STICK TO THE SHIP TILL LAST; THEN ALL HANDS OVERBOARD; SAVED WITH DIFFICULTY

Copenhagen, March 10—The German oil tank Deutschland has brought here the English captain and crew of twenty four of the steamer County of Devon. The latter's cargo shifted in a terrible storm on the Atlantic, she listed and great seas poured over her.

El Paso, Texas, March 10—Constitutionalist troops sent by General Villa to open a campaign for the capture of Torreon, have met with a crushing defeat, according to advices from Pochillo. They state that 1,600 Mexican soldiers were killed, 450 wounded and 190 taken prisoners. The battle took place late on Sunday.

Early on Sunday small forces of Federalists led by General Ricardo Pena were beaten by General Ortega's men and Pena was compelled to fall back on Torreon. The victorious rebels pressed towards that city and after a running fight of several hours, were outflanked by General Argumedo's troops.

Denifite Announcement Of Some City Candidates Is Made By Them Today

The approach of the civic election, which would be contested on April 14, is beginning to make its influence felt. The mayor being elected for only two years faces another election and Mayor Frink has definitely decided to accede to the wishes of his friends and to offer himself in opposition to the two successful candidates receiving the lowest number of votes should serve for only two years in their first term, that the retirement of only two commissioners should be brought about every two years, and thus give greater continuity to the work of the council.

LEFT BULK OF HER LARGE FORTUNE TO CHARITY

London, March 10—Miss Ellen Martha Bell, who died on January 8, aged seventy-nine years, left £20,000,000, of which nearly £1,700,000 is bequeathed to charity.

Purchase of Motor Fire Apparatus Again Voted Down

Resolution Proposed by Commissioner McLellan Defeated by Deciding Vote of the Mayor — Proceedings of Common Council

Commissioner McLellan, for the third time, at yesterday's meeting of the common council moved a resolution for the purchase of an 800-gallon pump auto chemical and hose wagon and also an 85-foot aerial ladder auto truck fully equipped at a maximum price of \$26,665. In opposing this, on the ground that the expenditure was unnecessary, Mayor Frink maintained his former position in the matter, explaining that \$20,000 had already been voted for the purchase of fire fighting apparatus, and that the further expenditure was, in his opinion, unjustified. The mayor again voted the motion down, after considerable discussion.

The commissioner urged that, even if his motion had been voted down on previous occasions for certain reasons, it still need not follow that it should be rejected in the present case. He said that if such apparatus was purchased, it would be necessary to build another station. Before putting his resolution, Commissioner McLellan referred to the recent fire at the Grand Union Hotel, saying that the inquiry into the death of those who had perished in the flames seemed to bring out more strongly the need of motor driven apparatus.

Commissioner Wigmore, in seconding the motion, as he had done on a previous occasion, emphasized the point that St. John could never do without pumping engines.

Mayor Frink said that after the motion had been twice voted down he thought it would not again have come up so soon.

He referred to the evidence taken at the recent inquiry, saying that efforts seemed to have been made to suppress the fact that, prior to his voting, Commissioner McLellan's motion, a motion had passed the council authorizing the commissioner of public safety to purchase fire apparatus for the sum of \$20,000. It had afterwards been represented by Commissioner McLellan that this amount would not cover the expense of all the apparatus which he considered necessary for the city.

The commissioner had asked the council to authorize the expenditure of some \$40,000. This he had voted down, firstly, on account of the tightness of money, and further in consideration of the fact that the Merryweather Company of England, reputed the best fire engine builders in the world, could supply the motor pumping engine for \$15,000 or \$18,000.

The total amount, if this firm's tender were accepted, would be \$33,000 and he did not see why this was not enough.

