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

## Twenty-Fifth Annual Communication

HELD IN

MECHANICS' HALL,—HAMILTON.

HAMILTON, August 18th, 1879.

A Special Meeting of the City Lodges being convened for that purpose, the Grand Marshal announced the Grand Lodge of Ontario in waiting, whereupon, that body was admitted and appropriately received.

Bro. F. Claringbowl, D. D. G. M., in a short address, cordially greeted the Grand Lodge, and welcomed it to the city of Hamilton. Expressing the hope that the Session would be fraught with much good to the Order, and profering the free use of the Hall and Ante-Rooms for the purposes of the Session, to which Bro. J. T. Hornibrook, M. W. Grand Master suitably responded and on behalf of the Grand Lodge accepted, the profered kindness of the Order in Hamilton.

Bro. J. T. Hornibrook, M. W. Grand Master, then took the Chair and called the R. W. Grand Lodge to order, whereupon, the Grand Marshal and Grand Conductor examined those present, and having declared them duly qualified, the R. W. Grand Chaplain Bro. W. Ballantyne, addressed the throne of Grace, as follows :

Bless the widow and orphan, and be merciful to the poor and afflicted, and relieve their sorrows and distresses. Bless our civil authorities, giving them grace to execute justice and to maintain truth, and may we ever abound with that righteousness which exalteth a nation. Look with favor upon our great Brotherhood, and so bless our efforts in the cause of humanity, that in due time all nations may be gathered under the banner of Friendship, Love and Truth. Hear us, O Lord, in these our supplications and prayers, and answer them as shall be most expedient for us, and when our labors on earth are ended; grant that we may enter into the rest prepared for Thy faithful servants, and with all Thy redeemed family, unite in ascribing praise to Thy Holy Name, for ever and ever—AMEN.

#### GRAND MASTER'S REPORT.

HAMILTON, August 18th, 1879.

#### *Officers, Representatives and Past Grands.*

Another year with its varied and important events, its joys and its sorrows, its opportunities for advancement improved or neglected, has been added to the past, and we are to day permitted, under the guidance of an All wise Providence, to again meet together in fraternal intercourse, to strengthen old friendships, to form new attachments, and to incite increased interests in, and legislate for, the well-being of our noble Order in this jurisdiction.

In accordance with the requirements of the Constitution of this R. W. Grand Body, I present for your consideration an official report of my administration.

During the last few years a general depression in business circles has been severely felt all over the Dominion, which has greatly tended to impede the growth of our Order, still, notwithstanding this adverse influence, it is a matter of sincere congratulation that our organization has more than maintained its own. I trust, however, that we have experienced the full extent of the "Hard Times," and that we will soon re-enter the sunlight of continued success and prosperity.

#### VISITATION.

Clause 3.—During my term of office although unable to make as many visitations as I desired, still it affords me much pleasure to report that wherever I did visit, I met with the most cordial welcome, and found the brethren zealous to push forward the good work in the true spirit of Odd-Fellowship. Whenever opportunity offered I exemplified the secret work, and administered such instruction as was most required.

#### DISPENSATIONS GRANTED.

Clause 4.—Quite a number of dispensations have been asked for during the year. I granted the following:

To several Lodges to wear regalia at funerals or anniversary celebrations.

To Cypress Lodge, No. 187, to reinstate an expelled member.

To Excelsior Lodge, No. 44, to reinstate a suspended member before expiration of term of suspension.

To Acton Lodge, No. 204, to elect and install new officers at the same meeting.

1. To Argyle Lodge, No. 218, to confer the five degrees at one meeting.

2. To Naomi Lodge, No. 116, to hold a public installation.

3. To Montana Lodge, No. 177, to hold public installation.

4. To Queen City of Ontario Lodge, No. 56, to hold an entertainment under the auspices of the order.

5. To Oakville Lodge, No. 182, to hold an entertainment under the auspices of the order.

6. To Milbank Lodge, No. 206, to elect a scarlet degree member as N. G.

7. To Garnet Lodge, No. 189, to elect a scarlet degree member as N. G.

8. To Laurel Lodge, No. 110, Yorkville, to move to Toronto.

#### DISPENSATIONS REFUSED.

Clause 5.—The following I deemed it inadvisable to grant:  
Cambridge Lodge, No. 169, to initiate a candidate under 21 years of age.

Garnet Lodge, No. 189, to initiate a candidate under 21 years of age  
 Mechanics Lodge, No. 69, Whistler, Mobile County, Alabama, to  
 apply for help to discharge a mortgage on their hall.  
 Franklin Lodge, No. 24, Tuscumbia, Ala. to apply for aid, as they  
 had been placed in pecuniary state of distress owing to the fever epi-  
 demic.

