AGED MINISTER
DIED YESTERDAY

Rev. Oliver Barton Emery, aged 88 years, died yesterday, Nov. 9, at the home of his brother, Andrew Emery, 79 Castle street, following an illness of about one month. Rev. Mr. Emery retired from active work as pastor of a church about 20 years ago, his last charge being at Montague, Prince Edward Island. The venerable clergyman was born March 30, 1835, in Ireland, his parents being Andrew and Margaret Emery. His wife died 22 years ago. Dr. Roberts, to provide insulin free to patients unable to pay for the treatment, and also to give every physician in the province an opportunity to learn the technique of administering the new treatment, is in line with the progressive health policy consistently carried out since Hon. Dr. Roberts became Minister of Health.

A BANKER'S REVIEW. Mr. F. W. Molson, President of the Molson's Bank, in his annual address this week said that if the public statements of the chartered banks can be considered a measure, the falling off in business activity has been checked, while the effect of the bounteous harvest is still to be felt. He notes an increase in receipts from customs and the postal service over last year, and a very considerable increase in volume in Canada's foreign trade. He said: "Last year the imports decreased by \$178,000,000, but this year an increase of about \$170,000,000 is seen. Last year the exports decreased by as much as \$188,000,000, changed this year to an increase to the extent of over \$200,000,000. It is encouraging to note that for the year ending 30th September last the exports exceeded the imports by over \$83,000,000."

While Mr. Molson's cautious and does not venture into the realm of prophecy, it is clear that he regards the general business outlook as more satisfactory than it was last year. Two sons of New Brunswick figured in a little discussion in the British Columbia Legislature a few days ago. Hon. J. W. Bower, leader of the Opposition, had the floor, and this is the report of one portion of a speech in which he handed out spicy comment on every member of the Government.

AN IMPORTANT MEETING. At the meeting of the Maritime Board of Trade in Halifax in September this resolution was adopted: "Resolved that an immediate effort be made to secure a conference between representatives of the Maritime Board of Trade selected from each of the three Provinces and representatives of the three Provincial Governments with the object of creating an organization with a permanent secretary for the purpose of conserving and promoting continuously and constantly the commercial, industrial and other interests of the Maritime Provinces."

The Board adopted another important resolution as follows: "Resolved that this Maritime Board of Trade place itself on record as being in favour of co-ordinating or amalgamating the tourist work now being carried on separately by the Provinces of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island."

As part of the latter resolution it was also urged that transportation companies provide better facilities in New England to advertise the attractions of these provinces; and that more be done to improve roads and provide hotel accommodation and camping sites, and in other ways encourage tourist traffic. Each of these resolutions was referred to a committee. Three committees are composed, the first of J. E. Masters of Moncton, C. C. Avar of Sackville, J. O. Hyndman and A. C. McMahon of Kentville and A. MacDonnell of Sydney; and the second of Messrs Avar and Hyndman, and J. O'Connell of Halifax. They meet in Moncton on Thursday, Nov. 22, when the first named will confer with the Provincial Premier.

The need of a permanent and active secretary for the Maritime Board of Trade is obvious, and it may be hoped the conference will result in arrangements for the appointment; while the question of co-ordinating efforts to enlarge the tourist traffic is also one worthy of the most serious consideration. Mr. Lloyd George nails the free trade flag to the mast. He lost no time on arrival in England in giving his opinion of the Baldwin proposals.

Press Comment

GROWING IN STRENGTH.

(Baltimore Sun.) This foreboding policy of drastic Imperial preference is not original with the British Empire. The colonial tariff policies of Japan, the United States and France are all based on outright favoritism toward Imperial products. What is novel is the move which Great Britain is taking in that the development is being pressed by Dominion rather than British spokesmen. Instead of Britain ruling her colonies, the great Dominions are now beginning to dictate to her. This is the real significance of the Imperial Conference, and it means a distinct tightening rather than any loosening of the Imperial tie.

