Members of the board of control state that this is one of the most generous and surprising offers ever made to Montreal.

STOLE FOR THE CHURCH

So French-Canadian Jury Refused to Convict A. J. Lemieux.

MONTREAL, March 28.—That the Catholic Church is superior to the criminal law of Canada, when the jury is a French-Canadian Catholic jury, is the evident meaning of the verdict in the Lemieux case to-day. A. J. Lemieux was charged with highway robbery of money and papers from L. Larose last autumn. He admitted taking the papers, but said he had returned the money, and pleaded that he was acting in the interests of the Catholic Church, as Larose was a Freemason, and secretary of the now famous Emancipation Lodge.

THE BONES OF TECUMSEH

Proof to Be Offered of Identity of Remains Found Near Wallaceburg.

LONDON, March 28.—The opening up of a grave on St. Anne's Island, said to contain the bones of the great Indian Chief Tecumseh, brought considerable criticism on certain Wallaceburg citizens about a year ago. St. Anne's Island is a low, flat piece of land in the river channel west of Wallaceburg and had often been claimed to be the burial place of the Indian chief. Those who conducted the work of digging up the bones felt certain that they had the actual remains of Tecumseh, but there was instant criticism from various parts, not only over the unauthorized desecration of the grave, but also over the possibility of the bones not being those of Tecumseh at all.

It is now stated that the board of trade of the town will bring forward evidence to prove that no mistake was made in opening the grave, and that it is really the bones of Tecumseh which were found.

STOLE TO GET DEPORTED.

Father Morrissey's Remedies

When Father Morrissey, the famous priest-physician of Bartleboque, N. E. died a year ago last spring, he left his prescriptions to the Sisters of the Hotel Dieu, at Chatham, to be used for the benefit of humanity and of the church.

Not being in position to make up and distribute the prescriptions themselves, the Sisters arranged with a number of gentlemen who had been Father Morrissey's friends, to care for them. These gentlemen working under the name of "Father Morrissey Medicine Co., Limited," had by the first of the year placed the remedies in nearly every store in the Maritime Provinces.

CONTROLLERS WORRY OVER PLANS OF C.P.R.

Right of Railway to Cross Streets on Level is Disputed by Civic Executive.

C.P.R. matters took up considerable of the attention of the board of control yesterday. The mayor thought something should be done regarding the level crossings at Spadina-avenue and Peter-street, while Controller Church saw in the plans for the government house property and adjacent holdings, a possible attempt to evade the valid decision.

Controller Hooken said it would be easier to regulate the traffic on the line crossing Spadina-avenue, which was purely for the purpose of handling local freight, than in regulating the freight and passenger traffic that will run through the south.

The mayor explained to Controller Church that the valid order did not do away with all level crossings. In fact it permitted the existing level crossings for sidling purposes when properly protected. The board must consider the possibility of eliminating the level crossings at Spadina-avenue and Peter-street.

Metered Water Cheaper.

Some time ago the Western Hospital authorities asked the council to sell their water at the same rate as the General Hospital, which is 81 per cent for every six months. This was assented to, but the meter was not put in and it was found that in the first six months the expense of buying water this way was \$385, as compared with \$110 shown by the meter readings for that period. The hospital has been under this arrangement for a year. In that time the difference between the meter readings and the charges under the arrangement has amounted to \$223.50.

The city collector was asked to report on the possible liability of the city in connection with the subsidence of houses at 41 to 45 Wvayst-avenue which have settled three-quarters of an inch out of plumb, it is claimed as a result of the construction of the trunk sewer by Contractor Gedson. The contractor claims that he has exercised every ordinary precaution and followed the specifications and thinks that the city should be held responsible for the damage to the houses is the result of the construction of the sewer in the same way that they would be liable for right-of-way over private property.

Mrs. John Macdonald asked for a grant of \$200 for the infants' Home for the East End Day Nursery. Mrs. William Boushée requested the usual grant of \$200 for the infants' Home and Infirmary in addition to the amount contributed by the city to special cases. Both will be taken up with the estimates.

Broker Makes Assignment. James McGregor, broker in Great Mines stock, has assigned to O'Leary, assignee. A meeting of the creditors will be held on Friday.

ONTARIO ALERT

Chief Factory Inspector Gives Reassuring Statement re Fire Escapes.

