LOOK OUT FOR BOMBS, TWO BRITISH STEAMERS WARNED Lives of British Ambassador and J. P. Morgan Menaced British Pulse Fresh Attack Tension at Washington French in Possession of Heights Overlooking Plains of Flanders Russians Victorious Near Lublin; Flanking Movement Continued

BRITISH DEFEAT GERMAN ONSET IN SHARP FIGHT

Enemy First Gained Foothold in British Lines, Then Quickly Thrown Out.

FIGHTING AT SOUCHEZ

German Aeroplane Brought Down by French Aviator Near Altkirch.

LONDON, July 11.—An attack which gained the Germans a foothold in the British trenches in Flanders was speedily repulsed, British soldiers soon driving the enemy from the foothold which he had gained in their lines. This incident of the battle front was reported in the French communiqué in the course of the past two weeks.

No Big General Offensive.

The official news indicates that no big general offensive has yet been undertaken by the allies, while the sporadic attacks of the Germans reported in the course of the past two weeks, and even the attempt on a larger scale to reach Verdun, made by the army of the crown prince recently, can not be described as any grand offensive.

Belgians Repulse Attack

The Belgians repulsed a night attack of the Germans on one of their points of support in front of the fortress of Namur, on the right bank of the Sambre.

Canonading at Many Points.

Canonading occurred at many points on the front, notably in the region of Neuport, the sectors of Arras and the Alsace, the Lorraine front, the wood of Le Froc, Remicourt, northwest of Flirey, on the French positions at Fontenelle, Metzeral, and a point west of Ammeries.

Shells were again thrown on Arras and Rheims, from a great distance, by the Germans today.

KING'S CONFIDENCE HIGH AFTER REVISITING FLEET

LONDON, July 11.—The belief that the British navy will win fresh laurels, "whenever the day of battle comes," is expressed by King George VI in a message to Admiral Jellicoe after his visit to the grand fleet. "I have had the pleasure of seeing the greater portion of the officers and men of the fleet," said His Majesty. "I realize the patient and determined spirit with which you have faced long months of waiting and hoping. I know how strong is the comradeship that links all ranks together. Such a happy state of things convinces me that whenever the day of battle comes my navy will add fresh triumphs to its old and glorious traditions."

RUSSIAN VALOR WON BATTLE ON WYSNIA FRONT

Austro-Germans Forced to Retreat in Great Disorder on Lublin Road.

RESERVES TURNED TIDE

Fiery Charge of Muscovites Completely Broke Resistance of Enemy.

Special Cable to The Toronto World.

LONDON, July 11.—Throwing their reserves into the fight at the deciding moment and delivering a fiery charge the Russians won another important victory over the Austro-German army at the Wysnia River, south of Urszadow, on the Lublin road, forcing the enemy to retreat in great haste and disorder.

As usual when they are winning a victory, the Russian commanders are chary of details. They simply report that on July 9 the enemy continued to hold ground on hill 118, south of Wilkopol, with numerous reserves, and that he delivered desperate attacks on the Bystritsa Village. All these attacks were repulsed and the Russian forces finished the battle here on the afternoon of July 9.

Held Viejprz-Bug Lines.

The Russian armies holding the lines between Viejprz and western Bug Rivers easily repulsed attacks of the enemy on the evening of July 8 and the morning of July 9, these assaults being chiefly delivered in the region of Grabowicz and south of Grubeschow, near Mieniany.

Attacks by Austrians and Germans were also broken down by the stubborn Russian resistance near Karlow Villed and the Zlota Lipa River Friday afternoon and night. The enemy came forward with great determination, making frequent attacks which more than once reached the Russian entanglements, but on each occasion Russian fire and counter attacks drove him back.

Fighting Brik at Przanysz.

Infantry actions between Russian and German detachments are more frequent between Przanysz and the Vistula River, with the Russians holding the ground.

On the left bank of the Vistula River, near Goumie, the Germans were forced to evacuate the last of the trenches which they had taken the preceding night. The Russians report that the enemy covered his evacuation with "a hurricane of fire."

ALLIES ATTACKED BY ANATOLIAN BATTERIES

Turks Claim to Have Bombed Camps and Caused Conflagration.

CONSTANTINOPLE (via London), July 11, 5:10 p.m.—The following official communication was issued today at the Turkish war office: "Our Anatolian batteries, which had moved forward, successfully bombarded enemy camps at Teke Burun, on the front near Seddul Baher, and an infantry division which was advancing. A great fire broke out in the environs of Teke Burun."