CRIMINAL RECKLESSNESS.

(St. Louis Globe-Democrat.) If the majority of automobile accidents could rightly be termed unavoidable, the death of scores of individuals and the maiming of others in great numbers during the course of a year might be viewed without indignation. But whatever may be a jurist's verdict with respect for legal considerations, there can hardly be any doubt that the great majority of accidents would have been avoided had driver and pedestrian at no time had thrown care to the winds. There is evidence of a trend, incurable recklessness in the figures showing that 14,000 persons, or 13 per cent. of the total accident mortality, were killed by automobiles throughout the entire country in 1922.

WISE COUNSEL.

(La Patrie.) The Hon. Mr. Brodeur, Lieutenant-Governor of Quebec, in the course of an interview declared that in order to achieve success in life two things were essential—work and uprightiness. His Honor's words merit a wider hearing, where so many young men embrace professional careers. "Talent is necessary, but it does not take one far without hard work. Uprightness—that is to say, frankness, honesty—this is a virtue which, unfortunately, is too often honored more in the higher ranks of society, where at the end it is held to justify the means and everything is considered permissible, even falsehood, imposture and theft. Still, if these things seem to lead to success, it is only temporary. The words of the Lieutenant-Governor should be the guiding star in every walk of life—work and uprightiness."

RULES FOR SPORTSMEN.

(New York Herald.) If every man who goes afield with dog and gun, or wets a line, would do up to the declared principles of the Dutchess County Sportsmen's Association there would be a lot more enjoyment in life for those who pursue the chase about the size of the bag and count that day not lost that does not produce a full crew. The declaration has been sent broadcast throughout the region where the club has shooting and fishing rights in "Never in sport endanger human life. Never kill wantonly or needlessly or brutally. Obey the laws of State and nation; work for better laws, and uphold the unbroken principles of the State. Respect the rights of farm and property owners and also their feelings. Always leave seed birds and game in cover. Never be a fish hog. Discourage the killing of game for commercial purposes by refusing to purchase trophies. Always record the natural history of game species in the interest of science. Love nature and its denizens, and be a gentleman. While all of the above is highly commendable, the first four provisions come pretty near covering the needs of every lover of rod and gun."

INDIVIDUAL TUITION.

(Brandon Sun.) A new school system is claimed for Winnipeg, in Illinois. The public schools are operated upon an individual system which permits each child to progress at his own natural rate, not forced too rapidly by those who are quicker, nor held back by those who are slower. Promotion is by subjects, not by time. Promotion is by achievement, not by time. From this it is possible to give individual instruction in large city school classes, even with five and six-year-old children. All of these experiments have shown that individual instruction eliminates failures and grade repetition, that it stimulates children's interest in school, that it strengthens their initiative, sense of responsibility and self-expressive activities more than is possible under the old class-lock-step system.

