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MINUTES OF COMMISSION OF SYNOD.

At Montreal, and within St. Andrew's Church there;—Wednesday, the Fourth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight years:—

Which day the Commission of Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland met according to appointment and was constituted with prayer by the Rev. Alexander Mathieson, D.D., who was chosen to act as Moderator.

Sederunt.—Alexander Mathieson, Moderator; William Simpson, Frederick P. Sym, James Patterson, William C. Clark, John Jenkins, Joshua Fraser, Donald Ross (Chatham), Donald Ross (Dundee), Robert Campbell, John Barr, Ministers; Archibald Ferguson, Elder.

The Rev. R. Campbell, M.A., was appointed Clerk of the meeting.

There was produced and read an Extract Minute of the Presbytery of Quebec, intimating the deliverance of that Court in the case of the Rev. Alex. Forbes, of Leeds and Inverness, remitted to them by the Synod. Said Extract bore that the Presbytery had dissolved the pastoral tie between Mr. Forbes and his congregation and contained an earnest request to the Commission to provide some mode of present relief for Mr. Forbes' necessities, and to recommend to the Presbyteries of the Church to afford him facilities for visiting the vacancies within their bounds, should he desire to do so. A letter from Mr. Forbes to the Clerk of the Synod and a communication from the Clerk of the Presbytery of Quebec, bearing on this subject, were also read.

Whereupon it was moved by Dr. Jenkins, seconded by Mr. Barr, and unanimously agreed to, That the Commission of Synod instruct their Clerk to furnish Mr. Forbes with a letter, recommending him to the cordial sympathy of the Presbyteries of the Church in terms of the entreaty of the Presbytery of Quebec.

On motion of Mr. Ross (Chatham), seconded by Mr. Clark, the Commission unanimously resolved to request the Moderator of Synod to appoint a day of Thanksgiving to Almighty God for an abundant harvest and other national mercies, to be observed throughout the Church at an early date.

The Commission adjourned and was closed with prayer.

By the death of the Rev. **James Thom,** of Woolwich, his late congregation have cause to mourn the loss of a faithful pastor, a kind friend, a truly pious and exemplary Christian, the memory of whose life and labours will long be had in affectionate remembrance by all who had the privilege of his acquaintance.

The Synod also bear willing testimony to the Christian life and character of the Rev. **William McEwen**, late minister of Dorchester, whose kind disposition and unaffected piety endeared him to a large circle of friends, and whose patient resignation during many long years of infirmity and suffering gave evidence that he felt the power of that religion which he taught to others.

The Synod feel called upon to recognize the zealous and faithful ministrations of the late Rev. **Joseph Anderson**, of South Gower and Mountain, whose Missionary labors during the earlier portion of his ministry extended over a wide area, and whose subsequent services as pastor were highly efficient and acceptable to the congregation, to whose spiritural interests the late years of his life were devoted.

dress of last year to Her Majesty the Queen had been laid at the foot of the Throne, and that "Her Majesty had received with much satisfaction the expressions of attachment to Her Throne and Person offered therein". APPLICATIONS FOR LICENSE.

Application was made by the Presbytery of Quebec for leave to take Messrs. John Bennett, and Charles Tanner, Students of Divinity, on public probationary trials for License. A similar application was made by the Presbytery of Montreal in behalf of Mr. Charles A. Doudiet; by the Presbytery of London in behalf of Mr. Joseph Eakin, B.A.; and by the Presbytery of Hamilton in behalf of Mr. David P. Niven, B.A. The Synod, having ascertained that Circular Letters, intimating the intention of these Presbyteries to make said application, had been duly issued, instructed these Students to appear before the Examining Committee.

APPLICATION OF THE REV. W. ANDERSON, M. A.

There was read an Extract Minute of the Presbytery of Montreal, of date August 4, 1868, transmitting an application of the Rev. William Anderson, M. A., for admission as a Minister of this Church, and recommending the same to the most favourable consideration of this Court. Said Extract bore that Mr. Anderson was a Graduate of the University of Glasgow, and had been Minister of Tobermore, within the bounds of the Synod of Ulster, for a period of seven years. Accompanying this Extract were Mr. Anderson's Diploma for the Degree of M. A., and a Presbyterial Certificate from the Presbytery of Magherafelt. The Synod unanimously agreed to entertain favourably Mr. Anderson's application, and instructed him to appear before the Examining Committee.

APPLICATION OF MR. GEORGE BURNFIELD.

MANAGERS OF WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The Synod proceeded to the election of three Managers of the Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund in room of those who retired pursuant to the terms of the Act of Incorporation; when it was unanimously agreed to elect the Rev. Robert Campbell, M.A., and to re-elect Alexander Cross, Esq., and James S. Hunter, Esq.

LETTERS ANENT BRITISH COLUMBIA.

The Clerk produced and read a communication which had been received from the Reverend the Convener of the Colonial Committee of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, of date April 20, 1869, in which he submitted to the Synod the desirableness of co-operation on the part of this Church with the Church of Scotland in an effort to send an additional Minister to British Columbia. In connection with this there was read a letter from the Rev. T. Somerville, of Victoria, Vancouver's Island, with reference to the same subject. It was resolved to refer these communications to the Jewish and Foreign Mission Committee, with instructions to report at a subsequent Diet on the proposals contained therein.

The Rev. William Ormiston, D.D., one of the Ministers of the Canada

Presbyterian Church in this City, being present, it was, on motion to that effect, unanimously resolved to ask him to sit and deliberate with the Court. Dr. Ormiston thanked the Synod for their courtesy in thus extending said invitation.

REPORT OF THE TEMPORALITIES' BOARD *

The Synod next took up the consideration of the Report and accompanying Financial Statements of the Board of Managers of the Temporalities' Fund, which, being printed and in the hands of members, were held as read. RETURNS ON THE FORM OF POLITY.

There were produced and read returns on the Form of Polity, Book I., sent down by the Synod at last meeting to Presbyteries for consideration, from the Presbyteries of Montreal, Glengary, Renfrew, Victoria and Hamilton, suggesting certain emendations therein and expressing disapproval of paragraph 17 of the section relating to Presbyteries, and from the Presbytery of Saugeen approving of the same. Inasmuch as a majority of Presbyteries have not intimated dissent, the Moderator, in terms of the Barrier Act, declared this Book to be passed into a permanent enactment of the Church.

There was read a letter from the Young Men's Christian Association of this City, inviting the members of Synod to visit the Reading Room of the Association during their stay in this City. The Clerk was instructed to convey to the Association the thanks of the Synod for their kind invitation.

The Synod resumed consideration of the report of the Committee appointed to consider the Report of the Managers of the Temporalities' Fund. Said report is of the following tenor:—

The Committee, having considered the report and statements submitted to them, beg leave to recommend the following as the deliverance of the Synod thereon:—

The Synod have much pleasure in recording anew their thanks to the members of the Board, and especially to the Chairman, for the careful attention they have given to the interests of the Fund committed to them, and for the ability and prudence displayed in the management thereof; approve of the changes made in the investments of the Board, whereby an addition of twenty-three thousand dollars (\$23,000) has been made to the Permanent Fund; share the regret expressed by the Board that there may be a difficulty in meeting all the payments falling due on the 30th inst., owing to the inadequacy of the revenue for the current half-year, and that from the same cause they have been unable to act upon the recommendation made by the Synod at its last meeting to the effect that Ordained Missionaries and Licentiates be placed on the list of beneficiaries; and call particular attention to the fact that several congregations enjoying the services of privileged ministers have, in disregard of the Synod's solemn injunction, neglected to contribute anything to the Fund during the past year.

The Board, having for many years steadily endeavoured, after satisfying the claims of privileged ministers, to insure to all

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others on the Roll a regular payment of two hundred dollars (\$200,) annually, in the prosecution of which effort, as has been repeatedly acknowledged, much difficulty has been experienced; and having been unable, owing to the depressed state of the Fund, to comply with the desire of the Synod respecting allowances to Missionaries in active service, it seems proper to consider whether in the distribution of the Fund for the future, while guarding vested rights, the Board should not have more regard to the relative strength of congregations with a view to induce such congregations as are able to do so to contribute more liberally to the revenue of the Fund, in consideration of the allowances which they draw from it for their ministers, and whether the following should not be declared to be the objects most important to be attained in the future administration of

1. The aiding of weak congregations.

2. The granting of allowances to Missionaries in active service.

3. The ultimate formation of a Fund, from which to grant allowances to all ministers who may be constrained to retire from the active duties of their office from age or infirmity.

In order the more effectually to secure the above objects, it is agreed to request the Board to enter into correspondence with congregations anent more liberal contributions to the Fund, to recommend anew to congregations the schedule system of receiving the offerings of their members in the belief, warranted by the experience of such as have made trial of it, that its general adoption would tend largely to increase the amount contributed; and to request the Moderator to prepare and issue, in the name of the Synod, a Pastoral Address to the members of the Church, in advocacy of the objects above stated and for the purpose more particularly of setting forth the obligations, which rest on them, as professing Christians, to provide according to their ability for the adequate support of ordinances.

The Synod suggest to the Board the desirableness of proceeding to the election of a successor to John Thomson, Esq., of Quebec, who has resigned his seat as a member of the Board.

On motion of Mr. J. C. Smith, seconded by Mr. W. R. Ross, the Synod resolved that, while the suggestions offered by the Committee regarding a change of the principle on which the funds have hitherto been disbursed may be worthy of consideration, the very small deficit, which will probably exist on the 1st July next, does not seem to warrant an immediate change; that the said suggestions be therefore struck out, and that the report, thus amended, be adopted: and further that a Committee, consisting of the Moderator and Clerk, Principals Cook and Snodgrass, Doctors Mathieson and Barclay, Messrs. Kenneth Maclennan, Smith, Robert Campbell, Joshua Fraser; Morris, Dennisteun, Croil, John Paton, and Alexander Macpherson, be appointed to consider this whole matter and report at next meeting of Synod.

FORM OF POLITY.

The Synod resumed consideration of the Form of Polity and proceeded with the same, paragraph by paragraph, amending it in several particulars, as far as the end of Book III. cap. 2.

The Rev. A. B. Simpson, Minister of Knox Church in this city, was introduced to the Moderator, and invited to sit and deliberate with the Court.

APPLICATION FOR LICENSE.

There was produced and read an Extract Minute of the Presbytery of Kingston, making application for leave to take Mr. James Gray on public probationary trials for License. Mr. Gray was instructed to appear before the Examining Committee.

JUVENILE MISSION AND SABBATH SCHOOL SCHEME.*

The Report on the Juvenile Mission and Sabbath School Scheme having been given in and read by Mr. John Paton, it was moved by Mr. Galbraith, seconded by Mr. George Bell, and carried unanimously, That the Synod receive the report; thank the Committee for their management of the Scheme; regret the probable discontinuance of the "Juvenile Presbyterian," which has done so much good among the youth of the Church, but trust that full information regarding the operations of the Juvenile Mission may still be given through other channels; and commend the Mission to the continued co-operation and sympathy of the Ministers and Sabbath School Teachers of the Church. The Synod, further, recommend the Scheme of Lessons published by the Committee to those who are not using some other Scheme.

MISSION TO THE LUMBERMEN.

Mr. D. M. Gordon, Convener, presented and read a Report from the Committee appointed to manage the Mission to the Lumbermen in the valley of the Ottawa and its tributaries. It was moved by Principal Snodgrass, seconded by Mr. M. W. Livingstone, and carried unanimously, That the Synod receive the report; thank the Committee for their exertions in behalf of the Mission; and re-appoint the Committee, with Mr. Gordon as Convener.

REPORT OF THE EXAMINING COMMITTEE.

The Report of the Examining Committee was read by Mr. George D. Ferguson, Secretary, bearing that the Committee have carefully examined the Students referred to them on the prescribed subjects of examination, and that they have been highly satisfied with the proficiency and attainments of Messrs. Doudiet, Eakin, Tanner, Bennet, Niven, Gray and Macaulay. In terms of its recommendations, the Synod granted leave to the Presbyteries of Montreal, London, Quebec, Hamilton, Kingston, and Victoria to take Messrs. Doudiet, Eakin, Tanner, Bennet, Niven, Gray, and Macaulay on public probationary trials for License.

Further, in regard to Mr. Burnfield, the Synod, in accordance with

29 the recommendation of the Committee and in consideration of the high testimony borne to Mr. Burnfield's talents and scholarship, empower the Presbytery of Toronto to examine him with a view to his entering the Divinity Hall of Queen's College as a Student of the Third Year.

MEMORIAL ON TEMPERANCE.

