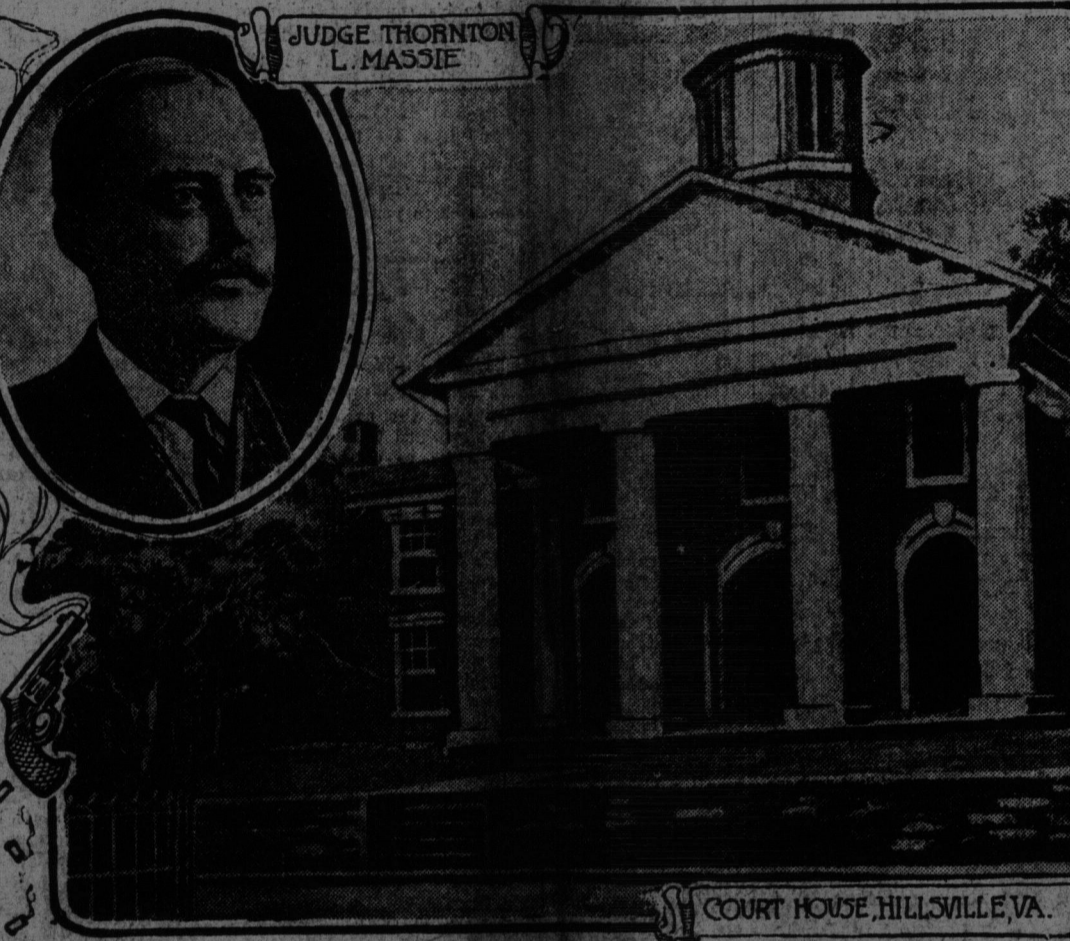

The committee has decided upon a general and substantial increase in the scale of salaries paid to both students and ordained missionaries throughout the dominion.

P. and president of the miners' federation of Great Britain, at once announced that the premier's rejection of the miners' amendment closed the door to an immediate settlement of the strike.

FOR HOME RULE IN THE Y.M.C.A.

St. John Delegates, Home From Truro, Tell of Plan for Canadian National Organization

Home Rule for the Canadian Y. M. C. A. was the most important matter considered at the 9th annual convention of the national association covering the whole of Canada, held in Truro, N. S., yesterday. The convention heartily agreed with the proposal to establish a national executive committee of the Y. M. C. A. for Canada, which will prevent the shipment of coal on hand in its ports for naval purposes, which will prevent the shipment of meat to England. It is officially declared today that the Derbyshire pits will not be re-opened until the surface men's demands for increased wages have been complied with.

OXYGEN TEST IN MARATHON RACE

Suggestion That Runners in Olympic Contest Be Allowed To Use It

London, March 22—In a letter to the Times, Sir Edwin Ray Lankester writes: "The competitors in the Marathon race at Stockholm, will presumably be allowed to consume refreshments as they run, such as was the case when the races took place in London. Will you, as the authority of the Olympic games to be held in Stockholm to state in your columns whether a competitor will be allowed to breathe, as he runs, oxygen from a bag carried by him?"

FRANCE DECIDES FOR THE BI-PLANE

Packets Case to Jury Today

Paris, March 22—The French war office has issued an order forbidding officers and military pupils in aviation from making flights in monoplane. Biplanes are declared to be all right. This order is the result of alleged proof that the tip surface of the monoplane is not sufficiently strong, and that the frame work is too weak generally. The champions of monoplane are furious over the order, while the adherents of the biplane are correspondingly jubilant.

Daily Hints For the Cook

BAKED HALIBUT. From a slice of halibut about four inches thick carefully remove the bones and spread the fish apart. Fill the hole with bread dressing seasoned with butter, salt, a very little oil and sage. Cover the top with thin slices of bacon. Place on a rack in a baking pan with a little water and bake until baked. Set the bacon aside and when ready to serve place around the fish. The bacon will burn if left on the fish until baked. Thicken the gravy and serve separately.

Ottawa, March 21—The Hon. Andrew A. MacDonald, Conservative senator from Prince Edward Island, died here today at the age of eighty-three years.

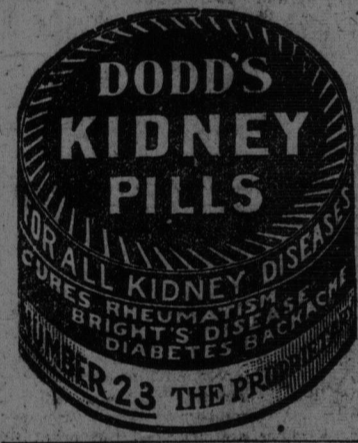
