NEW CONFERENCE
RE IRELAND

Men Who Signed Treaty Called to London.

Whole Situation to be Taken Up—What the Newspapers Say About Decision of the Sinn Fein to Postpone Convention.

London, Feb. 23.—The British government has invited the Irish signatories to the Anglo-Irish treaty to come to London for an early conference on the subject, it was announced in the House of Commons today by Winston Churchill, secretary for the colonies.

The South Satisfied. Dublin, Feb. 23.—General satisfaction seems to be felt in southern Ireland over yesterday's surprise decision of the Ard Fheis for a three months' adjournment, at the end of which the people will be asked to vote on a constitution as well as on the Anglo-Irish treaty. This opinion, however, is not unanimous. One question much discussed in some quarters is what is going to happen to the treaty bill now before the imperial parliament which it is contended is shattered to a great extent by the Ard Fheis' decision.

Newspapers of London Fuzzied. London, Feb. 23.—The decision reached by the Ard Fheis in Dublin gets a mixed reception in the London morning newspapers, which seem somewhat surprised at the unexpected outcome of the convention. Some condemn the arrangements by which the Irish elections are put off for three months, while others pronounce it as a matter affecting principally the Irish themselves. It is noteworthy that some of those who have reiterated with much insistence the necessity for an immediate election, raise no objection to the postponement.

The Times says the unexpected decision disappoints the supporters of the Anglo-Irish treaty and believes all those who wish lasting peace in Ireland will regret it. It says: "Public opinion will watch with anxiety, whether yesterday's decision does not tend to diminish the future course of Irish events." The Morning Post says yesterday's decision shows that the Irish republican army controls the situation now before the imperial parliament and is a victory for Eamon de Valera.

The Daily Chronicle, the government organ, thinks it a great pity that the constitution should be made by the Dail Eireann instead of a parliament elected for the purpose. The value of the Valerian's promise, it adds, depends wholly upon how it is kept. "Meanwhile," adds the Chronicle, "the attitude of the Irish government and public toward the contest must be one of watchful waiting."

The Daily News says the agreement is a tribute to the practical common sense of the Irish people and a genuine movement toward unity and goodwill. It adds: "The whole situation is now radically and dramatically altered, and altered much for the better."

The Westminster Gazette thinks if the two parties in the Sinn Fein are satisfied with the agreement, outside observers ought to welcome it, but trusts the Irish people will require the leaders to observe it in spirit as well as letter. No member of the British government expressed an opinion on the action of the Ard Fheis, but it is understood that members of the cabinet were surprised and somewhat perplexed. The Irish bill is expected to enter the committee stage on next Monday, and the government, hoping no amendments will be submitted, anticipated the third reading next week.

Utica, N. Y., Feb. 23.—(Canadian Press)—The state convention of the American Association for the Recognition of the Irish Republic last night adopted resolutions supporting the stand of Eamon De Valera and his adherents and reaffirming the organization's adherence to the cause of the Irish republic.

Other resolutions favored self-government for India and Egypt; urged a more intensive boycott of English goods by U. S. consumers; demanded that the U. S. take steps to insure a free expression of will in the plebiscite to be held in Ireland on the free state treaty, and denounced the proposed four power pact.

UNEMPLOYED ON BRITISH LISTS TOTAL 1,890,400

London, Feb. 23.—(Canadian Press)—The ministry of labor states that approximately 1,890,400 persons were registered as unemployed last week in Great Britain, showing a decrease of 44,000 in the last five weeks. The number of men employed last week on official unemployment relief schemes totalled 127,140.

PARIS CASE IN FREDERICTON

Fredericton, N. B., Feb. 23.—Sentenced by Judge Chandler to be hanged on March 30, in St. John, for the murder of Sadie McAuley, a nine-year-old crippled child, John Paris, a Nova Scotia negro, is today being given his last recourse before the court of New Brunswick to receive his liberty.

His appeal comes today in a motion for a case reserved before the Supreme Court of Appeal. The judges sitting on the appeal are Sir Douglas Hazen, Mr. Justice Barry, and Mr. Justice Grimmer.

HOME RULE FOR SCOTLAND AND WALES IN THIS BILL

London, Feb. 23.—(Canadian Press)—A group of Welsh and Scottish members of parliament have decided to draft a devolution bill for conferring of home rule on both Wales and Scotland.

