LONDON, Sept. 15.—In an eight-word statement made today by the British war press bureau, official announcement was made that the Anglo-French forces had occupied Rheims after driving the German army further back from the recent battlefields in France.

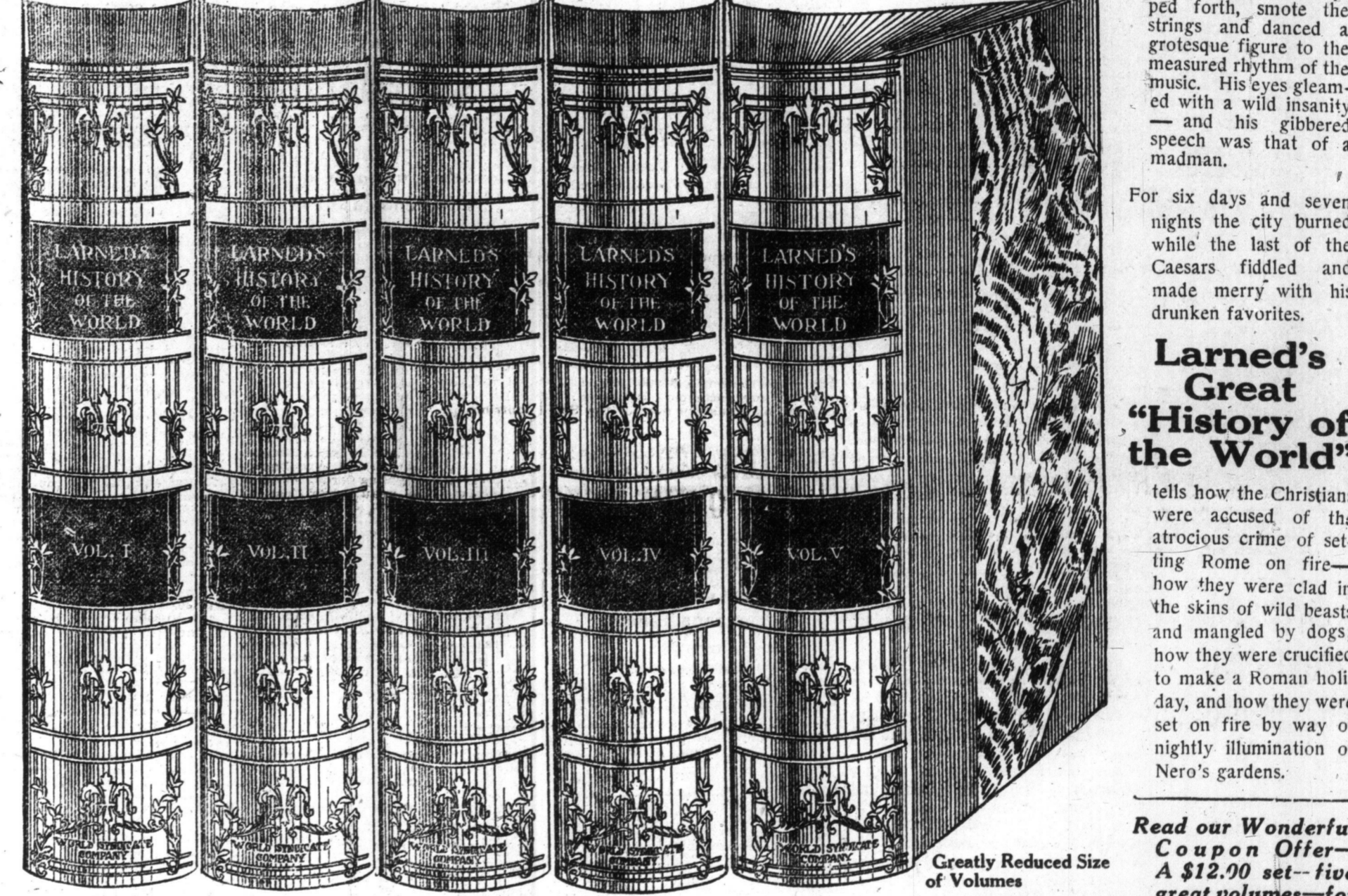