The commissioner of public safety, he said, had represented to the council that Stephen P. Gerow had, at that time, recently had St. John to go to the LaFrance Company, from which the commissioner recommended the purchase of the apparatus. He had pointed out that the city could get the apparatus at some discount, and that it would be better to buy it from the LaFrance Company, as he had done in the past. The mayor said he did not know what were the relations between the commissioner and Mr. Gerow, nor what were the feelings of the citizens in the matter of purchasing the apparatus through the agency of Mr. Gerow, but he did think that the price stated was too high.

His worship then referred to the petition, signed by six or eight merchants, that he withdraw his objection to the purchase of such apparatus as had been recommended by the commissioner. He added that he had not several of the signatories of this petition who had appeared in court, and he had not from conviction but because they could hardly refuse the request of the person who had circulated the petition.

"It looked," the mayor continued, "as if there had been some effort to drive me, but I am a pretty hard man to drive and when the motion came up again I voted it down."

Meanwhile, his worship pointed out, there was \$20,000 available for the purchase of fire apparatus at any time.

He further urged the impossibility of dispensing altogether with horse-drawn apparatus, and made the point that if one motor-driven piece was now purchased—a hook and ladder truck without the pumping engine—the city would have the opportunity to get low satisfaction if the motor engine happened to be hung up on a hill for half an hour, disaster might result.

"The horse," he added, "always gets there, even if he is a little slower than the motor. If a horse should break his leg another one can be on the spot in a minute or two. If anything went wrong with the motor a serious delay might result."

The mayor again urged the necessity for at least getting the motor driven aerial truck with the funds available. Further apparatus might be bought later if this should prove satisfactory.

Commissioner McLellan told again his reason why it would not in his opinion be satisfactory to get one piece without the other. He asserted that the purchase of motor-driven apparatus would effect economy in maintenance by avoiding wear and tear. Without another engine, he said, it would be necessary to have a new station and piece of apparatus round Brussels street.

Commissioner Schofield said that when the matter was brought up before he had been strongly in favor of the purchase of more modern apparatus, though he was satisfied that it would not be possible to operate motor-driven equipment in some very cold days. At the same time he thought this fact was no obstacle to buying the pieces recommended by the commissioner, merely because on a few days in winter it might be impossible to use them.

He wished, however, to be sure that the right price was being paid, and suggested that other cities which had bought similar equipment from the LaFrance Company be asked whether it had been satisfactory, and what prices had been paid.

Commissioner Agar said that he was practically of the same mind as Commissioner Schofield, yet he had hardly expected that the matter would have been brought up again so soon after it had been twice voted down already. He thought this was bad form and not fair to the mayor. The latter, he said, had

fearlessly maintained his opinion in spite of criticism. He moved that the matter lie over till the first meeting of the new council after the elections.

Mayor Frink said that, while he appreciated Commissioner Agar's remarks, he would prefer the matter should be disposed of immediately and that he would stand on his own responsibility.

Commissioner McLellan said the only reason he pressed the matter was his belief in the absolute necessity for further equipment. He pointed out that his reasons for not having anything to do with the Merryweather apparatus was that it would be shipped here without any guarantee and that it would have to be taken on trust without any test. It might not be suitable.

The resolution was put to the vote. The four commissioners rose in dissent but Mayor Frink maintained his opposition by voting in the negative. The motion was therefore lost as a unanimous vote on a bond issue is necessary.

Communications were received from the St. John Girls' Association and the Ladies' Aid of Waterloo Street Baptist church approving of the recent steps taken to eliminate vice from the county and requesting similar action being taken in the city.

A communication from the Granite Street Paving and Construction Co. offering to supply crushed stone at \$1.00 a ton was referred to the commissioner of public works. The time for sending in tenders for the purchase of a city lot in Fairville was extended to Saturday, March 14. The time of closing tenders for city supplies was extended to March 20. The N. B. Telephone Co. were granted permission to erect two poles in Whitcomb street.

On motion of Commissioner Schofield the mayor was requested to communicate with the board of trade to have the statement that the Goulais-Bowring agreement would end on May 1 confirmed.