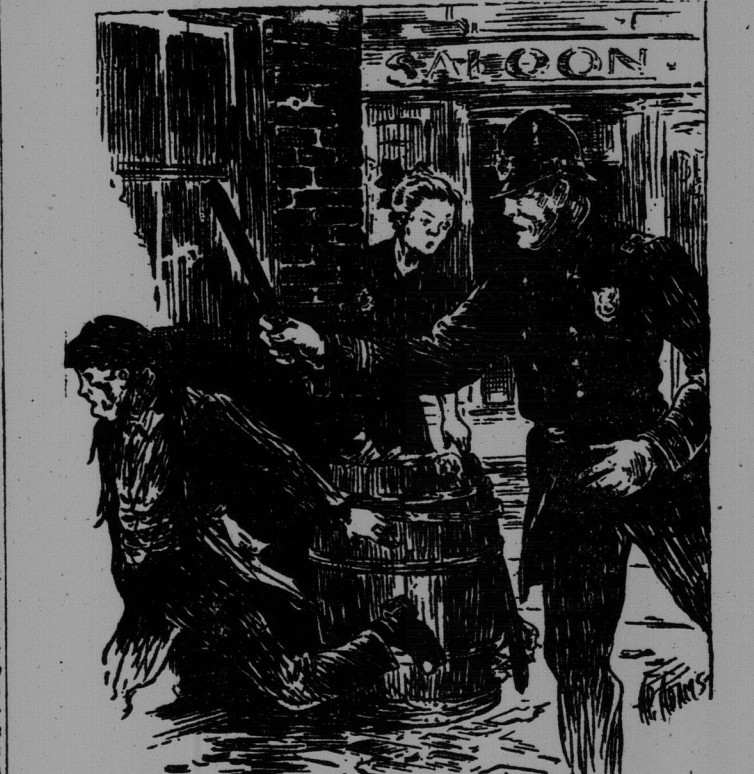
Independent Ticket In Kings Rumored

JURY SAYS DEATH WAS ACCIDENTAL

Verdict Returned in Matter of Fatal Street Car Accident.

The inquest into the death of George Gallant, of Britain street, who died a few days ago in the General Public Hospital as a result of injuries received when struck by a street car at the corner of Britain and Charlotte streets, about two weeks ago, was concluded in the Court House last night before Coroner A. F. Emery.

Several witnesses were examined and the jury, after deliberating thirty-five minutes, returned a verdict to the effect that George Gallant came to his death by being accidentally struck by a street car in Britain street on the morning of October 26, and that no blame attached to the driver of the street car. The jury was composed of R. T. Wardman, foreman, E. J. Todd, C. E. Farrand, George H. McLaughlin, Cornelius Dever, John L. Cambridge and William Crabbe.

Paul C. Oulan was present in the interests of Mr. Gallant's widow, at the instance of the Longshoremen's Association, while H. H. McLean, Jr. represented the New Brunswick Power Company.

Evidence was given by James Merritt, Policeman Frank Corvee, Policeman John McElhiney, Dr. Charles F. Inches, and Dr. O. B. Evans, interested at the General Public Hospital, Bayard Wilson, Herbert Newton, Cecil McPhee and Frank Flaten, motorman in charge of the car.