CONVENTION OF LIBERALS IN WOODSTOCK

Woodstock, Feb. 23.—A convention of the Liberals of Victoria-Carleton was held today at Perth. There have been 108 delegates elected from Carleton and sixty from Victoria. The convention will open on the arrival of the train from the south. Many important matters will be dealt with, and the selection of a Liberal federal candidate may come up for discussion. Considerable interest is taken and no doubt many delegates will be present.

HERE TO SPEAK ON WASHINGTON CONFERENCE

Lieut. Col. D. Forster Says Great Step Towards World Peace Made—Lecture Tonight.

Lieut.-Col. D. Forster, C.M.G., D.S.O., Royal Engineers, of the general staff office, London, arrived in the city on today's Montreal train from Quebec. Colonel Forster is making a tour of Canada and is lecturing in various cities on the effects of the Washington conference, at which he was one of the military delegates from Great Britain. In an interview today, Colonel Forster gave it as his opinion that a great deal had been accomplished by the conference, especially in view of the fact that it was considered a very dangerous experiment to hold such a meeting. Most especially in view of the fact that the peace of the world although the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans, he said, in all, he considered it was a great step towards the peace of the world although more might have been accomplished. He is to lecture tonight in the lecture room at the armory. The subject will be "The world situation with special reference to the Washington conference, and should prove of great interest. From here Colonel Forster will go to Halifax and hopes to accomplish the task he has set himself of seeing all the principal cities of Canada in six weeks.

At the close of the lecture an opportunity will be offered to meet Lieut. Col. Forster in the Officers' Mess, and to discuss points of interest with him.

LARGE SUM WAS SPENT ON STREETS

Report of Road Engineer and Superintendent Submitted at City Hall.

The annual report of the road engineer and superintendent of streets, presented to the common council this morning, contains much interesting information. The report showed that during 1921 the sum of \$550,000 had been expended upon the streets in the city of St. John. This was an increase of \$100,000 over the expenditure of the previous year. The work done during the year was as follows: Repairs to retaining walls, cleaning, watering and sanding the thoroughfares. There are now 11.9 miles of asphalt and granite surfaces. New pavement laid during the year amounted to 89,221 square yards at a cost of \$294,221.81. This yardage includes two and one-half miles of pavement laid during the year. Repairs were made to 4,772 yards of asphalt pavement at a cost of \$4,846.63.

Ordinary street repairs cost \$22,932.11 during the year. The sum of \$8,310.25 was spent on suburban roads, such as Millidgeville, Sandy Point, Ashburn, Bow's Head, On Rockwood park, \$7,137,500.01. Repairs to retaining walls cost \$509.29. It cost \$29,588.42 to operate stone crusher No. 1, and \$3,059.13 crusher No. 2. Street plant repairs cost \$19,385.96. The sum of \$4,912.98 was spent in the painting department and \$6,942.28 spent on mobile grounds, pink sidewalks and fences cost \$1,168.93. Street cleaning, including sweeping, sanding, watering, operation of dumps and snow removal, cost of the operation of each of the trucks of the department is also given in the report.

WORK BETTER THAN CUTTING EXPENSES

Arthur Staff, who won the international speed skating championship at Lake Placid and Endicott, and who established new world records for the 440 yards, three-quarters mile, and one mile, and was pleased to come to St. John. He said the fame of St. John was spreading all over America and that he was getting into the city at 8 o'clock. Gladys Robinson of Toronto, lady speed skater of America, who has been breaking records this year also arrived. She holds all women records for the world.

CALDWELL AGAIN S PRESIDENT

Re-elected by United Farmers of N. B.

Other Candidates Withdrew Names—Woman is a Second Vice-President—Convention Will Come to an End Tonight.

Fredericton, N. B., Feb. 23.—Thomas W. Caldwell, M. P., for Carleton-Victoria, was re-elected president of the United Farmers of New Brunswick at this morning's session of the convention. There was no contest, the eastern candidates who had been nominated, all withdrawing and thus making Mr. Caldwell's re-election unanimous.

The only change made in the principal officers was in the auditor, G. Kirkpatrick, formerly of Grand Falls and Woodstock, who has been secretary-treasurer for several years, will be re-appointed if he will accept.

