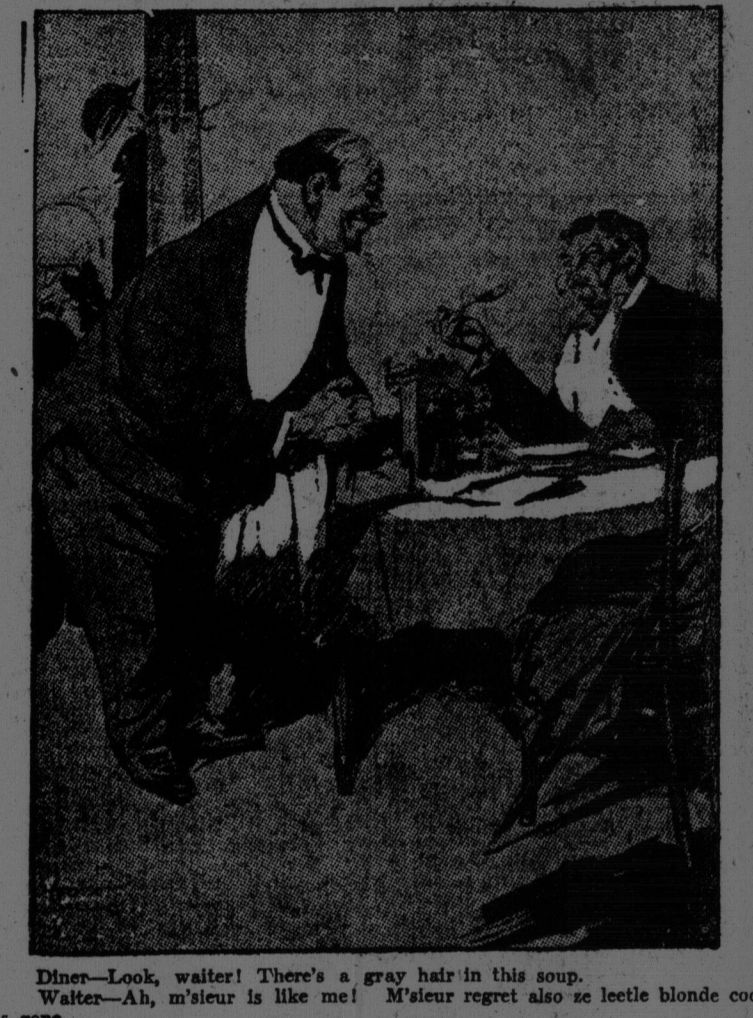

Set to cool while treating yolks and sugar, then stir in the yolks. Boil until it begins to thicken, then beat the whites to a froth. Stir into curd beat hard and pour into molds.

### ONE RESULT OF A STRIKE

(Bangor Commercial)

It was a very bitter blow that the silk weavers of Paterson, N. J., inflicted upon their city and themselves by the recent strike which was fomented by the agitators of the Industrial Workers of the World. The losses incurred by the strike run into the millions, but the misery caused cannot be estimated. One aftermath of the strike that has just been reported shows how the effects of the controversy are felt long after the settlement was effected and the mill once more set in operation.

We read that a silk manufacturer finding himself ruined by the enforcement of his business, committed suicide, but this is not the only home it desolate. It appears that many former silk mill employees left the city during the strike to seek employment elsewhere. No less than 200 of these 1 now disappeared from view, leaving their wives and children to be supported by the municipality. Some will eventually return, but there will doubtless be many who will not.

STUDY OF METHODS
BY CIVIC EXPERTS
Tour of European Countries
To Investigate
OUTLINE OF RESULTS
Inquiry Into Housing Conditions - Care of Streets and Sanitation in Cities Abroad
(Washington, D. C., Star)

The group of civic experts and students of civics who left Washington and New York in July for a tour of European countries, under the auspices of the American Civic Association, has just returned. Richard B. Watrous, secretary of the association, of this city, arrived in Washington yesterday. The members of the party were given unusual opportunities to make careful investigations of the methods applied in the cities of Germany, France and England, for efficient administration, with particular reference to the care of streets, the disposal of household waste, the creation and maintenance of parks and the solution of housing problems, and the large general subject of comprehensive city planning. Four of the six weeks abroad were spent in cities of Germany, one week in Paris and a week in London, with two days at Brussels, where the party was entertained at dinner at the home of the American ambassador, Theodore Marburg. "The trip has been a most valuable one in every way," Mr. Watrous said today. As secretary, he had in charge the arranging of the civic programme at the various cities. "We were accorded unusually courteous attention by the city officials and members of voluntary organizations, due largely to the admirable arrangements that had been made for our coming by our American consular officers, who had been advised by the State Department of our trip, and asked to do what they could for us." Meet City Officials "At each city visited, on our arrival, we had as our guests at dinner the consular general or consul, together with four to six city officials who were asked him to invite also as our guests. In that way we were introduced to and obtained most valuable information from just the authorities we desired to meet, and, following the evening's discussion, mapped out a programme to cover the number of days we were to be in each city. "In this way we were able to pursue new and independent lines of investigation, to get at methods of administration and to study under the best conditions the systems in vogue that have confronted us such a rare measure to make the German cities, in particular, distinguished for cleanliness and efficiency.