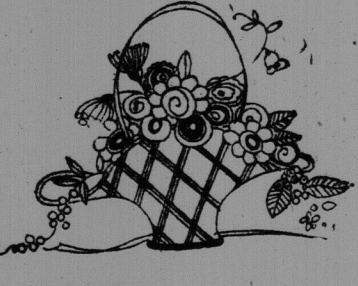

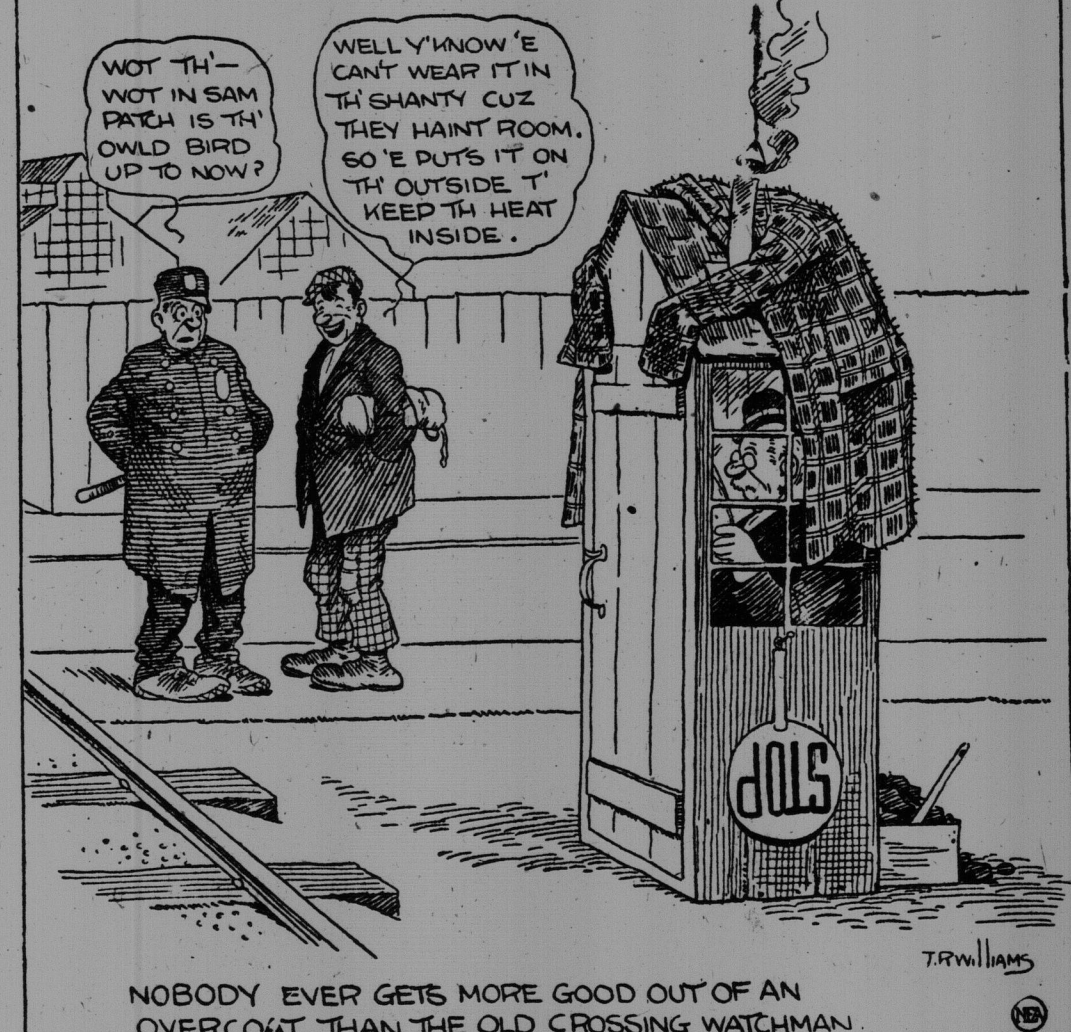

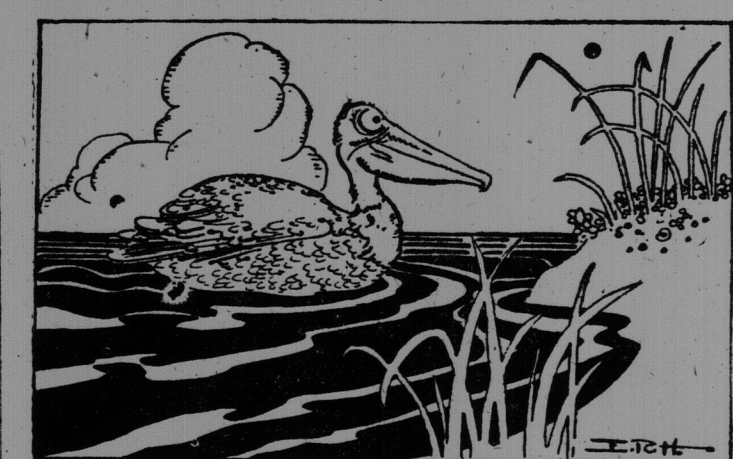
shrinking from the infliction of too severe a blow.