HEADLESS BODY TAKEN FROM DETROIT RIVER

Foul Play Believed by Windsor Police in Connection With Discovery.

WINDSOR, July 11.—The naked and headless body of an unidentified man was taken from the west channel of the Detroit River, opposite Sandwich, yesterday. Foul play is the theory of the police. A clothesline was tied about the man's waist and ten feet of rope was dangling in the water, this giving rise to the theory that a weight had originally been attached to the rope.

The police think the head was severed before the body was thrown into the river. The man was about 5 feet 6 inches in height and weighed 160 pounds.

Two Steamers Warned To Look Out For Bombs

Letter Signed "Pearce" Indicated Explosives Had Been Placed on Howth Head and Baron Napier—Lives of Morgan and Spring-Rice Threatened.

WASHINGTON, July 11.—Warning to look out for bombs concealed in their holds was flashed tonight from the naval wireless towers at Arlington to two ships at sea which sailed from New Orleans July 9.

Both the vessels, the British steamships Howth Head and Baron Napier, cleared with cargoes of mules for the British army July 8 and sailed the next day, the former for Dublin and Belfast, via Norfolk, and the latter direct for Avonmouth.

Sending of the warning was ordered by Secretary of the Navy Daniels upon receiving a telegram from a New Orleans newspaper saying a letter to that paper signed "Pearce" indicated that explosives had been placed aboard those vessels.

Napier, which sailed from New Orleans July 9, with mules for the British army, to watch for reports from those vessels.

ALL EMINENCES OF FLANDERS IN FRENCH HANDS COMPANY HELD HEIGHT DESPITE IMMENSE ODDS

Hill Country Between Bethune and Arras Cleared of Germans. For Four Days Small French Band Drove Off German Forces.

ONLY SOUCHEZ LEFT RELIEF FINALLY CAME

Another Quarter Mile of Trenches Defending Last German Position Taken.

ON THE HEIGHTS OF NOTRE DAME DE LORETTE, NEAR ARRAS, France, July 10, via Paris 11 noon. After battling 120 days for the hill country between Bethune and Arras, the French forces are in possession of all the eminences looking out upon the plain of Flanders. Lille, Douai and Cambrai all are visible from here.

Every position along the broad national road between Arras and Bethune has been won except Souchez, and last night another quarter-mile of trenches in the Souchez web was torn away. The attack was made under parachute rocket lights, the French burning bluish-white and the Germans greenish-white, covering the scene of the desperate conflict with a ghastly glow.

Desperate Fighting Here. The most desperate fighting has been along the short ten-mile front from Arras to Aix Noulette, which began March 9 with the taking of a few hundred yards of trenches on the watershed of Notre Dame de Lorette, where there are the ruins of an old

WASHINGTON, July 11.—Formal study of the official text of Germany's reply to the American note on submarine warfare as it affects neutral rights strengthens the conviction of high officials that a most critical point in the relations between the two countries had been reached.

Not only do they feel that the United States must refuse to accept the German proposals for the future conduct of American citizens on the high seas, but the failure of Germany to disavow the sinking of the Lusitania with the loss of more than 100 Americans, in their view has brought on a crisis, the outcome of which it is difficult to present clearly to foresee.

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CHECK IN RUSSIA DELAYS TEUTON DRIVE IN WEST

Victories of Grand Duke South of Lublin Spoil Plans of Enemy.

MORE TROOPS TO EAST

Germans Forced to Send Men Intended for Belgium, to Russia.

LONDON, July 11.—The check which the Russians have imposed on Archduke Joseph Ferdinand's army in southern Poland and the additional strain which this has placed on General von Mackensen's army to the right, has postponed, it is believed, in military circles here, the threatened German offensive in the west and there is now a possibility that the allies will be the first to take the offensive.

In support of this it is pointed out that the attacks by the German crown prince's army in the West, which the German press announces as a general movement forward, have ceased and what fighting is going on along the western front consists of artillery engagements and a few isolated attacks and counter-attacks by infantry, which make little or no difference in the positions of the opposing forces.

Repulse of Germans. The British, according to the French report, have repulsed a German attack. The German reports, however, refer to this as a British attack and Berlin says it was repulsed with considerable loss. In fact, the French and German reports are generally contradictory in respect to what fighting has taken place, but from the general trend of them it is evident that neither side has attempted anything of a decisive nature and it is believed here that it may be weeks yet before they do.

ARCHBISHOP QUIGLEY DEAD AT ROCHESTER

Prelate Was Born in Oshawa, Ont., Sixty-One Years Ago.