New Ideas in Care of Streets
We discovered some splendid new ideas for the care of streets. In Berlin, for instance, we were greatly interested in a contract that the city had just made for the installation of 7000 new street litter boxes, which differ from those now used in that, instead of being on and above the surface of the ground, they are sunk in concrete cases below the pavement. The street litter is swept into these boxes, which are sealed with a cover, similar to the ordinary street litter boxes, but which the arrival of the collection cart, which is equipped with a hoisting device by which the box is lifted out of its case to the top of the cart, its contents being made so to immediately covered with metal covers, so as to prevent any scattering by wind or other agencies. "It is a distinctly new development, in that it removes one more source of obstruction; that it eliminates the possibility of the scattering of the street sweepings by the ordinary shoveling process, and that it is economical and does not involve any special cost of the public health, because anything that reduces the scattering of the street dust is to our American communities." "Then, too, we conducted important investigations in the disposal of the refuse of the cities, including incineration on the one hand and on the other the distribution of garbage over low, swampy lands and converting such lands into fertile farm lands. We were inclined to think the last-named method might not be a safe or wise one, but when we had investigated it thoroughly, as conducted by the city of Munich, we were convinced that, so far as making new land was concerned, it was a complete success. That was possible, however, because German people do not have a great deal of garbage. Garbage Production Small "They are thrifty and their homes do not produce so much garbage as a week, or possibly two weeks, as many of our homes produce in a day. Then, the collection of garbage and other accumulations were dumped on the land all of the contents of the carts that might be of merchantable value, such as old shoes, rubbers, crockery, metal, paper, cotton and woolen goods and glass. The returns from this collection, together with the enhanced value of the land owned by the company owning the contract, are so profitable that the contracting company makes no charge to the city for its service of collection, which is a very important development, meaning, as it does, that the individual household does not pay a tax for that service nor does the city as a collective body pay. "The only expense to which the city is put is that of transporting by rail the wagon boxes with their contents, collected by the company, from the city to the suburb, where they are again delivered to the contractor for assortment and distribution. But here again arises a distinction between German and American methods. Much of the street cleaning of German cities is done by women and children. "I don't imagine that our American cities will come to that practice in many years. I never, nor can one imagine women engaged in the same dirty and menial service that we found them engaged in at the Munich garbage disposal plant. The important thing to be learned, however, is that by the employment of sufficient help, the streets of large cities can be kept all the same as clean, and also that garbage and other household waste can be collected and at a very slight expense to the city because of the returns that may be derived in a business way by the contractor. It remains for American ingenuity and en-