In reply to Mechanics Lodge I informed them that very few of our  
 lodges were in as good financial standing as they themselves were, and  
 a great many were not in the position to render aid for the purpose  
 requested.

In answer to Franklin Lodge, I informed them that as our lodges  
 only a short time previously had generously contributed to the General  
 Relief Fund for our Southern brethren, I deemed it inadvisable, under  
 the circumstances, to permit a further appeal to our membership.

## DECISIONS.

Clause 6.—During recess a great many questions have been sub-  
 mitted to me, most of them easily answered by reference to the consti-  
 tution for subordinates, or to the Digests of G. L., I. O. O. F., or of  
 Ontario. I submit the following for your approval:

1. A lodge should act according to the wishes of the widow or  
 family in disposing of the sum allowed for "funeral benefits;" that is,  
 they should pay the amount to the widow or family direct, or use same  
 towards defraying the funeral expenses, if so desired. In case the  
 amount is not all used the balance should be paid to the widow or  
 family.

2 If a Lodge, by request of a widow of a deceased brother, pays  
 the funeral expenses she is entitled (if she so desires) to see that the  
 amount allowed by the by-laws has been expended.

3 The status of a brother holding a dismissal certificate is specifi-  
 cally defined by the resolution as reported under sec. 816, White's  
 Digest, and if he desires to renew his membership he must pursue the  
 same course as that prescribed for Ancient Odd-Fellows in sec. 84.

4. A brother holding a withdrawal card which has run out of date,  
 or a dismissal certificate, may be recognized as an Ancient Odd-Fellow,  
 and be allowed to renew his membership, by the deposit of said card or  
 dismissal certificate, in a Lodge at the place of his residence, subject  
 to the payment of such fee as the local law may require.

5 A Lodge, whose by-laws require the payment of dues quarterly  
 in advance, can consider members who have not so paid, in arrears.

6 If a member takes a Withdrawal Card, before the expiration of  
 the time up to which his dues are paid, the Lodge shall refund him  
 the amount overpaid.

7 A Lodge cannot legally initiate a candidate residing in the juris-  
 diction of another Lodge, without first obtaining consent of said Lodge.

8 A decision by civil law should not be held as a reason for not en-  
 tertaining a charge properly preferred.

9. A visiting brother can take part in the ceremony of initiation,  
 if requested by the Noble Grand.

10 The funeral expenses of a deceased brother being defrayed by  
 another society does not relieve a Lodge from paying the amount of  
 funeral benefits in accordance with their by-laws.

11 A Lodge having the following by-laws: 1st.—"No brother who  
 shall have been in arrears will be entitled to benefits until six weeks

after such arrears have been paid in full." "2nd.—"No brother shall be entitled to any benefits for sickness commencing while under disabilities;" can refuse to pay benefits for sickness contracted while under said disability for six weeks.

12 A Junior Past Grand should not be elected or appointed to office during the term he occupies the P. G. chair.

13. Appeals to a D. D. G. M. should be forwarded through the Lodge, and his answer sent to the Lodge and not to the brother making the appeal.

14. A member gaining admission through false statements regarding his health, after a proper trial and being found guilty, can be expelled from the Order.

15. If a duly elected candidate is proven unworthy to the satisfaction of the Lodge, the Lodge can, previous to his initiation, by a two-thirds majority vote of those present, declare the election void.

16. A candidate for membership must be six months resident within the jurisdiction of the Lodge to which he applies.

17. A subordinate Lodge can sub-let their lodge room to another Society.

18. A member cannot wear encampment regalia in his own subordinate Lodge

19. A brother can apply for re-instatement in his own Lodge, although resident within the jurisdiction of another Lodge, the application to be in writing.

20. If a member is desirous of being re-instated for the purpose of taking a withdrawal card to join another lodge in the same jurisdiction, the Lodge may charge him not less than one year's dues and price of card, providing there is no specified amount in their by-laws.

21. An unfavorable ballot can only be reconsidered by a voluntary motion of all those who cast black balls, and all votes cast on such motion must be in favor of it.

22. A. D. D. G. M. should not hold the office of N. G.

23. Elective Officers who are in arrears for Lodge dues cannot be installed until such arrears are paid in full.

24. Officers who are to serve for one year should be installed in January.

25. A. D. D. G. M. has no right to communicate the password to any person except the N. G. or acting N. G.

26 A Lodge must receive a charge against one of its members, if properly preferred.

27. Business transacted at a Lodge meeting, when the charter or dispensation is not in the Lodge room, is illegal.

28. When notices of "Investment of Funds," to be voted on, on a certain night, have been sent according to the by-laws to the members of a Lodge, and when on such night, after same has been under discussion, a motion is carried to postpone further debate until another night, it is not legally requisite that the members should again be notified.

