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

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

Marriage; Homes; Home Life.

God created man in his own image:

R. Male and female created he them. (Gen. 1:27.)

For this cause shall a man leave his father and his mother and shall cleave unto his wife.

And they shall be one flesh. (Gen. 2: 24. St. Mark 10:7.) R. What therefore God hath joined together: Let not man put asunder. (St. Mark 10 %)

V. This is a great mystery.
R. But I speak as concerning Christ and the church.

O Lord God, Who in the beginning didst create man and woman to live in fellowship to Thy honour and glory, and Who in marriage didst symbolize the mystical union between Christ and the Church: We beseech Thee protect the estate of marriage in the dangers which threaten its stability: Grant that those who enter it may do so soberly, lovingly and in Thy fear. that by Thy grace husbands and wives may mutually love, help, honour and cherish one another, may beget children and may train their children in the knowledge which is eternal life and in the service which is perfect freedom, through Him Who with His own presence blessed a marriage feast, Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

R. So is the Lord merciful unto them that fear him.

V. And all thy children shall be taught of the Lord:

R. And great shall be the peace of thy children. (Isaiah 54:13.)

O Blessed Jesus, Son of God most high, help us to sanctify our home by the remembrance of Thy perfect obedience and Thy gentle love, that following the example of the self control and holiness of Thy childhood, we may make our home more worthy of Thy presence and may win for it the benediction of Thy peace, to Thy honour and glory. 2. V. God setteth the solitary in families: (Or, maketh the solitary to dwell in an house.) (Psalm 68:6.)

And the wilderness and the solitary place shall be glad for

them. (Isaiah 35:1.)

V. They shall sit every man under his vine and under his fig tree:

R. And none shall make them afraid. (Micah 4:4.)

V. The voice of joy and health is in the dwellings of the righteous: (Psalm 118:15.)
R, And the children of Israel had light in their dwellings

(Exodus 10:23.)

R.

1. O Thou Lord of all things, Who hast given the earth to the children of men, and art Thyself the Father of Whom the whole family is named: Bless every wise plan for housing

reform and for the provision of houses for Thy people to dwell in: Grant that with shelter from cold and heat they may also have the needful privacy: Give them light in their dwellings that the houses in which they live may be true shrines of peace and purity, through Him who was homeless that His people might have homes, Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

2. We heartily pray Thee, O Lord, that they who possess the grounds, pastures and dwelling places of the earth may not rack and stretch out the rents of their houses and lands, nor take unreasonable fines and incomes, but may so let them out to others that the inhabitants thereof may both be able to pay their rents and also honestly to live, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (From a Liturgy of Edward VI.)

Children: Child Welfare; Young People.

V. Jesus said: Whospever shall offend one of these little ones that believe in me:

R. It were better for him that a millstone were hanged about his neck, and he were cast into the sea.

(St. Matt. 18:6.)

V. Take head that ye despise not one of these little ones:

R. For in heaven their angels do always behold the face of my father which is in heaven. (St. Matt. 18:10.)

V. Suffer the little children to come unto me and forbid them not:

R. For of such is the Kingdom of God. (St. Mark 10:14.)

- 1. Lord Jesus, Who lovest all children, we commend to Thee the children of this and all lands: Thou Who didst bless little children brought to Thee, bless them and make them Thine: Keep, Lord, their eyes from seeing evil: Shut, Lord, their ears from hearing it: Keep, Lord, their little feet upon the King's highway, that none may make them afraid, for Thine own love's sake. Amen. (Toc H. Treasury of Prayers.)
- 2. O Lord, we ask Thy guidance for all who have the care of children, that they may foster in children a love of beauty, truth and goodness, and may lead their splendid energy to find its outlet and satisfaction in fellowship and service: Grant that by the inspiration of Thy loving Spirit they may direct the children's thoughts through curiosity to wonder, through fairies to angels, through the imagination of the delights of play to the wers hip of the joys of the Eternal: Grant that they may lead the children to think of Chist as ever near; to know His standard as their standard and Himself their captain, hero and king. Amen. (Acts of devotion.)
- 1. O Father, make our hearts burn within us for the unlovely lives of children in dark places; all orphaned, homeless or unwanted children; all children of loveless homes; all children handicapped through infirmity and all who are victims of

the sins of men and women: Let Thy loving Spirit breathe into us a living renewal that with unflagging confidence, with wise statesmanship and readiness to combine with others, we may turn to good account every law for the welfare of children, through Christ Who loved and loves them. Amen. (Acts of Devotion.)

