## FOUR LINERS IN

Montreal, March 22—The prospects are fairly good for a well-contested race up the St. Lawrence at the opening of navigation this year. The Cunard "Ultonia" will leave Southampton on April 18, and is expected in Montreal on the 28th. The Donaldson line "Cassandra" will leave Glasgow on April 20, and is expected to reach Montreal on the 29th. The Allan line "Tunisian" is to leave Liverpool on April 18, and will arrive about the 27th. The White Star-Dominion S.S. "Canada" will be in this great trans-Atlantic race, leaving Liverpool on April 20 she should reach Montreal on the 28th.

It will be seen that there are four vessels definitely scheduled to sail for this port nearly the same time, and the honor of reaching it first is regarded as more or less the blue ribbon achievement of the shipping season.