The convention will close this evening. The matters remaining for discussion include the resolution condemning the feature of the public health act of this province which takes away from the county council discretionary powers in the matters of assessments, for the purpose of the act.

Resolutions which were passed by the United Farmers of Ontario, pledging their support in avoiding all entangling alliances with either of the old parties, and following in the footsteps of the course mapped out during his appeal to the people, were endorsed unanimously.

A resolution pledging the Bay district against any change in the present road act was laid on the table.

MONTREAL RIVAL OF NEW YORK

World Discusses Possibility of Canadian Metropolis Being Greatest Port of Continent.

New York, Feb. 23.—(Canadian Press)—The possibility of Montreal becoming the greatest port on the American continent is the subject of an editorial in this morning's issue of the New York Times, which provides for a new system of government for the Port of New York by bringing the New Jersey section of the local port facilities under the same jurisdiction as New York and removing all matters affecting the harbor from municipal control. It is hoped to bring about a big extension of business.

The newspaper, which heads the article "New York or Montreal?" includes its argument with this significant paragraph: "The best asset of the St. Lawrence ship canal project is the backwardness of the Port of New York. So long as the port remains undeveloped, freight is used for lower Michigan, the Ohio Valley, Tennessee and the east gulf states tonight or early tomorrow and will overpass the Atlantic coastal region by tomorrow night, according to the forecast issued today by the bureau.

FOR REBUILDING OF 3,000 CHURCHES

Bond Issue for Replacement of Structures in France Destroyed in War.

Paris, Feb. 23.—A bond issue for the reconstruction of 3,000 churches destroyed in the devastated areas of France has been authorized. It will be the same type as other issues for reconstruction projects in the devastated regions and will amount to 200,000,000 francs, bearing interest at 6 per cent, issued in 50 franc denominations and payable in thirty years. The issue will be guaranteed by the government, as has been the case with other similar issues.

MORMONS CHASED BY ANGRY MOBBS

Rescued With Difficulty in Plymouth, England—Expulsion Urged.

Plymouth, Feb. 23.—Several Mormon missionaries were pursued through the streets yesterday by an angry mob because of their utterances in Market Square. The police rescued the Mormons with difficulty.

DOMINION NOTE REPORT BETTER

Reflects Improvement in Canadian Exchange at New York.

Ottawa, Feb. 23.—(Canadian Press)—Recent improvement in Canadian exchange in New York finds a reflection in the statement of Dominion note circulation which will appear in the next issue of the Canada Gazette.

The statement will show that while since last month, there has been little change in the amount of gold held for redemption of Dominion notes, the amount of Dominion notes in circulation has been reduced by \$25,000,000 and the percentage of gold thereby sensibly increased.

On Feb. 21, the statement will show, Dominion notes in circulation were \$255,414,668 against which there was gold held to the amount of \$80,825,971, or 31 per cent. In addition the circulation was backed to the extent of another \$187,327,988 by deposits of approved securities.

Last month, Dominion notes in circulation totalled \$260,938,727; gold held amounted to \$81,131,830; approved securities deposited amounted to \$162,858,897. The percentage of gold to circulation was twenty-eight, or 28 per cent less than in the present month.

THE NORTHWEST IS ICE BOUND

Blizzard With Thunder and Lightning.

Mercury Below Zero and in Some Parts of States Snow Drifts 20 Feet High—Skating on Highway.

Chicago, Feb. 23.—The northwest continued ice and snowbound today and the blizzard which swept in from the Rocky Mountains last night with thunder and lightning spread its influence eastward and southward. Temperatures were falling early today. Western Minnesota and the Dakotas reported from five to twelve degrees below zero, and a cold wave began to affect the southwest as far as Central Texas. At Chicago, the mercury began to tumble rapidly.

In the northwest train schedules continued to be seriously interrupted, in some instances abandonment of service, while wire service was handicapped. Hundreds of telegraph line poles went down under weight of freezing rain or sleet and winds of from 20 to 50 miles an hour, which piled snow in some places in the Dakotas, Minnesota and Wisconsin to a height of twenty feet.

In the southwest a severe glass storm prevailed over a wide area. In Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, and Northern Texas wars, soaking rains fell yesterday, turning to sheets of ice when the temperature suddenly dropped.