- 2. O Lord, Who didst become a child for love of us, grant Thy loving pity to all children under age who labour for daily wages: Touch the hearts of those who through thoughtlessness or love of gain consider not their weak and tender years: Assist the passage of just laws in their behalf; free them from bondage and bring them to the joyful inheritance of Thy children, for Thy Name's sake. Amen. (Social Prayers.)
- V. The streets of the city shall be full of boys and girls:
- Playing in the streets thereof. (Zech. 8:5.) R.
- V. That our sons may grow up as the young plants:
- R. And that our daughters may be as the polished corners of the temple. (Psalm 144:12.)
- I have written unto you, young men, because ye are strong V. and the word of God abideth in you:
- And ye have overcome the wicked one. (1 John 2:14.) R.
- 1. O Lord, Who desirest the love of every heart and Whose delight is with the children of men: Bless our girls and boys, our young men and maidens, in the years of growth from childhood to maturity: Strengthen them to resist temptation and direct to noble ends the spirit of adventure in that which is good: Teach them to hate what Thou hatest, to love what Thou lovest, that in the days of their youth they may remember their Creator, and serving Thee with gladness may rejoice in the good news of the glory of the happy God: Let Thy loving Spirit draw them into the fulness of that life which Jesus came to bring, that they may walk before Thee in newness of life, through the same Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
- 2. O Lord, Who from generation to generation dost call men and women to Thy service, and Who in baptism hast enlisted us each one to be Thy faithful soldiers and servants unto our lives' end: Thou Who didst call the child Samuel and the stripling David to serve Thee in their day and generation according to Thy will: Grant to young men and women such a sense of Thy purpose in life that hearing Thy call in youth, they may bring Thee the offering of free hearts and may dedicate themselves without reserve to the service of Thy kingdom. Grant that with joy they may work wherever Thou dost place them, wherever Thou dost send them, and may be faithful and obedient unto the end, through Him Who lived to do Thy holy will, Jesus our Lord. Amen. Collects: St. Andrew, Trinity 20.

Schools, Colleges and Universities: Teachers and Pupils.

V. Wisdom is a loving spirit:

- R. She is easily seen of them that love her, and found of such as seek her. (Wisdom 1:6: and 6:12.)
- V. The beginning of wisdom is the desire of discipline:
- R. And love is the keeping of her laws. (Wisdom 6:17, 18.)
- V. Wisdom is the principal thing; therefore get wisdom:
- R. And with all thy getting, get understanding. (Prov. 4:7.)
- V. Say unto wisdom, Thou art my sister:
- R. And the fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom. (Prov. 7:4 and 9:10.)
- 1. O God, Who givest to all men liberally, grant Thy blessing to both teachers and taught in all schools, colleges and universities: Grant that their studies may lead them to see Thee in the order of nature and in the experience of history, and to recognize in the discoveries of human knowledge, the work of Thy Spirit of right reason in the hearts and minds of men: Deliver them from the knowledge that puffeth up, that human things may not prejudice such as are divine, but that the growth of knowledge may lead to reverence and faith, and to the love and worship of Thee in Whom are hid all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge, through Thy Son Jesus Christ, Who with Thee and the holy Spirit of wisdom reigneth over all things, world without end. Amen.
- 2. Almighty God, of Whose only gift cometh wisdom and understanding: We beseech Thee with Thy gracious favour to behold our universities, colleges and schools, that the confines of knowledge may be ever enlarged and all good learning flourish and abound: Bless all who teach and all who learn, and grant that both teachers and learners in humility of heart may look ever upward to Thee Who art the fountain of wisdom, through Jesus Christ our Lord, Who liveth and reigneth with Thee in the unity of the Holy Ghost, one God, world without end. Amen.

