. He was a man singularly modest and retiring, of sound discretion and stern integrity.

It is indeed a sad bereavement when four such members are removed in a single year. They have done a good work amongst us and their places will be hard to fill.

The following is the abstract of the Revenue Account of the Diocesan Board for the year ended Dec. 31st, 1883:--

From the above statement, it will be seen that Your Board has been able to carry on the Missionary work of the Diocese during the past year, without calling upon the Clergy Trust Fund for any assistance, besides making an appropriation of \$1,695, in augmentation of the scanty incomes of the Clergy.

The balance at the close of 1882, has thus been reduced to an amount which will barely suffice to meet the ordinary outlay till the Mission Fund collections and offertories are received.

Some missions spoken of as vacant in the last report, have been without a resident Clergyman for part of the year.

Of the three specially referred to in the last report, the Missions of Brompton and Windsor has had a resident Missionary since last June and Sandy Beach since December, whilst the large and scattered Mission of St. Sylvester has been served most of the time by a Clergyman in temporary charge.

The Mission of Labrador has been vacant since September, but the people are being looked after by a catechist appointed by the Bishop, until such time as a missionary in orders can be secured.

With these exceptions, St. John's, Melbourne, is the only Mission now vacant, and even here the people are only in part deprived of the ministrations of the Church, which are supplied to them by the Rector of Melbourne, who devotes what time he can spare from his own parish to the service of the congregations in this Mission.

In taking a review of the past year's work, your Board has much satisfaction in being able to report that notwith-standing the difficulties to be encountered from the sparseness of the Church population and in some instances the tendency to migrate to more promising fields of employment, unmistakable progress has attended the missionary work of the Church in this Diocese.

Abundant and interesting evidence of this is to be found in the Reports of the Clergy which are hereunto appended, not only do these reports indicate in detail the various points of improvement which have taken place but, for the most part they breathe a spirit of hopefulness which augurs well for the future.

Nothing short of a careful perusal of these details of quiet unostentations work and its many happy results can convey a full conception of the actual progress made, but some justification at least for this hopeful view may be adduced

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luced to rdinary ries are in the fact that the congregations with scarcely any exceptions are faithfully fulfilling their obligations to the Board.

Those missions also which, in the judgment of the Synod of the Diocese, were deemed to have grown strong enough to bear the near prospect of independence are faithfully preparing themselves with this object in view.

The Missions of Durham and Coaticook during the current year will pay an assessment of \$600 and \$550 respectively and will become self sustaining on the 1st January, 1885.

The Mission of Stanstead will also become self-supporting at the close of the year 1884, and the Mission of Cookshire, on 1st July, 1885.

One other Mission besides that of Bury, has been notified that no aid will be extended to it after the close of the year 1884.

In addition to this there is every prospect that one new Mission, viz.: Ascot corner and Westbury, will shortly be added to the list of those aided by your Board.

The following appointments have been made during the past year.

In the month of June the Rev. H. Mansbridge was appointed to the Mission of Brompton and Windsor.

In the month of November the Rev. I. M. Thompson to the Mission of Danville rendered vacant by the resignation of Rev. H. J. Petry, efter eighteen years faithful and arduous work.

In December, the Revd. W. T. Forsythe to the Mission of Sandy Beach including Peninsula and Little Gaspé.

In the month of May, the Revd. S. Riopel resigned the Mission of Valcartier and Stoneham, but was re-appointed to its charge in the following September.

In July, the Revd. E. J. Harper resigned the Mission of St. John's, Melbourne, and in September, the Revd. R. W. Brown resigned the Mission of Labrador.

"Resolved that the members of the Diocesan Board—mourning the loss of a personal friend in the death of Mr. H. S. The year which is now closing has been a memorable one in the Missionary History of the Canadian Church. The impulse given to the Missionary spirit among us by the Revd. Dr. Sullivan's acceptance of the Missionary Bishopric of Algoma, has been greatly increased by his refusing, on the ground of duty to Algoma, to abandon it for the more attractive Bishopric of Huron. The remarkable report presented to the late Provincial Synod, by the General Board of Canadian Missions, exhibited a growth in contributions for Missionary work throughout the Ecclesiastical Province, which took the Church quite by surprise. For Algoma alone, during the first year of Bishop Sullivan's episcopate, more than \$30,000 was contributed; for Algoma and the

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North West during the past three years—of moneys publicly reported, more than \$45,000 besides \$8,000 for missions to the Heathen;—in all \$53,000. The contributions for Algoma and the North West grew from not quite \$5,000 in 1881 to \$13,000 in 1883. Contributions for missions to the Heathen, have grown steadily from \$1,500 in 1881, to \$2,-

300 in 1882 and \$3,000 in 1883.

The growth of the missionary spirit has been shown also in another way; in the time and attention devoted to Missionary work by the late Provincial Synod. Two entire days of the time of the Synod was given up to Missions, and that with an enthusiasm which spoke volumes. The general Missionary Board was entirely reorganized, on the lines which have proved so efficient in our venerated sister Church in the United States. The new Board, at its first meeting a fortuight ago, in Montreal, set itself to the task of completing the details of its organization, and carrying out its work with an earnestness of spirit which argues well for its success. It was publicly stated during its sessions, that the Board ought to look forward to raising in Canada \$100,000 a year for missionary work, a sum, it was added, quite within the ability of the Canadian Church.

It is also cause for thankfulness and encouragement, to notice that in this matter of progress in contributions for missionary work, the Diocese of Quebec has been forward. This Diocese, though far the poorest in the ecclesiastical Province, has contributed during the last three years, in proportion to its Church population, for Algoma and the North West, nearly four times as much as the Province of Ontario; nearly three times as much as the Province of New Brunswick, and thirteen times as much as Nova Scotia. Also for Missions to the Heathen, during the same period, this Diocese has contributed in proportion to Church population, more than six times as much as the Province of Ontario, about the same proportion as New Brunswick,

and ten times as much as Nova Scotia.

On the other hand it is fair to remember that Ontario receives no help from England, while we are receiving nearly \$7000 a year. Besides, when we look fairly into what we are doing we shall see how little it is.

This year we have sent away for missionary work in Algoma, the North West and among the Heathen and for other extra parochial objects the sum of \$2,242. On the other hand we have received from the Mission Funds of the Church towards the support of our own Clergy to the amount of \$4,000. So that deducting what we send away, we in this district are still drawing upon the Missionary Funds of the Church to the amount of nearly \$2,000 a year. Every Churchman in this District ought seriously to ask himself. Is it right to take this money?

The amount contributed within this District during the year for all Church purposes has been \$23,009.64, of this sum, \$20,768.50 was for strictly parochial objects; and \$2,240.84 we sent away to help those outside:—distributed as follows:—The Church-Society, \$1,101.21; Bishop's College, \$205.30; Algoma and North West, \$630.32; Missions to Heathen, \$243.16; Jews and Deaf-mutes, \$47.65.

Comparing this with last year's contributions it is found that the total amount raised is \$5,062.56 more than last year, exclusive of the valuable gift of land in Magog. Contributions to the Church Society, however, have fallen off by the sum of \$103. While nine of our Missions have increased in their Church Society collections by the sum of \$99, eleven, nearly all of them among the wealthiest, have decreased to the amount of \$202. On the other hand contributions for Foreign and Domestic Missions and Bishop's College have increased by the sum of \$264.65. This leaves, in what are really our gifts (for what we do for our own Parish purposes is in no sense a gift) a small balance to the good.

On the whole, then, we have no ground of boasting in the matter of contributions for religious objects. It is quite evident that in this department we have much yet to learn. What we ought to resolve upon is, that each one of us, Clergyman and Layman, will consider it our bounden duty to see that the amount contributed in each of our Parishes for the extension of Christ's Kingdom, both within and without our borders, grows with a marked and steady in-

crease year by year.

The reports of the Clergy will be printed at length in the annual report. They will be found to be a modest record of faithful service which cannot be read without thankfulness. The thoughtful reader will gather from them that a most earnest and progressive ministry is being exercised among us. One feature is not on the surface. The steady

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increase in the number of services, and more particularly the multiplication of School House Stations, can only be discovered by careful study. Seven missions have regular services at 34 stations. The next seven have 21 stations. In the 20 clerical charges of this District, there are 71 distinct stations, (known to the Secretary there may be more) served regularly.

And success is certainly following these loving and devoted labors. There can be no doubt that the Church in these Townships is making marked and healthy progress. Old prejudices are fast being dissipated, and the old Catholic Church of the English-speaking people is being more and more recognized as a true branch of the Church of the

living God, the Pillar and Ground of the Truth.

This report ought not to close without giving expression to the Church's thankfulness to Almighty God for His blessing vouchsafed to the work of our Diocesan Missioner, now brought to a close. Eight Missions have been held in the District during the year, and with respect to them all, the Clergy speak most gratefully and hopefully. There can be no doubt that the experiment of a Diocesan Missioner has been crowned with more uniform success than could reasonably have been expected. While all will rejoice that Mr. Thomson resumes parochial work within the District of St. Francis, it is matter of great and general regret that his loving labours as Diocesan Missioner are to cease.

ACTON.

The Rev. L. C. Wurtele reports:-

During the year, several families left for the United States and elsewhere, but in consequence of new arrivals from other places, our numbers are not diminished.

Services are still held in Upton and Roxton Falls, Diocese of Montreal.; but still I believe as many services dur-

ing the year have been given in my own Mission, as in any other country Mission in the Diocese. The two services held in St Mark's Church, Actonvale, every Sunday, have been well attended, the average attendance being 30. This must appear small to most persons, but taking into consideration the fewness of the English population, it is satisfactory and good.

During the year, in all, I have held 251 services, of which 81 were in the Diocese of Montreal, and the balance, 170, were in Actonvale, Danby and West Wickham, for I have still under my charge five congregations, although they be small in numbers and scanty in worldly goods.

With regard to improvements, our dilapidated Church steps have given way to new ones, and the approaches to God's House put into good order. We have also to acknowledge a very handsome gift of a Church bell, from Mrs. Wurtele, Senr., and the heirs of the late Mr. Ambrose Duncan. Also, through a lady communicant, a new Chalice and Paten and Altar Linen.

There have been: Baptisms, 8; Marriages, 7; Burials, 4. Amounts collected for all Church purposes, viz:—Assessment, \$250; Church Society, \$22; Other purposes, \$219.89. Total, \$491.89.

BARFORD.

The Rev. C. B. Washer reports:-

It is with much thankfulness that I report that, during the past year, I have been enabled to hold on my way in this mission in normal health. My engagements have been kept in four of the stations, except at Peterboro' on two Sunday afternoons, when the state of the snow road prevented my reaching the station in time. One satisfactory reflection is the outcome of the experience of last winter, and may be noted. If the Missionary here could come well through that season, he may anticipate the wildest winter of the future with calmness and complacency.

Hardly more than a note or two have I to give beyond the common round of work.

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Dixville.—Service here every Sunday. Congregation larger and promising further to grow. Sunday School good and encouraging, and the scholars remain to Church—no small improvement, considering the locality. We have not yet begun our Church. Though we have enough money to begin, we have not enough to finish. As we propose to incur no debt, we must be content to wait.

St. Lawrence.—The services uninterruptedly conducted fortnightly on Sundays through the year, except during July and August, when my place was kindly taken by the Rev. C. Worrell, M.A., of Brockville, Ont., who held a service every Sunday. For these two months the young of the neighbourhood had the advantage of a Sunday School, under the management of Miss Annie Ward and a friend, and was only discontinued by reason of the good teachers having to return to Montreal.

Stanhope.—The congregation maintains its attendance. We revived a Sunday School in the spring, but circumstances have been against us. One of the two gentlemen who were to have assisted, unexpectedly, at the commencement of the enterprise, removed to a distance to accept a situation that offered itself; and the other, in a few weeks, was laid low by illness. This compelled me to have Sunday School only once a fortnight, before service time, when I could myself be present. I received efficient help from Mrs. James Cameron, who, I regret to say, has recently left Stanhope. I am now managing the school single handed.

Perryboro'.—Services fortnightly on Sunday throughout the year, with the two exceptions indicated. Congregations as good as ever. The Sunday School was carried on during the summer months. I wish I could reach this station early enough to be present sometimes at school.