The Committee, appointed to consider the Memorial of the "Canada Temperance Union," gave in a report, and in terms of its recommendation the Synod adopted the following as a deliverance with reference thereto:-

The Synod, deploring the many evils resulting from intemperance throughout the Dominion, and hailing with satisfaction all suitable efforts tending to lessen these evils and to influence public opinion in the right direction, again instruct their members to use all lawful endeavours that sound and correct views may prevail throughout their various congregations regarding the Temperance Reformation, and anew urge on all under their influence the use of such means as they may consider best adapted according to the Word of God to arrest and

REPORTS ON QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY.*

Principal Snodgrass presented and read the Annual Report of the Board of Trustees of the University of Queen's College and in connection therewith a Report from the Executive Committee appointed at the pro-re-nata meeting of Synod to provide an Endowment of at least one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000,) for that Institution. After deliberation upon the points embraced in these reports, the Synod deferred the final consideration of the same until to-morrow.

The Synod adjourned to meet in this place to-morrow morning at ten o'clock, of which public intimation was made, and this Diet was closed with prayer.

QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY.

The Synod resumed consideration of the Report of the Trustees of

Queen's College and that of the Executive Committee for providing an Endowment Fund for that University. It was moved by Mr. Hogg, seconded by Dr. Muir, and carried unanimously, That the Synod receive the reports now read; heartily rejoice in the great success which has attended the efforts that have been made to collect funds for the Endowment of Queen's College; and earnestly hope that a similar success will follow the further prosecution of the Scheme.

THE STATUS IN SCOTLAND OF LICENTIATES OF THIS CHURCH.

The following motion was introduced by Mr. Joshua Fraser and seconded by Mr. Clark, That, in order that the Canadian Ministers of our Church, who have been licensed and ordained in this country, shall be placed on the same status with the Ministers of the Church of Scotland in Scotland, a Committee be appointed to open up correspondence with the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland with reference thereto. The roll having been called and the votes marked, the teller reported the state of the vote to be, Aye 4, No 40, No vote 2; and the Moderator intimated accordingly that the motion was lost.

DELEGATE FROM THE CONGREGATIONAL UNION.

The Clerk produced and read a letter which had been received from the Rev. F. H. Marling, of Toronto, who had been appointed Delegate to this Synod by the Congregational Union of Ontario and Quebec, intimating that he had been prevented by unforeseen circumstances from being present at this meeting to convey to this Church the fraternal salutations of the Body whom he represented. Messrs. Dobie, Convener, Mackerras and Croil, were appointed a Committee to prepare and report a suitable minute in reply to this communication.

COMMUNION SERVICE.

The Moderator announced that the hour of three o'clock in the afternoon of to-morrow had been suggested by the Committee as a suitable hour for the Synodical observance of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. The suggestion was adopted, and the Moderator was requested to preside at the administration of the solemn ordinance.

The Synod adjourned to meet in this place on Monday morning at half-past ten o'clock, of which public intimation was made, and this Diet was closed with prayer.

SCHOLARSHIP AND BURSARY SCHEME.*

The Report of the Committee on the Scholarship and Bursary Scheme, having been called for, was presented by Principal Snodgrass and read. Whereupon it was moved by Mr. George Bell, seconded by Mr. Lindsay, and carried unanimously, That the Synod receive the report; and, while rejoicing in the prospect of a more liberal assistance to deserving students which is afforded by the improved state of the Fund, anew recommend the Scheme to the sympathy and support of the Church; and re-appoint the Committee:—Professor Williamson to be Convener.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Synod called for the Report of the Committee on Foreign Missions, which was given in and read by Principal Snodgrass, Convener. After due deliberation, the following deliverance was moved by Mr. Patterson, seconded by Mr. Mylne, and carried unanimously, Receive the report; cordially approve of its recommendations in behalf of the Mission of the Church of Scotland in British Columbia; agree to appoint a Collection to be made in aid of the Mission in all the churches within the bounds; earnestly commend the special object of this Collection to the liberal support of the Church; and re-appoint the Committee, with Professor Mowat as Convener, and Alexander Morris, Esq.,

DELEGATE FROM THE CANADA PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

There was produced and read a Commission from the Synod of the

Canada Presbyterian Church, appointing the Rev. William Ormiston, D.D., Minister of the Central Presbyterian Church in this City, as their Representative to this Synod. Dr. Ormiston, being present, conveyed in an eloquent manner to the Court the cordial and fraternal greetings of the Church which he represented. The Moderator responded in suitable terms; and the Synod adopted with acclamation the following resolution moved by Principal Snodgrass, and seconded by Mr. Robert Burnet, That the Synod cordially welcome Dr. Ormiston in his fulfilment of the appointment by the Moderator of the Canada Presbyterian Church to convey to this Synod the fraternal congratulations of that Church, and thank him for the able manner in which he has performed the duty laid upon him.

OVERTURE ANENT DEPUTATION TO THE C. P. CHURCH.

There was submitted to the Court an Overture subscribed by the following members of Synod, viz.: Dr. Muir, Dr. Barclay, Dr. Snodgrass, Messrs. Tawse, Dobie, Robert Burnet, Inglis, Mackerras, Kenneth Maclennan, Mylne, Clark, Smith; Paton, Croil, Mitchell, and Geo. Cruickshanks, praying the Synod to appoint a Deputation to wait upon the Synod of the Canada Presbyterian Church about to convene in this City and convey to that Body the Christian and brotherly greetings of this Synod, and to assure them of our desire and prayer that the Head of the Church may bless them in their work of faith and labour of love. On motion to that effect, the Synod unanimously agreed to decern in terms of the Overture; and in accordance therewith appointed Messrs. Kenneth Maclennan, D. J. Macdonnell, and Croil a Deputation to carry out the purpose stated therein.

FRENCH MISSION SCHEME.*

The Report of the Committee on the French Mission Scheme having been given in by the Convener and read, it was moved by Mr. J. C. Smith, seconded by Mr. McGillivray, and carried unanimously, That the Synod receive the report; thank the Committee for their diligence and reappoint them; grant the request made with reference to the settlement of Mr. Doudiet in Montreal; sympathize with the Committee's desire to extend their operations; and, to enable the Committee to carry out their views, commend this Scheme to the increased liberality of the Church.

HYMN-BOOK.

Mr. D. J. Macdonnell gave in the Report of the Committee on the preparation of the Hymn-Book, which was read. Whereupon it was moved by Mr. Dobie, seconded by Mr. M. W. Livingstone, and carried unanimously, That the Committee on Hymns receive the thanks of the Court; that the recommendations contained in the report, now read,

MINISTERS' WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

Mr. Mylne, Convener of the Committee appointed to consider the report of the Board of Managers of the Ministers' Widows and Orphans' Fund, gave in a report, which was read. After due deliberation, the Synod in terms of its recommendations unanimously resolved as follows: -Express their satisfaction with the position of the Fund; record their gratitude for the liberal benefaction of the late William Dow, Esq., of Montreal; confirm the election of Mr. John Grant as a member of the Board in room of the late Joseph M. Ross, Esq.; enjoin Presbyteries to collect and report to the Board the names and ages of the children of Ministers within their repective bounds; and return their thanks to the Board, and especially to the Treasurer, Archibald Ferguson, Esq., for his indefatigable labors.

COMMUNICATION FROM SHERIFF THOMAS.

There was produced and read a communication which had been received from Sheriff Thomas, of this city, drawing the attention of the Synod to the desirableness of having Houses of Refuge and Industry provided with a view to the amelioration of the criminal classes of the country, and suggesting the propriety of addressing the Government and praying them to adopt measures making such provision. This communication was referred to a Committee, consisting of Messrs. Robert Burnet, Convener, James B. Muir, and Sheriff Macdonald, with instructions to prepare a suitable deliverance with reference thereto.

PRESBYTERY RECORDS.

Mr. George Bell, Convener of the Committee appointed to revise Presbytery Records, gave in a report, which was read. Said report is

The Committee beg leave to report to the Synod :-

1. That the Record of the Presbytery of Quebec has not been presented to the Court.

2. That the Records of the Presbyteries of Montreal, Glengary, Perth, Ottawa, Renfrew, Kingston, Toronto, Victoria, Hamilton, London, and Saugeen are carefully and correctly kept.

The Moderator having asked if any member had any remarks to make on any of these Records, objection was made to the order of the names on the Roll of the Presbytery of Victoria, as sent up to the Synod. It was, on motion to that effect, agreed to instruct the Presbytery of Victoria to amend their Roll, so that the names of the Ministers composing it be entered on the Roll in the order of their induction to their present charges, and as they stood on the Roll of the Presbytery of Toronto before the Presbytery of Victoria was separated

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The Synod unanimously resolved to decern in terms of the report, and, with reference to the absence of the Record of the Presbytery of Quebec, instruct their Clerk to write to the Clerk of that Presbytery and ask an explanation of the non-production of said Record, and in regard to the other Records instruct the Clerk to attest them as carefully and correctly kept.

MEETINGS OF PRESBYTERIES.

Leave, having been asked, was granted to the Presbytery of Kingston to meet at Kingston on the 19th inst, at noon, for the purpose of taking steps to complete the Induction of the Rev. J. C. Smith to Belleville, and taking Mr. James Gray on public probationary trials for License. Leave was also granted to the Presbytery of Montreal to meet at Ormstown on the 16th inst., at 10 o'clock, a.m.—to the Presbytery of Hamilton to meet at Clifton on the 22nd inst., at 10 o'clock, a.m.—to the Presbytery of London to meet at London on the 14th inst., at 2 o'clock, p.m.—to'the Presbytery of Ottawa to meet at Ottawa on the 17th inst., at 10 o'clock, a.m.—to the Presbytery of Perth to meet at Perth on the 29th inst., at 10 o'clock, a.m.—to the Presbytery of Victoria to meet at Lindsay on the 29th inst., at noon,—and to the Presbytery of Toronto to meet at Toronto on the 9th inst., at noon,—all for the despatch of competent business.

SHERIFF THOMAS' COMMUNICATION.

Mr. Robert Burnet, Convener of the Committee appointed to prepare a minute with reference to the communication of Sheriff Thomas, gave in a report. In accordance with its recommendations, the Synod resolved to call the attention of Presbyteries to the poor and destitute within their bounds, and to take such steps for the alleviation of the sad results of vicious habits too prevalent throughout the Province as they may deem most effective for this purpose.

REPORT ON STATISTICS.

Mr. Croil, Convener of the Committee on Statistics, presented a report on that subject, which was read. Whereupon it was moved by Mr. Joshua Fraser, seconded by Mr. Hunter, and carried unanimously, That the Synod receive the report; thank the Convener; and re-appoint the Committee.

With reference to the non-reporting Presbyteries, the Synod instruct the Clerk to write to the Clerks of these Presbyteries and enjoin them to take immediate steps to send to the Convener statistics of the congregations within their respective bounds, and, in the event of these Presbyteries not complying with this injunction, to summon them to appear at the bar of the Synod at next meeting and answer for their non-compliance.

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DELEGATE TO THE CONGREGATIONAL UNION.

Mr. Dobie, Convener of the Committee appointed to prepare a suitable minute in reply to the communication from the Rev. F. H. Marling, gave in a report; and, in terms of its recommendations, the Synod, while regretting that Mr Marling had been prevented from conveying in person to this Synod the fraternal salutations of the Congregational Union, unanimously resolved to express to that Body their Christian and brotherly feelings, and appointed the Rev. Robert Campbell, M.A., to appear as a Delegate from this Court at the ensuing meeting of the Union to be held at Montreal.

ADDRESSES TO THE QUEEN \dagger AND GOVERNOR GENERAL. \ddagger

Addresses to the Queen and Governor General were read, adopted, and ordered to be transmitted in the usual way.

CHURCH PROPERTY.

Dr. Barclay, Convener of the Committee on Church Property, reported that no business had been submitted to the Committee during the

ACT FOR SPECIAL COLLECTIONS.

The Synod renewed the act for regulating public Collections as follows :-

THE Synod appoint the following Public Collections to be made in all the churches during the ensuing year, viz :-

- I. For the French Mission—on the First Sabbath of July.
- II. For the Home Mission—on the First Sabbath of October.
- III. For the Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund—on the First Sabbath of January.
- IV. For the Bursary Scheme—on the First Sabbath of March.

And, to enable the Synod to implement their engagement to the Colonial Committee in regard to the Mission to British Columbia, earnestly recommend congregations to contribute for this Mission on such Sabbath during the year as may be most convenient.

Provided always that when the Lord's Supper shall be observed on any of the said Sabbaths, or when any of the said Sabbaths shall be deemed unsuitable, then another day may be selected by the Session within three months thereafter; Provided also that congregations, preferring to raise their contributions in any other way, as by subscriptions and donations, or to furnish them out of any fund under their control, shall be at liberty to do so.