(The Scottish Book of Common Prayer.)

3. O Thou Who art the light of the minds that know Thee, the life of the souls that love Thee and the strength of the thoughts that seek Thee: Help us so to know Thee that we may truly love Thee, so to love Thee that we may fully serve Thee, Whose service is perfect freedom; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (Gelasian Sacramentary.)

Collect: St. Philip and St. James.

Women and Women Workers. (Whether volunteer or professional.)

V. She stretcheth out her hands to the poor; yea, she reacheth forth her hands to the needy:

R. Strength and honour are her clothing, and a woman that feareth the Lord she shall be praised.
(Prov. 31:20, 26,30.)

V. And women ministered to him of their substance: (St. Luke 8:3.)

R. And many of them believed, also of honourable women. (Acts 17:12.)

V. And Mary said, Behold the nandmaid of the Lord: (St. Luke 1:38.)

R. And the hath been a succourer of many. (Rom. 16:2.)
V. There came a woman having an alabaster box of very

precious ointment; and she brake the box: (St. Mark 14:3.)

R. And the house was filled with the odour of the ointment. (St. John 12:3.)

1. O Lord, Whose blessed Son was born of a woman, bless the women of all nations and give them strength for the new burdens laid upon them: Increase Thy gifts of knowledge and understanding, of counsel and strength, that they may walk worthy of their vocation, for Jesus' sake. Amen.

(Per Christum vinces.)

- 2. O Lord, Who didst consecrate a woman to be the mother of Thine incarnate Son and Who in ancient days didst call chosen handmaidens to be prophetesses of Thy Church and kingdom, preserve the women of all lands from pollution of life, and thought: Grant Thine effectual grace to protect women tempted in any way; to foster with Thy gracious guidance all movements for the uplifting and enriching of the womanhood of our day and generation, that they may enter into the fruits of Thy holy Incarnation and may walk before Thee in newness of life, with good will doing service, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
- 3. O Lord Jesus born of Mary, Who didst draw women to Thy worship and service, didst receive their lifts, didst cleanse their sins and heal their infirmities: Grant that as Thou hast set their feet in a large room through the freedom of the Gospel, so Thou mayest give them hearts ready for Thy service, and minds and bodies fit and prepared to do Thy will. Help them to spend wisely, to rule justly, to direct their households according to Thy laws of Thy Kingdom, to use their influence and exercise their votes to bring home to life the love of the Incarnation. Let strength and honour be their clothing and make them all glorious within. Let their speech be with grace, and grant that they may order all things sweetly and strongly, for love of Thee, their Lord. Amen.

4. O Lord Jesus, Who didst stretch out Thine arms of love on the hard wood of the Cross, that all men might come within the reach of Thy saving embrace, clothe us in Thy Spirit, that we, stretching forth our hands in loving labour for others, may bring those who know Thee not to the knowledge and love of Thee, Who with the Father and the Holy Ghost livest and reignest, God for ever and ever. Amen. (Prayers for Social Purity, Manchester.)

For all workers, especially those who work with their hands.

Man goeth forth to his work and to his labour until the V. evening:

When thou givest it them they gather it, and when thou R. openest thy hand they are filled with good. (Psalm 104:23, 28.)

Seest thou a man diligent in his business?

V. R. He shall not stand before mean men; He shall stand before kings. (Prov. 22: 29.) V. Work your work betimes and in his time he shall give

you your reward: (Ecclus. 51:30.)
Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that R. needeth not to be ashamed. (2 Tim. 2:15.)

V. Not with eye-service as men pleasers, but as the servants of Christ:

Doing the will of God from the heart. (Ephes. 6:6.) R.

Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might: (Eccles. 9:10).