Hereford.—This station does not permit me to make a more favourable report than I made last year. It is at present closed on account of arrears of assessment, after regular Sunday services fortnightly through the summer, and there seems to be no immediate prospect of reopening. The lady who did so much to bring about the resumption of services fifteen months ago is not free to engage in the work again, were the likelihood of success as great; and no one else is ready to take the matter up. The future for this station seems dismal. The settling of a Missionary in its midst ap-

pears to me the only remedy for present ills. I am ready to give and desirous of giving a fortnightly Sunday evening service, but a place like this cannot successfully be worked at so great a distance from head-quarters, and with the charge of four other stations.

In my last report I led the Church to expect, in a small way, the beginning of subscriptions to the Church Society's funds. I record with pleasure the realization of the expectation. We have made a beginning, and each of the five stations is represented. Now a start has been made, I trust we shall do better year by year.

Baptisms, 3; Marriages, 1; Burials, 4.

Amounts collected for all Church purposes, viz.: Assessment, \$165.00; Church Society, \$32.69; Other purposes, \$25.21. Total, \$222.90.

BOURG LOUIS.

The Rev. H. C. Stuart reports :-

Services have been held regularly every Sunday and principal Holy-days at St. Bartholomew's Church, and fortnightly at St. Jeane de Neuville during the Summer. The Holy Communion has been celebrated fortnightly and on the chief Holy-days, and all the services have been well attended.

The three schools aided by the Church Society have been in operation during the whole year. I cannot speak too highly of the good quality of work done in these schools, nor of the self-sacrifice of two of the teachers, holding Model Diplomas of the first class, who contentedly labour here on a salary of \$120.00 out of which they must board themselves.

Many changes have taken place, even in this secluded mission, during the past year. The death of Col. Panet has cast a gloom over the whole seigniory which will take many years to disperse. Many of us can scarcely realize the fact that his genial face we shall see no more. James Davidson, sr., Mrs. Pyles, Mrs. Smith and Mrs. McCorkell were old landmarks whose removal, each in their several spheres, have changed the Mission in a marked degree. John Smith was taken away in the prime and vigour of life, leaving a widow and eight children to mourn his loss. Three families have left

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the Mission, and their places are vacant, or filled by Roman Catholic families. Indeed, we must face the fact that our numbers are being steadily diminished. Thirty-four children, young men and young women, are now away from home, earning the livelihood they could not obtain here, and it is very improbable that they will return. A large number of our people would gladly seek a home in the West if they could collect sufficient money to take themselves and families thither.

The Assessment to the Board has been paid cheerfully, and the people have willingly contributed of their penury to the various objects for which their assistance has been requested. Knowing their circumstances, I think their contributions to Church purposes quite all they are able to make, I am frequently at a loss to know how they can meet all their dues, their drawbacks are so many and so formidable.

The people here are not indolent by any means, neither are they particularly improvident. They have great difficulties to encounter, some of which I shall briefly mention.

The bulk of the people have no wood on their farms, and none, with a single exception, have sufficient wood to make its transport to market a profitable enterprise. A few men have wood enough to supply themselves, and one or two neighbours, and occasionally a cord or two to sell. Numbers of men have told me that when their little piece of wood land is exhausted, they must either emigrate or freeze.

Nearly all of our people have farms located on an extensive plain of sand. If the summer be a rainy one, and they have enough manure to fertilize their land, their potatoes and oats yield a good harvest. But if the season be dry, the lookout is indeed a sad one. I have seen two seasons so dry that not one bundle of hay was cut on the whole plain. Even in the most favourable season, harvest rarely brings more than \$150 to the husbandman, out of which his family must be clothed and fed for the year, leaving, surely a very limited amount on which to luxuriate, after "the two ends have been made to meet."

There are now twenty-two people here of seventy years of age and upwards; and thirty-four children and young people are away from home, mostly in the far West, who send money home regularly to help to support their parents.

It is exceedingly distasteful to me to thus write of the temporal condition of the Mission, but I am obliged to mention our drawbacks, to give anything like a just estimate

of our actual circumstance, and resources.

Turning from the contemplation of the the dark side of the picture, I hereby tender to Miss Price, of Wolfesfield, our warmest thanks for a very beautifully embroidered red Altar cloth; and record with due thankfulness the kindness of the people in presenting me with a purse containing \$45, and in erecting a stable, and digging a well, at the parsonage.

BROMPTON AND WINDSOR MILLS.

The Revd. H. P. Mansbridge reports :--

Windsor Mills.—I have now been in charge of this Mission about seven months, and my experience so far leads me to think that Windsor is the proper place for the Clergyman to reside.

The congregation in this village, since my appointment, has been steadily on the increase, and already do they shew a greater zeal and earnestness in religious matters than has hitherto been the case. The average attendance is about forty.

The services in the little Church are hearty and cheerful; the singing also is greatly improved. The unfortunate site of the Church, however, proves a great drawback: In time we hope to erect a larger edifice on a more central

spot.

I cannot omit to mention in my report the willingness displayed by the congregation in contributing towards the different funds of the Church Society. They have exceeded my expectation in this respect, and I carnestly hope it may prove but a commencement of what is to come. We tender our most sincere thanks to Miss Annie Miller for her kindness in collecting the same.

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rillingness of towards hey have earnestly that is to iss Annie Brompton.—When first appointed to the Mission it was suggested that I should hold the services in the morning every alternate month at Windsor and Brompton, but after giving it a fair trial, it was found to suit neither congregation. At present we have a morning service at Brompton and afternoon at Windsor. There is a pretty Church here and the congregation is usually good.

I take the opportunity, on behalf of the congregation and myself, of returning our most sincere thanks to Miss Lamont for her kind and gratuitous services as organist.

Baptisms, 5; Marriages, 2; Burials, 4.

Amounts collected for all Church purposes, viz: Assessment, \$103.20; Church Society, \$18.36; Domestic Missions. \$3,60; Bishop's College, \$3.07; Other purposes, \$90.42. Total. \$218.65.

BURY.

The Rev. F. M. Webster reports:-

During the last year the work in this Mission has been carried on without interruption.

Saint Paul's Church, Robinson,—There is Sunday Morning service at 11 o'clock, preceded by Sunday School. Holy Communion is celebrated twice a month, at 9 a. m. and at 11 a. m.

The attendance at this church, which is well situated for the Parish Church, being centrally located in the midst of a populous district, has been very good; and I attribute this happy fact in a great measure to the School House services held regularly on the outskirts of the parish.

Friday evening service has been maintained regularly, followed by a practice of Church Music for the following Sunday service. The Sunday School in connexion with the Church is a very promising one; the teachers have been on the whole regular, faithful and painstaking.

The Incumbent, for some time past, has been holding a confirmation class during the Sunday School hour.

Saint Thomas' Church, Bury.—Distant six miles from the village.

This congregation for the present meets for service in a large room kindly lent by one of the members. The Sunday

service is fortnightly at 3 p. m. The attendance is good. Steps will be shortly taken, I trust, for building a suitable Church edifice in this part of the mission.

Saint John's Church, Bury.—Distant four miles from the village has not been utilized for regular service during the past year, for the reason that the only hours for service at my disposal, after the congregation was prepared to enter into an agreement with the Diocesan Board, did not meet with the views of the majority of the people; however this congregation is not debarred by distance from attending the Sunday morning services in the village, as the major portion of the people live equally as close, if not closer to St Paul's Church as to St John's. I am glad to say that a goodly number have availed themselves of this privilege.

Saint Peter's Church, Lingwick.—Distant thirteen miles from the village, has been regularly served every fortnight with a Sunday service at 4 p. m.

Holy Communion is celebrated once a quarter. During the months of July and August. services were held every Sunday when, through the Rev. Dr. Roe's instrumentality, I was well assisted by Mr. Richard Hewton, B. A. of Bishop's College. Although, particularly during the Spring and Fall, the way to this distant outpost is long and dreary, yet the attendance and attention of the congregation are most encouraging. Mrs. Williams kindly presented this church with a suitable Altar cloth which was much needed.

Missionary meetings were held in each of the above churches, last winter, with the exception of St John's. Taking into account the unfavorable weather at the time, the attendance was fair. School House services are held as follows, at:

Barterville.—Once a fortnight, where I am ably assisted by the Rev. A. H. Judge. Here the attendance has been very good, and the interest displayed encouraging from the beginning.

Hard-Wood-Flat.—This School House receives a monthly service, the attendance is good and constant. The Ladies' Guild, in connexion with the village church, still continues its effective help; two very successful entertainments have been held since my last report.

The annual Sunday School treat took place in the Town

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Hall at Christmas, when prizes were given to the deserving children.

The annual Pic-nic at mid-summer was greatly appreciated by both the younger and older members of the Sunday School.

We hope soon to have the privilege of welcoming once more into our midst the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, when, it is hoped, a large number of persons will present themselves for confirmation. We have been favored by a visit from the Rev: Rural Dean Reid who preached for us twice at our Thanksgiving services. His presence, words of council and sympathy will no doubt prove a source of strength to the work of the mission. A small band of six persons have undertaken the work of collecting money for the different funds of the Church Society.

I must not omit to mention that the Ladies' Guild of St. Matthew's Church, Quebec, have again nobly helped us this year. 1st in procuring a chancel carpet, 2nd by contributing \$30 in money towards securing a most necessary want, viz: a solid silver communion set. The good which these devoted ladies effect in our country missions is incalculable.

CAPE COVE.

Revd. W. G. Lyster reports:—

During the past year, the small and struggling congregation of St. James', Cape Cove, has been still further reduced by the removal from the country of five families comprising

over thirty individuals.

The congregation now numbers only thirty-three families, and on these rest, the burden of an assessment considerably larger than that paid by neighbouring congregations of double the number. This assessment will, I hope, continue as heretofore, to be cheerfully met. When we find it impossible to collect the amount, we shall appeal to the Diocesan Board, and we entertain no doubt that we shall be treated with fairness and consideration.

A successful effort has been made to raise a fund for providing new pews and carpeting for the Church. This was accomplished at a Christmas-tree entertainment, and we have to thank J. J. Balleine, Esq, and our energetic teacher Miss Higginson, as well as a number of young people who assisted, for the success of the undertaking. We have also secured an excellent bell, weighing 316 lbs. at a cost of \$120. Messrs Robin generously contributed half that amount; a kind friend gave us \$20; and the price of two old bells, with a small collection taken up in Church, furnished the balance.

Thanks to the grants of the Church Society our three daily schools have been constantly in operation: our Sun-

day-Schools have also been well attended.

It is hardly necessary to state that the ordinary work of the Mission has gone on as usual: nothing note-worthy has taken place. There is some reason to hope, although so many have left us, that the mania for deserting the coast has received a check: indeed there are indications that a few of our wandering friends may soon be expected to return. There is a growing feeling that there are worse places in the world than Gaspé, and that if people would only work as hard here as they do elsewhere, they might fairly expect to prosper.

The neat little Church at Percé, St. Paul's, was carefully

repainted this summer, and now looks quite new.

It must be said, the church-wardens continue to take a laudable interest in its preservation. A few of the young people evince great taste, year after year, in decorating this Church for Christmas: it is a labour of love, and I am always glad to thank them for it.

At the close of twenty-five years of missionary service on this coast, I may be permitted to add a few words as to the drawbacks and advantages connected with a residence

in this somewhat neglected part of Canada.

As to the first, it must be admitted that the absence of society, the want of educational advantages for a clergy-man's children and the remoteness from the centres of intellectual life and movement, are all disadvantages, and in some respects serious ones.

On the other hand, the proverbial healthiness of the coast, the cheapness of living, the peaceful, obliging and

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hospitable character of the inhabitants, and the somewhat primitive mode of existence, possess for many persons a charm which grows only stronger, as the years pass by. A Clergyman is certain of respectful and kindly treatment on all hands; and I may safely say, there are probably no congregations in Canada more devoted to their Clergy, and more easily advised and led, than the kind-hearted Church-people of the Gaspé district.

I may add, that the merchants who are engaged in the fishing business, are, nearly all, members of the Church, and, as a rule, contribute fairly, and sometimes liberally to

Church purposes.

My own experience in this respect, has however, been almost restricted to the firm of Robin & Co., and it is due to them to say that their agents and employees are always ready to aid in a good work, at least I have never appealed to them in vain.

I would be ungrateful indeed, if I did not thankfully acknowlege, as I do now, the unvarying kindness, attention and hospitality that I have been receiving for the past twenty-five years, from the agents of this extensive firm.

COATICOOK.

The Rev. John Foster reports:-

During the year I have kept up three Services every Sunday, with unfailing regularity, two at St. Stephen's Church, in the upper Village, and one (in the afternoon) at Christ Church, North Coaticook.