All Ministers of the Church are appointed at least to exhort their Congregations to contribute towards the maintenance and spread of the Gospel of Christ on all the days above specified; and, on a Sabbath preceding that on which a collection is to be made, to give due intimation from the pulpit, together with such information on the object of it as he may have been able to acquire. The Conveners of the several Committees and Boards for the management of the Schemes herein specified are required to forward, in good time, to all the Ministers, notices of these appointments as they become due, together with such statements as it may be of use and interest to read along with their intimations; and, in particular, the Synod enjoin the several Presbyteries, at their meetings next after the times specified, to inquire into the diligence of all their Ministers and congregations in this matter, and record reports thereof in their Books, and likewise instruct the Committee of Synod for revising Presbytery Books to notice how far Presbyteries attend to this injunction; and the Synod, while rejoicing at the increased fruits of Christian effort in this Church, yet considering that the means hitherto supplied are quite inadequate to the extent of the field daily opening up to the operations of the Church, and far within what might be expected from the gratitude and love due to a crucified Saviour, earnestly urge on all the people seriously to consider the duty of contributing liberally for the advancement of Christ's cause, according to the ability wherewith God has blessed them. This act shall be annually renewed, with such amendments as the Synod may deem called for, and the expense of printing it for distribution among ministers shall be borne equally by the several Schemes, and the funds of each Scheme shall be charged with all the expenses of its own management.

INDEBTEDNESS FOR CHURCH AGENT'S REPORT.

A statement having been made to the effect that a considerable debt remained on the publication of the Church Agent's Historical and Statistical Report, the Synod resolved to appoint a Committee, consisting of Messrs. Kenneth Maclennan, Convener, George Bell, Mackerras, and John Paton, with instructions to examine the accounts of the Publisher in connection therewith and take such measures as they may deem most advisable to provide means for liquidating this indebtedness.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR COMMUNION SERVICES OF 1870.

The Synod appointed the Moderator and Clerk, Dr. Barclay, Dr. Snod-

LEAVE TO REDUCE THE MINIMUM STIPEND IN CLARKE.

There was produced and read an Extract Minute of the Presbytery of Victoria, making application for leave to induct a Minister into the charge of Clarke on receiving a guarantee for an annual stipend of at least three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350), notwithstanding the law requiring a minimum stipend of four hundred dollars (\$400), inasmuch as the members of that congregation have become much reduced in number from emigration to Western sections of the Province and as they have recently purchased a suitable house as a residence for their Minister. The leave craved was granted,

FORM OF POLITY.

The Synod resumed consideration of the Form of Polity, and proceeded to discuss and amend the same as far as the end of Book III. It was unanimously resolved to send down Books II. and III. to Presbyteries for consideration, with instructions to these to send up their opinions thereon to next meeting of Synod. Book II. is hereby converted into, and declared to have force, as an Interim Act. The Synod further agreed to record the warm expression of their thanks to Mr. Bell for his arduous and judicious labours in compiling this code. Books II. and III., as finally amended, are as follows:—

Polity of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland.

BOOK II.

RULES OF PROCEDURE.

I. GENERAL RULES FOR CHURCH COURTS.

1. The Moderator shall take the chair at the hour to which the Court stands adjourned, shall call the members to order, and, on the appearance of a quorum, shall constitute the meeting with prayer.

2. If a quorum be not assembled within one hour of the time appointed for the meeting, it shall be competent for any two members to adjourn from time to time that an opportunity may be given for a quorum to assemble.

3. At the first assembling of a Court, the Roll shall be called and the Sederunt recorded; and members coming in afterwards shall have their names noted on the minutes as they appear.

4. The Minutes shall be read at the opening of each Diet of the Session, and corrected as may be requisite.

6. It is the duty of the Clerk to keep all papers in perfect order, so that they may be ready when needed, and to keep a docket containing memoranda of any business left unfinished at a former meeting; on which he shall also enter every item of business to be brought before the Court.

7. After the Court is constituted, and the minutes are sustained, the Moderator shall call for any papers and reports which are to be given in at that meeting, which, being given in, shall be arranged by the Clerk, and noted on the docket, unless otherwise specially ordered.

8. The Moderator shall at all times preserve order and see that business is conducted in a regular manner, endeavouring to bring all business to a speedy and proper conclusion.

9. No member of any Church Court shall retire from a meeting without leave of the Moderator, nor withdraw from it to return home, without the consent of the Court.

10. The Moderator shall name all Committees of the Court, unless it be

otherwise provided for by motion or rule.

11. The Presbytery and Synod are open Courts, but, in the trial of certain causes, to avoid scandals, it is desirable to sit with closed doors. A motion to have a particular matter discussed with closed doors is therefore

12. It is incompetent for any inferior Court to erase any part of the records of a former meeting, unless when ordered by a superior Court.

13. It is the duty of the Moderator to see that the Minutes, as taken down, correctly record the proceedings of the Court, and for this purpose he shall have the portions of the Minutes as they are framed, read and amended or corrected as necessary, until the Court shall be satisfied of their

14. It is competent for any member at any time to move the Court into

a Committee of the whole.

15. In all Courts the following fees shall be payable to the Clerk by the parties concerned, namely:

Each person recording a dissent simpliciter, 25 cents.

For reasons entered on the Minutes in support of such dissent, 20 cents for the first, and 10 cents for each subsequent one.

For extracts of Minutes or copies of papers furnished to individuals, for

every 100 words or fraction thereof, 12½ cents.

The proceeds of such fees in the Synod to be applied in aid of the Synod fund, and in the other Courts to such purpose as the Court may direct.

II. STANDING ORDERS OF THE SUPREME COURT.

Copy of the Act adopted May 31, 1859, with the following additions: (Motions,) XVII. If a motion under debate contains several parts, any two members may have it divided and the question taken on each part.

Miscellaneous.

I. During a Session the Synod shall each day, before proceeding to any

business, engage in devotional exercises.

II. The Synod, at the first Diet of its Annual Meeting, shall nominate a Committee on business to arrange as far as possible the whole business of the Session, and prepare and print a docket for the use of members. Papers of every description, without exception, intended to be submitted to the Synod must be laid before this Committee; and accurate intimations of their contents must be forwarded to the Synod Clerk, at least four clear days before the meeting of Synod; nevertheless this order shall not be held as preventing any papers from being presented and received by permission

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of the Synod, at any time in the course of the meeting, when they refer to matters arising out of the proceedings of the meeting to which they are presented, but such papers only shall it be competent to receive in this way.

III. In order that all documents coming before the Synod may be preserved in a form easy of access and convenient for reference, Reports, Overtures, References, Appeals, Extract Minutes, and all other matters whatsoever, intended to be submitted to the Synod, or Commission of Synod, shall be written on foolscap paper with sufficient margins, so as to admit of their being bound in volumes; and, for the sake of securing fully the ends of justice, parties who have causes or questions which they deem it important to bring before the Synod for consideration and disposal, are recommended to print copies of the same in sufficient numbers for the use of members, and in a shape suitable for binding along with the printed minutes of Synod.

IV. In the appointment of a Committee, unless otherwise specially provided, the person first named shall be the Convener thereof. His duty it shall be to call the Committee together at the proper time: and in the case of his absence or inability to act,, the second named member shall take his

V. The Legislative Enactments of the Supreme Court are regularly transmitted to the several Presbyteries, and are in force for only one year, and unless the dissent of a majority of Presbyteries be intimated to the meeting of the Supreme Court next after that, at which such enactments have respectively been made, the said enactments shall become the law of

VI. Regulations anent Records of Church Courts. 1. The pages are to be numbered in words at length.

2. Every page is to be signed by the Clerk, and the Records of each meeting by the Moderator and Clerk. In case of the death or removal of the Moderator or Clerk, the Record shall afterwards be signed by the then acting Moderator or Clerk, in the presence of the Court, cum nota of

3. The time and place of meeting are to be minutely stated in words at

4. The place and date of each meeting are to be shortly indicated on the margin at the top of each page.

5. Every page is to have a suitable margin, on which notes shall be written, distinctly indicating the various items of business.

6. All Church Courts shall take special care that their Records are correctly written; if anything has to be erased as superfluous, it shall be marked on the margin how many words or lines are erased and that it was done by competent authority; and the marginal note shall be signed by the name or initials of the Moderator or Clerk; and if anything be omitted, it shall be written on the margin and signed by the Clerk.

V. ACT ANENT RECEPTION OF MINISTERS, (SEPT. 14, 1847.)

"Whereas there is at present a great and lamentable want of Ministers, and, from the laudable desire on the part of Presbyteries to supply the congregations under their care, destitute of fixed Pastors, with the stated dispensation of ordinances, their is reason to fear that Presbyteries might be disposed to settle Ministers with undue haste: -And whereas, the circumstances of the Church at all times, but more especially at present, call for the exercise of the greatest care and faithfulness on the part of Presbyteries, in settling Ministers over vacant charges,—the Synod enjoin Presbyteries to take special care in settling Ministers, that they be men of great prudence, undoubted piety, and highly respectable Ministerial gifts; and further, not to ordain or settle Ministers coming from other churches, whatsoever be their credentials, except in accordance with the following rules:—

- "1. That no Probationer or Minister belonging to any Church, not in communion with this Church, shall be received by any Presbytery, without examination of his Literary and Theological attainments, his reasons for joining this Church, and his views of its constitution and government, as well as ample certificates of his good standing in the body from which he comes.
- "2. That no Probationer or Minister shall be taken on trials, to be received into this church, until he has produced evidence satisfactory to the Presbytery, of his having gone through a course of education analogous to that required by this Church, and by the Church of Scotland.
- "3. That every such Probationer or Minister shall reside at least one year within the bounds of the Synod after his being received, and be reported to the Synod by the Presbytery, before he can receive a call from any congregation in this Church; but he may, in the meantime, be employed as a Missiquary, under the direction of the Presbytery.
- "4. That the whole proceedings of each Presbytery in regard of receiving any such Probationer or Minister shall be read and approved in Synod, previous to his being ordained or inducted as a Minister of this Church.
- "5. That before receiving any Probationer or Minister known to be under censure of any Church, in communion with this Church, Presbyteries shall correspond with such Church."

VI. ACT ANENT REPRESENTATION OF THE ELDERSHIP.

It shall be the duty of every Kirk-session to elect one of their number, being a bona fide acting elder of the congregation, to represent the Session in the Superior Courts for the year; and it shall be the duty of the Minister or any Ordained Minister of the Church acting by his authority, or, in the case of a vacancy, by the authority of the Presbytery, to call a meeting of Session for the purpose of such election on some convenient day within two months after the annual meeting of Synod; and it shall be the duty of the Elder elect to transmit or present his Commission to the Presbytery without delay, it being competent for any meeting of Presbytery to receive and sustain Elders' Commissions.

II. It shall be the duty of Presbyteries to ascertain that Kirk-sessions and Ministers perform their several duties in this respect, and take order, where from any cause an election has not taken place within the two months specified in this Act, that it be made with all convenient speed.

III. The Representative Elder shall in every case hold office till his successor is appointed, or till the expiry of the two months, whichever shall first happen.

IV. It shall be competent for Representative Elders to resign and for Sessions to appoint successors, whose Commission shall be valid when sustained by the Presbytery, or by the Synod, if no meeting of Presbytery intervene.

V. The Elders of a Charge consisting of more than one congregation shall constitute one Session for the purposes of this Act.

4. Do you promise to observe all public ordinances within this Church, as the same are authorized?

I do sincerely own and declare the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments to be the word of God; and the Westminster Shorter Catechism to contain the true doctrine to which I will constantly adhere; as likewise that I own and acknowledge the Presbyterian Church government of this Church by Sessions, Presbyteries, Synods and General Assemblies, to be the only government of this Church; and that I will submit thereto, concur therewith, and never endeavour, directly or indirectly, the prejudice or subversion thereof; and that I shall observe all public ordinances within this Church, as the same are authorized.

BOOK III.

DISCIPLINE.

CHAPTER I .- NATURE AND OBJECT.

1. Discipline is the exercise of that spiritual authority which the Lord Jesus Christ has appointed in His Church. Its objects are the rebuke of offences, the removal of scandals, the vindication of the Divine honour, the promotion of the purity and edification of the Church, and the spiritual good of the members.

2. An offence, the object of discipline, is anything in the principles or practice of a member of the Church which is contrary to the word of God, the Confession of Faith and the Catechisms of the Westminster Assembly. Hence, nothing is to be regarded as just cause of discipline which cannot be shown to be condemned by Scripture or by the established regulations and practice of the Church, founded on Scripture; or unless involving those evils which discipline is intended to prevent.

3. Offences may be personal or general, private or public. Personal offences are violations of the Divine law, considered in the special relation of injury or wrong done to individuals; general offences are heresies or immoralities having no such relation, or as considered apart from it. Private offences are those which are known to one person or to a few; public offences are those which are notorious.

CHAPTER II.

Of the parties in cases of process.

1. Process against an offender shall not be commenced unless some person undertakes to make out the charge; or unless a fama clamosa is so loudly proclaiming the scandal that a Church Court finds it necessary, for the honour of religion, to investigate the matter.

2. In the case of personal offences, the injured party cannot become a prosecutor without having previously tried the means of reconciliation and of reclaiming the offender, required by Christ, Matt. xviii, 15, 16; nor can those to whom private offences are known become accusers, without having previously used private means to remove the scandal.

3. In the case of general offences a Church Court may commence process either at the instance of an individual or individuals who appear as accusers, and undertake to substantiate the charge, or at their own instance on the existence of a fama. In the latter case the previous steps required in case of personal offences are not obligatory; yet, with the view of reclaiming an offender by tender treatment, a Court should use private means by a Committee or a friendly conference to bring him to a proper sense of his guilt, before commencing process.