Do all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks unto God and the Father by him. (Col. 3: 17.) R.

V. And there shall be no more curse and his servants shall serve him:

And they shall see his face, and his name shall be in their foreheads. (Rev. 22: 3, 4.)

- 1. Almighty God, Who by Thy divine providence hast appointed for each of us our work in life and commandest that we should not be slothful in business but fervent in spirit serving Thee, help us always to remember that our work is Thine appointment and to do it heartily as unto Thee: Preserve us from slothfulness and make us to live with loins girded and lamps burning, that we may be found faithful in that which is least and in that which is greatest, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (Dean Goulburn.)
- 2. O Son of God who wast pleased Thyself to be reckoned among the craftsmen, bless all who labour with their hands, that the things which they make may be a pleasure to make and a pleasure to use: Enable all craftsmen to rejoice in good work well done: And for those whose work is mechanical and wearisome, grant them the right use of leisure that they may

learn to enjoy and to admire rightly the wonderful works of Thy hand and the works of the skill of Thy children, for Thy Nane's sake. Amen.

- 3. O Blessed Lord, we beseech Thee to pour down upon us such grace as may not only cleanse this life of ours but beautify it a little, if it be Thy vill, before we go hence and are no more seen. Grant that we may love Thee with all our healt and soul and mind and strength, and our neighbour as ourself, and that we may persevere unto the end; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (Rev. James Skinner.)
- 4. O Lord Thou knowest how busy I must be this day; if I forget Thee, do not Thou forget me; for Christ's sake. Amen. (General Sir Jacob Astley, before the battle of Edgehill, 1643.)

R. The king himself is served by the field. (Eccles. 5:9.)

V. All the whole heavens are the Lord's:

R. The earth hath he given to the children of men. (Psalm 115:16.)

R. He bringeth forth grass for the cattle and green herb for the service of men. (Psalm 104:13, 14.)

V. He maketh the wilderness a standing water and water springs into a dry ground.

R. And there he settet the hungry, that they may sow fields and plant vineyards. (Psalm 107: 35, 36.)
V. Thou visiteth the earth and blessest it: thou makest it

R. The folds shall be full of sheep: the valleys also shall stand so thick with corn that they shall laugh and sing.

R. Until he receive the early and latter rain. (James 5:7.) V. One hath planted, another watered, but God gave the

R. We are labourers together with God: Ye are God's husbandry. (1 Cor. 3:7, 8.)

1. O bountiful Father, Who makest Thy sun to shine on all things and Whose clouds drop the rain: Have mercy on all who labour in the cultivation of the earth, that they may receive the due reward of their work, and that by Thy grace their souls may be made fruitful unto all good works, through Jesus Christ the heavenly sower. Amen. (Social Prayers.)

2. O Lord, by Whose sure promise while earth remaineth seed time and harvest shall not fail: Have compassion on the necessities of lands threatened with scarcity: Help us in this bountiful land to be faithful to our trust as almoners of Thine abundance, and prosper the labours of all who work on the land and in the production of food: Keep us ever mindful that while we plant and water, it is Thou alone who givest the increase: Bless and preserve the kindly fruits of the earth, so that in due time they may be garnered and distributed for the needs of Thy children: For Jesus' sake. Amen.

Commerce, Industry, Business.

Take heed and beware of covetousness:

R. For a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth. (St. Luke 12:15.) Owe no man anything but to love one another:

Love worketh no ill to his neighbour; therefore love is the fulfilling of the law. (Rom. 13: 8, 10.)

V. Whatsoever ve do, do it heartily as to the Lord and not unto men:

R. For ye serve the Lord Christ.

V. Give unto your servants that which is just and equal:

R. Knowing that ye also have a Master in heaven. (Col. 3:23 and 4:2.)

Study to be quiet and to do ye ... own business and work with your own hands:

That ye may walk honestly toward them that are without, R. and that ye may have lack of nothing. (1 Thess. 4:11.)