Holy Communion is administered once in two months, at 9 A. M., at Christ Church, and on the first Sunday in the

month at St. Stephen's Church.

The attendance at all the Services, which are bright and

hearty, is much the same as last year.

I have commenced a Service on Wednesday evenings, at Belknap's school-house, about three miles from Coaticook; so far the interest taken in the Service is encouraging, and the attendance is, on the whole, good.

Two Sunday Schools have been regularly kept up, during

the year, in each of which I teach a Bible class.

I have still to complain of the drift of our people westward, and to express my regret that so few immigrants from the mother country come amongst us, and of the few who do come, the greater number remain but a short time. Mr. Hobbs and his large family, who were regular attendants at, and most generous supporters of the Church, removed to

Magog during the Summer.

Before leaving Coaticook Mr. Hobbs very generously offered to pay off the sum of one hundred and twenty dollars still due on the enlargement of St. Stephen's Church, and also one tenth of the six hundred and thirty dollars due on the Parsonage, provided the remaining members of the Congregation would agree to pay off the balance within six months. Stimulated by so generous an offer a subscription list was circulated and the required amount was cheerfully subscribed within the prescribed time. We hope therefore, during the present winter to see the parish entirely free from debt.

During the month of November the Rev. Isaac Thompson held a Mission at Christ Church, North Coaticook. The Services were very well attended, and a deep interest was

manifested by all who took part in them.

The ground was diligently prepared by house to house visiting before Mr. Thompson entered on the work, and is being followed up by weekly cottage lectures from house to house. In this way I hope to deepen and solidify the good impressions which I have every reason to believe were made during the progress of the Mission.

I carnestly hope and pray that God will aboundantly bless the work which was begun in faith and prayer, and car-

ried on with zeal and perseverance.

I have established a guild in connection with St. Stephen's and Christ Church, from which I hope for good results in every way.

Pastoral visiting has been kept up with unfailing regu-

larity.

The Revd. Andrew Balfour who has resided in Coaticook during the past five years, is, I regret to say, about to leave here, to live in Montreal.

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in Coatiy, about to During his stay here, he took part in the Sunday Services, greatly to my relief, and with much acceptance to the people, by whom he is universally held in the highest esteem for kindly disposition, and exalted Christian character.

On looking back over the events of the year, I cannot but feel that many of my people are making progress in the

spiritual life, for which I am most thankful.

I append the usual Statistics: Baptisms, 16; Marriages, 7; Burials, 10.

Moneys raised during the year:

Assessment \$450; Church Society, \$10; Domestic Missions, \$13; Foreign Missions, \$5; Bishop's College, \$3; Other purposes, \$540.14. Total, \$1021.14.

COOKSHIRE.

The Rev. A. H. Judge reports :-

St. Peter's Church, Cookshire.—The usual services have been held regularly throughout the year, attended during the Summer months by an average morning congregation of ninety, while at the evening services a most encouraging increase is seen. The congregations on week-days and the chief Fasts and Festivals of the Church are not so satisfactory. The Sunday school continues to flourish under the skillful management of our staff of teachers. In connection with St. Peter's Church, a ladies Guild and Missionary Union has been formed. A meeting is held every fortnight, when the ladies devote themselves to work for the new Parsonage, and at every second meeting an hour is spent reading interesting Missionary news of the Church. I rejoice to think that a growing interest is being felt in our foreign Mission work, for I fully believe that the greater the interest shown in the Church's work abroad, the more surely will the work at home flourish. Besides this Society a branch of the Girls Friendly Society has been established here, having two associates and fifteen members. Last Summer the old Parsonage, being in a ruinous and uninhabitable condition, was sold and a new building commenced. The contract, for two thousand dollars, was signed on the 8th August and the building shortly afterwards begun. It is conveniently situated immediately to the East of the Church on the corner of the lot, and will add greatly to the appearance and value of our Church property. The building stands now, enclosed, brick cased and shingled, and is to be completed by June 1st, 1884. The people have subscribed very nobly towards the Parsonage fund.

Christ Church, Island Brook.—All Church work here, I am thankful to say, is satisfactory. The congregations have very materially increased, (averaging seventy throughout the the whole year) and deep interest is shown in the Church's welfare. In the Summer we had our property neatly fenced in, and hope next spring to set about erecting horse-sheds. On my own behalf and that of my people I record our warmest thanks to Mrs. Williams for gifts of Altar linen and alms bags; to Mrs. Geo. R. White, of Lennoxville, for the gift of a beautiful and costly Altar cloth, and to the Guild of St. Matthew's, Quebec, for the gift of a valuable brass alms-basin. Stimulated by such acts of kindness the Congregation has purchased a neat and good organ for the Church, and otherwise added furniture to the building; yet our wants are still many, including a bell, Eucharistic vessels, a font, vestry furniture, matting, &c. In connection with Christ Church a Sunday school has now been started and we have on the roll some twenty names. This is a small beginning, but with God's blessing we hope the school may prosper. With great regret I mention the loss, through removal from the village, of our Church-warden and organist Mr. Nutt. His invaluable services will be greatly missed.

Ditton.—This station, twenty-five miles from Cookshire, is served by me once a month, and entails a long and arduous drive. I hold service in a school house at New England, where are nine English families, on Monday evening, and the following morning as I return homewards, again in the Norwegian settlement in the house of one of the five families of Norwegians. At New England a Sunday school is carried on by a layman.

Randboro.—Ten miles from Cookshire I found six church families living near the hamlet of Randboro. My offer to give them a monthly service was received with great gladness, and I have now held four services in a school house there, all of which have been very well attended. I was told that mine was the first Church of England service ever

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held in the place, and the interest and curiosity shown the first night was manifest by the assembling of over one hundred people, who completely filled the building, and most attentive they all were. The choir of St. Peter's Church accompanied me on this first visit and our service was singularly well rendered and hearty. So much enthusiasm is shown by the few church people here, and such substantial offers of aid have been made by them that I have a good hope that we may soon erect a little church at this out-post.

"The Basin".—During the summer months the Sunday school here has been kept up by the same lady whom I mentioned in my last year's report. Her work is completely a labour of love. I have had afternoon service in the school house at various times throughout the year.

A bright season for the Parish was the occasion of His Lordship the Bishop's visit, on Oct. 27th. The following day, the 23rd Sunday after Trinity, twenty-six candidates were presented for confirmation, lifteen in Cookshire, and eleven in Island Brook.

I append statistics:—Baptisms, 50; infants, 39; adults, 11; Marriages, 2; Confirmed, 26; Burials, 10.

Amount collected for all Church purposes, in Cookshire and Island Brook: Assessment, \$500.00; Church Society, \$37.71; Domestic Missions, \$3.76; Foreign Missions, \$6.45; Bishop's College, \$5,15; Other purposes, 999.39. Total \$1,552.46.

DANVILLE.

The Rev. H. J. Petry reports:-

I am happy and thankful to state that no interruption to the Services has taken place in these three congregations, since writing my last Report. Even during the desperate weather and roads of last Winter, not a Sunday was a blank, though I must admit having had some tough work at times to keep appointments.

In May last, the Lord Bishop consecrated St. Augustine's Church, at Danville, St. Paul's at Troutbrook, and the

"Church of the Epiphany" at Lorne.

It is gratifying to see these three congregations, each with

its Church completed and paid for,—each with a congregation increasing in numbers, attached to the Church's teaching and discipline, devout in behaviour, and appreciating

their privileges.

At the expiration of the third quarter I resigned my charge, after eighteen years of unbroken labour; it is needless to add how acutely I feel the separation. During this long period, nothing ever happened to disturb the harmony of my relations with the people committed to my charge. I have ever been treated with unaffected kindness and cordiality which seemed to increase with each year of my Incumbency. I leave the Deanery of St. Francis with feelings of profound regret.

Baptisms, 24; Burials, 7; Marriages, 1.

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DRUMMONDVILLE.

The Rev. F. J. B. Allnatt reports:-

The state of things here is much the same as that represented in my last report. Our numbers are being gradually reduced, but otherwise what little there is to tell (capable, that is, of being mentioned in a report) is cheering rather than otherwise. I am pleased to observe a tendency towards regularity in Church-attendance, and a marked kindly interest in Church matters, on the part of those who formerly stood aloof. This is especially the case with the members of other denominations, or of none at all, who have been for the past two years drawn here by the new branches of industry which have sprung up; and to whom our services at first appeared strange and uncongenial.

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Church-work has gone on much as usual. The scheme of services, classes, &c., for the past and the coming year is as follows:—

SERVICES AT THE PARISH CHURCH.—Every Sunday, also Christmas Day, Epiphany, Ash-Wednesday, Good Friday, Ascension Day,—at 11 a. m., and 7 p. m.

New Year's Day, and Harvest Festival, at 11 a. m.

Every Friday, also Christmas Eve, New Year's Eve, Shrove Tuesday, and every evening in Holy Week,—at 7 p. m.

HOLY COMMUNION. On the first and third Sundays in each month; also on Christmas Day, Sunday after Christmas, Epiphany, Easter Day, Sunday after Easter, Ascension Day, Witsunday, Trinity Sunday, and Sunday after Thanksgiving Day.

School-house Services.—On each Sunday afternoon, at one

of these different places, according to arrangement.

Classes.—(1) Sunday 9.55 a.m., for candidates for confirmation. (2) Sunday, 10.25 a.m., for elder pupils. (3) Saturday, 7 p. m., for adults of both sexes.

Sunday Schools.—(1) At the Farsonage, by Mrs. Allnatt and Miss Mazurette, 2 p. m. (2) At the Tannery Settlement, by Miss Watts, and Miss G. Hemming, at 2.30 p. m.

A Women's Guild, chiefly for Missionary and charitable Sewing, has been started, and promises to work well.

Our Church Day-School now of three years' standing, is still in existence; but, owing to death and removal, its fortunes have been reduced to a somewhat low ebb; and the help of the Society has been craved to save it from collapse. The number now in attendance is 17; but, before the spring, should the school continue, it would probably be increased to 23.

There are five other "Protestant" Schools within the parish, at all of which my visits are welcomed, whether for

religious teaching, or general inspection.

In March last, a ten days' Mission was held by Mr. Thompson, our Diocesan Missioner. The services were well attended by large and daily increasing congregations, notwithstanding the most unfavorable condition of weather and roads. The result was certainly that of generally deepened seriousness and concern for religious things, which tended much to facilitate my efforts in dealing with

the more remiss members of my flock. In fact, it appears to have decidedly strengthened the Church's influence in this place.

Baptisms, 16; viz., 1 adult, 15 infants; Marriages, 1;

Burials, 6.

I am sorry that we have not as yet been able to do more for the Church Society. I have plans in preparation which I trust will have the effect of greatly increasing the amount

of our contributions during the coming year.

Assessment, \$400; Church Society (including a Life Membership), \$100.60; Domestic Missions, \$12; Foreign Missions, being thank offering after ten days' Mission, \$43.35; Bishop's College, \$6.20; Other purposes, \$203.20. Total, \$765.35.

DUDSWELL.

The Rev. T. S. Chapman reports:—

"St. Paul's," as usual, has had the morning service, and "the Good Shepherd" the afternoon, and St. Paul's again in the evening. The congregations, on the whole, have been steady and encouraging, with some increase in num-

bers attending the Holy Communion.

I have kept up, pretty regularly, the large printed sheet lessons, spoken of in my report of last year, with, I hope, general benefit to all ages of my congregations, and I think I can safely say also, with general acceptance. I have never allowed this exercise to exceed five minutes in duration, and it has been taken up at the regularly appointed time for catechetical instruction. I mention this again in the hope that some af my brethern of the Clergy will also try the same experiment, and give the result of their own experience. For my part, I have no hesitation in saying that I consider this attempt at public catechising a success, and very valuable as an auxiliary to the Sunday School, as through it your whole congregation, old and young, for the time being becomes your class.

Our Model School is in successful operation, under Miss Alice French. She succeeded Miss Brown in January last, who was obliged to leave us. The good moral influence of Miss Brown upon her pupils, will not soon be forgotten.

There is at present an ebb in the number of our elder papils capable of taking up advanced studies (though the entire number in attendance is large, in fact every seat in our school-room is occupied) which I trust neither our Church Society nor the Protestant Committee of Superior Education will hold us accountable. The smaller children will soon come forward to fill the ranks of the Model School classes.

Our people owe a debt of gratitude for the grants heretofore made them in behalf of education, which I trust they

duly feel and appreciate.