4. Before commencing process on the ground of a fama a Court must be satisfied that such fama really exists; and no rumor is to be considered

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as such, unless it specifies some particular sin or sins, is widely spread, generally believed, and has strong presumption of truth.

5. If a slandered individual should himself request an investigation in consequence of the existence of rumors injurious to him, but which the Court does not consider as constituting a fama as above defined, the Court may grant his request. If in such investigation the individual is proved guilty, the Court shall deal with him the same as if convicted by regular process.

6. The original parties in a process are the accuser and the accused; and in process on the ground of a fama, the court may appoint, if they see meet, a person to represent the fama, who shall act as the accuser, or the Court itself may so act. In case of appeal, the parties become appellant and appellee.

7. Great caution is to be exercised in receiving accusations from any person who is rash or malicious, who is not of good character, who is himself under censure or process, or who is personally interested in the conviction of the accused.

8. Any prosecutor, but especially the prosecutor of a Minister, should be previously warned, that, if he fail to show good cause for the charges made, he must himself be censured as a slanderer, in proportion to the malignity or rashness, of which he shall appear to have been guilty.

CHAPTER III.

Of Process. General Provisions.

1. Original jurisdiction in relation to Ministers and Licentiates belongs to the Presbytery, and, in relation to other Church members, to the Session.

2. All accusations shall be presented in writing, in which, as far as possible, times, places and circumstances shall be particularly stated. The Court shall then furnish the accused with a copy of the accusation, with the names of the witnesses who may be cited to prove the charges. All parties shall then be cited to appear at a subsequent meeting, which, in the case of a Presbytery, shall not be held sooner than ten days after the citation, and, in the case of a Session, two days.

3 At this subsequent meeting the accused shall answer in writing. If he confess, or admit the facts charged, but deny that they constitute an offence, the Court, after hearing the parties, may proceed to judgment. If he deny the charges, the trial shall proceed.

4. Citations to parties are usually to be made in writing. Citations to witnesses may be made in writing or verbally at the discretion of the Court. A verbal citation to a witness may be made by one of the parties, or by any other competent person. A certificate of the serving of citation shall in all cases be lodged with the Court. Any person, either party or witness, who may be present at a meeting of the Court, may be cited apudacta.

5. When an accused person refuses to obey a citation, he shall be cited a second time with certification that if he do not appear at the time appointed, unless providentially hindered (of which he must notify the Court), he will be dealt with for contumacy. If he fail to appear the Court may proceed to trial and judgment in his absence. The time allowed for his appearance on the second or any subsequent citation shall not be less than is quite sufficient for a reasonable and convenient compliance with the citation.

6. If the accused party shall purposely absent or secrete himself, so that process cannot be served on him, the Court may suspend him until he shall appear and answer to the accusation.

7. Before proceeding to trial or to censure for contumacy, Courts must ascertain and record the fact that their citations have been duly served.

8. The witnesses shall be examined in the presence of the parties (or after due notice to attend); and the parties shall be permitted to cross-examine them, asking through the Moderator, any relevant and respectful questions. After the testimony has been concluded the parties shall be beared.

After the testimony has been concluded, the parties shall be heard.

9. Minutes of the whole proceedings shall be regularly kept by the Clerk of the Court, but shall not be entered on the permanent records until the trial has been completed. If the accused is acquitted, these minutes shall be then destroyed; and the only record entered shall be a statement that such charge had been made, and that the party had been acquitted. If the accused is convicted, the charges, the answer and the judgment shall be recorded, and the whole minutes of the trial, including all the citations and returns thereto, the acts and orders of the Court relating to the cause, and all the testimony adduced, shall be attached together, and kept in retentis.

In case of an appeal or complaint, these minutes together with the notice of appeal or complaint and the reasons thereof, if any have been minuted or filed, shall be duly authenticated by the Clerk, and transmitted to the higher Court. These papers shall be called the "judicial record." Nothing shall be taken into consideration in the higher Court, which is not contained in the judicial record.

10. All parties shall be entitled to receive copies of the judicial record, or extracts therefrom, at their own expense; and, on the final judgment of a cause, the higher Court shall retain the judicial record.

11. Questions relating to evidence shall be decided by the Moderator, subject to appeal to the Court. Decisions on points of order or evidence need not be minuted unless desired by a party, and then at the discretion of the Court.

CHAPTER IV.

Special provisions pertaining to process before Sessions.

1. In case it is impracticable to commence process immediately against an accused person, and the time for observing the Lord's Supper is near at hand, the Session may, if they think the edification of the Church require it, prevent the accused person from coming to the Lord's table at that time, the charges being afterwards, as soon as practicable, examined and disposed of.

2. When an accused person has been twice duly cited, and refuses to compear, or compearing, refuses to answer the charges brought against him, he shall be suspended from the communion of the Church for his contumacy; and this sentence shall not be removed until he repents of his contumacy, and submits to the orders of the Court.

3. The censures to be inflicted by the Session are admonition, rebuke, suspension from sealing ordinances, and, in case of gross and flagrant offenders, excommunication.

4. The Session may suspend or depose a ruling elder from his office, with or without suspension from the communion of the Church, as the case may require.

5. A sentence may simply pass in Court, or if it be thought expedient to publish it, it shall be published only in the Church or Churches which have been offended.

CHAPTER V.

Provisions pertaining to process against a Minister.

1. As the honour and success of the Gospel depend, in a great measure, on the character of its Ministers, it is the duty of the Presbytery carefully

and impartially to watch over the personal and professional conduct of all its members. But as no Minister ought, on account of his office, to be screened from the hand of justice, nor his offences to be slightly censured, so neither ought scandalous charges to be received against him on slight

2. It is the duty of all Christians to be very cautious in taking up an ill report of any man, but especially of a Minister of the Gospel; therefore, if any man know a Minister to be guilty of a private fault, he should warn him in private. But if the guilty person persist in his fault, or it become public, he who knows it should apply to some other Minister of the Presby-

3. If a Minister is supposed to have committed an offence at a distance from home, which is not likely to become known to his own Presbytery, it shall be the duty of the Presbytery, within whose bounds the offence is alleged to have been committed, to send notice to the Presbytery, of which he is a member, of the offence charged, and the grounds for believing the truth of the charge; and the Presbytery, on receiving such notice, shall, if they think it necessary, proceed against him, as in a case of fama.

4. If a Minister, accused of an offence, shall refuse to attend the Presbytery after being twice duly cited to appear and answer the accusation, he may be immediately suspended from his office; and if, after another citation, he shall refuse to attend, he shall be deposed as contumacious.

5. If, upon trial, a Minister shall be found guilty, he shall be admonished, rebuked, suspended from the functions of the Ministry, deposed, with or without deprivation of Church privileges, or excommunicated, as the Court shall deem fit.

6. Heresy and schism may be of such a nature as to infer deposition; but errors should be carefully considered whether they strike at the vitals of religion, and are industriously spread, or whether they arise from the weakness of the human understanding and are not likely to do much injury. In the latter case, the Presbytery should use prudent measures to remove

7. A Minister deposed for scandalous conduct shall not be reponed, even on evidence of the deepest sorrow for his sin, until after some time of eminent and exemplary, humble and edifying conversation, to heal the wound made by his scandal; and until public sentiment is strongly in favour of his restoration, and then only by the Presbytery which deposed him, or by

8. Deposition involves the separation of the pastoral tie, and the congregation shall be forthwith declared vacant. In suspension, the Presbytery shall decide whether such separation shall take place or not.

CHAPTER VI

Of cases without Process.

1. When an individual commits an offence in the presence of the Court, or when he voluntarily confesses his guilt, it is competent to the Court to proceed to judgment without process, the offender having the privilege of being fully heard. The record must show the nature of the offence, the judgment of the Court and the reasons thereof.

2. Should such judgment be appealed from, the Court itself, or any member or members thereof, appointed for the purpose, shall act as appellee.

3. When a member, elder, or Minister shall renounce the communion of the Church by joining another denomination without a regular dismission, if the denomination be evangelical, and he be in good standing, the irregularity shall be noted in the records of the Court having jurisdiction, and his name erased. If charges are pending against him they may be prose-

CHAPTER VII.

Of Evidence.

1. Church Courts should be very careful and impartial in deciding on the competency and credibility of witnesses. Either party has a right to challenge a witness, and the Court decides on his competency. Disbelief in the existence of God or a future state of rewards and punishments involves incompetency.

2. The credibility of a witness may be affected by relationship to one of the parties; by interest in the result of the trial; by want of proper age; by weakness of understanding; by infamy of character; by being under censure; by rashness, indiscretion or malignity of disposition; or by other circumstances.

3. Agency, malice, or partial counsel may exist to such an extent as to exclude a witness altogether, and in any degree will lessen the value of his testimony. In this matter a Church Court must be very particular in ascertaining how far any such alleged cause of disqualification really exists.

4. A question that is either frivolous or not pertinent to the matter under examination should not be allowed to be put to a witness; and no evidence should be received except what is matter of knowledge or cause of knowledge of the witness. What a witness has heard should never be received, except it be what he has heard said by a person deceased, or by the accused, or by one in the presence of the accused.

5. A witness may look at writings or memoranda of his own to refresh his memory, but not at those of another person.

6. Leading questions are not to be put to a witness; and no witness is bound to criminate himself.

7. The testimony of more than one witness is necessary in order to establish any charge; yet if several credible witnesses testify to different acts of a similar nature or to confirmatory circumstances belonging to the same general charge, the crime may be considered as proved.

8. No witness, afterward to be examined, except a member of the Court, shall be present during the examination of another witness in the same case, unless by consent of parties.

9. Witnesses shall first be examined by the party introducing them; then cross-examined by the opposite party; and; thereafter, by any member of the Court who may wish to do so, through the Moderator.

member of the Court who may wish to do so, through the Moderator.

10. The depositions of witnesses shall be reduced to writing and signed by them. The questions in full shall not be recorded, unless desired by a party as being very important.

11. The Records of any Church Court or any part of them, whether original or transcribed, or any extract therefrom, if regularly authenticated by the Moderator and Clerk, or either of them, shall be deemed good and sufficient evidence in every other Church Court.

12. In like manner, testimony taken by one Court, and regularly certified, shall be received by every other Church Court, as no less valid than if it had been taken by itself.

13. Any Church Court has the power, on the application of a party, and with good cause shown, to appoint a commission to examine witnesses. The testimony shall be taken in the same manner as in Court. Notice shall be duly given of the time and place of such examination.

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14. If, after a trial, new testimony be discovered, supposed to be highly important to the exculpation of the accused person, it is proper for him, if the case has not been appealed, to ask, and for the Court to grant a new trial, when the new testimony shall be taken in the orditimony shall be read over in order, and the Court shall then proceed to judgment, as if no former judgment had been rendered; and the new judgment shall entirely supersede the former one.

15. If, in the prosecution of an appeal, new testimony is offered, which, in the opinion of the appellate Court, has an important bearing on the case, it shall be competent to the Court to refer the cause to the inferior Court for a new trial; or, with the consent of parties, to receive the testimony, and bring the case to an issue.

CHAPTER VIII.

The removal of a cause from a lower to a higher Court.

A decision of any Church Court, except the highest, is subject to the review of a superior Court, and may be removed thereto in one of the four following ways:—namely, 1. general review and control; 2. reference; 3. appeal; and 4. complaint. When a matter is so removed by appeal or complaint, the inferior Court shall be regarded as a party members shall not be entitled to deliberate and vote thereon in the higher Court. In any other case of the removal of a decision as above, bers lose their right to sit, deliberate and vote in the higher Court.

Section I. General Review and Control.

1. Every Court above the Session reviews the Records of the Courts next below (being within its jurisdiction) at least once a year, and, should the lower Court omit to send up its Records, the higher shall order them to be produced immediately, or on a day named.

2. In reviewing such Records, the higher Court shall examine first, whether the proceedings have been constitutional and regular; and secondly, whether they have been properly recorded. The superior Court shall record its decision on these matters, taking such further action as may be necessary, and ordering the lower Court accordingly. Provided, that a judicial sentence shall not be reversed, unless it has been brought up by appeal or complaint.

3. If inferior Courts neglect to perform their duty, or commit great irregularities which may not be brought to notice in the revision of their Records, and the superior Court shall learn by any means that such evils exist, it shall take cognizance thereof, and shall inquire into the matter and take such action thereon as may be necessary.

4. In considering any important delinquency or grossly unconstitutional proceeding, the inferior Court shall be cited to appear at a specified time and place, to show cause for what they have done, or have failed to do; after which, usually, the matter shall be remitted to them with special instructions or orders.

Section II. References.

1. A Reference is a judicial representation made by an inferior Court to a superior for advice or direction.

2. Cases of peculiar difficulty or delicacy, on which it is desirable that a larger body shall first decide, are proper subjects of reference.

3. A reference may be for advice, merely suspending the decision of the inferior Court until such advice has been obtained; or it may be for the declaration of a general principle, thereby relinquishing the decision to the higher Court.