ROCHESTER, N.Y., July 11.—James Edward Quigley, Catholic Archbishop of Chicago, died last night at the home of his brother here, Chief of Police Joseph M. Quigley.

The late archbishop was a Canadian, having been born in Oshawa, Ont., Oct. 15, 1854. He was educated at St. Joseph's College, Buffalo, Niagara University, Innsbruck University, Austria, and Propaganda College, Rome, and was ordained in 1879.

He was rector of St. Vincent's Church, Utica, New York, from 1879 to 1884, when he was appointed rector of St. Joseph's Cathedral, Buffalo, which he held until 1896, being then removed to St. Bridget's Church of that city, and a year later was elevated to the bishopric of the diocese.

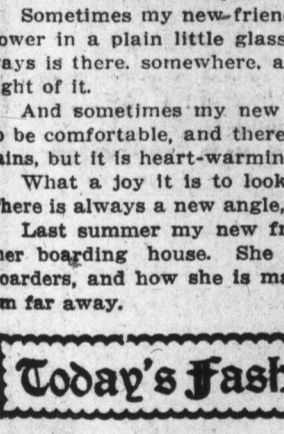

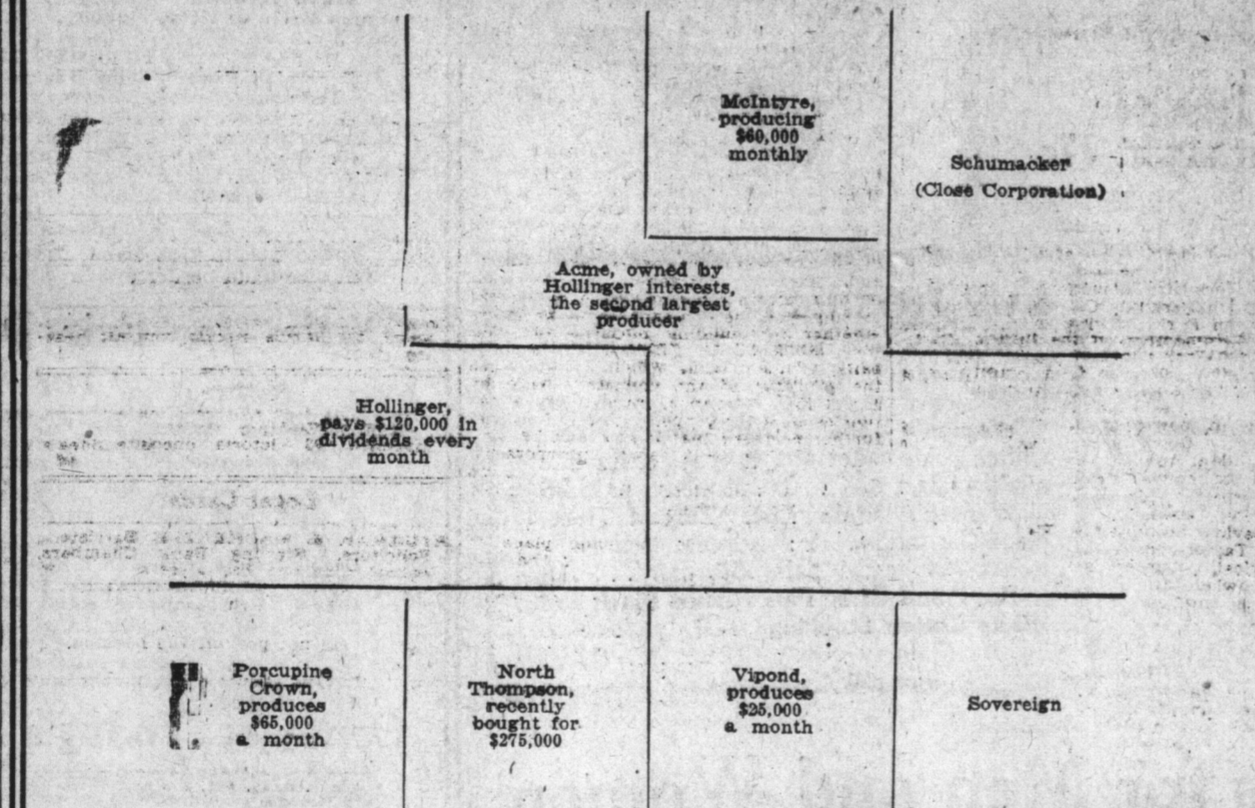