For various reasons, 1 have not given any Sunday services at St. Thomas' Church, Westbury, for now nearly a year, the chief of these, is the fact that a third Church at such a distance is too much for my health, and besides, the attendance was not encouraging, and there was no contribution towards helping to make up the large assessment upon the Mission. An effort is being made to meet the amount required by the Diocesan Board for the Stipend of a resident Clergyman, which I hope will soon be accomplished.

A contribution to make up a balance of \$80, due upon the Church Organ of the Good Shepherd, at the same time as the collections for the Church Society, I am sorry to say, has made the sum less than last year.

Assessment, \$300; Church Society, \$19.35; Foreign Missions, \$1.57; Domestic Missions, \$2.50; Other Purposes, \$96.11. Total, \$419.53.

DURHAM.

The Rev. G. T. Harding reports :-

As far as I am able to judge, without being too sanguine, the work here is prospering and giving many indi-

cations of good fruit soon to come.

Among these good indications, the congregations may be noticed first. I am thankful to see, that whereas formerly they were very good—and in some cases remarkable—during certain seasons of the year, and at other times, when the weather was less favorable, became very small; now, they continue good in almost all kinds of weather,

thus being of a much more steady character, and shewing, probably, a larger average attendance than in many previous years. In confirmation of this, it may be stated that the offertory for this year, deducting special collections, is the largest received during my incumbency.

The case is similar in regard to the attendance at Holy Communion. Formerly, most of the members managed to communicate the prescribed three times a year; now, I

notice that more of them have become regular.

Another good indication of progress—one, indeed, which gives me the greatest encouragement—is the unusual manifestation, lately, of earnestness on the part of many young persons. I have been able to gain the confidence of some of these, and was, on one or two occasions, quite surprised and gratified to see the sincerity of their religious inten-As an instance, I may mention that two or three young men, unmarried, have voluntarily undertaken the duty of family worship themselves, or been the means of having it performed in their homes. Some others, just beginning married life, are following a similar course, and testifying in other ways their earnestness in religion. may add, too, that many of these, under the influence of strong temptation to stray away from the fold of the Church, have proved the stability of their convictions and the strength of their devotion to Her interests, by remaining firm, in spite of all attempts to turn them.

Another cause for gratitude, and a mark of progress, is the feeling manifesied, generally, towards your Missionary. I seem, to some extent, by the favour of Almighty God, to have secured the good-will of both old and young, and have received many marks of their confidence.

Lastly, there is the matter of offerings made for outside objects, to which I have often before referred in encouraging terms, and which, this year, is no less a subject for thankfulness. As shewing that there is steady progress in this respect, I may say, that in 1879, the amount raised was \$58.47, while this year the figures are \$109.77.

The amounts collected this year by means of Mission Cards are as follows: Miss Ginn, \$15.75; Miss Burrill, \$12.00; Mrs. R. Skillen, \$11.00; Miss Holmes, \$10.75; Miss Ployart, \$10.00; Miss Doyle, \$8.55; Miss A. Lyster, \$8.35; Miss E. McDougall, \$5.00. Total, \$81.40.

In this good work, as will be seen in the financial statement, L'Avenir stands first again, and South Durham second; though Upper Durham also is steadily improving.

Thus far, I have given only the bright side of things, and it must not be supposed therefrom, that there are no gloomy features connected with the work. Many discouragements meet your Missionary from time to time, in the prosecution of his labour. The difficulty of making up the amount of the assessment which has always been great, shows no signs as yet of abatement. And while I feel strongly that the sum required of us is nothing more than reasonable, and that we ought now, even to be self-supporting, I am conscious of a great want of sympathy with me in this, on the part of many members of the Church; being often surprised and grieved at the short sighted spirit I meet with, and the weak faith of those whom God has prospered, and who cannot more willingly and freely give to Him, remembering that He is able to recompense them a thousand

I ought not to close without referring again to the good work done here by the Diocesan Missioner. Another "Mission" was held by him, during last Advent, in the Church of St. Paul, L'Avenir, it being the third altogether in Durham. Much of what was said about the other two will apply to the last one; as it was conducted in like manner, and with similar immediate effects. Taking them now, altogether, and speaking with reference to general results, I cannot but feel that they have been good.

I need scarcely say that the services during the past year have been kept up with the usual regularity.

FAST FRAMPTON.

The Rev. F. Boyle writes:-

I have been enabled to keep up my two Sunday services, (not passing by many of the leading holidays,) with unfailing regularity during the year which is now just closing. The services in both churches, taking everything into consideration, have been fairly-well attended. This is especially true during the summer months. What I stated in my report last year about my Standon congregation, I endorse again this year. Only allow me to extend the remark that the people there, owing to the loss in their number, are not able to meet their full assessment, for they have only paid thirty dollars out of forty which is now due. My earnest prayer for this congregation is that our Bishop and the Diocesan Board may see fit to spare them the services of the church some years longer. This can only be done by reducing the present assessment.

As to Hemison congregation I have to report this year the loss of three of my leading church families, who have emigrated to the States, and more are looking forward to follow them in the spring. This is a loss which we feel financially and socially, and we have had no acquisitions, and not likely to have any, to fill the vacancy thus created.

GASPE BASIN.

The Rev. J. P. Richmond reports:-

During the past year the services of the Church have been regularly held in this Mission and have been well attended. Besides the regular work of the Mission I have served as far as possible the Mission of Sandy Beach in which I had eighteen services besides visitation and Communion of the sick, burial of the dead and other calls for my services. ay services, with unfailust closing. 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urch have en well ation I have y Beach in and Comr calls for St. Paul's Church.—The congregations have been larger than usual owing to the vacancy in Sandy Beach which caused many of the people from that Mission to frequent this Church. Some little addition has been made to the interior of the Church and the building is ready for consecration.

St. James' Church, South West Arm.—This congregation has been struggling to meet its assessment. Since the assessment was doubled in, I think, the year 1871, the people have always experienced difficulty and especially during the last two bad seasons. The exodus of many young men who were absent the whole year and some of whom have not yet returned, caused a heavy pecuniary loss to the Wardens, so that in that time in spite of extra assessment on those remaining, the Wardens are deficient one quarter's assessment.

Peninsula.—For the same reason fell back in the same way, but owing to a "good season's" fishing have been able to redeem the loss. This Church is now finished and is ready for consecration. The Church Society's grant enabled the congregation to complete the building. There are about 161 Church people in this part of the Mission and several scattered people on the St. Lawrence, who look to this Church for all ministrations which they may require i.e. fifteen people at Griffon Cove, nine miles from Peninsula, fifteen people at Fox, six miles further on, and nine persons at Fame Point, seventeen miles still further.

Little Gaspé.—At last I am glad to report that the old debt on the Church is paid. For the last three years a little was paid yearly, but last Easter it was determined to make an effort to pay the debt and with clean books to apply for the grant of the S. P. C. K., which had lapsed and also to apply to the Church Society. The people agreed to give the proceeds of St. Peter's day fishery to the Church. It realized about \$70 and quite unexpectedly was supplemented by a cheque for \$100 from Mr. Luce of Jersey, a member of the firm of Messrs. Fruing &Co. The two sums more than paid the debt. The S. P. C. K., made a liberal grant of £25 and the Church Society one of \$100, so that now with the labour of the people, the new Church commenced about twenty years ago can be repaired and finished, I hope, in time for consecration next summer.

HATLEY AND WATERVILLE.

The Rev. Albert Stevens reports:—

At Hatley the congregations have been good on the whole, though they are not yet what they ought to be. The Parsonage debt has been reduced by \$600 which leaves a balance with accrued interest of about \$275. The ladies of the guild have raised during the year about \$150 and deserve great credit for the interest they have taken in all Church work. A kind friend of the mission has generously given me \$100 to be added to the Endowment Fund as an acknowledgment for benefits received from the ministrations of the late Bishop Stewart, who was the first missionary of the church stationed here. He came in 1817, just sixty-six years ago.

At Waterville there has been a decided improvement in the number attending the service. The church has been newly painted and a carpet provided for the chancel at a cost of about \$100. A very successful "mission" was held here in June last and a good foundation laid for future work.

The usual fortnightly Sunday evening service has been kept up at Massawippi and the congregation has been about as usual.

At North Hatley the fortnightly Sunday service has been kept up as regularly as the state of the roads and the weather would permit. The congregations have varied consider-

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e has been e weather considerably. The fornightly Wednesday reving service at Libbytown has been maintained throughout the year. I have always found a good and attentive congregation to welcome me, and I consider this a field that will show good results for work done there.

I have also held during the summer a fortnightly service

at the Sutton School house in Barnston.

Though the work at these out-stations is not as encouraging as one could wish yet, I think it, on the whole profitable, my object is to cover as much as possible of the ground within the limits of the mission, and to bring the Church's influence to bear upon as many persons as possible. For I believe that the quiet orderly service of the Church though held but occasionally in any neighbourhood has a decided influence in checking not only vice but also fanaticism.

I am happy to be able to report an increase in the amount of money raised not only for home use but also for outside

objects.

We were encouraged by a visit from the Bishop in October last, when twenty-six persons were Confirmed.--15 at Water ville and 11 at Hatley. I hope to have another class for confirmation ready for next summer.

My register shows the following entries: Baptisms adults,

7; Infants, 18; total 25. Marriages, 4; Burials, 13.

Amounts collected for all Church purposes, viz:—Assessment, \$450.00; Church Society, \$44.85; Domestic Missions, \$8.00; Foreign Missions, \$11.00; Bishop's College, \$4.56, Other purposes, \$992.67. Total, \$1511.00.

INVERNESS.

The Rev. P. Roe reports:—

The most stirring event in the annual history of this parish, has been the "Mission," held in the Church of the Ascension, Campbell's Corners, in the month of January! These services were well attended. The Missioner, as usual, was most successful in "shaking up the dry bones," and, no doubt, has been the means, under the Spirit's teaching of causing many careless souls: these impressions it is to be devoutly hoped, may, in many cases, prove lasting; the

services, I am sure, helped others who were looking anxiously for grace and help in their journey Zionward.

The usual work of this Mission has gone on uninterruptedly throughout the year. The services at St. Stephen's and the Church of the Ascension have been, as a rule, well attended; occasional services have been held at Lysander Falls, and the usual monthly service, with one or two exceptions in bad weather, at St. Julie Station.

The number of regular attendants at the new Church of the Ascension has increased considerably during the year. We have a good organ in the Church, and I think the music and the singing are attracting the young people. There seems to be a most excellent spirit prevailing all the members. A state of things most gratifying to the Incumbent. A very handsome marble Font, the gift of Mrs. Reed, was placed in this Church in August last.

The Sunday Schools at St. Stephen's and Church of the Ascension, are increasing in members, they are both well attended, and the progress is very satisfactory. We held two Pic-nics in September, one at St. Stephen's, the other in Young's Grove, Gosford Road, and both were duly appreciated by old and young.

I have received several letters from my friend, the Rev. A. A. Von Island, which would never have been written, if the members of the Church, in this Mission, had been more punctual in their payments to the Diocesan Board. I think, from what I can learn, it has not been a very prosperous season with our farmers; but the small demand made on them by the Board might be punctually paid. Manitoba and the far West are attracting many of our Protestant settlers in these townships, who frequently sell out to French Canadians; we have lost two families in our Mission during the past year. From present appearances, not very many years hence, the greater part of these townships in Megantic will be French Canadian.

The balance of debt due, W. S. Thomas, Esq., for advances made by him towards enlargement of the Parsonage, is now in process of liquidation, and I hope will be soon paid up in full. I have received assistance from friends of the Church in Quebec, towards paying off a debt incurred for sundry repairs and improvements in and around the Parsonage.

Ellen Jane Patterson, Ellen Brown and Susy Patterson had to pay visits to about 40 houses, scattered over an area of many miles, to collect the quarters and half dollars that make up the sum total.

IRELAND.

The Rev. T. L. Ball reports :—

I am thankful to say I have been able to go on for another year, with the exception of four Sundays in the winter, when I took advantage of the D'ocesan Missioner's visit, for a month's holidays. My work has been a little lightened by the vacancy in the parish school. As we could get no assistance from the Superior Education Fund, the Church Society or School Commissioners, we very reluctantly closed the school. The funds of the School Commissioners are now in better condition and the prospects encouraging for opening the school early next year. The tide of emigration has at last reached us. Not less than a hundred persons have removed from the Parish within the year, and their places taken, with the exception of one family, by Roman Catholics. The mission comprise Wolfestown, Colerain and Thetford.