4. References are to be made to the Court immediately superior, and must be accompanied with all the papers necessary for the proper

consideration of the matter referred.

Section III. Appeals.

1. An appeal is made by a party against whom a judgment has been pronounced, by which he feels himself aggrieved. No appeal is to be allowed as competent except when the judgment appealed against is alleged to be contrary to the word of God or the laws of the Church.

2. Those parties only, who have submitted to a regular trial, are en-

titled to an appeal.

3. The effect of an appeal is to arrest the execution of the judgment pronounced until the matter shall be reviewed by the higher Court.

4. The grounds of appeal are,—a refusal of reasonable indulgence to a party on trial; refusing to receive important testimony; undue haste in closing a case; manifest prejudice, mistake or injustice.

5. An appeal must be made when the sentence of the Court is intimated to a party, and, if reasons are then given in, they are entered on the minutes. The appellant also craves extracts. If reasons are promised, they must be sent to the Clerk within ten days, and they are afterwards read in the Court and kept in retentis. Reasons must be respectfully expressed, else the Court will refuse to receive them. The Court, if considering it necessary, answers the reasons.

6. The superior Court, after ascertaining that an appeal has been regularly made, shall have the whole of the judicial record of the inferior Court read. The parties shall then be heard, first the appellant, and then the appellee, after which the Court shall proceed to judgment. When the inferior Court is in the position of appellee, only

one member thereof shall be heard.

7. The judgment of the superior Court may be to confirm or reverse, in whole or in part, the judgment of the inferior; to remit the cause for the purpose of amending the Record, if it appear defective; or to remit it for a new trial.

8. Appeals made against particular parts of the action of a Court in conducting a process do not stop the advancement of the process, but all such notices of appeal and exceptions by a party to any findings of the Court shall be taken note of, and sent up to the superior Court for adjudication, as forming together a single cause with any final appeal which may be made.

9. If an appellant fail to prosecute his appeal, by neglecting to appear at the superior Court, it shall be considered as fallen from, and the sentence appealed against shall be final; unless he shall make it appear that he was prevented in the providence of God from seasonably prosecuting his appeal, when the superior Court shall then proceed in the matter, due notice being given to others interested.

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10. If an appellant is found to manifest a litigious or other unchristian spirit in the prosecution of his appeal, he shall be liable to be censured by the superior Court.

Section IV. Complaints.

1. A complaint is a representation made to a superior Court by any member or members of a minority in an inferior Court respecting a decision which, in the opinion of such member or members, has been irregular or unjustly made. The competency and grounds of a complaintare similar to those of an appeal by a party.

2. A member of an inferior Court must dissent from the finding of the Court, and give notice of his intention to complain, when the judgment is pronounced, and the regulation anent reasons of appeal applies to reasons of complaint. He must also crave extracts, which with relative documents the Court is required to send in due time to the higher Court.

3. Any person may have access to a superior Court by Memorial which may contain a complaint against an inferior Court for proceedings in which he feels aggrieved. Such memorial must be in respectful language, and a copy must have been previously sent to the Court complained of.

4. The superior Court, in taking up a complaint, shall proceed, mutatis mutandis, as in an appeal.

5. Church Courts should not be impeded in the conducting of process, nor a superior one troubled by vexatious or frivolous complaints or appeals, and persons making such complaints or appeals shall be severely censured.

CHAPTER IX.

Dissents and Protests.

1. A Dissent is a declaration made by a member of a Court to record the fact that he did not agree with the decision of the majority, and which he considers unjust or irregular, in order to save himself from the consequences of such decision; or it may be made by a minority. It must be given at the time when the decision is pronounced, and it is always entered on the records. It may stand alone or be accompanied with reasons. If reasons are given in at the time that the dissent is intimated, they are entered on the Record. If not given in at then (after having been read in Court) kept in retentis. Other members, who formed part of the minority, shall be allowed to adhere to a dissent.

2. A protest is a more solemn and formal declaration made by a party, a member, or a minority, bearing testimony against what is deemed a mischievous or erroneous judgment. It usually accompanies an appeal or complaint.

COMMISSION OF SYNOD.

The Synod appointed their Commission to meet in St. Andrew's Church, Montreal, on the Wednesday after the second Tuesday of November next, at noon; in St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, on the Wednesday after the third Tuesday of January next, at noon; and oftener by adjournment when and where the Commission may choose.

Power is hereby given to the Commission at its meeting in November to receive and adjudicate upon any applications for leave to retire from the active duties of the Ministry, transmitted in the usual way.

Nine Commissioners shall be a quorum, of whom five must be Ministers. In all their actings the Commissioners shall proceed according to the Act of Synod, 1859, anent the nature, powers, and duties of the Commission of the Supreme Court of this Church.

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APPENDIX A.

REPORT OF MANAGERS OF THE TEMPORALITIES' BOARD.

The Board for the management of the Temporalities' Fund beg leave to submit to the Synod abstracts of the accounts for the past year, a statement of the investments, details of payments to Ministers, and of all moneys received on account of the Contingent Fund.

In compliance with the recommendation of the Synod, the Board caused 12000 printed Schedules for the Schemes together with explanatory circulars and account books to be distributed to all the Congregations at the beginning of the present year. Sufficient time has not yet elapsed to prove the efficiency of this mode of collecting for the Schemes.

From the want of available means the Board were unable to place the names of Ordained Missionaries and Licentiates upon the list of recipients from the Fund.

Further important changes have been made in the investments, by which the sum of \$23000 has been added to the permanent Fund. Owing, however, to the difficulty of procuring remunerative, and at the same time reliable securities, any marked increase of revenue is not expected. During last session an Act of Parliament was obtained from the Legislature of the Province of Quebec, empowering the Board to invest their surplus funds in Mortgages.

The amount of contributions to the Contingent Fund from all sources during the past year is \$7020.14 including a donation of £100 Sterling from the Colonial Committee of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland. The Synodical Scheme of deducting \$50 from the payments of non-privileged Ministers yielded \$3050.71, and the voluntary contributions amounted to \$2451.54. Under the existing mode of distribution-with the present number of Ministers on the Roll-the ordinary expenditure for a year is \$36400. The interest at 6½ per cent on the par value of investments—which is as much as can safely be counted upon-is \$30389, leaving \$6011 of annual deficiency, or, deducting the proceeds of the Synodical Scheme as above stated, \$2961 to be supplied yearly by voluntary contributions-\$510 more than the contributions of the past year. It has, therefore, become necessary for the Synod either to devise means for securing the amount shown to be required, or to suggest another mode of distribution. Appended to this report is a list of the Congregations who have not contributed to the fund otherwise than by Synodical Deduction since October last, the time enjoined by the Synod for taking up collections for the Home Mission

The revenue of the current half-year falls short of the amount required to meet the payments due on the 30th of June by \$1000. implies the removal of the names of thirteen Ministers from any participation in the benefits of the Fund, and a consequent disappointment, which the Board regret very much. They are not without hope, however, that the measures already taken to overcome the difficulty may be

The Board desire to express their acknowledgments to Messrs. James Mitchell and George Templeton for the valuable services rendered by them in auditing the books and accounts of the Board.

John Thomson, Esq., of Quebec, having tendered his resignation as a member of the Board, it devolves upon the Synod to elect a member The retiring members of the Board are the Reverends Dr. Cook and Dr. Barclay; Messrs. Robert Dennistoun and Thomas Paton, all of whom are eligible for re-election.

If systematic efforts are used in every congregation, it is undoubtedly in the power of the Church to sustain the Board in their attempt to comply with the wishes of the Synod; otherwise it will not be possible to keep pace with the increasing demands on the Fund; and, let it be remembered, if a deficiency of revenue recur, the disappointment that will ensue must fall on those, who, generally speaking, are least able to bear it—the newly inducted Ministers.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE MINISTERS' WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

It is with grateful acknowledgment of the Divine Blessing accompanying their labours, that the Board of Managers of the Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund submit to the consideration of the Synod the following Report:

The Fund continues to receive that measure of congregational support which its importance claims.

The Treasurer's Report is herewith submitted, by which it appears that at the close of last year's accounts there remained in his hands (of Permanent Fund) \$53059 87; received from all sources during current year, \$12,965 58; disbursed, \$12,846 67; balance added to Permanent Fund, \$3,239 94; leaving amount now in reserve, \$56,299 81.

Mr. Hunter intimated that his engagements absolutely prevented him from giving the necessary attention to the interests of the Fund, and requested to be relieved from the duties of Secretary. The Rev. Andrew Paton was appointed in his stead. It having afterwards been brought to the knowledge of the Board that the Secretary must be a member of the Board, Mr. Hunter was requested to continue in office, Mr. Paton undertaking to discharge all the necessary duties till the close of the year, when arrangements might be made for the appointment of a successor to Mr. Hunter. Mr. Hunter agreed to this arrangement, and Mr. Paton, who takes a warm interest in the affairs of the Fund, was appointed to act as his deputy; while Mr. Hunter continued to give all the attention he could to the matters that came under

The Board had to lament the sudden death of Mr. James M. Ross, an active and efficient member. Mr. John Grant was appointed in his stead, whose appointment must be confirmed by the Synod, or another

In considering the consequences of the admission of Ministers' daughters, being orphans, above the age of 21 years, to the benefits of the Fund, and the Synod's deliverance approving of the suggestion made by the Chairman, a question arose in point of law whether they could be considered orphans, and also whether the safe and equitable working of the Scheme would admit of the extension of the benefits of the Fund to unmarried daughters above the age of 21, say to an annuity not exceeding \$50. The Board not being in possession of sufficient information, the point remained undecided and was again postponed. It appears that measure was contemplated by the founders of the Scheme, and delayed only till experience would either commend its adoption, or disapprove of it, by embarrassing the free action of the funds of the Trust. From the increasing prosperity of the Fund, the benevolent intention of the proposal, and the limited allowance to be given, the Chairman can see nothing to prevent it, while there is much to commend its going into operation.

A proposal was made by which Professors, who had forfeited the advantages of the Scheme, might be restored to its benefits on conditions easy to them and equitable to others; but no action has been taken in the case.

Mr. Donald Strachan was admitted to the privileges and benefits of the Fund on the conditions intimated by the Presbytery of Toronto.

The same privileges were extended to Mr. J. S. Burnet on the con-

ditions specified to the Presbytery of Glengary.

A legacy by the late Mr. William Dow, of \$800 to the Fund was received and invested in Dominion Stock; the interest to form a permanent revenue, and to be added to the benefits arising from the Ministers' department of the Fund.

The Board have again to complain of the inattention of congregations to the injunction of Synod that all contributions shall be annually placed in the hands of the Treasurer before the first of April, so that the accounts be accurately stated. The irregularity causes unnecessary trouble and great confusion in the accounts.

The number of defaulters is 51. The Board would recommend that new congregations be added to the roll of Presbyteries, on petition of Presbyteries to the Synod, and reported to the Board of Managers an-

In justice to those for whose interests they are responsible, the Board intimate that they will rigidly enforce hereafter the law relating to all defaulters, viz:-that if they are two years in arrear they thereby cut themselves and families off from the benefits of the Trust-13 are in this condition—4 being 3 years in arrear.

All corrections in the Tabular Statements, printed under the report for 1868, must be made before six months from rising of Synod, 1869: otherwise they will be held to be correct and unalterable.

The Board request the Synod to enjoin Presbyteries to collect and report to the Board the names and ages of the children of Ministers within their respective bounds, with certification.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF QUEEN'S COLLEGE.

To the Reverend the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland.

The Trustees of Queen's University and College submit to the Synod copies of the Calandar for next Session, and the Treasurer's annual statement, exhibiting the financial condition of the Institution on the 10th of April last.

The result of attempts made to induce the Legislature of Ontario to continue an annual grant is matter of common notoriety. Without loss of time the Trustees met to consider the grave emergency occasioned by the adverse decision of the Assembly, and, agreeably to a request made in accordance with a resolution of the Board, your Moderator summoned the Synod to meet pro re nata, on the earliest possible day

It will be, the Trustees feel assured, in the highest degree gratifying to the Synod to learn that the appeal to the friends of the College by which the passing of this resolution was promptly followed up, so far as it has been made, has been responded to with a willingness and liberality which even the most sanguine were not prepared to anticipate. In the places visited by the Principal and Professor Mackerras, namely, the cities of Ottawa, Toronto, and Montreal, the towns of Guelph, Galt, and Brockville, and the rural districts of Scarborough, Vaughan, and Smith's Falls, the value of the subscriptions obtained is reckoned at \$41,000. It is expected that Kingston will contribute \$25,000. Including one promise of \$400 a year, the subscription lists opened there show an amount which is over \$24,000. Several congregations in the Presbyteries of Ottawa and Toronto have been visited by local deputations. The subscriptions obtained from these, together with a few others that have been heard of, will bring the total amount up to \$70,000, of which \$24,990 82 has been paid.

