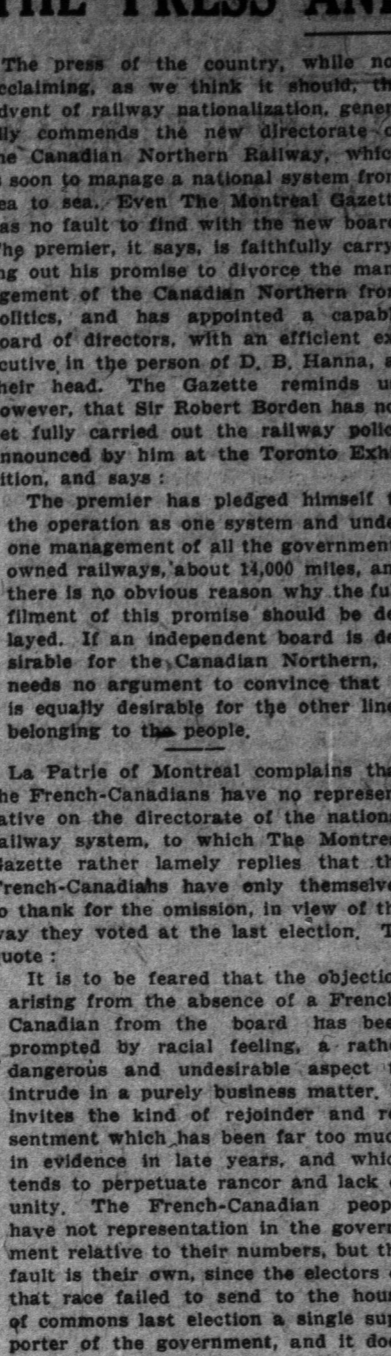
FUR AUCTION PRICES.
