Liege, Namur and Mau-beuge are monuments to this effect. These fortifications melted, as someone has described it, as butter before a heat-of kine. There followed the Battle of the Marne, which checked the German drive, and ushered in the period of trench

Belgium which they held could never be wrested from them—that the trench, in fact, would be the impregnable fortress of this war.

A German Error.

British guns in the past week have shown that the defensive has not yet countered the offensive in warfare. The trenches have fallen as the fortresses fell. Once more have the Germans erred on the sid of thoroughness. Finding that on the sid of thoroughness. Finding that a trench six feet deep was a good sheit-er, they argued that a trench or shelter twelve feet deep was twice as good, and a drain twenty-four feet underground was twice as good again. The British guns have destroyed the exits of these tweetee and here left the subtarranean trenches, and have left the subterranean Germans an easy prey for the advancing infantry. They could not get to the sur-face and operate their machine guns; they could not escape from the rear exits because of the barrage fire, and so they were caught, to use a good old ex-pression, like "rats in a trap." The deeper the trench the more certain their capture—that is a military principle that the Germans have been taught in the past few days.

Elaborate But Futile.

The German engineers have done their work well, as stories now coming back from the front attest. They have made their shelters not trenches, but mines, with elaborate systems of ventilation, with numerous exits and entrances plentifully provisioned and equipped; hey were expecting to stand a siege like a fortress. Their concreted, steel-lined under-ground retreats have been the result of two years' planning and work. Pitted against anything less than the British bombardment they would have served their purpose; in some cases they have done their work well, for those that were not destroyed served as nests for machine gunners. Fortunately these were few, for the airmen had taken hundreds of photographs of the German positions and most of the trenches were known in advance and subjected to a conscientious fire from heavier guns than were ever be-fore turned against field entrenchments It is incredible that the trenches that the Germans are now digging in the rear of the shattered Hindenburg line can be so well prepared as those which have been destroyed already. "Stalemate" is a word that may be deleted from the lexicon of