29. A Noble Grand has no right to entertain an illegal motion, although no objection is raised to his so doing.

30. A Lodge, to alter a resolution already carried, must first obtain a reconsideration, such reconsideration to be obtained before the time allowed by law has expired.

81. A Noble Grand cannot receive an amendment to resolution already carried.
82. An expelled member cannot be reinstated unless his Lodge first obtains the consent of the Grand Lodge or Grand Master, and he must then be admitted in the same manner as an Ancient Odd-Fellow.
83. A Lodge should notify the D. D. G. M. of its intention to hold a special meeting, for the installation of officers.
84. It is not necessary to obtain the consent of the Grand Lodge or Grand Master to reinstate a member suspended for N. P. D.
85. A brother cannot be tried the second time for the same offence where no appeal has been made.
86. A Lodge is bound to take action upon the application for reinstatement of a brother suspended for over twelve months for N. P. D., when it is for the purpose of uniting with another Lodge in the same jurisdiction, and is accompanied with the amount of one year's dues and price of card. A ballot to be taken on the same, and not an open vote.
- "Decision Bro. Geo. Whittington vs. Napanee Lodge No. 86; correspondence herewith submitted.
87. A motion is not required to enable a Lodge to discuss a subject laid over from a former meeting.
88. A brother does not violate his obligation by informing a brother in good standing of anything that may have transpired in the Lodge previous to the initiation of said member.
89. A Lodge is not compelled to pay sick benefits for a shorter term than one week, unless specially so provided by its by-laws.
40. A member of a trial committee has no right to appear as a witness to give evidence in the matter.
41. A trial committee has no right to demand the Lodge Minutes.
42. A Lodge has no right to take evidence, either to prove or disprove statements made against a brother, otherwise than through a trial committee.
43. The Book for evidence, as properly certified copies of the minutes should be in their possession.
48. A member suspended for N. P. D. should be reinstated without a ballot, if he applied within six months from date of suspension.
44. A member suspended for N. P. D. ceases membership after the expiration of six months from date of suspension.
45. Degrees must be balloted for on the night of application, and in the subordinate Lodge to which the applicant belongs.
46. It is not legal to declare officers elected by acclamation on the second night of nomination; they must be elected by ballot on the night appointed for election.
47. A motion to adjourn and then close the Lodge without the usual ceremony is illegal.
48. It is legal to nominate and elect representatives on the last meeting night in the term.
49. Installation performed by a duly qualified Past Grand is legal.
50. A Lodge is not compelled to send their D. D. G. M. as their representative to Grand Lodge.
51. A Vice-Grand being in the chair in the absence of the N. G., can initiate a candidate if there is a Past Grand present to deliver the P. G. charge.

52. In the absence of the N. G., V. G., and all Past Grands, it is illegal for a scarlet member to take the chair and transact business.

53. By-law 2, Art. 6, of Union Lodge No. 16, St. Catharines, was submitted to me by D. D. G. M., W. A. Rawlings for my ruling as to the legality of the words, "commencing not more than one week anterior to the date at which the same shall have been reported to the Lodge." The by-law reads as follows:

BENEFIT IN CASE OF SICKNESS.

"2. Every bona-fide member, not disqualified under Article 8 of these by-laws, if rendered incapable of following his usual occupation by sickness or other disability not proceeding from immoral conduct on his part, shall receive a benefit from the funds of the Lodge, during such sickness or disability, commencing not more than one week anterior to the date at which the same shall have been reported to the Lodge, unless otherwise ordered by the Lodge, and at the rate following, that is to say, &c., &c."

My decision was that the words referred to conflicted with clause 50, constitution of subordinates, and was therefore illegal.

54. In the report for term ending Dec. 31st, 1878, of Bro. T. A. Thompson, D. D. G. M. of Toronto, a complaint was made against the action of Queen City of Ontario Lodge, No. 56, for installing officers at a special meeting called for that purpose, without having notified him as D. D. G. M., maintaining that under the circumstances the installation of officers was illegal.

After carefully investigating the matter I decided that while it was the duty of the Lodge to notify the D. D. G. M., of such intention to instal at a special meeting, the ceremony of installation being performed by a Past Grand in good standing was legal.

The correspondence in this case is somewhat voluminous and is herewith submitted.

OFFICERS BONDS.