Your Health

INSOMNIA
Insomnia is no respecter of persons. If you persist in overstepping the rules of health, it may come your way. The trouble is either functional or symptomatic. It has psychologic, physiologic and pathologic conditions and changes. The tired business man or city dweller, through mental strain or overwork, is a favorite victim. But people of the country or smaller towns are by no means immune. The poor may have their troubles, but they usually are not insomnia victims; they sleep well.
Worry, nervous troubles, indulging in improper food at the wrong time and sustained mental strain cause insomnia, in most cases. Conditions of the body itself and environment also play important parts. Do not try to go to sleep with cold feet.
To help insomnia sufferers, I would advise light eating at night. Sometimes a glass of warm milk or even other food may aid sleep by directing the increased flow of blood to the stomach during the night.
Do not resort to sedatives, sleeping pills or hypnotic drugs to cure insomnia. Their use will often work greater harm than the insomnia you seek to cure.
Seek plenty of fresh air in walks and by the open window at night. Never smoke to excess, its effects on insomnia are far reaching and well defined. A warm bath of short duration will often help greatly.
In pronounced cases of insomnia, the trouble is dangerous and must be considered a real illness and a cause for careful diagnosis by your physician.

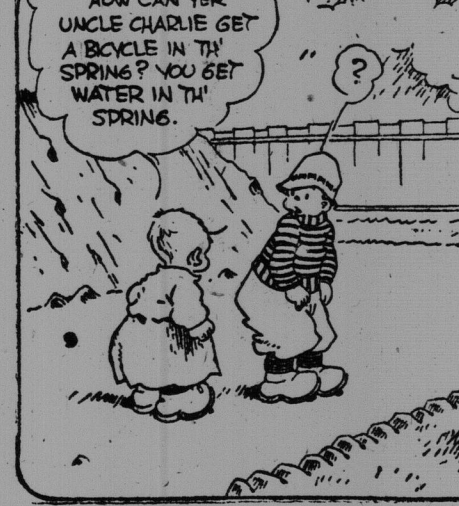

SOCIAL HYGIENE EXECUTIVE MEETS

Marked Reduction in Number of Cases of Disease Reported

There had been a very marked diminution in the number of cases of primary and secondary syphilis as the result of the work of the social hygiene clinics in St. John and throughout the province. It was reported at the meeting of the executive of the St. John branch of the Canadian Social Hygiene Council which was held yesterday afternoon in the Health Centre with W. A. Lockhart, the president, in the chair. It was stated by Dr. J. A. McCarthy that for the greater number of applicants for treatment at the St. John clinic now came from people infected for a long time. This fact he attributed to the compulsory measures adopted in forcing carriers of the disease to undergo treatment, thus preventing the spread of the disease. Among those present at the meeting yesterday were Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts, Minister of Health, H. Usher Miller and Dr. McCarthy. Several bills were passed for payment. The appointment of a new secretary to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Miss Katherine Creaney was under discussion and a committee was appointed to consider various applications. The report of the work done during the last three months in the local social hygiene clinic was submitted by Dr. McCarthy and gave the following statistics: Treatments given, 2,151; blood Wassermann tests, 110; new cases, 83; follow up calls made, 84. From the statistics and the information at hand Dr. McCarthy said he was able to determine that there had been a decided reduction in cases. In connection with the St. John clinic, it is gratifying to know that Dr. Hagerly, of Toronto, the chief of the general disease division of the Dominion Department of Health, who travels from coast to coast in connection with the work of his department, has stated that the St. John clinic was the finest he had seen today in the Dominion with regard to its efficiency and equipment. In addition to the clinic in St. John the Provincial Department of Health has provided similar clinics with officials especially trained to take charge at Moncton, Chatham, Campbellton, St. Basil, near Edmundston, Woodstock, Fredericton, and St. Stephen. At all of these clinics any suffer-

ing from any such disease will be examined and treated free of charge. The amount of money given by the Dominion Department of Health to these services in each province is given on the understanding that treatment at public clinics is to be done free. From the standpoint of population, New Brunswick is provided with a larger number of clinics than any other province.

TO HOLD EXAMINATIONS.
The New Brunswick Embalmers' Examining Board, consisting of Dr. G. S. Melvin, chairman, of Fredericton; S. R. Sederquist, of St. Stephen, and N. L. Brennan, of St. John, held a meeting at the Department of Health, Fredericton, last Monday to decide the dates for examining candidates for embalmers' licenses. The date selected was early in December.

