IN HIDING WITH THE STOLEN GOODS

Cause of Atlantic City Train Disaster Undetermined - General Manager of Pennsylvania Thinks Nothing Was Wrong With Rails of the Bridge.

Atlantic City, N.J., Oct. 29.- The total number of dead in the appalling wreck of an electric train, which on Sunday afternoon, loaded with passengers, plunged into the waterway separating this city from the mainland, now is placed at 53.

Of these 49 bodies have been identified, and two others remain unclatmed in the temporary mortuary.

The bodies of two persons known to have been drowned have not been

A special car containing the bodies of the Philadelphia victims left tonight for that city.

The day has been one of unceasing activity, of gruesome scenes and pathetic incidents. Wrecking crews with derricks succeeded in bringing one of the two submerged cars to the surface, and divers working in relays brought up bodies until their task was completed and they reported that no more dead remained either inside the second car or in the water and mud anywhere in the vicinity.

Interest now centres in the work of the coroner's jury, which to-day made a careful inspection of the scene of the wreck, and the drawbridge, at which the train left the rails. State Senator Edward S. Lee is foreman of

After the forward car of the two submerged coaches had been hoisted to the surface and the divers who had worked on the wreckage all day long had made a final examination of the second car without finding any more bodies, W. W. Atterbury, general manager of the Pennsylvania Railway, who, with several of his assistants, had been on the scene since Sunday night, expressed his belief that the total number of dead would not exceed 53.

IRECTORS SHOULD KEEP CONSTANT DOUBLE CHECK

General Manager Permit Himself to Shoulder Whole Respensibility, Says Byron E. Walker-Government Inspection Valueless.

FOR A BANK'S SAFETY,

(1) No one man should be put in charge of a bank without check or inspection. He should not himself permit it, and the directors should not permit it.

(2) Every general manager and other important officer should have associated with him some men or one man at least—to divide his responsibility, to aid him with advice, and capable, at a moment's notice, of taking his place, if necessary

(3) While the directors cannot be expected to count the cash or attend to many details, they are responsible for the way in which and the persons to whom they delegate their authority. They should not abdicate their functions, but should keep in touch with the affairs of the institution. And their powers should not be turned over to any one man, responsible to nobody, but to an organization whose members to an organization whose members should be men of undoubted character and ability and who will check one another. There should be a double check on every transaction.

LIBERALS BEATEN IN LORDS MAJORITY TWO HUNDRED ON EDUCATION BILL

Lord Heneage Offers Amendment Making Religious Instruction in Schools Compulsory and This Carried by 256-56-One Tory With Minority.

London, Oct. 29 .- The first vote in ommittee of the house of lords on the education bill was taken to-night and resulted in the defeat of the government by a majority of 200.

The vote came on an amendment to the first clause in the bill. The amendment, which was offered by Lord Heneage, Liberal, makes religious instruction compulsory during a part of the daily school hours in all public elementary schools.

Earl Crewe, speaking for the government, refused to accept the amendment, but after a most businesslike debate, the amendment was carried, 256 to 56. The majority included the entire opposition in the house of lords with the exception of Lord Ampthill, who voted with the minority. Among the majority were the Archbishop of Canterbury, 20 bishops and the Duke of Devonshire.

Among the minority were all the peers who are members of the government. and Lord Rosebery, the Duke of Manchester, the Earl of Durham, Earl Russell, the Marquis of Northlampton, Lord Brassey, Lord Grimthorpe, Lord Weardale, Lord Haversham and Lord Reay.

Needs of a Home Manicure. A plentiful supply of unguents and lotions is required by the woman who is going to be her own manicure. She needs to have a shelf. And her manicure table must be well fitted out with all sort of emollients for the nails and hands. Here are a few of the things as suggested by a French manicure, who makes a great specialty of the hands:

She will need a bottle of white vase-

who makes a great specialty of the hands:

She will need a bottle of white vase-line and almond oil, half and half; a bottle of glycerine and rose water in the same proportion.

A vial of polish in which there is a tiny brush by which the polish is applied to the nails.

A jar of lanoline and peroxide for bleaching the hands and arms.

A bottle of alcohol for taking stains off the fingers.

A cut lemon, or, if this is inconvenient, a bottle of clear lemon juice, also to be used for stains. And it is a very good thing to have a pumice stone or two or three acids for taking off the spots which come upon the hands in mysterious ways.

The home manicure should devote 15 mins, one day a week to her nails. This will keep them in good condition. On this day she slightly files them, pinches the tops of the fingers to make them pointed; whitens the nails and shapes them. They will look nice for a whole week.