Clause 7.—In accordance with resolution of last session, the Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer made application to the "Canada Guarantee Co." for bonds of indemnity, for the respective amounts of \$2,000 and \$6,000. The applications were favorably entertained, the premium asked being 1½ p. c., viz., \$120. This sum being largely in excess of amount contemplated, I deemed it advisable, on consultation with the Executive, to allow it to stand for your further consideration, the Treasurer's bonds being still in possession of Grand Lodge.

CHANGE OF NAME.

Clause 8.—During the last session of the Supreme Grand Lodge the name of that Right Worthy Grand Body was changed from the Grand Lodge of the United States, I. O. O. F. to the Grand Lodge I. O. O. F.

After the continued efforts of this Right Worthy Grand Body, through your Grand Representatives, I am pleased to be able to congratulate you that the "Sovereign Grand Lodge" has at last adopted a name in harmony with the character of our Institution.

GRAND LODGE OF QUEBEC.

Clause 9.—On the 12th, Oct., 1878, Bro. Cl. T. Campbell, P. G. M., advised me that he had been commissioned by the M. W. Grand Sire

to institute a Grand Lodge in the Province of Quebec, which has happily been effected under the most favorable auspices. I with sincere pleasure welcome another sister Grand Lodge in Canada, and wish our brethren of the new jurisdiction success in their undertaking.

## ANNIVERSARY.

Clause 10.—I issued circulars to all subordinate Lodges in the jurisdiction requesting them to comply with the following received from the M. W. Grand Sire:

WHEREAS, the twenty-sixth day of April is the Anniversary of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows in the United States of America, and it has been the custom and usage of the several jurisdictions under the Grand Lodge of the I. O. O. F. to celebrate the day in such appropriate manner as they may respectively designate:

Now therefore, I, JOHN B. HARMON, M. W. Grand Sire, by virtue of such usage and the authority of the Grand Lodge (Journal, 7851), do hereby recommend all Grand and Subordinate Bodies of the Order to set apart the Twenty-sixth day of April, 1870, for its due observance as the *Sixtieth Anniversary of Odd Fellowship in America*. And to that end to dedicate the occasion to appropriate exercises, and thanksgiving to Almighty God for his manifold blessings to our Order, individually and collectively.

Done at the City of Baltimore, State of Maryland, this Twenty-fourth day of February, A. D., 1870, and of our Order the sixtieth.

## RELIEF TO THE SOUTH.

Clause 11.—Early in September the painful intelligence reached me that Tennessee, Louisiana and Mississippi were again visited with the yellow fever in its most virulent form, creating widespread distress amongst our brethren of the South. I immediately consulted with my advisory board, and we decided to forward \$800 from the funds of the Grand Lodge. The urgency of the case was so great that I also caused an appeal to be made to the subordinate lodges in this jurisdiction for further assistance, to which, I am pleased to report, the Order in Ontario gave a liberal response.

## APPOINTMENTS.

Clause 12.—During recess I appointed the following: Committee on laws of subordinatcs—W. A. Rawlings, W. S. Campbell, H. Kirkpatrick, W. D. Gordon and James Sutherland, Committee on Sovereign Grand Lodge in Canada—P. G. Masters Wright, Woodyst and Campbell.  
Auditors—F. B.'s Chas. Packert and W. G. Mutton,

## DUPLICATE CHARTERS.

Clause 13.—I instructed the Grand Secretary to forward duplicate charters to Palmerston Lodge No. 128, Palmerston, original burnt when hall was destroyed by fire; Metropolitan Degree Lodge No. 8, Toronto; original almost worn out, and which I forwarded to Grand Secretary.

## CARDS GRANTED.

Clause 14.—I granted cards to members of defunct Lodges as follows:—Bro. Titus, Trenton Lodge, Bro. Osborne, Trenton Lodge and Bro. Haight, Shannonville.

## DISTRICT DEPUTIES.

Clause 15.—I have only received some thirty reports from the D. D. G. M's. throughout the Province, and am inclined to attribute this non-performance of duty to the fact that they were not aware of the requirements of the law, or to a want of interest in their official positions. I must coincide with my predecessor, in the statement made in his report of last year, that the Lodges generally ignore their D. D. G. M., and send their communications direct to the Grand Master. I would earnestly recommend this R. W. Grand Lodge to consider the expediency of enlarging the Districts, as, in my opinion, the more importance and responsibility you attach to the position, the more thorough will be the discharge of official duty. I made a few alterations in the list of Deputies during the year, to fill vacancies occasioned by resignation or removal.

## CHARTERS SURRENDERED.

## TRENTON LODGE, NO. 118 TRENTON.

Clause 16.—On account of information received from the Grand Secretary and Bro. McLellan, M. D., of Trenton, I made an official visit to Trenton Lodge, and as there appeared no prospect whatever of the Lodge again resuming work, I deemed it advisable to accede to the request of the two or three brothers, who continued in good standing, to withdraw its charter, and having taken an inventory of their effects, authorized Bro. McLellan, M. D., to dispose of same and forward statement to the Grand Secretary.