- 1 O Lord, prosper with Thy blessing all merchants and tradesmen who are striving to regulate their dealings by the rule of truth and love, and quicken within them such desire of laying up treasure in heaven as may cause them with entire satisfaction to accept Thy perfect will, teaching them so to use earthly things that they may become partakers of the true riches which cannot fail; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (Sursum Corda.)
- 2. Grant, O Lord, that the Church may fully accept Christ's social teaching as a vital part of its witness to spiritual truth: that the sacredness of personal life and the equal value of each soul in the sight of God may be accepted as first p .nciples of all industrial organisation: Grant that the Incarnation and the Cross may be recognised as the inexhaustible springs of brotherhood, sacrifice and service in human life, and grant that there may be no divorce between the practices of economic life and the universal principles of Christian moral obligation, in the Name of Jesus our Lord. Amen. (F. W. Drake.)
- 3. O Lord Who dost govern all things, grant that men may increasingly work together in agreement, with mutual helpfulness, temperance and toleration: Grant that the masses of

mankind may rise out of base and immediate anxieties, out of dwarfing pressure and cramped surroundings, to understanding and participation in noble effort: Grant that the resources of the earth may be husbanded and harvested, economised and used with scientific skill for human benefit: Grant that towns and cities may be finely built and men and women finely taught and trained: Grant that there may be open ways and peace and freedom from end to end of the earth, and that through the great body of mankind may go evermore an increasing understanding, an intensifying brothcrhood, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

(Prayers for the City of God.)

4. Guide us, O Christ, in all the perplexities of our industrial and social life, and in Thine own time bring us together in love and unity, making the kingdoms of the world Thy kingdoms as Thou willest, Who now dost live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit, God, world without end. Amen. Collect: Trinity 9.

The Unemployed.

V. God knowth our frame:

R. He remembereth that we are but dust. (Psalm 103:14.) V. They went astray in the wilderness out of the way:

R. Hungry and thirsty, their soul fainted in them.

V. Then they cried unto the Lord in their trouble:

R. And he led them forth by the right way that they might go to a city where they dwelt. (Psalm 107:4, 7.)

V. He satisfieth the empty soul:

R. And filleth the hungry; soul with goodness. (Psalm 107:9.)
V. Who helpeth them to right that suffer wrong: who feedeth the hungry:

R. And satisfielh the desire of every living thing. (Psalm 145:16.)

1. O God our Father, Whose joy is ever joy in work and Who hast given us strength of mind and body that we may share that joy with Thee, save those who are unemployed, from the temptations that beset them through our failure to find them work: Keep them from loss of character, skill and power, and from the despair that comes with constant disappointment: And grant that we whom Thou hast blest with work and comfort may never rest till we have given them beauty for ashes, oil of joy for mourning, and the garment of praise for the spirit of heaviness, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (Industrial Christian Fellowship.)

2. O Lord our Father, we commend to Thy protecting care and compassion the men and women suffering distress and anxiety through lack of work. Support and strengthen them, we beseech Thee, and so prosper the counsels of those engaged in the ordering of industrial life that Thy people may be set free from want and fear, and may be enabled to labour in security for the relief of their necessities and for the well-being of our Empire and its Dominions, for Jesus' sake. Amen. (I.C.F.)

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Immigrants; Strangers; Welcome and Welfare.

- V. Thou shalt neither vex a stranger nor oppress him: (Exodus 22:21.)
- R. But he shall he unto you as one born among you and thou shall love him as thyself. (Levit. 19:34.)
- V. And seek ye the peace of the city whither I have caused you to be carried away:
- R. For in the peace thereof shall ye have peace. (Jerem. 39:7.)
- V. Ye are no more strangers and foreigners; but fellow citizens with the saints:
- R. And of the household of God. (Ephes. 2:19.)
- V. For there is neither Jew nor Greek, bond nor free:

O Saviour of all men, Who didst send Thy disciples unto every nation, bidding them to feed thy sheep and Who in these later times hast brought from many nation a multitude to dwell in this land: Grant that Thy Church may prove faithful to this great trust and may have grace and power to feed them by Thy appointed means, so that all peoples, nations and languages may give glory to Thee, the good Shepherd. Amen. (Social Prayers.)