We have to mourn the death of Thos. Wood, of Wood-side, one of the most zealous members and Lay Delegate to the Synod since its lirst organization in this Diocese. The Ladies' Association are devoting their energies for the purchase of a new organ for Trinity Church.

I held a fortnightly service at Millfield, on Sunday evenings, during the summer. The people there having no public worship regularly, the Minister of the Congregationalists having left early in the year. Though we have very few Church members in the vicinity, the attendance was good, and warm feelings for the Church incited. This point is four miles from the Lower Ireland Church. I wish I could report more progress on the erection of the proposed new Church there. The building committee have selected a plan and complied with the Canon, and I trust will show steady advance next year. The Bishop, on his visit at Adderley, was impressed with the increase of the congregation. The Church property here has now a very neat appearance, the fencing of the burying-ground being completed, through the exertions of Mr. Thomas Walsh.

The Rev. J. S Sykes reports:-

The services of the Church have been regularly maintained, in the three Churches of the Mission during the past year.

The attendance has been good. Holy Communion is now celebrated once a month in every Church of this Mission.

Our Lenten services were well attended owing "perhaps to the fact that they were a preparation for a mission."

"A mission," which was held in St. Paul's, Sydenham Place, in the month of February, was attended by large and attentive congregations. Another was held at Holy Trinity, Denison's mills in the month of September, not so largely attended. The roads were very bad at the time, the nights pitch dark, and the journey to and from the Church had to be made in the pouring rain.

The Church-Wardens of St. Paul's, Sydenham Place, have, with commendable zeal, placed new wire fencing round the Church-yard—repaired the broken plaster in the

Our Church Steeple now glistens in the sunshine and can be seen for miles in every direction. Messrs. John and Henry W dleigh, John Armstrong and Joseph Lodge have again each supplied me with a load of good hav. I am indebted to all the people in my Mission for supplies in

general.

In the beginning of July, we held our Sunday School Pic-nic. We had a short service in the Church with a special address to the children. After which we adjourned to the Parsonage grounds where a most elaborate and sumptubus repast was provided, to which great attention was paid by old and young alike. The tables cleared, various games were played outside, while those who preferred the strains of the violin with harmonium accompaniment kept within the house.

In August, a second gathering of the Sunday Schools took place at Mr. Thomas Lodge's grove where all met

to enjoy themselves.

Three Sunday Schools have been in operation during the Summer. The one at Spooner Pond still conducted by Miss Evans, the scholars showing their appreciation of their teacher's kindness and untiring efforts for their good by a very regular attendance, and exceptionally good conduct.

The Sunday School at Holy Trinity, Denison's Mills, owes its existence to the zeal of Mr. Albert Carson and Miss Barlow, assisted by other members of the congregation. The attendance was very good averaging 20 every Sunday.

My own Sunday School at St. Paul's, of which I am sole superintendent and teacher numbers 16, with an average

attendance of 12.

A communion table, reading-desk, and pulpit have been added to the furniture of the Church at Spooner Pond; and we are indebted to the generosity of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Wilcox, of Richmond, for the gift of handsome communion vessels, and alms-dish

In addition to \$75 already given towards furnishing the Chancel, Henry Evans, Esq., of Montreal, is about to present us with an Altar cloth.

A small horse-shed has been built by the members of the Spooner Pond congregation.

A Sewing Society has been started under the Presidency of Mrs. John Evans, the proceeds of which are to go towards Church purposes.

We are deeply indebted to the Central Board for the second \$50 thus completing the grant of \$100 to the Spooner

Pond Church.

LABRADOR.

The late Missionary, Revd. R. W. Brown, left the Coast in September and has accepted a mission in the Diocese of Montreal; until a successor can be found the mission is in charge of a Catechist.

That portion of the Coast which comprises the Mission

within the Diocese of Quebec is 300 miles long.

The Church people have increased between the Bishop's two last visits from 300 to 500, chiefly by the influx of Newfoundland fishermen. During the Bishop's Visitation last summer 65 were confirmed.

LEEDS.

The Rev. J. Kemp reports:-

St. James' Church.—The work here continues as when reported last year. The same round of public services, and house to house visitations.

Here being the residence of the clergyman, and the congregation assessed at the highest rate, we have the greatest

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Total.

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number of regular Sunday services; morning, once in two weeks; on every Sunday evening during the year. The congregations about the same as when last reported, or perhaps something smaller, owing to withdrawals and removals.

Sunday School.—We have a Sunday School in connection with this congregation, only kept during the summer months—about thirty on the books. Mr. G. Bayne, lay delegate, as usual, takes charge of it, assisted by some young ladies of the congregation, to whom I hereby record my acknowledgment.

Mrs. Marshall still presides at the organ. The Church has been decorated for Xmas, and looks remarkably well. The zeal of those who took part in the work deserve all commendation, involving as it did some nine or ten evenings

of their work, in preparing the decorations.

St. Mark's Church, Kinnear's Mills.—In this Church the services have been held as hitherto, once in two weeks in the afternoon, and twice in six weeks in the morning. The congregations have not been as good, owing to deaths, removals and perhaps one or two withdrawals, the fruit of mixed marriages.

Mission Services.—On Sunday, the 7th of October, the Rev. I. Thompson commenced a temporary "mission" in this Church. The Church was crowded, to overflowing our own people turned out fairly well, but we were almost swamped by outsiders, very gratifying in one way, and made the whole thing apparently a great success; but our own people were not so personally dealt with as they might have been, had there been only a few besides Church people; and I fear that the results will not tell so well for the Church as we had hoped; several however came to the Holy Communion for the first time, who, I trust, will continue. God grant the seed may not have been sown in vain.

Broughton.—Here we are a handful among a vast French population, and the Protestants leaving. Services only once in six weeks, and some times, owing to roads, the appointments cannot be kept, which makes it twelve weeks between one service and another. Congregation small, people poor, find it difficult to make up the assessment of \$20 per aunum. This place could be more readily reached from

the Quebec Central, being on the line; it was once part of

Rev. Mr. King's missionary district.

Harvey Hill Mines.—Service here on my way home from Broughton. Very few. Nothing doing at Mines, only two families being there, besides four or five members in the neighbourhood. Pay little or nothing.

Beatties.—A settlement six miles from Leeds Village. Sunday services in Summer, week day services in Winter. Congregation about 50 (fifty); have promised to help in making up St. James' assessment.

Frizzells.—Week day service about once a month. Something contributed towards Kinnear's Mills' assessment.

Subscriptions to Church Society.—The amount contributed for the whole mission, including offertories, is about fifty-four dollars, besides over twenty-four dollars for Foreign and Domestic Missions.

MAGDALEN ISLANDS.

The Rev. J. Chambers reports:—

Few can know the exact state of this Mission.

The Islands are thirteen in number, seven of which are inhabited and are situated ten to twenty miles from each other respectively; extending a distance of about forty-five miles from east to west.

The Church of England people are scattered widely over

the group and number four hundred people.

Side by side are four thousand Roman Catholics.

Cut off from all shipping communication with the outside world for nearly six months by an impenetrable barrier of pack ice, that surrounds the islands during the greater part of this long and miserable winter, the place becomes a "little world in itself" to the inhabitants.

Friendships, associations and attachments must of necessity be formed, and as the Church of England members form such a feeble minority, the religious influence of the

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t of necesmembers nce of the Roman Catholics would preponderate, were it not for the Divine blessing resting upon the Society's endeavours to spread the Gospel, and enabling the people generally to prefer that Gospel and see its superiority to that of any other system.

But still danger exists: not in Romanism as a direct power, but indirectly, in the facilities offered for mixed marriages; and occasionally the utmost tact and care is required to break up one of these engagements and divert their attentions.

In the summer a different evil presents itself. When, besides the ordinary fishing business, ten large "Lobster Canning Factories" are in full operation, the islands become a centre for a number of roving and questionable characters seeking employment. These bring either their "isms" or infidelity with them, and what with their corrupted systems of religious belief, and their more corrupted state of life, much evil is propagated through their means.

One can from the above, form some small estimate of the damaging influence brought to bear against the work of Christ, and how difficult a task for one clergyman alone to

cope with the evil.

Although the number of my people is small, yet the area over which they are spread is wide, and frequently the approaches to these islands are difficult and dangerous. Moreover, as most of the journeying has to be done in an open boat, the Missionary must be governed entirely by the weather and consequently punctual visits to any of the stations is impossible.

All the islands have been visited as regularly as weather

permitted.

Entry Island.—From Entry Island two families and a few individuals have emigrated to Cape Breton, but I anticipate their return next spring, as I do not think they will improve their condition. The movement has reduced the congregation from the number of 78 to 57. It has also the evil effect of lessening the probability of a day school, as the remainder cannot well afford to pay for a teacher.

Amherst Island.—There are only four families here. A neat little Church was built some years back by the zeal of a former missionary, but the expenses of repairs must rest with the residing missionary; for the congregation is too

small to render effective aid. It is at present under repair which will cost \$120.

Grindstone Island.—The Parsonage is here, and the con-

gregation number in all 115 souls.

On this island the people work hard for their Church and school. If once the material is purchased they execute all the work themselves. This prevents a great outlay, and speaks volumes for the good-will of the people.

Grosse Isle—Under this name are comprised several other places: e.g. "Grand Entry," "Old Harry," "East Cape and Grosse Isle North and South." The congregation number in all 181.

The new Church is perfectly completed and fit for Divine Service. It will accommodate about 200 people. It has never been in debt, for I was determined not to drive a nail, unless we had the means in hand to pay for it.

A good school has been in operation this summer, but owing to the widely scattered state of the inhabitants entire

satisfaction could not be given to all.

Bryon Island.—This is the most difficult of the Mission stations. It is situated ten miles to the North of Grosse Isle and can only be visited at rare intervals, on account of the dangerous and heavy seas which rapidly rise, and our small boats are too frail for this purpose, though good seaboats and fit for the other parts of the group.

MAGOG AND GEORGEVILLE.

The Rev. James Hepburn reports:—

One encouraging feature of my work is that people are learning to give for the privileges of the Church *i. e.*, to give freely and heartily as a duty, and not merely to give because they hate to refuse, or because their refusal might be commented upon to their hurt.

In my newer stations a readiness to volunteer support has been shown from time to time; and among the older members I am sure the delight of giving is frequently felt.

I must give one instance. One evening in a School-house after evening prayer, I spoke of the increased assessment put upon the Mission, and said I thought it right that they

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er support the older tently felt, hool-house assessment that they to whom I ministered as frequently as I could should help to meet the increase. The suggestion was enough. On the spot a list of contributions was made out. A few days later a woman of the congregation met me and gave me twentyfive cents—the gift of a young lad who was obliged to earn his own living, and help to support his parents who were poor. He did not like to give such a small sum himself; soon he hoped to be able to give more.

And speaking of interest in the Church as proved by giving, brings me to mention a most munificent gift by Mr. Ralph Merry, Warden of St. Luke's Church, Magog. At our annual Easter business meeting he spoke to me quietly but confidently of the favourable prospects of the Church, and said that in a few years doubtless a larger building would be needed to accommodate us than the present; and that also a parsonage should be erected as a home for the Incumbent; and that a site should now be chosen large enough for the two buildings, whenever it would be deemed time to build them.

Then he concluded his remarks by telling us to our immense delight that he had an acre of ground in a very desirable place (the choicest in the whole village, it proved to be) which he would be pleased to deed to the Church. A dead silence followed this announcement, broken by himself saying that now he was old and feeble, and would not have many opportunities of doing work, and therefore must do it now for the Church he loved so well, and which he hoped would prove a blessing to those who would live after him!

Business men have since reported that the gift is quite worth \$2000.

I am sorry to record that the extra services held in my Churches even during the seasons of Advent and Lent have not been well attended. The country has not yet discovered the great need of such seasons; but we may hope that if the clergy faithfully continue to observe them the people will gradually learn from them.

The Sunday School for the first time in it history gave the offertory for the year (\$10) to the Diocese of Algoma. It seems very desirable to educate the youngest members of the Church that there is something they can do just as well as their elders.

Through the kindness of the Bishop, I had a most enjoyable holiday with him in my old Mission of Labrador. It is never easy to leave a parish; it was unusually difficult this year through the influx of labourers engaged in build-

ing the Print Factory in Magog.

At the time of His Lordship's invitation reaching me, Mr. Thompson, the Diocesan Missioner chanced to be with me, and urged me to accept the offer, very kindly promising to take a month of duty for me. The remaining Sundays were taking by neighbouring clergy. Dr. Roe of Lennoxville, Mr. Brown of Mansonville, Mr. Clayton of Bolton, Mr. Read of Lennoxville, and Mr. Wurtele of Acton.