This might have been accounted a large sum in a season of universal business activity, but when the great commercial depression which has been prevailing during the winter is duly considered, it must be described as being very extraordinary. The Trustees accept it as a convincing proof of the great importance which is attached to the maintenance of Queen's College, of the widespread sympathy which has been awakened by the trials to which it has been subjected, and of the hearty goodwill with which its continuance and prosperity are regarded. The Synod will no doubt join with the Trustees in that deeply grateful experience, which such an appreciation of the value of the College, and such a disposition to devise liberal things at the present time in its behalf, do not fail to produce in their minds; and will have a special satisfaction in knowing that not a few contributions, some of which are among the largest that have been received, are from friends belonging to other churches.

The Principal and Professor Mackerras have resolved to spend the summer months in the further prosecution of this undertaking. they shall be enabled to carry out their intentions, and if the reception they shall meet with be of the same kind as that with which they have hitherto been favoured, there is little doubt that by the close of the vacation they shall be in a position to report that the minimum sum named by the Synod has been subscribed. The possession of this sum and its investment so that it shall bear annual interest at six per cent, will place the College financially in the state in which it was prior to the failure of the Commercial Bank and the discontinuance of the Legislative grant. At that time the income was barely sufficient to meet the ordinary expenditure, and there was nothing whatever available for the effecting of improvements, however useful or urgent they might seem to be. There is good reason to hope that long before all who are interested in the endowment scheme shall have had an opportunity of contributing to it, the fund will be considerably in excess of \$100,000. If it can be brought up to half as much more, and the Trustees do not despair of this, not only will the finances of the Institution be in an easy condition, but there will also be available a surplus revenue for the introduction of such additional appliances as will materially tend to an increase of efficiency.

The gentlemen who have been engaged in the advocacy of the endowment scheme assure us that the interest manifested in connection with it is not confined to the mere giving of money, but that it extends to the educational advantages which the Institution is the means They have embraced every opportunity of giving information on this subject, of explaining the value of superior education, and pointing out the importance of the influence it may exercise upon the future of this country, and especially of urging the claims of the Ministry upon Christian parents and their sons; and they report that to their representations a very favourable reception has been everywhere accorded—so favourable that in not a few instances the work of preparation for entering College has been already begun. It will, it is hoped, be one good effect of the system which has been adopted of connecting privileges in respect of the nomination of Students to a course of free education with certain classes of subscriptions, that the possession of these privileges will at all times be an inducement to exercise them. If the intentions avowed by subscribers be acted upon to only a partial extent, there ought to be before long a considerable increase in the attendance of Students.

It will take some time to realize the amount subscribed, and for at least two years an adequate permanent revenue cannot be secured. The sustentation of the Institution in the meantime is, therefore, a matter of anxious concern to the Trustees. This point has formed the subject of correspondence with the Colonial Committee of the Church of Scotland. The Convener has, in emphatic terms, assured the Board that a warm interest is taken by the members of the Committee and of the Church of Scotland generally in the success of our scheme, and an appeal has been published in the Home and Foreign Record, in the hope that assistance will be obtained, in the form of voluntary subscriptions, towards the provision of a sufficient temporary support.

The General Committee appointed by the Synod to devise and carry out methods for securing the success of the endowment scheme was also instructed "to confer with the Board in regard to the best mode of increasing the efficiency of the Institution." The Trustees are most anxious that every possible improvement may be introduced into the College without delay, and they will gladly avail themselves of any

assistance which the Synod's Committee may give them to that end.

To all friends who have in any way aided in promoting the endowment of the College, and to those who, during the past year, have made donations to the Museum, the Library, and the Scholarship and Prize Funds, the Trustees offer their grateful acknowledgments.

The following is the attendance registered for the past session at Queen's College and the Institutions in affiliation :- In Arts, 25; in Theology, 9; in Medicine (Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons), 54, of whom 18 obtained the degree of Doctor; in Grammar School, 69. Total 157. Of the Students at Queen's College sixteen have avowed their intention of going forward to the Ministry. Four Theological Students having completed the prescribed course, will appear before the Synod with the view of being taken on trials for license.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE FOR THE ENDOWMENT OF QUEEN'S COLLEGE.

To the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Canada in connection with the Church of Scotland

The General Committee on the Endowment of Queen's College respectfully submit the following report:

Judging from representations made by members of Synod and others at the pro re nata meeting held at Kingston on the 6th and 7th days of January, it seemed to be a prevailing opinion that the success of the proposal to raise an Endowment would depend to a large extent upon the amount of support received at Kingston. Therefore before taking any action in furtherance of the Scheme, your Committee left to the Synod's Kingston Committee the duty of testing the effect of an appeal to the Citizens. The local Committee issued an address setting forth special grounds of claim in behalf of the College, and immediately after followed up this proceeding by waiting upon the inhabitants for their subscriptions. In the course of a short time it was found that Kingston was ready to set the example expected of it and appropriate to it as the seat of the University.

It was then resolved to commence a visitation of places at a distance. The Principal and Professor Mackerras undertook to give effect to this resolution, arrangements being made for the teaching of their classes during their absence. In their selection of places to be visited first they

were guided chiefly by a desire to discover how far different sections of the country were well disposed towards the effort, and to produce as quickly as possible such results as might furnish a stimulus and encouragement to the friends of the College generally. Next to this, considerations of convenience influenced their movements. They kept to the work as continuously as possible until the first of April, when the

to the work as continuously as possible until the first of April, when the closing examinations of the session and other duties demanded their return to Kingston In the second week of May they resumed their labours and continued at them until the end of the week before last.

Their plan of operations has been to officiate on Sabbath, distribute copies of the appeal which has been issued in the name of the Committee, hold a meeting on a week day, secure the appointment of a Congregational Committee and a local Treasurer, and devote as much time as they could spare to the personal solicitation of subscriptions. In this way they have advocated and otherwise promoted the Scheme in the cities of Ottawa, Toronto and Montreal, in the Towns of Guelph, Galt, and Brockville, in the Villages of Smith's Falls, Lachine, Hawkesbury, and L'Orignal, and in the rural districts of Scarborough and Vaughan. In doing so the probability of success has been tested in communities which are very varied in many respects. In some, the church is represented by large and strong congregations, in others, by congregations which are small and weak. Some had just completed, were still carrying on, or were about to begin important local undertakings, such as the building of churches or the removal of debts upon property; others had none of these things to trouble them. possess local advantages in the matter of superior education, and therefore might be supposed to have comparatively little interest in the Endowment of a College at Kingston; others are entirely free from influences of this kind. Some have had direct evidence of the benefits which Queen's College has conferred upon the church and the country; others have had no such experience of its usefulness. Of none of them, however, so far as this project is concerned, can anything be reported except what is in the highest degree satisfactory. Stronger language, indeed, is justifiable. It may be affirmed of all of them that their response has been liberal beyond the most sanguine of well-founded expectations. In all the deputation received a hearty welcome, found a lively interest prevailing in the efficient sustentation of the College, and were greatly aided by the zealous co-operation of Ministers and leading laymen.

In the localities mentioned, including Kingston, guarantees, which your Committee believe to be reliable, have been obtained for contributions amounting to not less than \$66750. This has been accomplished during a season of great commercial depression and the time spent in accomplishing it has not been much more than three months. An assurance of subscriptions amounting to at least \$2500 has been received from Peterborough, which has not yet been visited. Some work has been done by local deputations in the Presbyteries of Ottawa and Toronto. In the absence of full information your Committee feel safe in estimating the result of their operations at \$1000. So that the total amount at this date may be confidently stated at \$70000. A large proportion of the whole subscription is payable by instalments, but the cash

receipts already exceed \$25000.

With regard to local deputations it was at first intended to organize them in all Presbyteries. It is believed that the deputations to congregations in the Presbyteries of Ottawa and Toronto, consisting of members of these Presbyteries and other gentlemen resident within the bounds, efficiently performed the work intrusted to them so far as circumstances allowed; but upon a comparison of results obtained by

this plan with those produced by the deputation from the College and by the advice of many friends, some of whom were members of these deputations, it was resolved to discontinue it in favour of the latter system, the conviction being that, while it would take more time, this disadvantage would be more than counterbalanced by its greater effectiveness.

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In visiting the places named some of our principal congregations have been appealed to, but there remain 111 congregations yet to be approached and a considerable number of these are able and no doubt willing to contribute liberally. The Principal and Professor Mackerras are prepared to spend the summer months in visiting as many of these as possible, and your Committee think that in the remarkable success already attained and the very favourable spirit in which the people are everywhere regarding the Scheme, there is good reason for feeling confident that there will be no difficulty in obtaining the minimum sum mentioned in the Synod's resolution.

This sum safely invested should yield an annual revenue of at least \$6000, which would place the finances of the College in much the same position as they were prior to the failure of the Commercial Bank. At that time, however, the revenue was barely sufficient to meet current expenses, and on that account such improvements as seemed, and still seem, to be very desirable in the equipment of the Institution could not be effected. Encouraged by what has been done, and measuring the capabilities of fields yet to be operated upon by results already obtained, your Committee feel hopeful that an Endowment fund of \$150000 will be ultimately approximated if not fully realized; and should this amount be secured the Institution will, under the divine favour, have a strong basis to rest upon in all time to come, the appliances at its command for the discharge of its proper functions will be much increased, and its usefulness will be more extended than ever.

Most men like to be assured of some direct advantage before investing largely in any enterprize, and from circumstances peculiar to this new country all legitimate means must be used for the purpose of inducing young men to enter College. For these reasons it was deemed advisable to connect the privilege of nominating students to a course of intruction free of class fees with subscriptions of \$100 and upwards, the privilege being greater in value in proportion to the amount subscribed. Upon the recommendation of your Committee the Board of Trustees has adopted the following regulations in reference to this subject:—

1. Each and every subscription of \$500 shall be the foundation of a Scholarship bearing in perpetuity the subscriber's name or any other name by which the subscriber may desire it to be known; the annual value of the Scholarship shall be the privilege allowed to one student of attending College without payment of class fees (at present \$20 per session), together with any other advantages, such as an annual income for support or encouragement, which may at any time be connected with it; the Scholarship shall be awarded annually according to directions received from the subscriber in writing; and after the subscriber's death it shall be tenable by his lineal representatives in the order of seniority.

2. Subscribers of \$100, \$200. \$300 and \$400, shall have the right of nomination, which may be exercised at any time during life, for one, two, three or four students respectively, to a full course of instruction in Arts free of class fees.

3. Upon payment of one-half of a subscription for a scholarship the subscriber may begin to exercise the right of nomination, but the contin-

uance of the privilege shall be subject to the payment of the subscription in full, according to engagement.

4. Subscribers of amounts which do not entitle to privileges shall be allowed to acquire privileges in connection with Scholarships or nominations upon making up their subscriptions to the amounts named in the first or second of the foregoing resolutions, provided the payment in full be not later than 1st April, 1871.

The Treasurer has authority to issue a certificate signed by the Chairman of the Board, for every subscription he receives in full for either a Scholarship or nomination.

This plan has been well received, and, besides having the effect of augmenting in very many instances the sums originally intended for contribution, it has secured a very large measure of continuous co-operation for the increase of students from numerous subscribers who have expressed their determination to enjoy the privileges now at their command.

Already 20 Scholarship Certificates have been issued representing subscriptions to the amount of \$10000, and 46 Nomination Certificates representing \$4600. Eight subscribers have also become entitled to begin to exercise the right of nomination in terms of the third regulation.

The Church has always had great difficulty in obtaining a sufficient number of students, and, if the demand for Ministers to supply vacancies and for Missionaries to enter upon new fields be taken into consideration, it is at present a subject of great regret that very few are studying for the Ministry. The members of the deputation in their public addresses and private interviews keep this state of matters constantly and anxiously in view, and take every opportunity of urging the claims of the Christian Ministry upon the prayerful consideration of parents and the piety of their most promising sons. It is believed that their efforts will be productive of a gradual change for the better. They have had many assurances that the subject is receiving serious attention, and have met with not a few cases in which preparation for College has been actually determined on.

It is impossible to form any adequate anticipation of the effect of this movement upon the character, position and usefulness of the Church. Estimating probable results by such common principles as are applicable, we are justified in looking for a marked increase of earnest activity, the result of a quickened consciousness of vital power; and instances of a deeper interest in ecclesiastical affairs awakened by the efforts which the endowment scheme has necessitated are not wanting to illustrate this position. There is a feeling of joy among our people over the rapid and unexpected success already attained. The value of a hearty and united action shows itself in a growing disposition to cultivate that spirit of self-reliance which subordinates the free use of means possessed to the humble but enlightened dependence which attaches supreme importance to the blessing of God. To the feeling of self-respect which arises from the prompt improvement of a serious exigency, we can add the satisfaction of knowing that the manner in which that exigency has been met, has raised the Church to which we belong in the esteem of other denominations of Christians.

It affords your Committee particular pleasure to report that among the subscribers there is a goodly number belonging to other churches and they accept this most friendly assistance as an evidence of the place which Queen's College holds in general conf. Jence and goodwill.

APPENDIX F.