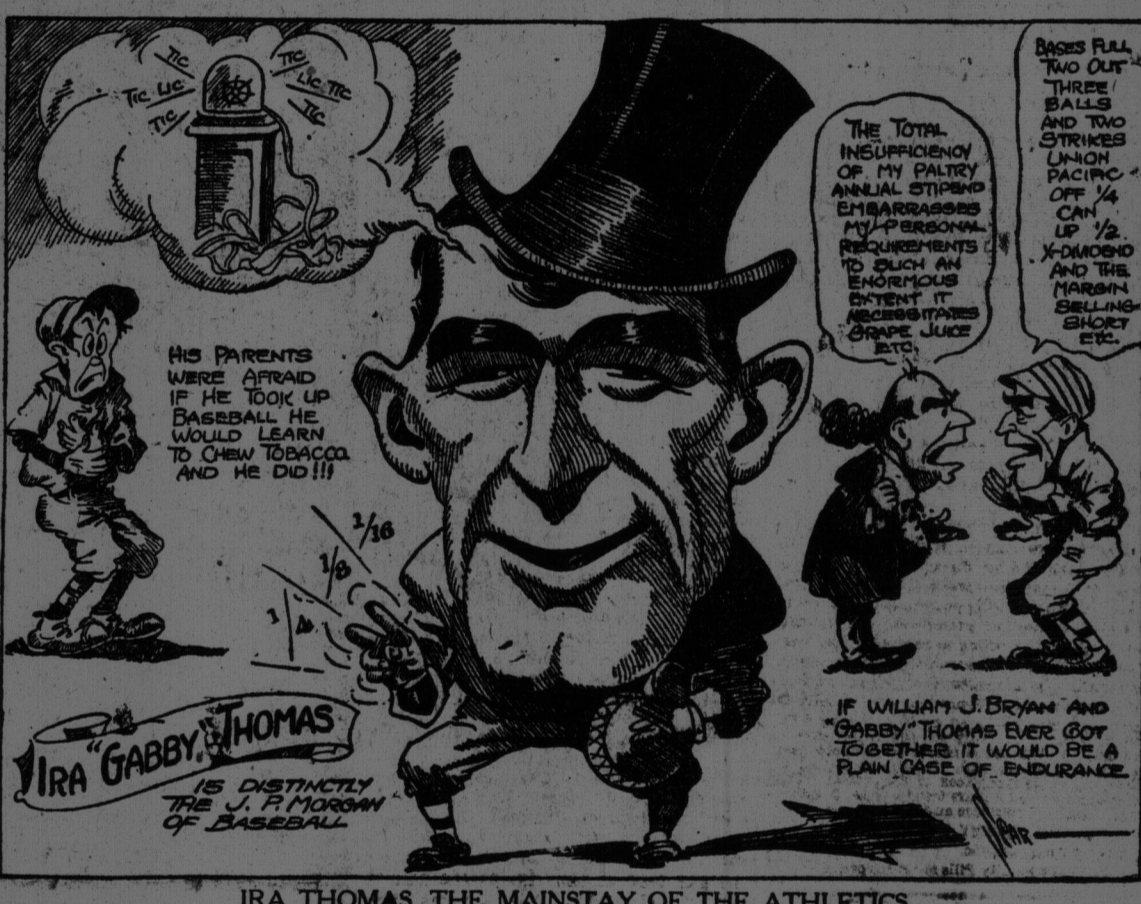

The policy of strict neutrality with respect to the exportations of arms and munitions of war from this country, however, will be continued until recognition is actually extended. The attitude of the United States for the next few weeks is likely to be that of an interested spectator with John Lind being retained at Vera Cruz, however, to show the world generally that the United States stands ready to assist in the situation by pacific means if its friendly offices are desired.

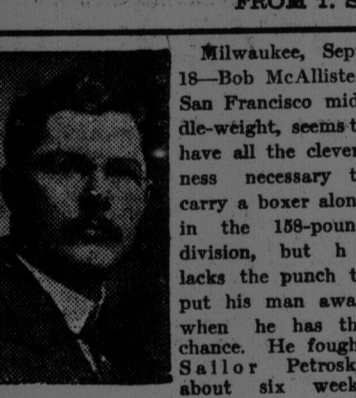

Everything But the Punch

Milwaukee, Sept. 18.—Bob McAllister, San Francisco middle-weight, seems to have all the clearest necessary to carry a boxer along in the 155-pound division, but he lacks the punch to put his man away when he has the chance. He fought Sallor Petrovsky about six weeks ago and secured a draw. They met again last week and once more it was a 20-round draw. The boy, for McAllister is merely a youth, demonstrated that he is there with the cleverness and can go the distance, but he lacks the one great essential to fighting—the punch—something that Stanley Ketchell possessed. McAllister may be able to develop the punch as he goes along. It is likely that he will be matched now with Jimmy Clabby at San Francisco.