O Lord, Who didst lead Thy people forty years in the wilderness on their way to the land of promise: Be with those who have come to this land seeking new homes and new opportunities: Let Thine angel go before them and be to them a pillar of cloud by day for shelter and refreshment, a pillar of fire by night for warmth and light: Grant that they may not lose the glory and honour which is Thy gift to each but may bring it hither to enrich our common life. O Thou Who knowest the heart of a stranger and Who dost bid us to welcome Thee in the person of the stranger within our gates, give us a heart of welcome, a hand of helpfulness, a mind of sympathy towards new comers of our own blood and speech, or of whatever race, that this land, our goodly heritage, enriched with divers gifts, may become a praise in the earth, for Jesus' sake. Amen.
- 3. Almighty God, our Heavenly Father, whose Blessed Son was once a newcomer to this world of ours: Bless we beseech Thee all who leave their homeland to settle in other parts of our Empire. Give them courage, patience, perseverance and hope. Grant that they may never forget Thee in their eagerness for success, the Old Country in the new land, or the Mother Church in the new surroundings. Give to all of us grace to work together for the common good in making the dominions of our King the Dominions of our Lord and of His Christ, through the same Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Rich, Prosperous, Privileged.

If I have withheld the poor from their desire, if I have eaten my morsel alone:

I should have denied the God that is above. (Job 17:28.) There is that maketh himself rich, yet hath nothing: R.

R. There is that maketh himself poor, yet hath great riches. (Prov. 13:7.)

V. The people bring much more than enough for the service

R. So the people were restrained from bringing. (Exodus 36:5.) V. Wherefore do ye spend money for that which is not bread, and your labour for that which satisfieth not? R.

Incline your ear and come unto me: hear and your soul shall live. (Isaiah 55:2, 3.)

Whosoever will be the friend of the world is the enemy of V. Gcd: (James 4:4.)

Ye cannot serve God and mammon. (St. Mact. 6:24.)

Ye know the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor:

R. That ye through his poverty might be rich. (2 Cor. 9:7.)

The world passeth away and the lust thereof:

But he that doeth the will of God abideth forever. (1 John 2:17.)

- 1. O Lord Jesus Christ, Who for our sakes didst become poor, we pray Thee to protect them that are rich in this world, that they be not high-minded and trust in uncertain riches but in Thee, the living God, Who givest us richly all things to enjoy. Grant them grace so to use their wealth that they may do good, and be rich in good works, ready to distribute, willing to communicate, laying up in store for themselves a good foundation against the time to come that they may lay hold on eternal life, for Thy Name's sake. O Creative Word, Who while on earth to be known as the Carpenter, grant sight to luxury and deliverance to those bound by rich may joyfully follow the simplicity of The and the poor may obtain the inheritance of that the hearts of all may be set with one at the way of salvation, through Thy mercy. Who for our sake didst become poor that poverty, might become rich, and now live without end. Amen. (Social Prayers.)
- 2. O God, the Father of lights, Who has blessed doctrine of St. James that Thou hearkens of the oppressed and hast chosen the poor to be Grant us grace that, renouncing corrupt rich order all things in righteousness, that e prestate earth may be abundantly obtained by those labour, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (Industrial Christian Fellowship.)
- 3. O Lord, Who alone workest great marvels, W. Son came that all men might have life and have it about and Who hast taught us that life consists, not me possession, but in the spirit of love and joy: Deliver us a deliver all the people from the bondage of the world, from the vership of mammon and from all complicity in social evil and allence at wrong: Deliver all who are enslaved, over-worked or burdened: Protect those whose labour leads them into temptation or danger, those who are ill paid, unemployed or needy: Hasten the time when labour shall be redeemed from the curse, when men shall work not for personal gain but for the common good, when all commerce shall be pure, all labour prayer, all

work worship, and men shall rejoice in the things their hands have made, for Jesus' sake. Amen. (Industrial Christian Fellowship.)

