

The two men had taken possession of my money before this and it was when I was attempting to prevent them going off with my money that they shot me. When McIntosh was brought in the dying man hearing him speak, said that is one of them. When McIntosh was brought in the dying man said, "McIntosh, why did you do this?" When the prisoner Williams was brought in the dying man, after looking at Williams, said, speaking to witness: Be as easy asy ou can with them, I don't care to say anything.

At 4.55 a.m. the dying man stated that he had about \$70 or \$80 in money, principally ones, some fives and one or two tens. There was about \$20 in silver.