## RIVERSIDE LODGE NO. 145, IROQUOIS.

Hearing that this Lodge had ceased to hold meetings, I instructed Bro. W. D. Gordon, P. G., of Kingston, to visit them and endeavor to instil new life into the members, and, if possible, to again place them in working order. He did so, and reported that they had promised to do so, but after a short period they wrote him that they were unable to carry on the Lodge. After consulting Bro. Gordon, I empowered him to go and wind up their affairs, and forward charter and effects to the Grand Secretary.

## CAPITOL LODGE NO. 141, OTTAWA.

I received several letters from Bro. J. H. Ward, the D. D. G. M., of the Lodge, relative to the Lodge surrendering its charter, and in my replies I strongly urged upon him the necessity of using all possible means to banish such an idea from the minds of the members. I also requested Bro. J. B. McIntyre, D. G. M., to visit them when he was in Ottawa, and render them his assistance in restoring their Lodge meet-

ings. It was all in vain, however, and although extremely disappointed at the non-success of our efforts, I had no choice but to ask a surrender of its charter. I wrote informing Bro. Ward of my decision, and instructed him to close up its affairs. I have repeatedly written him, but cannot get any satisfactory reply, and lately cannot get any answer whatever. I would therefore recommend this R. W. Grand Lodge to take some decided action in this case, especially as our Grand Secretary informs me that they procured a fine set of regalia, &c., from Bro. White, of Hamilton, and have not yet paid him, although they had sold said regalia, &c., to one of our new Lodges, who promptly remitted them the amount.

#### TECUMSEH LODGE NO. 182, OTTERTVILLE.

Acting upon information received from the Grand Secretary regarding this Lodge, I instructed him to make necessary enquiries, and if he thought it advisable, withdraw its charter. He did so, through Bro. Campbell, D.D.G.M., of Tilsonburg, who thought it best to arrange its affairs and forward charter, etc., to the R. W. Grand Secretary. I am pleased, however, to report that they have asked to have their charter restored, and after careful consideration I complied with their request, and have reason to believe that they will soon be in good working condition.

#### DEDICATIONS.

Clause 17.—Several new halls have been dedicated to the purposes of our Order during the past year. For valued assistance in the performance of these interesting ceremonies, I am indebted to Bros. J. B. King, G. S., H. Blain, P. G., and the several D. D. G. M.'s.

#### CONCLUSION.

Clause 18.—In conclusion, I must express my high appreciation of your confidence in electing me to the important office of Grand Master of Ontario, and I now desire to return my sincere and heartfelt thanks for the honor conferred upon me, and also to the many brethren who have so kindly assisted me during my term of office.

I am particularly indebted to Grand Secretary J. B. King, and Grand Treasurer W. Badenach, for their valuable counsels in the discharge of my official duties.

I trust that your deliberations at this annual session may be conducted with wisdom, a spirit of brotherly love, and an earnest desire to legislate for the best interests of our Order in this jurisdiction.

The R. W. Grand Secretary then presented his Annual Report, tables and statements which were distributed as printed and referred to the Committee on Distribution.

#### R. W. GRAND SECRETARY'S REPORT.

HAMILTON, August 18, 1879.

To the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario, I. O. O. F.

BRETHREN,—I have much pleasures in being again permitted to submit my Annual Report and Statements. The result of the year's

labors are very encouraging, and prove beyond a doubt that we hold first rank among the Benevolent Institutions of the day. While many jurisdictions, from various causes, report loss in membership, we have had a gain—small, it is true, yet an actual gain—both in Lodges, membership, and in the affections of the people. Our losses from suspension for N. P. D. have been large, but they are less by over 100 than last year.

Clause 1. The country has been passing, the last few years, through a very severe commercial trial, to which have been, at various times, attributed the loss of membership for non-payment of dues; but I am led to believe that there are other and more potent causes, to which a very great number of them can be attributed than the hard times. Bro. McDiarmid, D. D. G. M. of Lucas, seems to me to have a good idea of some of the causes, and therefore I will quote from his report for the last term, and trust that Lodges will examine carefully into the matter, and see whether or not they can attribute any of their losses to the same cause.