In some parts of Southern Minnesota one of three inches of ice, formed as the blizzard swept in from the west, covered the ground. Seven high school students of Welton, Minn., skated seven miles to Fairmount on the public highway which was covered with smooth ice.

At Duluth, Minn., nearly 30 inches of snow had fallen early today. Jamestown, N. D., reported a temperature of 12 below zero.

FIGHTS EFFORT OF MRS. STILLMAN TO GET EVIDENCE

New York, Feb. 23.—For the second time in two months Mrs. Anne U. Stillman must await the result of an appeal by attorneys for her husband, James A. Stillman, from a court order granting her money with which to meet expenses of gathering evidence in her divorce action in Canada.

John E. Mack, guardian of Babe Guy of the Stillman, and John F. Brennan, attorney for Mrs. Stillman, have been served with papers declaring that Stillman has appealed the latest court order, which was for \$6,000.

RECEIVED BIG SUM FOR SEIZED GERMAN SHIPS.

London, Feb. 23.—(Canadian Press)—Lord Incheape, chairman of the government shipping board, has reported to the reparations commission on the sale of former German ships allotted to Great Britain. His reports show that 418 vessels, totalling 2,600,000 tons, have realized above £20,000,000. The cost of selling the ships was only half a crown per 100 of the sum realized.

THIS WILL INTEREST FARMERS OF CANADA

London, Feb. 23.—(Canadian Press)—Chairman Treshowman of the Australian voluntary wheat pool, now says that the object of his coming visit to London and America is to arrange a linking up of farmers' co-operative societies in Australia, Canada and the United States with a view to organized marketing of produce in London including wheat, wool, tallow, butter, meat, canned and dried fruits and all primary produce, says a Reuter despatch from Sydney.

CONSIDER CHANGES IN HARBOR ACT
Steps for re-drafting the harbor commission act of 1919 were taken at the Board of Trade rooms last evening by the committee appointed for that purpose, consisting of Mayor Schofield, Commissioner Hulbeck, Dr. W. Ledwith, A. F. Blake, A. P. Paterson, R. H. Cushing, F. S. A. McMullin, F. A. Campbell, H. C. Schofield, R. E. Armstrong, F. A. Dykeman, and Dr. Murray MacLaren, M. P.

One of the changes proposed was the increase of the financial consideration from \$2,000,000 to \$3,000,000. The matter of the uprisement of the government property and the C. N. R. elevator were discussed. The free use of the harbor for the ferry and the rights of the citizens on the wharves used as thoroughfares it was said should not be interfered with. R. E. Armstrong was authorized to write of the amendments proposed to the city council before action should be taken.

OVER THE WIRES

Two men and a woman plotted the murder of William Desmond Taylor, according to a statement of Harry M. Fields, now under arrest at Detroit. Fields said that he received \$800 for driving the plotters to Taylor's house on the night of the murder, and afterwards drove them away to a hop-joint. Seven men, including two from Newfoundland and one from New Brunswick, lost their lives when the fishing schooner Caldwell H. WHOSE VOICE IS THIS? A long "contributed" article in the Standard sets forth the alleged perils confronting the city if it accepts the assurance of the provincial government that the latter will supply a stated quantity of hydro-electric power at a fixed maximum price. That would be "a gamble," we are told, and the system, especially after the reorganization and lightening up of the whole national system has been effected.

Drop personalities, forget past grievance, remember only what is best in the interests of the city and in the interests of invested capital. Be an optimist. NURSES SELF-DENIAL.
Moscow Hospitals Efficient Despite Paltry Salaries.
London, Feb. 23.—The monthly salary of a nurse in the municipal hospital in Moscow is less than the cost of a cake of soap in that city. This striking example of the disproportion between wages and the cost of living in the Russian capital is disclosed in a report just made by a special commission sent to Russia by the Health Committee of the League of Nations.

The commission says that a cake of soap in Moscow cost 8,500 rubles, while nurses in the city hospital were paid only 5,000 rubles a month, and that they had to be content with very scanty food. The poverty and misery that prevailed in Russia, as seen in the hospitals which the commission visited, made a deep impression upon the members. Nevertheless, the commission stated, there is a high state of efficiency in the municipal hospital, and the commission emphasized the spirit of sacrifice displayed by those entrusted with ministering to the health of the Russian people, especially of the children.

RUSSIAN REFUGEES IN GREAT MISERY

Cold and Snow Intensify the Sufferings Around Constantinople.