ARMISTICE DAY OF '18 RECALLED

Boche Driven Out in Early Hours of Eventful November 11.

HISTORIC CITY

Reasons for a Cessation of Hostilities, Best Course for Allied Armies.

(Written for The Canadian Press by J. F. B. Livesey.)

Five years ago! And yet the day is more vivid now than it was two or three years ago. It stands out boldly in its right proportion, the dramatic ending of fifty-one months of agony. At the time the significance of Armistice Day was clouded by many things. The Army ceased to function as the all-in-all and the politicians came into their own. "Cessation of hostilities"—a mighty phrase that was to issue in the healing virtues of peace. Unhappily it was but a phrase, there has been no cessation, and Europe is as anything more embittered, more of an armed camp, nearer by the long strides of these five years to disruption and overthrow, to the perishment of civilization in the cauldron of anarchy.

News of the armistice was celebrated in many capitals, demonstrations not devoid of hysteria, so sudden the relief from the strain of years, so bright shone the sun as the war clouds rolled away. But for the fortunate Canadian soldier no place at all was so fitting for its celebration than the historic city of Mons, entered by the troops of the 3rd Canadian Division, Maj.-General A. C. MacDonnell, in the early hours of the morning, and where at 11 o'clock in the Grande Place the burgomaster presented the keys of the city to Brigadier-General J. A. Clark of the 7th Brigade, all of whose battalions had taken part in the assault on the Royal Canadian Regiment, Princess Patricia's Light Infantry, the 42nd Battalion (5th Royal Highlanders of Montreal) and the 40th Battalion (5th Royal Highlanders of Montreal), warriors of the Black Watch led the march because its troops had been the first to enter the city.

N. B. DIABETES SUFFERERS, UNABLE TO PAY, TO RECEIVE FREE INSULIN

Provincial Government Approves Plan of Hon. Dr. Roberts.

Always alive to the necessity of having a healthy population, Hon. W. F. Roberts, Minister of Health, the pioneer health minister in Canada, has persuaded his colleagues in the Government to provide free insulin treatment for those suffering from diabetes and unable to pay the cost of the treatment. To this end he has made arrangements to have Dr. W. W. Hipwell, right hand man of Dr. Bunting, come to New Brunswick and instruct the physicians of the province in the method of using this cure.

Again First in the Field.

The Province of New Brunswick was the first in the Dominion of Canada to seek information from insulin headquarters as to procedure to be adopted in order that its citizens might have the benefit to be derived from this wonderful discovery. This application was made by Dr. Roberts by night-telegram and information was immediately forthcoming. As a result of this the Minister of Public Health once appointed Dr. W. E. Hovley and Dr. H. L. Abramson to take charge of the administration of insulin at the General Hospital, their services to be to the public and provided through the Government. Not every case of diabetes absolutely requires insulin treatment, Dr. Roberts explained last evening, and all cases of diabetes which require insulin must undergo very careful and technical examination in order that it may be known what amount of insulin is necessary from time to time to take care of the proper amount of nourishment to support the patient.

This service which has been established at the General Hospital has been taken advantage of by a large number of citizens, not only from St. John but from various parts of the province. Dr. Roberts has received upwards of 150 communications from those afflicted with this serious malady. The great difficulty that has presented itself with the majority of those living outside the city and county of St. John has been that they must pay or the municipality in which they reside must pay hospital maintenance amounting to at least \$1.00 or \$2 a day in addition to paying for the insulin. Until recently this totalled for the average patient from \$20 to \$25 a week for hospital maintenance and insulin, regardless of the fact that the Government, through its Department of Health, furnished the services of the aforementioned physicians, which if considered, would have added at least another \$25 to the expenses.