REPORT ON THE SCHOLARSHIP AND BURSARY SCHEME FOR THE YEAR ENDING 30TH MAY, 1869.

The Committee on the Scholarship and Bursary Scheme beg leave to submit the following Report :—

It appears from the financial statement of the Treasurer, that the amount received since last report is \$441 10, that received in 1867-68 being \$438 51. Although the amount of contributions to the Fund has not decreased, your Committee regret to say, that the number of congregations contributing is only 30, less than a third of the number of congregations on the roll of the Synod, and four less than last year.

Your Committee are convinced, that, were the Ministers and people of our Church to consider more fully the necessity and importance of a more general compliance with the recommendation of the Synod in favor of the Scheme, the number of congregations contributing and the amount received in its behalf would be very much greater than they are.

When we reflect, that the income of most of our settled charges is as yet less than the smallest provision enjoyed by Ministers in the Parent Church, and is, we fear, far from adequate to keep the incumbents of these charges free from pecuniary cares amid the discharge of their arduous and responsible duties, and to their proper maintenance in the position in Society which they are expected to occupy, we see, that there are no great worldly inducements in Canada for parents to encourage their sons to prosecute their Studies for the Ministry, or for these latter to do so. If, however, the general smallness of the worldly income of our Ministers were all, the difficulty of obtaining a sufficient supply of men prepared to devote themselves to the work of the Lord would not be so much felt. Some temporal provision for themselves and their families is made for all upon their being settled in any charge

and those who aspire to the Office of the Holy Ministry from proper motives will not be so likely to be deterred from that purpose, because that provision is very far from being liberal. The main difficulty in obtaining the requisite supply of Candidates for the Ministerial Office lies in this, that, while every other profession and occupation may be entered upon, and its members enabled more or less to maintain themselves in a comparatively short period, the Theological Student must wait for seven or eight years before he can attain even that measure of support which is provided for him. It is wisely ordered, that it should be so, yet let us remember at the same time that, during all that long interval between the commencement of his professional studies, and his settlement, he can do very little to maintain himself. His board at College, his clothing, and books annually amount to a sum which very many parents belonging to our Church are unable to Some provision, therefore, must be made for deserving young men studying for the Ministry during their College course to enable them to defray the necessary expenses of their attendance at the University, as well as for our Ministers when settled. That for Students will, of course, be comparatively small, but it is in many cases scarcely less necessary than for Ministers.

The amount, however, of a Scholarship, or of a Bursary may be so small, as not to afford to those who would be glad to devote themselves to the Ministerial work from the purest motives the prospect of overcoming their pecuniary difficulties even when it is obtained, and our Scholarships and Bursaries may, therefore, fail of being an adequate encouragement to young men of merit to come up to College to be examined with a view to their attainment. They are still afraid of in-curring a debt which may hang upon them for years. Your Committee have hitherto been able to award only from \$30 to \$40 to each of those who have passed the examinations required, but at least double these amounts is, in many cases, needed effectually to aid and

encourage those who are worthy of them.

For these reasons, and in the prospect of a considerable increase of Students for the Ministry at Queen's College next Session, your Committee trust that the Synod will again recommend this important Scheme to the sympathy and support of the Church, and will renew its recommendation, that on the day appointed for the Collection prayer be offered up for our Colleges in all its congregations, and the attention of their members be directed to the claims of the Gospel Ministry upon young men of piety and talent.

They would also beg leave again to suggest, that as early a day as possible be fixed for the Collection for the Scheme, as the Bursaries

fall to be paid before the close of the College Session.

APPENDIX G.

REPORT ON FRENCH MISSION SCHEME.

The Committee on the French Mission Scheme beg leave to submit the following Report:—

The financial statement by the Treasurer, appended, shows that the number of Congregations contributing to the Scheme during 1868-69 is 57, being five more than during the previous year; it further shows that apart from donations the amount contributed by Congregations has increased from \$655 98 in 1867-68 to \$779 36 in 1868-69. When it is considered that no pressing claim was presented and no special appeal made for funds during the year, your Committee regard this increase as an indication of the growing desire on the part of the Church that the work of this Committee should be vigorously prosecuted. During the summer of 1868 M. Doudiet laboured assiduously and successfully in the Dorchester St. Church, Montreal, not only preaching on the Lord's Day but also conducting a Sunday School and Bible Class as well as visiting from house to house during the week. During the College Session he was necessarily absent through the week, but either personally or by substitute he furnished supplies for carrying on the work of the Mission on the Lord's Day. Mdlle. Vernier continues to conduct a class in connection with the Mission in Montreal, at a small

expense to the funds; but the Committee are of opinion that her labors form an important auxiliary to the work they have on hand.

The Committee have purchased a manse adjacent to the Church in Montreal, which they have been able to procure on terms which will reduce the claims the Missionary would otherwise have upon the funds at the disposal of the Committee.

The Committee are of opinion that circumstances connected with the French Mission are more promising than they have ever been before, and they confidently look forward to greater results than have yet been attained in connection with the Scheme. Mr. Doudiet, having completed the prescribed Collegiate curriculum, is now fully equipped for the service upon which they have been long expecting him to enter; and they think that the distinctions he has won at College, and the excellent examinations he has undergone before the Church Courts, warrant them in believing that he will bring great ability, wisdom and zeal to bear upon those of his fellow-countrymen who may be brought within the circle of his influence.

The Committee ask the Synod to empower the Presbytery of Montreal to ordain and induct Mr. Doudiet to the pastorate of the French Church, Dorchester St., Montreal, so soon as he is qualified for ordination, without insisting upon 40 families being first connected with the Church, upon the Committee's giving a guarantee for stipend.

The Committee have further the pleasure of stating that there is a good prospect of obtaining the services of another French preacher, educated in our own College, Mr. C. A. Tanner, who has just passed the Synod's examination, to labour in an outlying district in the Island of Montreal. They also cherish the hope of being able to employ Colporteurs, and other agencies more commensurate with the demand upon them on behalf of the French Canadian population. And in order that they may be able to extend their labours in the directions indicated, and prosecute the work committed to them vigorously, they again confidently appeal to the Church for support to this popular Scheme of the Church, trusting that the liberality of congregational contributions shall rise in proportion to the increased work which the Committee desire and propose to undertake.

APPENDIX H.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Committee on Foreign Mission submit the following report:—

The Committe have had under consideration letters addressed to the Synod by the Rev. Thomas Somerville of Victoria, British Columbia, of date the 12th April last, and by the Convener of the Colonial Committee of the Church of Scotland, of date the 20th April. From these communications it appears that, after a very large expenditure by the Parent Church, the Mission to British Columbia has at length attained a very hopeful position. St. Andrew's Church, Victoria, has been completed and dedicated to the service of God. Mr. Somerville, who is still the only Minister of the Church of Scotland in the Province, urgently represents the importance of his obtaining the assistance of a fellow-labourer in order to extend the Mission, and the favourableness of the present time for commencing operations at several stations which have been opened up. The Convener of the Colonial Committee represents that the earnest desire of the Committee to strengthen the Mission has been relieved, by their having been directed to the choice of a Minister in whom they "believe all the qualifications for the peculiar field of labour in British Columbia are to be found," and that the Committee now anxiously look to the Churches on the North American Continent for aid in supporting him.

Your Committee have considered the encouraging statements contained in these communications, the importance of the field to which they refer, and especially the duty of this Church to extend to the Mission its prayerful sympathy and active co-operation, on account of its being the branch of the Church of Scotland, which is the nearest to it in British North America, because of the closer relations growing up between Canada and British Columbia, under the Imperial policy of

Confederation, and for the reason mentioned by Mr. Somerville, that in territory with which he is connected there are now resident numerous members of the Canadian Church; and as the result of their deliberations they recommend the Synod to assume a pecuniary obligation of £100 stg., per annum—this amount to be transmitted to the Secretary of the Colonial Committee, and by the Committee to be applied to the purposes of the Mission; and for the raising of this contribution your Committee further recommend the Synod to appoint a day for a collection to be taken up in all the churches within the bounds, specifically for the Mission in British Columbia and to agree that in the event of the collection exceeding £100 stg., the whole amount of it shall be transmitted to the Colonial Committee. They also suggest that the Convener of the Committee receive authority to request the Colonial Committee to direct their Missionaries to communicate to him from time to time accounts of the progress of their work for the information of the Church and in order to keep up the interest of contributors.

It would have been gratifying to the Committee to have seen their way to the recommendation of a greater measure of assistance, but, as the Treasurer reports no funds on hand since the remittance of \$300 last year to the Colonial Committee for this Mission, they cannot venture to propose a larger sum. If, in addition to the important objects which this contribution is intended to promote, our people will consider it as a slight but acceptable recognition of the many great favours annually bestowed by the Church of Scotland upon the Church in Canada, throughout the whole period of its history down to the present day, it is believed that the call for assistance to this Mission now addressed to them by the Colonial Committee will be cheerfully and liberally responded to.

APPENDIX I.

JUVENILE MISSION AND SABBATH SCHOOL SCHEME.

The Committee have now the pleasure of submitting the thirteenth annual Report of the Juvenile Mission Scheme, being the first since that and the Sabbath School Scheme were merged into one.

During the past year the two Schemes have met with much success and encouragement among the youth of our Church, and it is with feelings of deep thankfulness to Almighty God that the Committee are able to report to the Synod increasing interest in the cause of Missions, and marked improvement in the efficiency of our Sabbath Schools.

The Orphanage Scheme continues to be the favourite channel through which the Missionary offerings are dispensed, and during the year \$677 55 have been received by the Committee on account of Orphans supported in India. Most satisfactory and gratifying reports of these Orphans have been received, and not a few of them are occupying positions of great usefulness. One girl, Margaret Machar, has recently been engaged by the American Ladies' Mission, as a Zenana Teacher at Calcutta, and several others are teaching to their heathen countrywomen the blessed truths which they themselves learned in our Orphanages.

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The numerous letters passing between our Sabbath Schools and their protegees in India, the little presents and tokens of regard frequently exchanged, and the constant anxiety to obtain tidings from the Mission field, all give evidence even more pleasing than mere money contributions, that the Scheme has taken hold of the affections of our youth, and that seeds which may bear richer fruit have been

implanted in their hearts.

The experiment of a Canadian School at Calcutta for High caste girls, a class hitherto never reached by Missionary instruction, has proved a success. At first it was found necessary to provide conveyances to and from School for these girls, the prejudices of their parents being too strong to permit of their appearing on the streets, unattended, or on foot. So great, however, was the interest which they took in the school that, when the carriages were withdrawn, the attendance continued undiminished, and for the first time the daughters of the most exclusive caste in India have been drawn out of their Zenanas to walk

through the streets of Calcutta to a Christian School.

No department of Missionary labour in India is regarded with deeper interest at present than that of sending female Scripture readers, and teachers into the Zenanas of the higher classes, where the women and children spend their time in strict seclusion, idleness, and ignorance. It would extend this report too much to write at length of the wonderful success which has attended such efforts, and of the power with which the Gospel has taken hold of the hearts thus opened to it. A Missionary of great experience and high standing thus writes—"Much connected with the future prospects of Christianity in India is in the hands of Soon they will contribute far, very far more than the men could, to the downfall of superstition and the ruin of Hinduism. After nearly twenty-five years of work in India, I find that very little permanent impression can be made on the masses, unless woman's influence is brought to bear. 'The power of native mothers on the boy of five and the man of fifty recalls the remark of a Jesuit in Europe, when it was said that few men attended the churches: 'Oh! we do not care, we have the women, and through them we work both on men and chil-

Acting upon the strong advice of many friends in India and at home, and also impressed with the favourable views of Drs. Macleod and Watson, the late deputation to India, the Committee decided to try the interesting experiment of supporting a Zenana Teacher, and have made all the necessary arrangements for that purpose. The expense will not exceed \$80 per annum, for the present, and it is confidently believed that our schools will readily provide the means for carrying on the work, especially after the monthly reports from the Zenana Teacher begin to be circulated and read.

In view of the noble effort for Queen's College, now meeting with such gratifying success, the Committee decided to establish a Juvenile Mission Bursary, for the support and education of a Divinity Student. So soon as the number of Students attending College exceeds the resources of the Bursary Committee, it its believed that our Sabbath

Schools will do their part in aiding this useful scheme.

For fourteen years past the "Juvenile Presbyterian" has done much good among our Sabbath Schools, more especially in diffusing intelligence as the organ of the Juvenile Mission. The present circulation of the paper (3000) being however too limited to enable it to compete in appearance or price with the many other excellent Sabbath School papers now extensively published, the Juvenile Presbyterian will probably be discontinued at the end of the year, and our Missionary intelligence circulated more widely in a cheaper form.

At the end of last year the Committee published a Scheme of Lessons for our Sabbath Schools, altered and adapted from the scheme of the Edinburgh Sabbath School Teachers Union. The low price of this scheme, as well as its suitableness, seem to have given general satisfaction, over 5000 copies having been taken. 134 copies of notes on the scheme for the use of Teachers, have also been subscribed for through the Committee.