On motion of Commissioner Agar an amendment to the paving law to eliminate doubt regarding the wording was approved. The amendment will have to be ratified at Fredericton.

BIG CELEBRATION TO MARK CANADA'S GOLDEN JUBILEE

Ottawa, March 9—Canada will celebrate in 1917 on a somewhat elaborate scale, the fiftieth anniversary of the establishment of Confederation. This announcement was made by Premier Borden in parliament today, but the premier added that no conclusion had yet been come to as to the character and extent of the celebration.

Hon. W. B. Naudet introduced a bill to amend the adulteration of foods act with regard to maple sugar and maple syrup by providing that the words "maple sugar" and "maple syrup" must not be used upon labels to describe an article which is not pure according to the standards of the department.

At the opening of the house Hon. Mr. White, minister of finance, took occasion to publicly withdraw a statement he had made earlier in the session in the debate upon the address, when he had attributed to Hon. Mr. Fielding an article on "Frenzied Finance in Canada," which had appeared in Montreal and London (Eng.) papers. His error, said Mr. White, had been drawn to his attention.

SECURED HIS WARES WITH SKELETON KEY

Arrested in Rochester Selling Stolen Goods.

Rochester, March 10—The mystery of the whereabouts of a key-worker whose numerous thefts of late had begun to worry the police was solved when Harry McGuire, 85, of Mount Forest, Ont., was taken into custody. Detectives landed him while he was trying to sell some new razors. A vagrancy charge against the man was withdrawn and he was substituted. The razors were found to be part of goods stolen from a house here.

McGuire admitted three other burglaries which he had committed in the city. He entered the houses with a skeleton key and stole money, clothing, silverware, jewelry and everything of value he could carry away. Most of the stuff was pawned and was recovered.

Supports Statements of F. B. Carvell

THE SOUTHAMPTON MATTER

Parliament Told of Double Subsidy Said to Give Mr. Pinder, M. P. P., Profit of \$59,000 on Construction—Investigation Promised

Ottawa, March 9.—This stern fact stands out: A great wrong has been done. A large amount of money had been taken wrongfully, I might really say stolen, from the public treasury. The facts warrant a thorough and searching investigation."

With these serious words F. B. Carvell pressed an ugly charge against the Borden administration in parliament tonight. The facts concerning the misappropriation of public money had been revealed in a law suit before the supreme court of New Brunswick and the Carleton member backed his charge with certified copies of the evidence given before the court.

He showed that the Southampton Railway Company, which constructed a short line from Millville to the St. John river, a total mileage of 12.7, and whose officers consisted of J. K. Pinder, M. P. P., as president, and P. A. Guthrie, M. P. P., as secretary, both Conservative members of the provincial legislature, had secured a provincial guarantee of four per cent bonds (principal and interest) of \$100,000 per mile from the New Brunswick government in 1909 when Hon. Mr. Hasen was premier, and has secured a double subsidy in 1912 under the Borden administration of \$18,200 per mile.

He then produced the sworn testimony of the contractor who built the road before the New Brunswick court that the total cost of construction was

less than \$12,000 per mile. Mr. Pinder had therefore netted a profit of over \$66,000 at the expense of the public.

Engineer Certified to It.

Among the most serious of the documents presented to the house by Mr. Carvell in his searching arraignment was the original report of the railway department, who reported that he had investigated the railway before the subsidy was issued and that it had cost \$29,664 per mile.

"One of two things is certain," commented Mr. Carvell, "either the character of this official is unmistakable or he was instructed to do something. It is for the government to say."

When the York by-election was approaching, Mr. Carvell continued, Mr. Pinder became anxious to go to Ottawa and he was told, according to the Carleton member, that if he "was good" he would get his double subsidy for his railway. "So," added Mr. Carvell, "Mr. Pinder went to the Conservative convention and nominated Mr. McLeod, the present Conservative member."

"It didn't make any difference," he said, "I have got here anyway," put in Mr. McLeod.