SUNKEN ART TREASURES

Relics of the Sack of Athens Discovered. A correspondent, writing to the Paris "Liberte", gives particulars of an archaeological find of the greatest interest. At Madhia, on the Tugian coast, five or six years ago, some Greek sponge fishers noticed a strange mass of wreckage lying at a depth of 100 feet to the north of Madhia. A simple admiral's jungle of timbers lay splendid marble columns, bronze statuettes, a superb life-size boy's figure, and a Hermes of Dionysos, which they succeeded in bringing to the surface. M. Meril, the head of the Tunisian antiquities department, applied for and finally obtained various excavations, and the admiral commanding the Tunisian squadron sent a powerful tug and two torpedo boats to give assistance. It has been ascertained that the sunken ship was a vessel of about four hundred tons, a hundred feet long, and twenty-five feet broad. She was laden with an extraordinarily heterogeneous cargo; not only blocks of marble, but bases and capitals for columns, enfilades, statues, furniture, ives, leaden pipes, lamps, amulets, etc. Among the fragments were found figures of a demigod and a maiden and a fountain, which correspond almost exactly with those upon which is known as the Borgheze vase dug up in Rome and now in the Louvre. The Hermes bears the signature "Borghese", the sculptor of the celebrated "Child with a Goose" of the second century B. C., and there are numerous other very fine specimens of old Greek sculpture among the treasures already recovered. The bottom of the hold contains about thirty columns of bluish-white marble thirteen feet high, which were probably one of the causes of the wreck of an evidently too heavily freighted ship. All the inscriptions deciphered relate to Attica and personages of the middle fourth century B. C., and it might have been thought that the vessel dated from that period but for the Boeotian statue and a lamp of a pattern introduced into Attica at the end of the second century B. C. Some writing on lead ingots also is in the Latin of that epoch, and experts have concluded so far that the vessel was loaded in Attica for Rome, and probably the cargo was the spoil after the taking of Athens by Sulla in 88 B. C. Both Lucian and Pliay relate how Sulla pillaged Athens, and the former describes a wreck of Cape Males of a ship full of works of Greek art, including a picture of Xenia. Rome's loss two thousand years ago, however, becomes French gain, and soon travelers will be able to admire these priceless relics in the Biblio Museum in Tunis.

BALLOON DRAGS BOY TO DEATH

Caught in Rope While Watching Ascention. CROWD WATCHING TRAGEDY. Airman Dangling in Parachute Unable to Aid Child Sliding to His Death on Rope he Could Not Grip.

Woodstock, Conn., Sept. 20.—Every year just before the summer cottages from Hartford and Boston go back home, the little town of Woodstock in Windham county holds its annual fair. Today was the first day of this year's three day celebration. And the star event scheduled was a balloon ascension. Among the scores of country folks who edged their way into the fair grounds and found places in the lines of carriages and automobiles to watch the big balloon was a small boy, George Bernier. With his older brother he had trudged six miles from Mechanisville, where a good many French Canadian live, carrying his lunch in a paper bag, just to see the balloon go up.

The big bag was stationed in the center of the racetrack, and after the best of the local horses had shown their pace and the prize jumpkin had been blue ribboned, "Prof" Fowler started the fire under his balloon. When the big silk bag was pretty well filled and looked like a wobbling beetle, Fowler called for volunteers to hold the guy ropes and leave the balloon down until he was ready to start his "world renowned triple parachute ascension." The Bernier boy was the first to respond to the call, and held grimly onto the rope while he watched, big eyes, the balloon rise inflammable as the fire and make more gas for the lift.

Lifts Boy Skyward. When everything was ready, Prof. Fowler stripped off his overalls and stood in the afternoon sunshine in the all glory of black spangled tights. The boy never took his eyes off. He glimped onto the trapeze of the last parachute and turned to the crowd. "Let go and stand back!" The Bernier boy, oblivious to everything but his hero, held tight to the guy rope he had in his hand. Up went the balloon, while the end of the guy rope whipped around and caught the boy's ankles, forming a half circle. His hundred pounds or so made the balloon career a trifle as it sped skyward. Five thousand men and women standing about the racetrack held their breath for a minute and then there rose a simultaneous shout as the boy, head downward, dangled from the guy rope at the edge of the lion and well above Fowler on his last parachute. Fowler, hanging there, was as helpless as the boy as any of the spectators who had gathered to watch the ascent. "I'm getting married," he said, "and I want a cake." 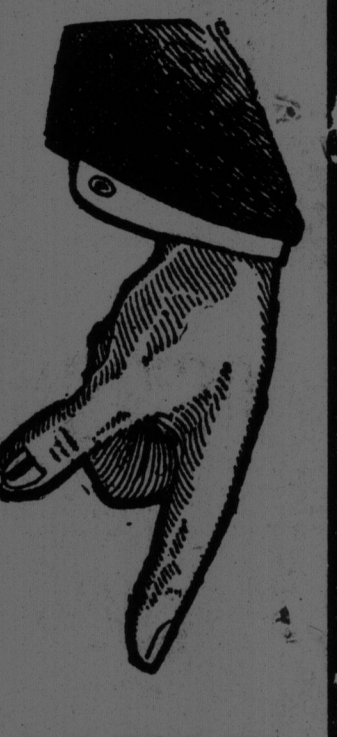
Wm. Hoyt, aged ten years, was seriously injured yesterday at Woodstock by being struck by an automobile driven by Louis Yonkers.