Mr. Stevens of Hatley, also very kindly gave a monthly service in one of my School-houses which I desire to keep open, about eight miles distant from his home. To these

gentlemen my heartiest thanks are due.

I may add, that, with the building up of Magog, we begin to entertain hopes of a subdivision of the parish. Each centre will require a settled pastor, and must have one as soon as suitable terms can be made with the Diocesan Board.

The Rev. J. R. Walters reports:—

I feel sorry that I am unable to send a more flourishing financial report this year from this Mission, for outside objects.

flourishing for outside But somehow we have felt the pressure of our assessment of \$300, which in order to make up, we have had to lend every effort.

The reason being that a few of those who helped us largely in Church matters, have left this Mission and there being no influx of ontsiders, and depending as my people do, almost without exception, upon the fishing for a livelihood, which of itself, is of such a precarious nature, but those who follow it, often when the season is ended, find themselves financially little better off than when they began.

Though this year the merchants have given the fishermen a splendid price for their fish, yet the catch of fish on the whole has been far below that of last year.

This being the only industry in this Mission, it is plainly to be seen, but my people have but the few short summer months from the last of May to the first of November, in which to earn their year's bread. I think I may safely say that mine is the only Mission along the coast where the people (most of them) depend "entirely" upon the fishing. Not only so but we maintain four School Teachers in this Mission. One in Malbaie, one in the New Line, one at Barachois and another at the corner of the Beach, with but the aid of a very small Government Grant. I would plead here the help of the Colonial and Continental Church Society, in behalf of our school work, for in no place, could their help be better extended than in assisting us in this coast Mission. I have throughout the year conducted every Sunday (and on the appointed Fasts and Festivals) Divine Service, at Malbaie, Corner Beach and Barachois school house, and have as often as occasion would permit conducted service at Sandy Beach, in the morning, with a celebration of Holy Communion. I have started here a branch of the Church of England Temperance Society, and have so far enrolled forty-three names, though I do not find it taken up as freely as one could wish, many persons feeling a kind of contempt for the name "temperance," not so much perhaps the cause, and yet are ready and willing to admit the truth of its work and good.

I wish here to thank those who helped us last year with our Tea Party. Especially Messrs. W. Bower, G. P. Fauvel, and C. Le Marquand which brought us in \$64.50.

We have this summer put a very pretty pulpit and prayer desk in the Church. Made from designs in Cox & Sons' book, by Drum & Co. of Quebec, which cost us \$66.50. I must here thank Mrs. Alexander, a lady of this Mission, for the prayer desk, (of ash and walnut).

I must also thank a very kind friend Geo. Sears, Esq., of Toronto, for the gift of \$20 to our Church work; also, his sister Mrs. Humphrey for a present of books for our Sunday

School.

We are getting up a sale of fancy work for the new year. I must thank here the Re 5. B. Ker of Trinity Church, Quebec, for his kindness in sending us a very nice box of things.

Also Mrs. Williams, in sending a box of things for the

poor.

I am sorry to chronicle the loss of Adolphus Collas, Esq., who has left the Mission to reside in Jersey. In Mrs. Collas, the Church had a very warm supporter here, and a ready helper in all good works.

FORTNEUF.

The Rev. R. W. Colston reports:-

Services have been kept up, without intermission every Sunday during the past year, both in the village School House and in Christ's Church, Halesboro'. In the latter place the congregations fell off greatly during the past winter, on account of the severitly of the weather and the almost impassable condition of the roads. Some idea of the condition of things may be gathered from the fact that eight Sundays I had to break out the roads from the village to the Halesboro' Church, and, as a rule, on these Sundays, when, after from two to four hours hard work, reach the Church, it was to find either the door locked, or a congregation of "one"—the Sexton. I shall hope that the past year has been one of real spiritual progress in addition to the regular Sunday services, The Holy Seasons of Advent and Lent have been carefully

observed. During the former your missionary held four special services each week,—In the Hardwood School House, in the Church at Halesboro', in the House of Mr. Thos Jess near the Railroad Station and in the village School House. All these were attended by thoughtful, carnest congregations anxious to hear the Church of Christ's message of solemn warning and holy comfort. Daring the latter, three special services were held, in the Hardwood School House, in the Church and in the village School House. Holy week was marked by daily services in the Church and in the village School House. At all these services a Sermon or Short Address was given. Your missionary is happy to be in a position to report that the long-talked of Church in Portneuf village will this spring be built. In a few days we hope that the contract will be signed. This happy consummation of our hopes is to a very large extent due to the generosity of a Quebec lady, Miss Davidson, who gave us the princely gift of \$350, on the condition that the people raised \$500. This has been done. It required no little self denial on the part of many of the people, but all felt encouraged by Miss Davidson's generosity and deemed it a sacred duty on their part to show their gratitude to her, by the amount of their subscriptions.

Our Temperance Association has been in full blast for nearly three years. It has become, I believe, a power for good in the community, while, it has gained the respect of our French neighbours. Still, until we have a Diocesan organization the individual Pastor, will find himself heavily handicapped in his temperance work, and all those who are actively associated with him will find the work to be " uphill." I cannot close this report without recording my own personal thanks to Miss Dollie Ford, for the thorough and conscientious way in which she has filled the office of organist during the past year both in the services of the sanctuary and also at our Temperance Meetings, and also to Miss Reynolds for occasionally acting in the same capacity for the services in the Church. To all my people, for their many acts of kindness and love I desire to express my sincere thanks. I append the usual statistical report of the whole amount \$304. The Village Congregation gave \$202. The Congregation of Christ's Church, Halesboro', \$102.

SHIGAWAKE AND PORT DANIEL.

The Rev. C. D. Brown reports:-

In this Mission there are three Churches with their separate congregations, viz: Shigawake, Port Daniel, and l'Anse au Gascon.

The Mission extends along the coast of the Baie des Chaleurs, from the larger Nouvelle river on the west, to the River Pabos, on the east, a distance of about thirty miles.

The Parsonage is situated at Shigawake, distant six miles from the Church at Port Daniel, and fifteen miles from the Church at l'Anse au Gascon.

During the past year Divine Service, and celebrations of the Holy Communion have been conducted with the accustomed regularity.

During the past winter alternate Services were held each Lord's Day at Shigawake and Port Daniel, excepting every fourth Sunday, when two Services were given at L'anse au Gascon, and a third one occasionally, in the evening, at Port Daniel, on the Missionary's return home. This arrangement is changed, however, for the present winter, and, a morning service given every fourth Sunday at l'Anse au Gascon, with regular Services in the other two Churches. And during the summer mouths alternate Services were also given every Lord's Day at Shigawake and Port Daniel, with a fortnightly Evening Service at l'Anse au Gascon. Also special Services have been held. On the whole, all these have been well attended, and characterized by hearty responding, singing, and much reverence. Pastoral visitation has been carried out with fair regularity.

The Missionary has received much cordial co-operation from the Church-Wardens of the several stations; and especially from Mr. William Skene, in his capacity as Senior Warden and Superintendent of the Sunday School of St. Paul's, Shigawake.

o-operation; and espeas Senior hool of St. The "Annual Statistical Table" sent from the Board does not permit the separate amounts realized from each congregation to be shown.

Reference must, therefore, be made to one item in the "Table," viz.: that of "Other purposes." This amount (\$201.22) includes the Offertory; repairs on the Parsonage; and new seats with other improvements in St. Paul's Church. For the work on the Parsonage the people throughout the whole Mission displayed much liberality, in consequence of which, it is now in a habitable condition being both comfortable and warm, the latter an important consideration in this severe climate.

Some help was received from the Messrs. Chas. Robin & Co.; LaBoutillier & Co.; John LeGrand, Esq.; and Mrs. Daniel Bisson, of Paspebiac.

New seats, which were much required, have been placed in St. Paul's Church, Shigawake. They are massive, strong, and look remarkably well. Other improvements have been also accomplished, making the Church look very nice.

The Communion Table, however, looks bare for want of a proper Altar cloth. A Pulpit is to be erected shortly. The health of the Community has been better this year than last, the death rate being fifty per cent less.

In the early part of this year death removed from our midst Mr. William Skene, sr., a pious churchman. He was much respected by all.

Also, near the latter part of the year death has taken away Mrs. John Travers a devout Church-women. She was much respected and beloved by all.

The Christmas decorations reflect much credit on the young people who got them up.

As hitherto, so also this year the Missionary has been the recipient of much substantial kindness from his Parishioners. His winter's wood gratuitously given by one Parishioner, Mr. Chas. Smith, and drawn by the people from his residence to the Parsonage, demonstrates this forcibly.

STANSTEAD.

The Rev. Geo. Thorneloe reports:-

During the past year, we have had much to encourage us in this Mission.

Our services have been heartier and our congregations larger than in previous years, while the interest manifested in Church work has been less confined to the few.

The average attendance at Holy Communion has also been somewhat larger than usual.

Two classes have been presented to the Bishop for Confirmation; one of 13 in Stanstead, and the other of 6 in Beebe Plain.

Of those baptized this year 13 were adults.

Aided by a generous grant from the Church Society we have raised the mortgage from our parsonage. A small balance remains still to be collected. But it has been made a matter of personal obligation. The parsonage is in reality free from all incumbrance.

The total amount raised in the parish for all purposes exceeds that of last year by about \$300.

Altogether we have great reason "to thank God and take courage."

And yet we have discouragements enough to keep us humble. One of the chief of these discouragements I must once more refer to. It is the continued drain made upon our ranks by the removal from our midst of people seeking more thriving business centres. This year e.g. we have to deplore, amongst others, the removals of Joseph Terill, Esq., and George Bixby, Esq., with their respective families.

The general arrangement of services remains unchanged. I have had three full services on Sunday, with two Bible classes; and an average of two or three week day services throughout the year. The usual special services in Lent and upon the chief days of the Church have also been held as usual.

In Holy Week, the Rev. Isaac Thompson held a Mission in Christ Church, Stanstead. His labours—which it is need-

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less to characterize as most earnest and self devoted—were plainly influential for good. The services were not very largely attended; nor were their effects upon individuals specially marked; but the general influence of the Mission was very observable throughout this portion of our parish. Recalling the encouraging symptoms referred to above, it is fair to suggest that perhaps under God this special Mission, held amongst us by Mr. Thompson, may have been the means of awakening us to fresher religious life.

In addition to the help afforded me by Rev. Mr. Thompson, who gave me also an extra Sunday in August, I have had assistance on two other Sundays from Rev. T. S. Chapman, of Dudswell, and Mr. Bernard. Divinity student,

of Lennoxville.

We are also indebted to the Rev. Dr. Lobley, of Bishop's College, for a most interesting Missionary address, delivered I am sorry and ashamed to say to a lamentably small congregation.

A beautiful alms-basin of sterling silver, elegantly engraved, the work of Messrs. J. & R. Lamb, New York, has been presented to Christ Church by Wm. Grannis, Esq., of Chicago, in memory of his mother, a late parishioner.

I acknowledge gratefully the services of the office bearers of the parish. Our young people with praiseworthy zeal have provided funds for a new cabinet organ in place of the old one. Miss Meigs continues faithful to her post and has been supported, in time of need, by the kind and efficient aid of Mrs. H. E. Channell.

In Beebe Plain a most encouraging growth is perceptible. Our people there are learning to rely upon themselves and are beginning to take an active and intelligent part in the support of the Church. At present they are busy completing the appointments of their Church edifice. This year they have put up a bell and built a furnace, the former being paid for by private subscription. A social and industrial association has been organized to promote unity of feeling and to provide further funds.

C. H. McClintock, Fsq., has presented 3 very neat chandeliers; and Messrs. Jamieson & Co., of Montreal, have given varnish, &c., for the finishing of the pews. To both we tender our thanks for their kindness; as also to various ladies who have been so active in Church and Sunday

school work in this corner of the Lord's Vineyard. They shall in no wise loose their reward.

In conclusion, I wish to say that the extent of the Mission renders it impossible for me to visit my people as often as I desire. The amount of time and effort required to search out and visit people who have lost the habit of Church going,—and to bring them past the doors of school houses which pander to their laxity of views and love of ease,—is simply enormous.

One man, even in a parish like mine, can do in this direction but a small fraction of the work that is clamouring to be done. We must seek such people out, we must go and preach to them in their school houses for in no other way can we teach them the duty of Church going, and win them back to habits of worship. Yet we cannot do this duty upon the outskirts faithfully without seeming to neglect other duties in the centres of our parishes.

