"Then, when it is taken into consideration," says the report, "that this tremendous number of ears is mostly traveling on the 11,000 miles of improved highways, the congestion on those highways may be realized. When it is considered that in this considion hundreds of thousands of persons are being transported in high-powered machines day in and day out, no more than 2,000 persons were killed in the whole state last year, it would seem that police protection has been fairly good. It is 2,000 too many, to be sure, but the proportion of accidents to the number of cars is diminishing.

Now a word about speed. It is not speed that causes accidents, for more accidents occur when motors are going under fifteen miles an hour than over.

The report also says that the present conflict is between the automobile and the pedestrian, "and the automobile will win the fight in the roads." "Fo-destrians," it says, "will have to keep off the highways, crossing them at certain protested places, and in cities eventually will go over or under the streets, leaving all streets in possession of the motors."

Liquor Inspectors Henderson and Barton yesterday morning raided the premises of James Spencer at Newcastle Bridge, Queens county and it is alleged, found a considerable quantity of mash ready for use, a gallon of homebrew and in addition, an illicit still. Councillor McAuley was making a serious charge against the Federal inspectors who carefully examined all cattle killed because of tubercular infection. "The explanation is," said Dr. Warwick, yesterday, "that in an effort to stamp out tubercular disease among cattle, the Dominion government agrees to compensate the farmer by giving him two-thirds of the value of the animal killed because of disease. In this way, it was hoped in time to stamp out tuberculosis among cows.

"To compensate the farmer still further and recoup him for his loss, the Federal inspection officer carefully examines animals killed and if he finds traces of the disease in parts, that part immediately is condemned and ordered burned. It would be an economic blunder, he said, to burn the entire body, merely because of a disease which is located in one part of the body. So the Federal officer looks for this minutely and, on his certificate, the portions not infected are allowed to be sold.

FELLOW CLERICS WANT REBUKE

Episcopal Clergy Outspoken in Condemning Recent Sermon

Bishop Manning Silent -Head of Church of Ascen-

Head of Church of Ascension in New York Declines to Answer Critics or Retract I his Statements.

While Bishop Manning, head of the Episcopal diocese, preserved strict silence yesterday on the utterances of the Rev. Dr. Percy Stickney Grant in the Church of the Ascension on Sunday, various Episcopal elergymen expressed the opinion that some action should be taken against him. They feel that this is the climax of a long series of unconventional moves on the part of Dr. Grant. One prominent clergyman went so far as to say that he should be brought to trial for heresy, adding that he fully expected Bishop Manning to take some action.

In a sermon delivered on Sunday morning Dr. Grant attacked the constitution and personnel of the Episcopal Church, describing the consecration



Dr. Grant refused to give any further statement yesterday. He intimated that he had said all he had to say on Sunday.

Indignation was registered in the theological colleges which were indirectly attacked in Dr. Grant's sermon. Dr. Raymond Iddings Bell, president of St. Stephen's College, Barrytown, N. Y. said yesterday:

"On the basis of newspaper reports of Dr. Grant's utterances, I wish to say that six of the faculty of St. Stephen's College for Men, which is owned by the Episcopal Church, are priests, all graduates of the great universities and well trained in science. They all believe in the diety of Christ without mental reservations.

Ouestions His Training.

"I am curious to know just what scientific training Dr. Grant has had himself. I think his sermon was a ludicrous exaggeration, not justified by the facts either here or abroad, in regard to scientifically trained priests."

The Rev. Herberf M. Denslow, subdean of the General Theological Seminafy, Ninth avenue and Twenty-second street, was inclined to think that Dr. Grant, indirectly denying the divinity of Christ, denied the fundamental doctrine of the Christ.

New York, Jan. 23—(By The Asso-iated Press)—The hurricanes, whole gales, half gales and storms which have been sweeping the Atlantic for nearly wo months, have spent their force, the weather bureau reports, but in their wake they have left stranded and sunk-m ships, unsolved and mysterious trag-dies of the sea, and a series of "de-ayed runs" for transatlantic liners which has not been equalled since war







Window Ventilation Inadequate.
The various mechanical means of ventilation in use in public buildings were found to differ widely in their effectiveness. Ventilation by means of windows alone did not prove satisfactory, but a modified system of window ventilation with special devices for tempering and deflecting the air and with proper means for allowing the foul air to escape through a gravity exhaust duct, was found to be the most satisfactory of all methods of ventilating a schoolroom. 