J. Burke, chief factory inspector for Ontario, said yesterday he considered the province fairly well provided against such disasters as that of New York. "Of course, you can never tell what will happen in case of fire in a factory employing a large number of men and women." He did not think such a disaster could happen in Ontario. The factories were inspected twice a year or oftener. The Darling factory compared in proportions to the one in New York but it has two fire escapes and an iron stairway.

AUTOISTS IN TROUBLE.

In the afternoon police court yesterday Matreux Kingsford fined A. K. Shives \$5 for having an auto two months without a license.

J. H. Walker had failed to have his new number on his auto lamps, but he put up a good excuse he was remanded until called on.

Another member of the delinquent out brigade, L. S. Martin, was up for having his car out at night without a number tacked on. He said his car was not out, and he will be given a chance to bring witnesses to prove it.

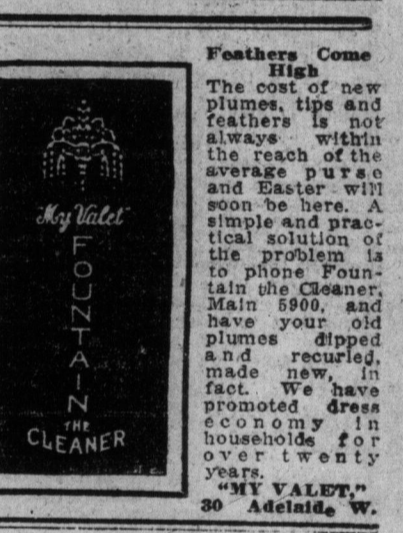

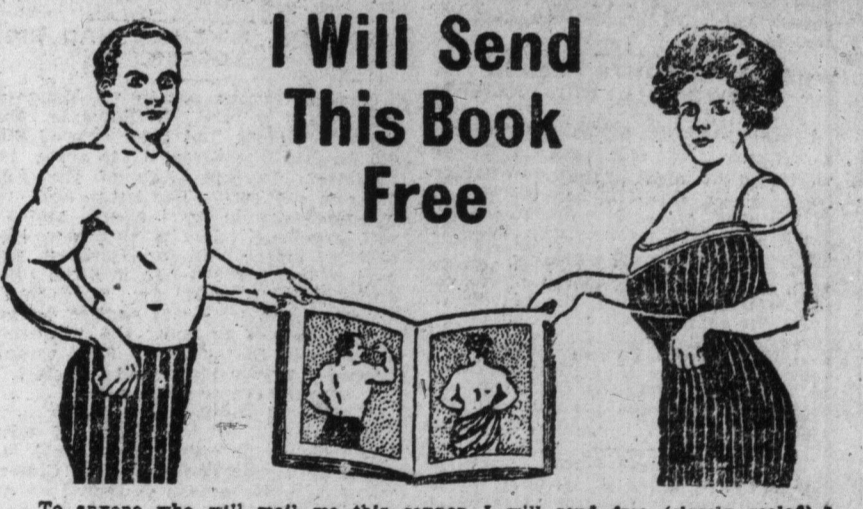

Speculators Take Profits in Some Mining Issues

Profit Taking in Porcupines Results in Lowering of Prices

Advances Attract Sales in Some of the Prominent Gold Stocks—Cobalts Dull and Easier With One Exception.

World Office, Tuesday Evening, March 28. Profit-taking in several of the mining securities to-day was reflected in the action of the stocks which was principally operated in.

Recent advances in Hollinger, Dobie and some others, invited selling and this was evidently in effect on the Toronto mining exchange.

All the activity in the mining securities to-day was practically confined to the Porcupine securities; the Cobalts being neglected and in some instances were even lower than yesterday's market.

Beaver sold down a point and a half below yesterday's low, but was in considerable enquiry at the low figure and some recovery in price was made.

Yesterday's big advance in Hollinger to \$10.20 brought considerable realizing to-day, and the shares dropped to \$7.75 and were offered at that price at the close.

The Dobie stock, which was principally underwritten in Montreal, and which advanced on Monday to \$4.80, sold down to-day as low as \$4.35, the selling coming from the underwriters, who are said to have subscribed to the shares at \$3.50.

Vipond, Dome Extension and Preston were distinctly firm, all offerings of these shares being taken by buyers who are not looking for immediate profits.

Great Northern was also strong, selling up to 20% owing to the company's possessions in the Porcupine field.