Constantinople, Feb. 23.—Bitter cold weather and heavy falls of snow are intensifying the sufferings of the legions of Russian refugees, who have sought shelter and food within the Turkish capital and its environs.

Entertainments, balls and gala performances are being given by charitable persons in an effort to raise money for the unfortunate Russian outcasts, but the response is very feeble.

The plight of the Russian women and children and old men is pathetic to the last degree. There is a shortage of wood and other fuel, and many are dying daily of exposure.

In addition to the Russian, Greek and Turkish refugees, whose numbers run into tens of thousands, Constantinople has in its midst a large number of Armenian refugees of Cilicia. Armenians are placed about the city to move the population to succor their destitute brethren, but nobody seems to worry about them.

Let the rich Americans of the League of Nations take care of them," is the general response.

Sir Samuel Hoare, Deputy High Commissioner for the League of Nations, is here in connection with the International Relief Fund for Russian refugees, with which Dr. Fridtjof Nansen is connected.

His arrival has greatly heartened the Russians, especially General Wrangel and other Russian officials, upon whom a great part of the task of caring for the refugees has fallen.

It is hoped here the League will take energetic measures to ameliorate the grave conditions that exist.

WILHELM'S MEMOIRS A TERRIBLE BOOK

Critical Verdict of Former Members of the Kaiser's Court.

Berlin, Feb. 22.—"Ein Entschliches Buch" (A terrible book!)

That is the critical verdict of former members of the Court of Emperor Wilhelm, who have been accorded the rare privilege of reading portions of the manuscript of the book of memoirs being written by the former Kaiser.

"If this book is ever published, it will be a death blow to monarchism in Germany for one hundred years."

This expression is credited to one of the former close friends and associates of Her Hohenzollern, after reading several chapters from the former Emperor's pen.

Wilhelm, it is claimed, has learned nothing from the outcome of the war and the vast changes it has wrought in the world. He has blamed every-

thing that occurred previous to and during the world war to somebody else. No blame is permitted to fall on himself. His memoirs are alleged to be full of Byzantine, obsolete political views and erroneous conclusions all directed toward the justification of his war-time policies.

"I hope the former Kaiser's heirs have the good sense to suppress these memoirs," is the remark made by one who has read portions.

SINGER'S BEQUESTS

Christine Nilsson Left Estate in England Value \$120,000.

Stockholm, February 26.—The late Christine Nilsson, or Countess Cass de Mirand, famous Swedish opera singer, called by many the "second Swedish nightingale," left an estate in England valued at \$120,000. This is disclosed by her will, which, according to Stockholm papers, has just been opened in London.

The value of her Swedish estate, said to be of considerable size, is not yet known. The Swedish press, however, asserts that estimates of her wealth published in many foreign papers placing her fortune at \$15,000,000, were grossly exaggerated. They add that she was noted in life for her great-hearted generosity, and that the total of her gifts are known to have amounted to a large fortune.

Of her English estate, the Countess bequeathed \$2,000 to the Royal Academy of Stockholm, and \$2,000 to the Conservatory of Music of Paris, both to be used as funds for scholarships. The will includes legacies of various amounts totaling \$17,000 to various friends.

The remainder of the English estate is left to the singer's step-daughter, Countess Rose Cass de Mirand. Her objects of art, paintings, etc. the singer left to four Swedish museums.

The delay in opening the singer's will is said to have been occasioned by the fact that Christine Nilsson was a French citizen.

Daniel Mullin, K. C., Belgian consul for New Brunswick, has been instructed by the minister of foreign affairs to demand all Belgians holding securities forming part of the old Austrian debt to have their securities stamped. Accordingly, such Belgians are invited to present themselves as soon as possible at the Belgian consulate, where they are instructed as to formalities to be fulfilled. This procedure is necessary for the protection of their interests by the safeguarding of their securities.



TO TAX INCOMES OF RUM-RUNNERS

Government Officials Find That Canada is Being Defrauded.

Windsor, Feb. 23.—Acting under instructions from Ottawa, officials responsible for the collection of Federal income taxes here are issuing special forms, requesting men known to be leaders in the business of rum-running to file statements of their incomes during the last three years.

Investigation by Federal agents has disclosed, it was admitted Saturday by government officials, that many of the rum-runners who have failed to pay income taxes here have huge accounts with banks in Michigan.