4. The Sick, Blind, Deaf, Disabled.

In that day shall the deaf hear the words of the Lord:

R. And the eyes of the blind shall see out of darkness. (Isaiah 29:18.)

The Lord comfort him when he lieth sick upon his bed. (Psalm 41:3.)

(Isaiah 33:24.)

R. And the inhabitant shall not say, I am sick. Lord, he whom Thou lovest is sick:

R. This sickness is not unto death, but for the glory of God. (St. John 11:3, 4.)

V. And Jesus laid His hands on every one of them that were sick and healed them. (St. Luke 4:40.)

Himself took our infirmities and bare our sicknesses. R. (St. Matt. 8:17.)

- 1. Let us pray to our Lord God for our brother (or brethren) whom present sickness sorely wounds, that the Lord's kindness may cure him with heavenly medicine: May He Who gave life also give health, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
- 2. O Lord, forasmuch as it is an easy thing for Thee to give life to the dead, restore we pray Thee to the sick their former health, and grant that they who seek the healing of Thy heavenly mercy may also obtain the remedies necessary for the body, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (Two prayers used by J. M. Hickson.)

- 3. O Christ our Lord, Who art the physician of salvation, grant unto all those who are sick the aid of Thy heavenly healing: Look upon Thy faithful people who are sick and who love to call upon Thy holy name, and take their souls into Thy keeping and vouchsafe to deliver them from all sickness and infirmity, for Thy sake, O Lord of Life and health. Amen. (Mozarabic Liturgy.)
- 4. Almighty God Whose blessed Son went about doing good and healing all manner of sickness and disease among the people, continue, we beseech Thee, His gracious work amongst us. Especially in all hospitals and wherever the sick are being cared for, grant to physicians, surgeons, nurses and attendants, wisdom, skill, sympathy and patience, and assist with Thy blessing all who are seeking to prevent suffering and to forward the purposes of Thy love among the suffering children of men, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (F. W. Drake.)

2. O Thou, Who art the mind of all creation, we remember to our comfort that Thou hast in Thy special care all broken, outworn and imperfect minds: Give to those who live with them the understanding and loving spirit of Christ: Enlighten those who are tempted to laugh or be ashamed at such illness. To all who are separated in this life by barriers of mind, grant the comfort of Thy holy Spirit, Who with Thee and Thy Christ liveth and reigneth, God over all things. Amen. (Acts of Devotion.)

R. And the streets of the city shall be full of boys and girls playing in the streets thereof. (Zech. 8:4.)

O Thou Who knowest the frailty of our hearts, hear our prayer for those who have been unfortunate in life and bruised in spirit; those who have toiled without success; those who have endured without encouragement; those who have given up earthly prospects to comfort the aged and care for the maimed; those who are lonely in heart; for them we know not what to ask, but Thou Who knowest, supply their need, O Lord, Thou lover of souls. Amen. (Acts of Devotion).

O Lord our Father, we beseech Thee to bless with Thy special care all prisons and penitentiaries: Guide those in authority to just and merciful decisions and endow them with loving-kindness: Give to prisoners contrition for the sins of the past and strengthen them in their good resolutions for the future: Protect those who have gone again into the world and lead them by the grace of Thy holy Spirit that they may persevere unto the end and win for themselves Thy new name, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (Social Prayers.)
- 2. O Thou Who hast all power in heaven and earth, let the light of Thy divine presence illuminate the shadows of the prison house, and fill the hearts of our brothers in bonds with hope and courage to endure patiently each his peculiar trials and burdens: Give them sorrow for their sins and firm resolve to sin no more: Support and comfort any who are cast down or forsaken by earthly friends or who suffer physical or mental pain or sickness. And if any are appointed to go hence, be Thou their rod and staff through the dark valley, and at the last receive them into Paradise, even as Thou didst promise to receive the penitent thief who turned to Thee upon the Cross, O Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