"It is with much regret that I am unable to report an increase of membership and revenue in the Lodge. On the contrary, we have lost ground heavily. The last year, ending 30th June last has been the most severe on us since the institution of the lodge, over eight years ago. During the last year we have, out of a total membership of 54 lost nine by suspension N. P. D.,—a decrease of over sixteen per cent from that cause alone,—and from present indications we expect to report the same loss in our next semi-annual report. Several members, after the right of initiation, attended no more meetings; took no degrees, of course; and suffered themselves to be suspended for non-payment of dues notwithstanding the repeated attempts made by the brethren to induce the delinquents to return. It is a fact, and a curious one, too, that the whole business of the Lodge, and consequently its very existence, depends upon the regular attendance and the warm interest taken in it by these eight brethren, who, to their honor be it said, were its earliest members.

"This state of affairs, its causes, and the remedy therefor, have been discussed long and earnestly, both in and out of Lodge, by those of the members who still exert themselves for the Order. Many schemes were suggested and unsuccessfully tried to counteract this decline. At last, after much enquiry and observation, we feel satisfied that this retrogression of Lucas Lodge in particular is not to be attributed to the long-continued depression in business of all kinds throughout the Province; that it is a dangerous and fallacious conclusion to hold the monetary pressure responsible solely for these losses in membership. I am convinced that not more than two per cent of the falling off is referable to the 'hard times.' Other causes are to be sought for. Among them are principally these:

"1st.—The disgusting and perfunctory manner in which the officers of Lodges perform the 'work.' Brethren are elected to the office of N. G., who cannot even read their charges, to say nothing of memorizing them without rendering them absolutely unintelligible to the candidate. And a candidate who has ever under gone an initiation at the hands of these officers, goes away with the natural impression deeply stamped on his mind that the whole ceremony is nothing but a meaningless mummerly, illustrated with childish nonsense. So that by the time he has exhausted his patience and curiosity by taking perhaps the third Degree Odd-fellowship is gone; and his continued absence from Lodge meetings is the first infallible indication that he is firmly convinced S. N. P. D. is the most sensible and desirable Degree in the Institution. I know personally, half a dozen instances where educated, intelligent men, men who would be a credit to the Order—have never reappeared for advancement for no other reason but that they were disgusted during the initiation by the hasty and senseless ceremony. Let us imagine a man receiving his first three degrees at once from such officers! No candidate should receive more than one degree at a time, unless by dispensation of the G. Master. The memorizing of his charges should be made compulsory

on every officer, as properly suggested by Grand Master Campbell in his Address. This matter requires immediate attention.

"2nd.—The general but erroneous system which Lodges, under a mistaken notion of benevolence and *charity*, pursue in dealing with their benefit funds. It is a great source of disunion, and disaffection wherever practiced. Benefits are paid irrespective of the standing of the relieved brother on the books, and in open defiance of the By-laws. To resist it, is to incur the displeasure and animosity of nine-tenths of the Lodge. Punctually paying members observe that there is no necessity or penalty for not paying dues promptly, seeing that benefits are regularly received by members in arrears, and they consequently themselves fall in arrears. Members seem to regard the Fund as a deposit from whence they can draw any time, quite regardless of By-laws or the rights of future members. There is sufficient for their day; they are old members, and let those who come after them look out for themselves. This system is the fountain of the Life Assurance Scheme whereby they propose, by the payment of six dollars a year, to draw sick benefits and one thousand dollars in the event of death. It obtained in this Lodge to such an extent that last year a member in good circumstances, but 12 months in arrears, made application for funeral benefits on the death of his wife; and in the application being refused, paid his dues and took a Withdrawal Card."

"3rd.—The fact that many have joined the Order from purely mercenary motives. After maintaining their connection for a few years, they find out their mistake and quietly drop off. The loss of such members as these is a source of strength and credit to the institution, although they appear in the Returns as S. N. P. D.—thus falsely certified victims to "hard times," they ought to be correctly classed in these Returns as expelled for unbecoming conduct."

"4th.—The present arrangements of Districts, while it may be a good one from a strictly economical point of view, works perniciously against the prosperity of subordinates. The universal identity of the secret work becomes lost or confused in many important particulars. Each Lodge acquires and practices a system of its own, differing greatly from others. Visitations from Grand Officers are now, few and far between; indeed, this Lodge has not been honored by the presence of a Grand Officer above the rank of D. D. G. M. in his own jurisdiction for four years. In times past these visits were quite an event in the Lodge. The members made a point to attend in numbers; questions were asked and answered; points of order were settled; the secret work was exemplified and errors corrected; information was given as to the condition of surrounding Lodges, fresh interest and a wholesome spirit of emulation were inspired; weak brethren took new strength; the older ones were encouraged to persevere; congratulatory courtesies were exchanged; unanimity and good fellowship were the order of the evening, and the Lodge thereby was permanently benefitted. Under present arrangements, the absence of these visits is seriously felt by country Lodges; and the office of D. D. G. M. has become merely one of empty honor, without either usefulness or necessity to commend its continuance."