Has Studied Situation. Dr. Roberts, considering the average number of cases of diabetes to a given population, namely, from one to two per cent, realized that this important discovery was capable of prolonging

Proposal That Canada Pay Three-quarters Cost of Tubercular Aid.

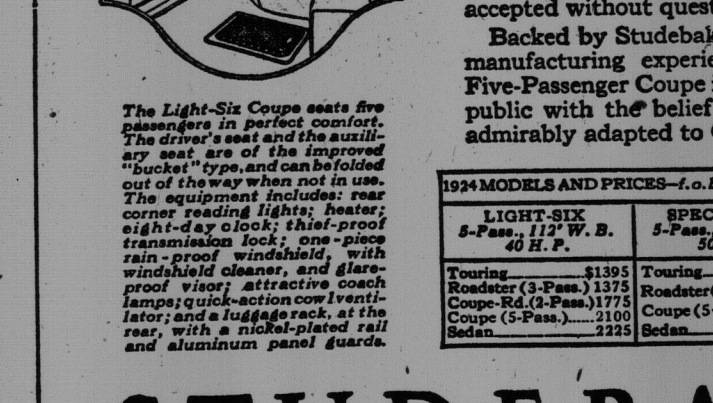

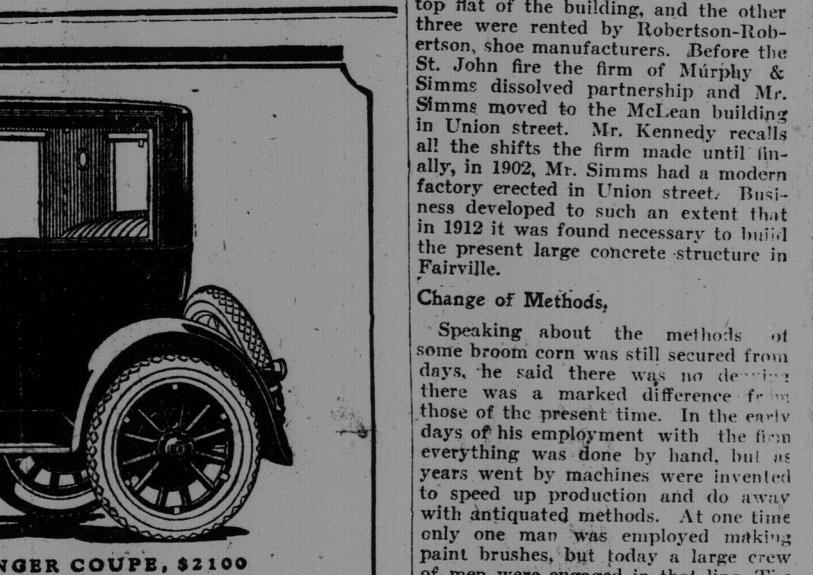

WAS ADRIPT AT SEA FOR 36 HOURS

Lobster Fisherman Picked Up Unconscious Off Massachusetts. Boston, Nov. 10.—Adrift in a 25-foot power boat for 36 hours, Harry Driscoll, Scituate lobster fisherman, was picked up off Graves Light by the Coast Guard Cutter Osipow.

At the same time a crew that had started out from the Nahant Coast Guard station in search of the man, came in sight, took the man off the Osipow and brought him to the Hull coast guard station. He was reported as "resting comfortably" at the light station last night.

The rescue followed a vain search for the man by a crew from the Hull station. Word was received at the Nahant station from Graves light that the power boat with Driscoll in it had been sighted. Boatwain F. A. Cole, with George W. Wickens, E. A. Ward and Harvey Hammond of the station crew put out in a power boat and when about three miles off the light sighted the Osipow, which had in the meantime picked up Driscoll and radioed the news along the coast.

Too Weak to Fix Signal. According to the men who rescued Driscoll the latter was lying unconscious in the bottom of his boat when discovered. He had fastened an oar with a piece of cloth as a signal distress Tuesday, but it had become detached and the fisherman was too weak to replace it.

