

NINETEENTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
TORONTO MAGDALENE ASYLUM
OR
FEMALE HOUSE OF REFUGE.

In presenting the regular Annual Report of the Magdalene Asylum or Female House of Refuge, the Managers feel much gratification in being able to testify to their friends and the public the continued and increasing success which has attended their efforts to lessen in some measure the misery and degradation of those poor unfortunates who have been led to place themselves under its shelter and protection. They desire to recognize, in the present as in the past, the good hand of God, and to record their gratitude and praise for his continued and manifold goodness.

At the commencement of the past year, there were 36 inmates. During the year, 33 were admitted and 39 left. Of these 15 ran away, 5 insisted in going out, 3 were dismissed, 12 went to service, 2 went to their friends, and 2 were sent to the Hospital.

The amount received for work done by the inmates from February, 1873, to April, 1874, was \$1000 03.

Of the history of the inmates, each year brings its own sad record of sins and sorrows. Some time ago one sought and found admittance whose previous life was ascertained to be unstained by that which most debases woman. Vice in another form had overtaken her; unable to conquer it, in despair she fled from her home, and entered the Asylum with the one desire and determination to put an end to her life. While planning the means to accomplish her purpose, her attention became riveted on the truths taught from God's Word; the guilt and danger of the act premeditated struck her awakened conscience with full force; and earnest and serious reflection was followed by a final abandonment of her sinful purpose. From her now happy English home, she writes, "My prayers daily ascend for you all; my desire and hope is that many may receive the good which I have done, and while life lasts I shall give

thanks and praise to God who first led my wayward steps to the refuge of the poor wanderer."

Thus to those Christian friends who minister to the higher interests of the inmates, it may be said—"Brethren, your labor is not in vain in the Lord."

While the Committee present their thanks to all contributors, they feel they cannot sufficiently express their gratitude to those who have also with a most generous liberality contributed towards the erection of the new building. These contributions are sufficient evidence of the interest taken in the Institution, and the hope is indulged that the expectations formed of its future usefulness may be more than realized.

Special thanks are due to Mr. Piatt, Water Commissioner, for two liberal donations.

Dr. Robinson most kindly continues to respond to every call made upon him.

Of Mrs. Aiken, the Matron, too much cannot be said. Perhaps the best tribute to her worth is found in the respect and affection with which she is regarded by those committed to her charge.

The erection of the new building has necessarily involved much labor, and the Committee cannot but express their sense of obligation to Mr. Lesslie and Mr. Alcorn for the time and attention which they have given in connection therewith, and they feel that it is owing to their advice and co-operation so cheerfully given they have been enabled to surmount many difficulties. Through Mr. Lesslie's kindness also, they are enabled to append the accompanying short history of the Institution, which they feel confident will not be without its interest to the many patrons of the Asylum, as well as to the public in general.

a home and employment for them in a private family. The relief thus extended to them, when known, led others to seek for refuge, which was cordially given in the same manner. It was soon found, however, after years of trial, that those private efforts were not adequate to meet the wants of this class or relieve their distress.

In 1853, the sympathy felt by many others on behalf of those poor outcasts from society led to the inquiry, "Can nothing be done on a more enlarged scale to save them from present misery and everlasting ruin?" A meeting was therefore called at the house of Mr. Sanson, the pastor of Trinity church, at which it was determined to organize a Society for this purpose. Thus was laid the foundation of the Toronto Magdalene Asylum; and for twenty years has its labor of love been employed with remarkable success, in bringing back many a hopeless wanderer to the parental or domestic home, to virtue, industry and comfort, and some to the hope and blessedness of the Christian life. At first the work commenced in a small building, which was rented for the purpose on Richmond Street, under a managing board of gentlemen and a committee of ladies. For some time, only two of the class for whose welfare it was opened availed themselves of its benefits, but the first Report of the Committee, issued about nine months afterwards, in March, 1854, exhibited a total of nineteen cases, of whom five had returned to their friends or had been hopefully settled as domestic servants. The fruit thus secured in so short a time encouraged its friends to go forward hopefully, and a public meeting was held in April to receive the Report of the Board of Managers relative to the erection of a building, or the purchase of one which had been offered for the purpose whose suitability was doubtful. Under these circumstances the work was continued for about seven years in the premises originally rented, until overcrowded and unsafe. In the Spring of 1860, a large old building in Yorkville, in a healthy locality, capable of accommodating about fifty individuals, was rented, and in the summer of that year the removal was effected, to the great advantage of the Institution. In 1861 the premises thus rented, with about three acres of ground, became, in the providence of God, without charge, the property of the Asylum. The residuary legatees of the late Dr. Burnside, an old medical practitioner in Toronto, having a large sum at their disposal for benevolent purposes, generously purchased this property, and gave it to the charity as a gift. During the last twelve years, with the superior accommodation and facilities furnished in the larger and more healthful premises, the operations of the Society have been conducted as successfully as they could be in an old building never designed for such a purpose. The increasing claims upon the Refuge by increased population, especially from "the city, with its sins and sorrows," demanded, under long experience, a larger and better building, planned especially to admit of a classification of the inmates, better facilities for industrial labor, superior sanitary arrangements, and generally more scope for the efficient and convenient management of the Institution.

For two or three years a fund has been gradually accumulating for this object. Although not half equal to the cost of the designed structure, the Committee, relying upon the kind generosity of the people in the city and neighborhood, so signally shown in the past, and upon their representatives in the Government and municipalities, have gone forward with this enterprize, trusting in their continued liberality and benevolence, and in the blessing of God. The building has been erected substantially, to accommodate one hundred inmates or more, is in keeping with the improvements of the age, and has cost about \$17,000, nearly the half of which has been raised by mortgage.

With the experience of many years, and superior facilities for profitable and useful labor, the hope is cherished that in time the Institution may be made largely, if not wholly self-sustaining.

In furthering the object for which this Institution was established, the visitation of the prisoners in the Jail became an important duty to find the victims and outcasts requiring its aid. In the discharge of this duty it was found there never had been a matron appointed to look after the welfare of the female prisoners, and without whose supervision and aid little good could be anticipated. The Committee therefore, supported by a Report of the County Council and a Resolution of the Magistrates in Quarter Session, had a respectable Christian woman appointed to that office in 1854, which has ever since been regarded as a necessity.

From the Jail the Asylum receives the most of its subjects, yet others of an affecting character have at times been received. Daughters, deceived and abandoned, having left their home to hide their shame and grief, and having providentially seen the finger post pointing to the Refuge, have fled to it and been saved from wretchedness and ruin; Parents have sought its shelter and discipline for wayward daughters on the verge of ruin, and have realized its benefits; wives have been reclaimed, and happily reconciled to their husbands.

The number of those reformed and returned to their friends or settled in respectable families as domestic servants, may be justly reckoned at an annual average of about twelve. As there is joy in heaven over one sinner that repenteth, the hopeful yearly reclamation of so many, under the benignant help of this Institution, is a cause of devout gratitude to God. Another pleasing feature, as the fruit of its labors, is the happy settlement of a number by marriage in respectable homes.

The instruction, training and discipline of the Asylum are all intended to be regulated by the benignant spirit of the Gospel and "the wisdom which cometh down from above." The letters which have frequently been received from those who have been rescued and comfortably resettled in life through its agency, as well as the gifts transmitted by them from time to time to its funds, tell of the unfeigned gratitude which dwells in their hearts towards God and the Christian laborers in this arid section of the Lord's vineyard.