West Dome was in good demand during the afternoon, and reached \$2.25 after selling down in the morning session below \$2.20.

The one strong Cobalt issue was Crown Reserve, which for some unknown reason advanced to \$2.25, the buying being of course due to Montreal orders.

To-day's business was the result of a perfectly natural proceeding in the market and cannot be accepted as other than a result of the in and out transactions of speculators.

Dividend Passed for Quarter. Directors of the Right of Way Mines have decided not to pay the dividend for the quarter ended March 31, 1911 and have sent shareholders a circular to this effect.

The reason given is that the failure of the Mines Power Co. to supply power has necessitated the suspension of mining operations where the company has been working down opposite the Silver Queen and Princess.

NIAGARA PORCUPINE. NEW YORK, March 28.—The following telegram from Toronto has been received by Fred R. Jones Co., 75 Broad St.: "The president of the Niagara Porcupine Mining Co. wires that he has struck new ore values, running \$1.50 to \$15 per ton against present values of from \$2 to \$7. The property side lines the Powell on the southwest and also adjoins the former Thinning properties, since acquired by the Bewick-Moreing people of London. Considerable new activity has developed among the companies in this section."

Standard Stock and Mining Exchange. 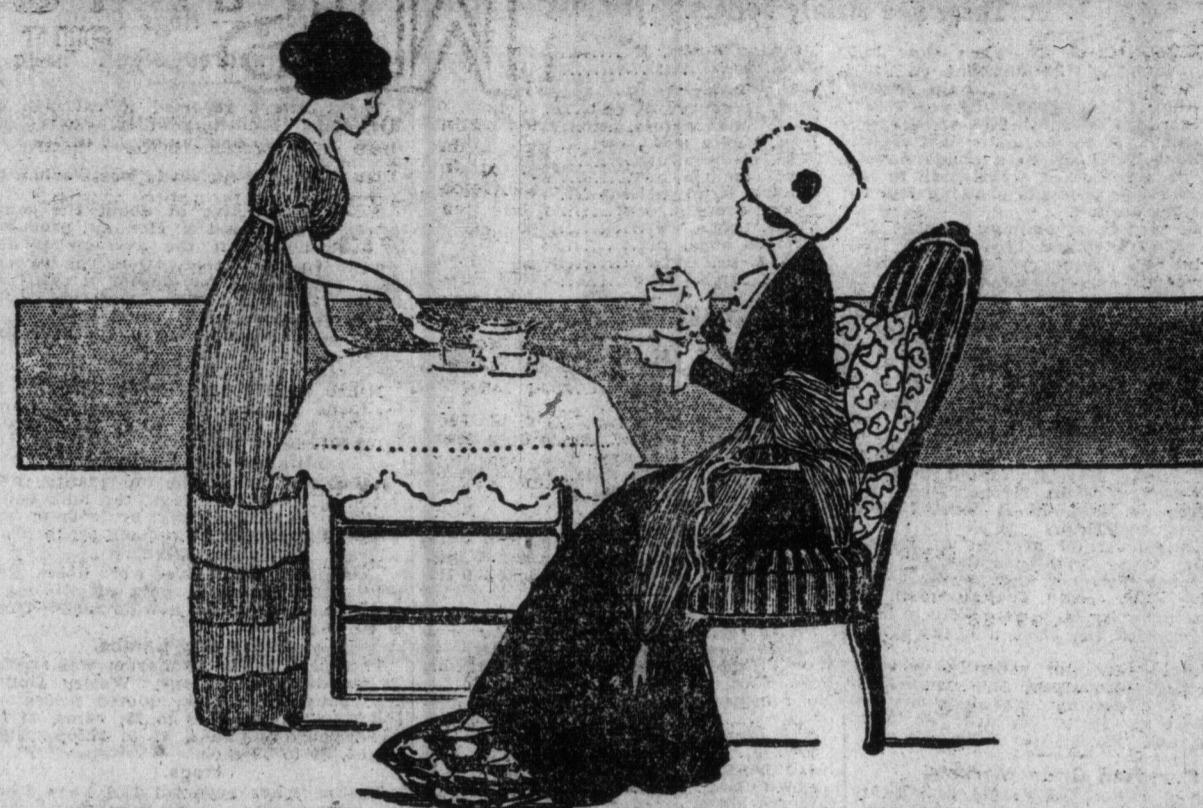