What we need is more men upon the ground. May the time soon come when we shall be able to secure for the work of this important. Mission field the services of an additional man, student or deacon, to strengthen the incumbent's hands and to cheer his heart in the midst of constantly increasing calls. So might we hope that the master's work would be better done and his Church in this part built upon more enduring foundations.

WEST FRAMPTON.

The Rev. J. B. Debbage reports :-

I think the people of West Frampton will be able to look back on the year just closing, with considerable satisfaction, notwithstanding the unusually heavy demands made on them. rd. They

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In the first place we have succeeded in clearing off the debt on the Parsonage, which has been a burden on the

place for several years.

We have also succeeded in obtaining a new Organ for West Frampton. This cost us ninety dollars, but the money was subscribed before the purchase was made. During the summer some young ladies from Quebec were staying at East Frampton and they kindly offered to get up a musical entertainment for us in order to procure Funds towards a new Organ. This offer we gladly accepted, and they with some other help from East Frampton succeeded in giving us a most enjoyable entertainment.

I must here acknowledge the receipt of very much kindness and help from the people of East Frampton not only

on this, but on other occasions.

Our thanks are due to the incumbent of that Mission for

his presence and help at our entertainment.

An addition was made during the summer to our Church stable, so now there are stables for 21 horses; and without a good stable it is impossible for the people from a distance to attend Church.

The attendance at our Services in both West Frampton and Cranbourne has been very encouraging. We have a Service every Wednesday evening during winter, which the people seem to appreciate very much and this prevents the Church being closed from Sunday to Sunday.

The last event was a visit from his Lordship the Bishop for Confirmation. In West Frampton 1 had twenty-eight candidates, varying in age from the youngest of thirteen to the gray haired old man of seventy years. In Cranbourne I had six candidates.

I have received much personal kindness from the people in both parts of my Mission. Foremost however must stand my Church-Warden, Mr. Wilson, of Cranbourne, and his wife, where I find a home every time I go there. My Church-Warden in Frampton, Mr. John Bartholomew, is ever ready to do what he can, not only for the Church, but for me. These however are not the only ones who hold both themselves and their horses at my service in case of need. My own horse was for a time disabled last winter by being horned by an ox, but I was never allowed to want or to hire one

Shortly before the Bishop's visit I received a very generous present from my people of a fine set of robes for my cariole and \$20.50 towards a new set of harness. This was accompanied by a letter asking me to accept them as "a very small token of their esteem."

I am sorry that we have during the year lost some of our

best supporters by removal from the place.

I have had 16 Baptisms; 3 Marriages, and 2 Burials.

This year the Parsonage has been painted and improved and a Mason & Hamlin Organ acquired for the Church.

For the Organ we are indebted to Miss A. MacAdams, of Quebec City, whose sojourn again with us during this summer gave us the very great advantage of musical services.

We are indebted to Mrs. F. Montizambert, Miss Walker, Rev. Chas. Hamilton, Miss A. MacAdams and others for Christmas tree presents.

The addition of Stoneham to my charge, though increasing my labors, has given me satisfaction, by reason of the hearty and welcome manner in which I am received by its people.

I am glad to say that a general good-will prevails among us and a general desire to promote the common good of the Church.

ST. SYLVESTER AND LAKE BEAUPORT.

The Rev. R. White, doing temporary duty in the above missions since the end of April last, reports:—

The Mission of St. Sylvester.—I have held fortnightly services at St. Giles and St. Sylvester, alternate morning and afternoon, and once a month at Cumberland Mills and St. George, also alternate morning and afternoon.

St. Giles with St. Narcisse comprises not more than eleven families. The congregation is small, averaging some twenty-five people. Many of the inhabitants have left. I was told two families, the early-part of this year, sold their property, left for other parts; this leaves a gap which I feel will not be easy to be filled up, as there appears very little chance of their being replaced by new seekers. The offertory has been good, considering the small number that attend. There has been one baptism and one burial during the past seven months.

St. Sylvester.—The number of families belonging to the Church residing in this part of the mission is nearly the same as St. Giles. The congregation averages from twenty to twenty-six. I fear there will be some difficulty in raising the required sum for the assessment. I baptized one child here the early part of the Summer.

Offertory-Pension Fund, \$2.32.

Cumberland Mills—Congregation good here; usual attendance forty. A very great want at this station is a day school and some one to superintend it. There are some fifteen to twenty children receiving not any instruction whatever. Taking this into consideration, I am thankful to say that the attendance is good, whatever the weather may be, and the devotional bearing proverbial. I baptized two infants there in July last—The assessment has all been collected.

St. George --Here the congregation is very good. Divine Service is held at the Manor House, (Mrs. S. Pozer, senr.) Both she and all her family take great interest in the work. One great want here, the same as at Cumberland Mills, is a day school. The services are always well attended, generally over thirty—two families coming from St. Fabien have to drive ten miles, and four have to come some four or five miles. Offertory fair. The assessment has been paid. I

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have baptized two infants during the past month. I have also visited the Kennebec three times during the last six months, and held a cottage service at three different houses on each occasion. There are only four or five families belonging to the Church on that road. I hold service regularly at the house of Mrs. George Pozer, Scott Junction, both on my way up to St. George and on my return. At present there are only two families residing there.

The remaining Sunday in the month I visit Lake Beauport. I hold service in the morning. The last five Sundays, since the congregation were aware there would be service regularly once a month, the Church has been well attended, considering the few residents there are. The roof of the Church is very defective, so much so, that it is almost

impossible to use the one side.

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The following Reports have been received from Clergymen not in connection with the Diocesan Board.

BISHOP'S COLLEGE, LENNOXVILLE.

The Principal begs to report :-

The number of our Students has not increased since last year. Indeed this could scarcely be expected, as an unusually large number finished last June the course for which they had entered. We have, however, a large First Year, which is a good omen for the future. Of our 22 Students only 14 have declared themselves Candidates for Holy Orders. Of these 6 intend to take work in the Diocese of Quebec, 5 of them being exhibitioners. Since January 1881 only one Candidate for Holy Orders has come to us from any Parish or Mission in this Diocese. The number of Boys in the School has slightly diminished since this time last year. Our number this term is 60.

The Daily Services in the Chapel have been regularly carried on. The Beye of the School now attend both the Chapel Services on Stunday. The Holy Communion has been celebrated during terretime every Sunday and on most of the other Holy Days. The celebration is always at 7 a.m., except on the 1st Sanday in each mouth, when it is at 11.

On the 20th May (Trinity Surday) the Bishop held a Confirmation in the Chapel, when 1 Student and 12 Boys received the Laying on of Hands—These are all now Communicants.

The small debt which at the time of my last report still remained on the Organ has now been paid off, and the Chapel and all things belowing to it are entirely free from debt.

The meetings of the Missienery Union have been regularly held, and I am pleased to note the special interest which is taken in this part of our work by those who happassed from the College into the ranks of the Missionary Clergy. The following clergymen have during the year preached or read papers before the Union—Rev. C. P. Reid, D. C. L., R. D., Rev. R. Lindsay, M.A., Rev. J. Foster, M.A., Rev. G. H. Parker, Rev. F. M. Webster, M.A.

The Offertories in the Chapel have amounted to \$204.50, for the following objects: Chapel Expenses, \$55.14; Organ,

\$40.85; Bishop's College, \$35.04; New Lectern \$10.18; Quebec Mission Fund, \$7.29; General Fund, \$6.43; Domestic Missions, \$3.85; Algoma, \$4.46; Algoma widows' and Orphans' Fund, \$6.83; Foreign Missions, \$21.27; Madagascar (Missionary Union) \$13.18.

The subscriptions of the members of the Missionary Union (for Madagascar) amount to a further sum of \$9.40,

and donations to the Organ Fund to \$97.11.

The Mission Services at Milby and Capelton, are still maintained. At Milby the work is chiefly in the hands of Mr. G. H. Fooks, I am only able, now that I have charge of the School as well as of the College, to go out, as a general rule, on one Sunday in the month. Mr. W. C. Bernard, B.A., and Mr. J. Eames, B.A., take charge of the work at Capelton, which is in nearly the same condition as at the time of my last report.

The Offertories at Milby during the year have amounted to \$95.70, for the following objects:—Current Expenses, \$72.14; Mission Fund, \$4.01; General Fund, \$1.36; Pension Fund, \$3.53; Domestic Missions, \$2.29; Algoma, Widows

and Orphans, \$12.37.

At Capelton the Offertories have amounted to \$22.93, and \$54.00 has been raised in other ways for the expenses of

the Mission

A Confirmation was held at Milby on the 17th June, when 11 candidates were presented. Two candidates from Capelton were confirmed at Lennoxville the same day. There are some hopeful signs about the Milby Congregation but they, as well as the Capelton people, need a great deal more pastoral care than 1 am able to give them.

BEHOL'S COLLEGE MISSIONS.

The Rev. Professor Roe reports:—

The Missions now served from Bishop's College are the Missions of Wilby and Capeltan, in charge of the Rev. Principal Lobley, and those of Ascot Corner, Sandhill, Johnville. Brazel's, Moulton Hill, and Lake Megantic, under the Superintendence of the Professor of Divinity. Of the ethe Rev. Professor Read takes the entire charge of Ascot Corner. He has also given much kind help to the Students in charge of Moulton Hill.

ege are the of the Rev. dhill, Johnortic, under v. Of the e ge of Ascot he Students The Moulton Hill School House is two miles from Lennoxville, two miles of unbroken ascent. There a Bible Class, and Sunday School, have for 3 years been conducted by Mr. F. Ritchie and Mr. W. Worthington. The attendance on the S. School is 29, with an average of 21. This includes adults as well as children, as all the adults who attend the closing service and address, are also members of the Bible Class. Five of the members of this school were presented for confirmation by the Rev. A. C. Scarth last June.

Brazels is a settlement about nine miles from Lennoxville, in the Mission of Eaton, where, by request of the Rev. A. H. Judge, we have lately opened a Sunday School. The adult members of 5 families in this neighbourhood have long been regular attendants upon the services at St. Luke's Church, Sandhill, were in fact won to the Church by those services; but it is too far for their children to go to Sunday School. Accordingly in the Summer I opened the school which Mr. Duncan Mackenzie, B.A., the son of a gentleman in Lennoxville, and one of our Senior Divinity Students shortly afterwards took in charge. The result has been in every way ratisfactory, except that to the very deep regret of every one, Mr. Mackenzie, owing to serious illness, has been obliged to resign. During the lew months he had the charge of Brazels, Mr. Mackenzie won the hearty love and confidence of both parents and scholars, and began a work which will bear fruit, I hope, for many years to come. A fortnight ago, I visited and examined the school and was greatly pleased with the progress already made, and the deep interest in their school manifested by both old and young.

The services reported last year as begun at Lake Megantie were continued by Mr. Richard Hewton, B.A., and myself down to the mid-summer holidays. Since then, I regret to say, owing to several removals from the place and the consequent lack of any one in Agnes willing to take upon himself the burden of attending to the necessary financial arrangements, the services have not been in unied. The distance from Lennovville is 70 miles, and the expense of Railway fare and board alone amounts to a considerable sum per annum. There would be no difficulty about collecting the money required if only the Church people on the spot could arrange among themselves to do it. The

sum of \$116 contributed mostly by friends outside towards building a small Church at Agnes has been deposited in the P. O. Savings Bank by the Treasurer, Mr. Stephen Pearce,

awaiting brighter days.

At St. Luke's Church, Sandhill, regular services on every Sunday, and the major festivals have been conducted during the past year by myself, except during the mid-summer vacation when the Rev. A. C. Scarth, the Rev. A. H. Judge and Mr. Duncan Mackenzie gave services which were much appreciated. There is little new to report from here. Financially the congregation flourishes. The fine Church Bell is up and paid for. The great want in this and all our College Missions, which those whose week days are entirely occupied with College tuition cannot supply, is that of regular pastoral care and visitation. This I hope will soon be supplied to Ascot Corner and Westbury.—For Sandhill I do what I can by giving them an occasional day's visiting on a Cellege holiday: that however is but little.

About two months' ago after long hesitation as to the wisdom of taking upon myself the burden of the additional work, I finally decided to open regular fortnightly services at Johnville, a village on the International Railway, 7 miles from Lennoxville, and lying within the district assigned to St. Łuke's Church, Sandhill. The services so far have been well attended. There is a Sunday School conducted by Mrs. Charles Smith. Johnville affords a promising centre for Church work and ought I think to be occupied by us. It is too soon to say anything about results.