The Committee are under great obligations to the Ministers, Sabbath School Superintendants, and Teachers of the Church for aiding them in their work. They would also acknowledge a debt of gratitude to Miss Sanders, Secretary of the Ladies' Association for Female Education in India, for her unwearied efforts and valuable information. The Superintendants of the Orphanages, the Chaplain of our Church at Bombay, the Rev. J. Paton, and many others, have also been very kind in aiding to maintain the interest of our schools. The correspondence connected with this Scheme is so great and laborious that it is at times a duty difficult of fulfilment to answer and forward the numerous letters and enquiries, a duty however always cheerfully undertaken as a labour of love.

The youth of every Congregation must necessarily occupy so much of the attention of the earnest Minister of Christ, and have so constant a place in his prayers, and in his mind, that the Committee feel in rendering an account of their stewardship that this department of the Church's labours can never be overlooked by the Synod. They would therefore add the earnest hope that yet richer blessings may rest upon our youth, that they may early be led to the Saviour and gathered into His visible Church, and that the seeds of mercy and Missionary zeal sown in their hearts may bear abundant fruit to the Glory of God, and the extension of the Redeemer's Kingdom.

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APPENDIX J.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CORRESPONDENCE WITH THE COLONIAL COMMITTEE.

The Committee of Correspondence with the Colonial Committee of the Church of Scotland beg to report to the Synod that, in accordance with notice given by circular, a meeting of Committee was held in Montreal in the month of November last, to receive applications from Congregations for aid from the Parent Church in the erection of Churches, and from Presbyteries for Missionaries. Of the applications thus laid before your Committee, and duly considered by them, a certain number were ordered to be transmitted to the Colonial Committee with an Extract Minute embodying your Committee's recommendation in each case. The Convener was also requested to write the Convener of the Colonial Committee with reference to the several applications, and to urge the views of the Canadian Church on certain points connected with the subject of the present correspondence.

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There has been received a reply from the Colonial Committee, of date 20th January last, intimating a grant of (£30) thirty pounds stg. in aid of the Bishop's Mills Church, on the usual conditions as to the liquidation of the debt on the building. Also a grant of £120 stg. in aid of the Church of Lochiel.

In response to the application from the Presbytery of Perth the Colonial Committee intimate their readiness to continue the grant of £50 stg. for the year ending 1st Feb. 1870, in aid of Missionary operations in the Township of Darling.

In accordance with the application of the Presbytery of Toronto, the Colonial Committee agree to send two Missionaries in the event of their being able to secure the services of competent men, upon the condition expressed in the Presbytery's application, to provide a sum equal to one half the salary of each Missionary.

Further the Colonial Committee agree to grant £50 stg., in aid of the stipend of any Minister who may be settled at London.

The Colonial Committee further agree to send out two Missionaries to labour in the Presbytery of Saugeen as soon as they are able to secure the services of two competent Licentiates.

In the letter enclosing the Colonial Committee's Minute, the Secretary, Mr. Laurie, states that, as authorized, he had advertised for Candidates for appointment in the several cases above referred to.

Your Committee further express the satisfaction with which they receive the assurance that the Colonial Committee sympathize deeply with the Canadian Church in the financial misfortune which has befallen it, and that it was with great pleasure they had heard of the laudable efforts which had been made by this Church during the past year to meet the exigencies of its position.

It further appears that the Colonial Committee were much gratified to observe the standing rule passed by the Synod's Correspondence Committee to the effect that each Presbytery, in applying for a Missionary from the Parent Church, shall accompany its application with a promise to contribute (£50) fifty pounds stg. towards his salary.

The Correspondence Committee would specially draw the attention of the Synod to the evidence, afforded in recent communications, of the great interest which the Colonial Committee continues to take in the prosperity of this Church, and the readiness with which they come to our aid in granting assistance, where necessary, from their funds to congregations making efforts to increase their Church accommodation, and to liquidate the debt on existing Church edifices.

In conclusion, your Committee recommend the continuance of the correspondence with the Parent Church as circumstances may arise, with a view at once to protect the funds of the Colonial Committee from improper or excessive demands, and to enforce with their recommendation those claims which approve themselves as most deserving

APPENDIX K.

REPORT ON THE MISSION TO THE LUMBERMEN.

The Committee on the Mission to the Lumbermen beg leave respectfully to report as follows:-

In accordance with the deliverance of Synod, of date June 8th, 1868. the Presbyteries of Perth, Renfrew and Ottawa elected members to form a joint Committee to attend to the spiritual interests of the Lumbermen in the Valley of the Ottawa. That Committee met in Perth on the 29th October, 1868, being composed as follows:-

From the Presbytery of Perth, Rev. S. Mylne, and A. Morris, Esq. M.P.

"Renfrew, Rev. P. Lindsay, Rev. H. Cameron, and W. H. Dowswell, Esq.

"Ottawa, Rev. Messrs. J. B. Mullan, and D.

M. Gordon.

The Rev. D. M. Gordon was appointed Convener, and Andrew Drummond Esq., Ottawa, was elected Secretary-Treasurer.

It was resolved that, owing to the present impossibility of procuring the regular and continuous services of a Missionary to the Lumbermen, such ordained Ministers as might be willing to undertake the work should be engaged: that the vacancies caused by their absence should be filled by the Presbyteries to which they might respectively belong: that the salary of each thus engaged should be at the rate of Forty Dollars (\$40) per month, travelling expenses excluded: that subscriptions in aid of the Mission should be solicited from the Employers of the Lumbermen, and from such others as might be interested in the work: and that the necessary information regarding Shanties, &c.,

should be procured for the guidance of Missionaries

Your Committee deemed it desirable that as many Shanties as possible should be visited, that religious service should be conducted, and religious literature circulated among the men, that the Mission should be strictly non-denominational, and that for the present no contributions be solicited from the Shanty-men.

The district to which your Committee specially direct their attention was, for convenience of operations, divided into three sections, viz: those including:

- 1. The Shanties upon the Ottawa, and its tributaries above Pembroke.
 - Those similarly situated between Pembroke and Ottawa.

3. Those on the Gatineau and the Lievre.

Your Committee felt themselves unable during the past season to attempt the Mission Work in the first of these sections, and they withdrew from it the more readily, as they were led to understand that the other branch of the Presbyterian Church in Canada would prob-

Smith, of Buckingham, the district of the Gatineau and the Lievre.

The appeal made to the Employers of the Lumbermen and others for money, for letters to the Foremen of the Shanties, and for information regarding the position of the Shanties, &c., was, in many cases, kindly and readily responded to, and much sympathy has been expressed in the Mission, particularly in the view of its non-denominational character.

Your Committee have to express their gratitude to John Dougall, Esq., of Montreal, for the gift of a large supply of literature suitable for circulation among the Shanty-men, to the Upper Canada Tract Society for a grant of eight dollars worth of tracts, to F. G. Grafton, Esq., of Montreal, for a free supply of many back numbers of the "British Workman" and "Leisure Hour," to John Durie, Esq., of Ottawa, for a gift of tracts, to the Perth Tract Society for a similar donation and to the Ottawa Bible Society for one hundred Bibles. These have been circulated among the Shanty-men.

Owing to the severe and unusual snowstorms of February, much less has been done in the matter of conducting service in the Shanties than your Committee expected. This is, of course, the main object of the Mission; that of circulating literature, however important, being only secondary. Only one section, that of the Madawaska and tributaries, has been visited, the Rev. Mr. McGillivray, of Brockville, having been able to spend a month in that district. He reports that wherever he went he met with a very cordial reception from Roman Catholics and Protestants alik, that he travelled over five hundred miles, visited more than fifty Shanties, preached for the most part twice every day, and distributed the religious literature which your Committee entrusted to him. The following extract from Mr. McGillivray's report may serve as an example to the welcome given by the Shanty-men to the Missionary, as well as of the importance of increased earnestness in ministering to their spiritual wants.—" The next Shanty was one belonging to the Hon. James Skead, of Ottawa; here the foreman was of the Kirk of Scotland, and could not fully express his feelings of gratitude and surprise at seeing a Minister of the Kirk out there. His men sitting round the fire on the weary Sabbath days frequently cast up to him that whatever others might do, nothing need be expected from the formal Clergymen of the Kirk of Scotland: with holy joy and delight, therefore, he could now lift up his head and exclaim that the Clergymen rejected and despised as cold and dead appeared the most loving towards the destitute woodsmen. Before going far I met an aged man from the 'land of brown heath and shaggy wood,' whose plaintive tale moved me much. His was one of forty families, who lived in the new township of Mattawachan, and except one visit from the late Dr. McMorine, had never seen the face of a Minister of the Auld Kirk of Scotland. He besought me to turn aside to the settlement, both to preach and baptise: but, as I could not do so, I promised to report his case."

In the Northern part of Section No. 2, viz: the district of the Deep River, Coulonge, &c., the Rev. Messrs. Cameron, and McDonald, were unable to visit the Shanties, owing to the very severe snowstorms,

and were also unable to forward the literature which your Committee

For the same reason of stress of weather, the districts of the Gatineau and Lievre, were unvisited, but Mr. Sieveright was enabled, through the kindness of Mr. Mather, of Chelsea, to forward to the Shanty-men of that district, a large supply of literature.

Owing to the necessity of thus abandoning part of their intended operations, your Committee have a balance in the hands of the Treasurer, with which the work may be the more hopefully engaged in

The very great importance of this Mission will be seen, when it is remembered that there are, at the lowest estimate, about 15000 men annually engaged in the Shanties on the Ottawa and its tributaries. These men are entirely cut off from the regular services of Public Worship: the Sabbath is to them generally a day of coarse amusement. Little is done for their spiritual welfare, and that little is, for the most part, done in a desultory and fragmentary way, according to the inclination or opportunities of those few Clergymen whose charges border on the lumbering districts. The Colporteurs of the Ottawa Bible Society endeavour to spread the Scriptures among the Shantymen to as great an extent as they are able, but their labours seldom extend to conducting religious services. It should, moreover, be remembered, that such of the Shanty-men as live during the summer months in the country parishes, near the lumbering districts, carry with them the effects of their winter's carelessness, and often become centres of evil influence in such parishes.

Nor are the difficulties connected with this Mission very great or formidable. No opposition is offered on the part of the employers, but on the contrary, much encouragement, assistance and sympathy. Many of the men employed, perhaps half of the whole number, are Roman Catholics; yet, in so far as your Committee are aware, these readily listen to the preaching of the Gospel, and gladly receive the literature sent to them. To the French speaking portion of the Shanty-men, who are generally unable to read, it is more difficult for your Committee at present to provide the means of spiritual improvement. The work already accomplished, the experiments already made in this Mission, seem to prove very clearly that there are no difficulties in carrying the Gospel to the Lumbermen, which cannot be surmounted by piety, earnestness and kindly feeling, and also that religious literature, if at all interesting, will be eagerly perused by all of them who can read, in which class are included nearly all the Protestants, a portion of the French Canadians, and a few Irish Catholics. As regards the money requisite for carrying on the Mission, your Committee anticipate no difficulty whatever in this respect. The Employers contribute willingly: and though, for the present, your Committee think it advisable to solicit no subscription from the Shanty-men, yet when the benefits of such a Mission are felt by the men, they would themselves in all probability support it.

What then, it may be asked, are the prospects of this Mission? Your Committee feel that the true way of meeting in the fullest manner possible the spiritual wants of the Lumbermen would be to have a general Protestant Mission, thoroughly non-sectarian, managed by a Central Board, composed of representatives of all Protestant denominations. Such a Board could engage such Preachers of the Gospel as from their earnestness, piety, and tact, would be qualified for the work. With this view your Committee desire the co-operation of all other Protestants who may feel an interest in the Mission. It is difficult for many reasons, to have settled Ministers leave their charges for

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several weeks in mid-winter, and therefore desirable to have the services of men whose special duty and object would be the supply of the ordinances of religion to the Lumbermen. Such Missionaries could, during the summer months, when the Shanty-men are away from the woods, labour in scattered and outlying districts, in many of which they would meet with the same class of men as those to whom they would minister in winter. Till the services of such men can be procured, your Committee think that, in so far as is practicable, the system which they have pursued during the past season should be continued.

In conclusion, your Committee would express their earnest hope that the efforts already put forth may prove but the small beginning of extended labours in this Mission. Its importance is great, its claims are urgent, and the vigorous prosecution of it would be a source of benefit to our Church and Country. There are no difficulties connected with it which may not be overcome by Christian earnestness and broad brotherly Christian charity. While the lumber trade of our country is one of the most important sources of our material wealth, it is sad that those most immediately engaged in it should be the most neglected in reference to their spiritual improvement. While it might be well for the Church to do more in the work of Foreign Missions, it can never be anything but ill for it to neglect its Home Mission. By going forward in the work with a living trust in the Lord of Missions it is to be confidently expected that this agency may contribute to hasten the time when the "wilderness and the solitary place shall be glad, and the desert shall rejoice and blossom as the rose." All which is respectfully submitted.