"May be," qualified Mr. Carvell, "it is strange, at any rate, that Pinder got the double subsidy he was not entitled to."

"The events seemed to synchronize," observed Hon. Mr. Oliver.

Hon. Dr. Reid, acting minister of railways, said the government had been guided solely by the reports of Mr. Johnson and Chief Engineer Bowden. The minister confessed it looked as though something was "radically wrong," and promised to inaugurate an investigation in the department tomorrow.

McLeod Corroborated Carvell.

Then came the denunciation of the night. Mr. McLeod rose to say that Mr. Pinder was his Conservative colleague in the legislature, but "there was a hundred other men in York county he would sooner have had nominated him."

"The denunciation," the facts outlined by the minister for Carleton," he de-

clared, amid manifest government perturbation; "I know the district, I know the men, and I know the facts, and I want to tell the house I fully concur in many of the statements which have been made. By living on the spot and knowing what items have been peddled and items have been turned into the government that were neither true nor correct. They talk about Pinder being a wily Tory politician, but when recently I had to fight, I had to fight against the Liberals but against him. I place myself on record as agreeing with many of the facts that were adduced by Mr. Carvell, and I say the minister should investigate it and put it right. But I tell him if he starts to get money back from J. K. Pinder he's up against a real hard proposition. They talk about this \$60,000 that didn't go into the railway. Well, if Pinder got it he's got it yet. It didn't go into any campaign fund. If the minister tries to get the money back from Pinder he's up against the real thing."

There was a profound sensation in the chamber all the time Mr. McLeod was speaking, and the tense silence which prevailed manifested the interest taken in this remarkable "fall out."

When Mr. McLeod sat down Mr. Carvell rose.

Ministers Set Dumb.

"I seek to be careful," said he, "to make charges only when I have absolute proof. I merely rise now after the I am making statement of the government member for York to suggest that the minister should not now restrict the investigation to any departmental inquiry but should appoint a royal commission to sift the matter to the bottom. The remarkable and frank corroboration of my charges by one of the minister's own supporters should surely necessitate such action. He has stated, what I believe, that Mr. Johnson is not the real sinner. I would urge the minister to appoint a royal commission and sift the serious matter to the bottom."

But Premier Borden and Hon. Dr. Reid both sat silent.

FAIRVILLE FIRE FIGHTERS ENJOY A GOOD SOCIAL TIME

Chief Linton Presides at Pleasant Gathering—Something About The Corps

The Fairville firemen held one of their enjoyable social evenings in their room in the Court House building last night. It was well attended. Games were played and Mr. Jones officiated very creditably at the piano, and several members enlivened the proceedings with vocal numbers, while all joined in the chorus. Cigars were passed round, and an hour and a half soon sped by. The chair was taken by Chief W. J. Linton. A programme of speeches, songs, readings, etc., was rendered in a manner that elicited hearty applause.

About 11 o'clock refreshments were served, and the members of a real good time with the firemen will linger with the guests until the next time proves even more enjoyable.

In talking with several of the officers of the Fairville fire fighters, it appeared that the volunteer company was organized soon after what is known as the Second Fire in 1868. The department was provided with an early type of hand engine, such as is familiar in parades. It had been presented as a relic of these early days, and rests from its labors in the engine room.

There were fifty men enrolled, and their regulars seem to have been of the best, though, oftimes blistered hands and backs testified sorely to their endeavors at a fire.

About eighteen years ago a steam engine was purchased, with a pumping capacity of 450 gallons a minute, and the corps was reduced to thirty men, at which strength it stands today.

The local corps have received more than passing attention in days gone by, notably, perhaps, at the Provincial Hospital fire a few years ago, when day and night they held their own, and in some instances more, against the best St. John could offer in the way of fire fighters.

Officers are elected annually, and the list at present is as follows: Chief—W. J. Linton. Captain—Arthur Sweet. Foreman—Joseph Sweet.