Clause 2.—I am pleased to report that reduced fares on all the leading lines of Railways and Steamboats have been secured and certificates issued, and the courtesy of the several managers duly acknowledged.

Clause 3.—As soon as possible after the close of last session, I called for tenders for printing the Journal of 1878, as required by resolution, page 139. The Brant Union being the lowest, and deemed otherwise satisfactory, I accepted it, and I regret very much that the work was not turned out as promised by the contractor. The proof sheets were as good as on other years, and I had no hesitation in accepting the work as satisfactory, and was not aware that the work was so poorly done until a number had been sent out. The delay in getting them made me anxious to have as little delay in issuing them as possible, therefore I did not take the precaution of examining them before accepting. The Journal was delayed very much, owing to a garnishee being served upon the officers, and it was not without some

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trouble and expense that the garnishee was overcome. I trust that in future all trouble such as the above will be avoided.

Clause 4.—A number of Lodges have submitted their By-laws for approval, each of which I have promptly transmitted to Bro. W. A. Rawlings, of the Committee on Laws of Subordinates, by the direction of the Chairman of that Committee. They have been read and returned without unnecessary delay, and as promptly forwarded to the respective Lodges. When Lodges find delay in receiving their By-laws, they can invariably trace the cause to their own neglect or carelessness, as frequently By-laws are received in almost every shape except that required by the law which requires them to be sent for approval, viz: only one copy, not certified by the proper officers, nor the seal of the Lodge attached. Very little care would prevent the recurrence of these errors and delays.

Clause 5.—With the year 1880 this Grand Lodge will have completed its first quarter of a century, and I believe has established itself amongst our people as a society, entitled to our highest and best considerations, and has enlisted the co-operation of many of our best citizens. I believe that some extraordinary affair should be gotten up to celebrate the event, and would suggest as one of many suitable features that may present themselves, that the Grand Lodge of the I. O. O. F. be invited to hold its annual session of 1880 in Ontario, when a monster gathering of the members of the Order could be arranged for, and without doubt such an event would give us an impetus that would be felt throughout the entire jurisdiction.

Clause 6.—The semi-annual abstract from the Returns of Subordinate Lodges for the term ending 31st December, 1878; also the annual return to the R. W. Grand Lodge of the I. O. O. F., was made up and sent out as early as the tardy receipt of the returns would allow, though that was much later than I would have desired, but I thought it better to wait a while and have the return complete than send it sooner and only partially so. These continual delays of officers of Lodges in transmitting their returns are vexatious, and really unnecessary.

I think a mistake was made when the penalty attached to Lodges for being so tardy in sending their returns was removed. There is no object in a Lodge being prompt, when those Lodges which, without the least cause, delay their returns so much as a few always do, and cause so much trouble, get as much credit and suffer no more inconvenience than those Lodges which are more prompt. Some penalty should be attached to delinquents after a certain date, especially for the returns of term ending 30th June, as from these depend the accurate and complete information to be given to the Grand Lodge at its annual session.

Clause 8.—The fine imposed against Napanee Lodge, for delay in transmitting their returns last year, has been remitted, it being clearly shown that the Lodge was in no way responsible for the delay, the return and tax having been duly given to the D. D. G. M., the proper officer of the Grand Lodge. Your approval is asked for this.

Clause 9.—I fear that many representatives to this Grand Lodge have but an imperfect conception of the duties devolving upon them, in accepting that honorable position, as many of them attend our annual sessions year after year, witness its working, renew old associations, form new acquaintances, and have a good time generally, then return to their homes and Lodges, satisfied that their duty to their constituents has been performed, and unless some Brother should ask for information on matters he knew were to come up for consideration, the Lodge would never know that it had been represented at all, I believe that every representative should be required by law to make, within two weeks of his return from the Grand Lodge, a report of its proceedings, more particularly of any changes in the laws, and decisions on questions submitted; and also instruct in the secret work. Were this done Lodges would be better posted than many of them seem to be; the members would take more interest in the Lodge, and greater prosperity would doubtless be the result. What would be the opinion of this

Grand Lodge if our representatives to the Grand Lodge of the I. O. O. F. should return from the annual session of that body without submitting a report of its transactions; and surely that which is the duty of our representatives should reasonably be expected by subordinate Lodges.

Clause 10.—Lodges are frequently writing for information as to the benefits to be derived from incorporation; if they can hold property and how much? I would suggest the advisability of issuing a circular containing all the information—compiled from the Acts—that can be asked for by these Lodges, many of which are not located where access can be had to the Statutes, and if they were, they would require more information than a mere reading would give.