By this method, the rum merchants have side-stepped their tax obligation to the Canadian government.

Other "big men" not connected with illicit traffic, also have escaped payment of Canadian income taxes by doing business with Detroit banks, the officials said.

Through statements made by "kings" of the rum-running business in police court, and with the aid of provincial license inspectors, who have furnished the approximate amount of liquor sold by these "tax slackers" in three years, the Federal government has compiled a list of "names," which will be sent to men who have boasted of their profits from selling liquor.

Washington, Feb. 22.—Statistics of income compiled from income tax returns for the calendar year of \$5,000,000 or over. The names of taxpayers are not revealed, the law requiring that income tax returns be held confidential.

Paris, Feb. 23.—The government's campaign against disseminators of false financial information calculated to ruin France's credit abroad, took definite form when the police arrested Jean Xydias, a millionaire banker in the Place de l'Opera, and after brief questioning, ordered his expulsion from the country, as well as that of another banker, named Michael Anatra. Both are Russians, and are accused of having direct relations with the Soviets through Anatra's agency in Geneva. Xydias admitted that he was born in Russia.

ARMED PLANES ACT CHAPERONE TO ANNA BELLE

Little British Schooner Laden With Whiskey is Taken in Charge.

Miami, Fla., Feb. 23.—The British schooner Anna Belle was seized late on Sunday off Jewish Creek, about 40 miles south of Miami, with a cargo of 11,200 cases of whiskey aboard, by aeroplanes of the prohibition squadron operating out of Miami and adjacent coastal towns, it was learned today from officials here.

The entire crew of 21 men were captured and are now being held under surveillance, while the confiscated liquor is under guard aboard the schooner, which is anchored off Jewish Creek.

Seven aeroplanes, painted a battleship grey, gradually made their way down the coast last week, it became known here today, one of them, under command of Capt. Rogers, stopping at Miami. Some of the others stopped at St. Augustine, Jacksonville, Charleston, and other points.

Advance information was furnished by scouts aboard sub-chasers, which got the location of the Anna Belle, and on Sunday a number of the planes collected near Jewish Creek, and at a signal, gathered simultaneously over the alleged whiskey carrier.

Capt. Johnson, who brought the report here, stated that the prohibition squadron was equipped with a wave code which no other wireless apparatus could interpret, and this is used exclusively in sending and receiving official messages.

14-YEAR-OLD GIRL PLANNED TO ELOPE

Stole 25,000 Francs in Notes and Bonds from Her Grandparents.

Paris, Feb. 23.—Marie Venizat, of Lussey, near Angers, is a little French peasant girl only 14 years old. But what she lacks in years she makes up for in romantic spirit. And her premature love affairs have ended by causing financial ruin to her grandparents with whom she is living. Having discovered what she thought her ideal of a prince charming—a young man living in the neighborhood of her grandparents' little farm—Marie decided that she was violently in love and could only achieve happiness by union and flight to Paris, the great city of which she was ever dreaming.

The young man more sensible, turned her down, refusing to take things seriously, but in order not to hurt her feelings said that he had no money to get married. So Marie, to prove the extent of her love, broke open her grandparents' chest, and took all they possessed, amounting to about 25,000 francs in bank notes and bonds and hid them away safely. Two days later having overheard her grandfather tell his wife

Geneva, Feb. 23.—A couple named Stalder, separated for thirty years, have been joined in death at Kussnacht, near Lucerne. For reasons they never told, the husband and wife parted a month after marriage, living in opposite ends of the village, bowing to each other on the street but never speaking.

Recently the wife died. The husband, on hearing the news, wrote a note asking to be buried near her. An hour later he was found dead. Doctors found no indications of suicide, and friends said he died of a broken heart.

HAS MORE INEBRIATE PATIENTS BUT SAYS PROHIBITION WILL WIN

Boston, Feb. 22.—The opinion that in time "prohibition will be an accomplished fact," is expressed by Dr. Hugh B. Gray, superintendent of the Washington Home for Inebriates, in his annual report. In 1921, however, the report says, the number of admissions to the Home, one of the oldest of its kind in the country, was 694, as against 410 in 1920, 669 in 1919, and 726 in 1918.