At the coast guard station in Hull it was said Driscoll would be able to return to his home in Scituate today. Driscoll was unable to tell a coherent story to the men who rescued him, but from what little they could learn it was understood that the engine of his boat had become disabled.

SPORT NEWS GLEANED FROM WORLD'S CENTRES

GREAT CHANGE AGAIN TO UPHOLD ST. JOHN'S PRESTIGE IN SPORT OFFERS

Big Hit Made as Ice Skating Centre in Other Years, Joe Page Points Way to Repeat—Can Have Canadian Championships With Olympic Stars in Line-up.

Another opportunity is knocking at the door of St. John. Will the citizens answer it, or will it go unheeded? St. John, now famous in skating circles throughout America, is being offered one of the big skating classics of the year and all that is necessary to secure it is for some local club to come forward and make application to conduct it.

When Mr. Page interviewed W. Grant Smith, president of the Gyro Club, yesterday, he was given an assurance that the matter would be brought before the members at their meeting next Tuesday evening.

Mr. Page, speaking about the proposed meet, said that St. John would lose a splendid opportunity for invaluable advertising if this offer were turned down.

"These meets," continued Mr. Page, "are good for business and the business men of this city must realize that and stand back of the efforts to bring this meet to St. John."

"What I would respectfully suggest is this: Let some club in the city, say the Gyro Club, apply for the sanction to hold the Canadian national outdoor speed-skating contests. That application must be forwarded through Alderman Louis Rubenstein, Canadian representative on the I. S. U. executive.

"Now, the Olympic speed skating contests will be finished the end of January. It should be pointed out to Mr. Goldsmith that several thousands of dollars could be saved in handling this meet if the Olympic teams from the United States and Canada on their return home be routed so that they land here in St. John. If this can be accomplished—and I see no reason under the sun why the request cannot be granted in view of the many professions of admiration for St. John by the I. S. U.—then, as you can see, a large bill of traveling expenses will be saved. There is no question but that such a meet would be a success.

It was the outside attractions that wiped out any surplus from the meet."

OLYMPIC CHAMPION.

The possibilities of making this meet one of the biggest ever held on the continent are large, says Mr. Page. "It is hardly possible that a Canadian skater will win the Olympic crown—Charles Gorman himself, I honestly believe Gorman stands a wonderful chance to win. There will be no jockeying and each man will fight it out on his merits. Gorman certainly should go to the Olympics. But should Gorman not win, there is a big chance that one of the United States team, Jewtraw, Kaskey, Moore and Steadman, will win the title. Then St. John would be the first city to entertain the Olympic champion. Newspaper men from the big U. S. centres would have special representatives down here to meet the team on its arrival and they would remain here to cover this big Canadian meet. Just think of the publicity such a meet would give this city. It could scarcely be estimated."

RENAULT TO MEET BILLY MISKE NEXT

New York, Nov. 9.—Prospects of a match between Jack Renault and Harry Wills in the near future at Madison Square Garden virtually disappeared today when Promoter Tex Rickard announced he had dropped negotiations for the present. Rickard began efforts to land the match shortly after Renault's knockout victory over Floyd Johnson seeking it as charity affair to be held around Christmas time. The Canadian heavyweight, however, turned down Rickard's offer, asking for more time before opposing the "brown panther" while Wills also displayed no eagerness for the match. A contest between Renault and Billy Miske, who knocked out Bill Brennan a few days ago at Omaha, now is in prospect.

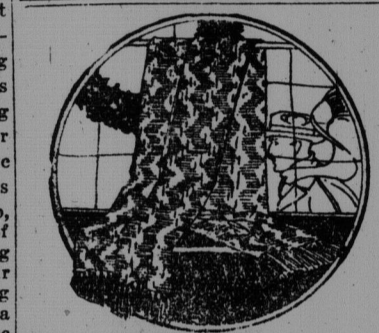