COMPTON LADIES' COLLEGE.

The Rev. J. Dinzey reports:—

On the 15th June last, the Compton Ladies' College closed the ninth year of its existence. During the period, four hundred and forty-seven pupils were wholly or partly educated in the Institution.

Of these, three hundred and lifteen were boarders, the majority of whom came from the Eastern Townships and the cities of Quebec and Montreal, while a most acceptable contingent was furnished by the Maritime Provinces. A fair proportion, 33 of the above, have engaged in the work of tuition, teaching in the Dominion and in the United States. Three have filled responsible positions in this school.

The small number of day pupils, 132, was owing to the inability of the locality to supply, to a greater extent than was the case, a class of pupils sufficiently advanced to meet the requirements of a superior school.

It was a condition with the principal subscriber to the College Fund, that the buildings should be erected in Compton. And, certainly, the beauty of the scenery, and the healthfulness of the neighbourhood are all that can be desired. But un ortunately, for the reasons just given, the school has been deprived in a large measure of that support which is a chief factor in the success of any unendowed educational institution—I mean local patronage.

During the nine years, a sum not less than \$64,000, has been expended in carrying on the work of the College. This amount has been supplied from three sources, viz:—1st. Board and fuition fees. 2nd. Government grants. 3rd. Private means.

The present school year is not sufficiently advanced to

enable me to report thereon.

In regard to the last year, Sep., 1882, to June, 1883, the number attending was somewhat smaller than the average for the previous four years, owing in part to the fact that nineteen young ladies left the school in the summer 1882, thirteen having finished the College course; three leaving for England, whither their parents had gone to reside; and three to attend other schools nearer home. The departure of so many at one time, created a void which it is difficult to fill from the certainly not increasing English speaking population of the Province. And all the more difficult, when church parents, for the sake of saving a few dollars, will ignore their own educational institutions to patronize Roman Catholic Convents. This has frequently happened in connection with the Compton College.

I am thankful to be able to report that the health of the school was excellent throughout the year, and the kindly feeling existing between teachers and pupils most satisfac-

tory.

The staff of teachers—exclusive of the principal—who gave instruction from three to four hours daily, consisted of a Lady Principal, and four governesses. The course of instruction embraced English, in all its branches, French, German, Latin, Drawing, Painting, Needlework and Calesthenics.

Early in May, the Rev. Mr. Alluatt, Special Examiner of High Schools, &c., examined the College and reported most

favourably on the work done.

At the Midsummer Examination, besides book prizes to several in the school, three young ladies received medals. In the Senior Class, a gold medal was awarded, and in the Fourth and Fifth Classes, silver medals. The gold medalist also passed a highly creditable examination for the McGilf and Bishop's College Association in Arts Certificate.

I may here add that four of this year's (1883-84) pupils

are being prepared for the same examination.

In regard to school fees, the terms are very moderate— \$165 per annum, covering all charges for board and laundry, and tuition in English, French, Latin, Drawing and Needlework, &c. Music and German are extras, at moderate rates.

Clergymen's daughters are received at \$150 per annum.

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LENNOXVILLE

The Rev. A. C. Scarth reports:—

St. George's Church.—During the past year a women's guild has been established in the parish, having in view the twofold object, of drawing together in Christian fellowship and social intercourse members of the Christian body, and of aiding in all such good works as may present themselves. So far it has been very successful.

The members of the Missionary Union still continue to meet on the first Monday of each month. It were much to be desired that many more had time and inclination to meet together to pray for the advancement of Christ's Church here on earth.

The memorial window to the late Mr. Doolittle, has at last

been placed at the east end of the Church.

The design was chosen by the Rev. Dr. Roe during his visit to England, and the work was executed by Cox and Son, London.

On the 17th of June, I presented to the Bishop a class of 38 to be confirmed by him, all of whom have become com-

municants.

The financial statement appended shows an apparent increase over the amounts raised last year, but it is only apparent, and is due to one or two exceptional items, which will not appear again. I regret to say that the contributions to all, or nearly all the different objects fall behind those of last year. This is due partly to removals from the parish, and partly to some of our people feeling themselves unable to contribute as liberally as heretofore. Notwithstanding this: -considering the altered circumstances of the congregation, we have, I think great reason to thank God and take courage,—but if we would mainfain our position in the future there will be needed much self-denying effort and self devotion.

The number of Baptisms during the year have been: Infants, 18; adults, 5; total, 23; Marriages, 7; Confirmed, 38; Burials, 14.

Amounts collected for all Church purposes, viz:—

Church Society, \$101.68; Domestic Missions, \$84.67; Foreign Missions, \$8.33; Bishop's College, \$8.50; Deaf-Mutes, \$6.65; Other purposes, \$1215.61. Total, \$1428.44. The Rev. Ernest A. Willoughby King reports:-

Offertory—For Church Society, \$9.57; Domestic Missions, \$11.24; Foreign, \$7.84; Bishop's College, \$5.25.

Subscriptions—Church Soc.ety, \$12; S. P. C., Jews, \$6; Church Home, Quebec. \$5; Sabrevois parsonage, \$1; making a total for outside objects of \$57.90. Sunday School offerings, \$13-77; expenses of Missioner, \$10; Easter Offering to Rector, \$28.63; total for specified purposes, \$110.30. Balance through offertory, \$263.31; total Offertories and subscriptions, \$346.61; towards stipend, &c., &c., \$507.88; total for all purposes, \$854.49.

There is a slight increase in most of these sums as com-

pared with last year's contributions.

Communicants at Easter Day, 27, and 39, and on the Octave 7 others, making 73 at Eastertide—The largest number yet reported. Improvements and donations, new floor in vestry, lamps for pulpit, handsome book of occasional offices, 4 prayer and hymn books and a surplice.

Mr. and Mrs. George King gave a new surplice for the Vestry and another to the Rector. Mr. Simpson has again

made a donation of coal.

The Rector would here also acknowledge gratefully a handsome new-year's gift, and a beautiful copy of Hymns A. and M., on his birthday from the Sunday School, and many other thoughtful and generous remembrances at Christmas and during the year from his kind people. One of the oldest and worthiest parishioners, Mrs. Tofield, senior, was called to rest in the early spring after a long illness. which she bore with Christian hopefulness. She was a very kind-hearted and an earnest-minded woman, and is much missed by her many friends. Levis is now the headquarters of the S. P. C. K.—Immigration Chaplain, Revd. T. W. Fyles. and his family make an important addition to our cougth. In the intervals of his very important work, Mr. Fyles has been good enough to help in the Sunday and other ministrations, and has won golden opinions. A weekly service and Bible-class have been held during the greater part of the year, and a confirmation-class is now in training.

We were favoured by a visit from the Bishop in February.

There is one serious drawback to the welfare of the mission in the sale of the Hall property; and altho it is the intent of some members of the family to build a Church for the Mission, I do not see how it is to be kept open permanently and served regularly unless it be attached to Lake Beauport and erected into a Mission (including the Asylum) under the Diocesan Board. There are eight families (farming) which belong to the Mission besides the employees of the mills.







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NEW LIVERPOOL.

I am glad, however, to be able to report that one third of the debt on our Parsonage has been paid off during the year, reducing it to one thousand dollars, every effort will still be made to get rid of this remaining liability.

During the last two years I have been holding monthly Services for the Protestant Railway employees at the Chaudière Junction, who are very much out of the reach of the ordinary means of grace. My Ministrations have been very cordially a cepted in that quarter and kindly acknowledged.

All our Services, special and ordinary, have been well attended, and on the whole, a very commendable degree of interest has been manifested throughout the year in the The ladies of the congregation work of the Church. undertook and carried to a successful issue, a Bazaar for which I feel they deserve our warmest thanks. I am hoping that we are getting within measurable distance of the time when such expedients for raising funds shall not be looked upon with approval. During the past year our Sunday School lost by removal its efficient Superintendent, Mr. Geo. King, who with his entire family, has gone to reside in the state of Minnesota, U.S. I am glad to say that the position of superintendent is now filled by my Church-warden Mr. Saml. Mitchell, from whose zealous efforts I expect very satisfactory results.

In common with other city Churches, we have to regret the loss of two or three families who have removed from Quebec, but having regard to the position of matters in this city generally we see much cause for thankfulness that we have been enabled to struggle through our most pressing difficulties. We have to depend on voluntary contributions for everything and when it is recollected that ours is the poorest city congregation, and that of its members, the majority are working people, I think it will be admitted that

they have done remarkably well.

The Sustentation Fund for the past year amounted to \$725 as against \$611 in 1882; the general Offertory \$963.44 as against \$903 in 1882, and the Easter Offertory to the Rector amounted to \$109 as against \$105 in 1882. Last year, not-

withstanding our numerous burdens we contributed \$33 to the Church Society in this Diocese, for the present year we have done slightly better, the amount being \$101. In addition to this there were individual contributions to various objects including some \$9 to Algoma. We have still to contend with a debt of \$4000 on the Church and the interest on this forms unquestionably our heaviest burden. Owing to our limited resources there are some objects of Diocesan importance to which we have not been able to contribute but which we would gladly help if we could do so.

During the year the Lord Bishop confirmed 17 candidates, there were 16 children baptized, 6 persons buried and 1 marriage. This latter item is in suggestive contrast to the pre-

vious year 1882, when we had 10 marriages.

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ed to 063.44 e Recr, notThe Reid scholarship now founded at Bishop's College for the benefit primarily of the sons of the clergy of the Dioceses of Quebec and Montreal, is a memorial of the appreciation felt by the parishioners for their old rector's twenty-nine years of labour among them, and of their love and respect for him personally. As it was to the founding of that scholarship that the Doctor-generously devoted the presentation made to him by his grateful parishioners.

The Church-wardens in their report made to the Vestry last Easter state that the general financial statement on comparison with that of last year is very satisfactory—over \$300 more has been realized from ordinary sources, and over \$900 from extraordinary sources. This latter sum, mostly raised by the ladies of St. Peter's Church Guild, has freed the new Church hall from debt. This year the Guild has undertaken the support and education of an Indian girl at the Wawanosh Home, Algoma.

During the month of October the Bishop visited the parish, when twenty-seven candidates were presented for confirmation.

The parish register shows 47 Baptisms (4 adults), 18 Marriages and 31 Burials.

In the financial summary below all the amounts raised for parochial objects with the exception of the Easter and Sunday School offertories are taken from the Church-wardens statement for the year ending 28th February last. The amount reported for the North-West and Algoma are taken from the report of the Diocesan Board of D. and F. Missions for the year ending 30th June.

THREE RIVERS.

The Rev. J. H. Jenkins reports: -

The year which has just passed has not been marked by any event of unusual interest. The Sunday services of the Church have been maintained with unfailing regularity and have been well attended. Mattins are said daily during the summer, and even song daily during Advent and Lent. At the former, we seldom fail to see a few of the faithful who believe their Lord's promise, that where two or three are gathered together in His name, He is in the midst of them. Even song during Advent and Lent is fairly attended; on Wednesday and Friday evening quite a large number are present.

Holy Communion is administered twice a month with a

fair average attendance.

In common with most parishes in this diocese, we are yearly losing many of our members by removals westward; since May eight families have left us, and we hear of none coming to replace them. It can easily be conceived how difficult it is for the handful who remain to maintain the services of the sanctuary; indeed, but for our Endowment it would be impossible for them to do so, for we have not a single man of wealth amongst us, but that they have not failed in their duty is evident, I think, from the statistical table which is appended in the form required by the Society; and I can bear witness that what they give, they give cheerfully.

Among the sums given under the head "Other purposes" in the table I may note \$80.00 for Repair of Rectory; \$32.25 for the S. S. Library, and \$66.25, Easter and Xmas gifts to Rector. As will be seen, the whole amount given for Church purposes during the year is \$788.17, being something over

\$5.00 a head for every person in the parish.

Presented to the Church Society, at the Annual Meeting, February 6th, 1881.

The Clergy Trust Committee have much satisfaction in stating that owing to the fact of the Diocesan Board not requiring the half of the surplus Revenue for 1882, as in former years, the capital of the Clergy Trust Fund has been augmented to that extent—say \$1,800.00.

In the interest of the Diocese your Committee would impress upon the members of the Diocesan Board the great desirability of only withdrawing from the surplus revenue what they absolutely require during the year, as the greater the increase in our capital the sooner will the Diocese be placed in an independent position as regards foreign aid; and the future independence of the Diocese mainly depends upon the growth of the Clergy Trust Fund.