Dr. Gray says the physical condition of patients at admission during the last year has been "extremely poor in a much larger proportion of cases than formerly," adding:

"There are two obvious conclusions: Drunkenness is increasing and the quality of liquor is deteriorating." He also sees no signs of any immediate change because strong prejudice against the prohibition hampers its enforcement, but continues:

"There can be no doubt as to the final result. This revolt will finally die down and prohibition will be an accomplished fact except for sporadic outbreaks."

LILLIAN GISH IN PULPIT REPLIES An Overflowing Congregation Heard Movie Actress Defend Her Profession—Says Film Folks Not Bad.

New York, Feb. 23—The Rev. Christian F. Reiser had to hang out a standing room only sign, figuratively speaking, when Lillian Gish, the moving picture actress, delivered an address on the subject of "Who Are You?" at the invitation of Dr. Reiser to answer the attacks of the Rev. John Roach Straton and others against the stage world as the result of the Taylor murder case and other scandals.

As soon as the doors were opened, hundreds of men, women and children had been waiting in the street for admission, piled into the house of worship. They occupied every seat and still they came. Dr. Reiser sent out for extra chairs and benches, and they filled all of the windows behind the pulpit, so that part of the crowd could be accommodated in a room beyond the windows. When the services began people were standing in rows on both sides of the pulpit.

When the other part of the regular evening service had been given Dr. Reiser delivered a sermon on "Who Are You?" in which he referred to the recent Sunday afternoon discussion of stage morals by Dr. Straton and William A. Brady in the Calvary Baptist church.

"I am proud to have Lillian Gish here in my church tonight," said Dr. Reiser. "I know her, and I know David Wark Griffith, her manager, and I am glad that I know them. I am proud to count William A. Brady among my friends. I am tired of hearing the theatre and the moving pictures continually abused. They do a great deal of good, and they should be encouraged rather than vilified. Of course, some plays are bad and should be blacklisted, but they are in the minority."

"The movies put the saloon out of business; so, instead of throwing stones at them, let's commend the good things they do."

At the end of his remarks, Dr. Reiser introduced Miss Gish, who was received with prolonged applause. The little moving picture star assured her unique audience that she was glad to be with them, and told them about the religious training she and her sister, Dorothy, had received and how moral life in the movies really was.

"I myself am a member of the Protestant Episcopal church, in which I was brought up," said Miss Gish. "However, I used to attend some of the Epworth League meetings, and (with a smile) a good many of our Methodist picnics, which I always enjoyed."

"Many people nowadays seem to regard actors and actresses with suspicion. I don't know exactly what to say to you to convince you that we are not strange people, but just normal everyday men and women like yourselves, but perhaps it will do if I simply tell you about myself and my sister Dorothy. Whatever success my sister and I have had is due to our mother, who has always been our friend and adviser."

"Our first public appearance on the stage was when I was five years old and Dorothy was three, in an entertainment in a church Sunday school, by the way."

Later, by mother had to be both father and mother to her two little girls, and she did not know how to bring them up.

Miss Gish said that her mother usually accompanied her wherever she went, but was ill last night, and could not go to the church with her.

"In 1917," she said, "I went to Europe to play a war film, and mother went with me. She became shell shocked over there, and has never recovered from it, so that I regard her as a war veteran."

At the conclusion of her address, Miss Gish was complimented by Dr. Reiser and loudly applauded by the audience.

BOARD OF TRADE AND HYDRO MATTER

Other City Questions Also Taken Up at Meeting of the Council.

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Reports were presented on the subject of the development of our natural resources and it was decided that the Hydro-Matter Committee be re-appointed. A letter was read from the secretary of the Hydro-Matter Committee, in which he stated that the committee had been asked to report on the character of their mining operations and to advise on the subject of the N. B. government and also with the mining department at Ottawa.

The conference with the minister of Railways also formed the subject for a report. A communication was received from Manager Allopp of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company advising the council that the government had extended the West India contract for another two-year period.

Membership applications from Knowlton & Gilchrist, insurance agents and S. E. Elkin, of the Maritime Mail Company, were approved.

After a lengthy discussion on the matter of the hydro-electric scheme, during which several suggestions were made, it was decided that, in order to co-operate with the city, a meeting of the industries and civics committee of the board should be held immediately to decide upon a concrete recommendation on the matter.

CLERGYMAN IS FOUND POISONED