Clause 11.—No reports have been received from Trenton, Charity, Capital, Riverside, Cookstown, or West Lorne Lodges. I have written to the D. D. G. M.'s and Secretary of each repeatedly, but can get no reply—or very unsatisfactory ones.

Capital Lodge, I learn, has sold its regalia, &c. to the new Lodge at Beamsville, getting cash for the same—though they have not as yet paid for it—Bro. White having written me lately, stating that fact. This course certainly deserves censure, to say the least.

Being on a visit to Oshawa lately, I took the occasion of visiting Charity Lodge No 129, at Sunderland. I could find but one member, all the others being at the time out of the village. From letters received from Bros. Moore and Lucas, I was led to believe that the Lodge was virtually defunct, though they hoped that with a renewal of trade members would pay up arrears, and continue on the Lodge. They had a very nice hall, good regalia and furniture, but were unable to keep the Lodge together. They had an opportunity of selling their furniture and letting their hall to another Society, and as there did not seem to be the least prospect of their resuming, I advised that they sell the things named, and surrender their regalia, funds, charter and books, &c., and ask for cards, which they could deposit, for the most part, in Manilla. Since my return I have not had a word from them.

In regard to Riverside Lodge No 145, Bro. W. D. Gordon, at the M. W. Grand Master's request, visited Iroquois and got the charter and books, which he returned to me. A memorandum of goods received is on file.

I received from Bro. Chas. McLellan, of late Trenton Lodge, the effects of that Lodge, a schedule of which is on file. Also cash \$5, being the balance of funds realized, after paying existing debts. Bros. Osborne and Titus, being clear on the books of the Lodge, asked for cards, which, by direction of the Grand Master, were granted. Bro. McLellan also asked for a card, and said he was good on the books, but the books showed otherwise, therefore the card was not given. Inasmuch as Bro. McLellan has so promptly delivered up all the effects of the Lodge, I would request that a card be granted, taking it for granted that his statement as to his dues being paid is correct.

Clause 12.—The card ordered to be given to Bro. G. W. Morgan, of late Elgin Lodge, at the last session, was duly issued. Inasmuch as none of the books of that Lodge are at hand, I could only fill up the card that the Bro. was a member of the Initiatory Degree.

Clause 13.—Agreeably to the reports of the Committee on Printing, page 138, I issued a circular to the Lodges, asking for subscriptions to the reprint of the entire proceedings of this Grand Lodge from its in-

stitution. The required number having been subscribed for—300—I asked for tenders for the reprint of 1000 copies, and received tenders from Messrs. Hunter, Rose & Co., Brant Expositor, and the Brant Union. Bro. M. D. Dawson, of the Herald, would have tendered, but for the misfortune of having his office destroyed by fire just at that time. The tender of the Expositor being the lowest, and in every way satisfactory, I gave them the contract, and at once prepared the copy. The first estimate of the cost of the work led me to believe that we could not sell it for less than \$3.50 per volume, at which price the Committee on Printing in its report on page 139 limited it, but upon receiving tenders, it was found that the work could be completed and delivered at a much less price, viz.: bound in cloth, \$1.75; half-law sheep, \$2.00, and full-law, \$2.50; the price thus coming below our estimate, it was decided to have a better paper than first estimated for, include pictures, &c., which will advance the several prices above named, 25 cents each volume, but its value more than that amount enhanced. I am pleased to report the work in a fair way for speedy completion, and its appearance is in every way satisfactory. Some 500 pages are complete, including the year 1871. Upon consultation with the Committee on History, it was decided to have the early history of the Order, upon which that Committee was engaged, preface the reprint, and after conferring with the M. W. Grand Master, it was decided to embellish the work with the portraits of Bros. W. B. M. Hartley, Thos. Reynolds, and Wm. Bissell. Past Grand Masters, who each took very prominent parts in regard to the progress of the Order in its early days; and inasmuch as we owe very much of our prosperity to the labors and diligence of our Past Grand Masters, I would respectfully suggest that this Grand Lodge show its appreciation of their labors by having the portraits of all of them in the reprinted Journal; not necessarily all at once, but two or three each year, as may be deemed best. And to further enhance its value, it was decided to request Lodges which own halls to send 1,000 copies of the pictures of the same, one copy to be inserted in each book. I am pleased to say that the following promptly responded, and their beautiful halls occupy a page in our work, viz.:—Frontier Lodge No. 45, Eastern Star Lodge No. 72, Orient Lodge No. 134, Lodges at London, and Avon Lodge No. 41.

I trust those Lodges which have not as yet responded, will now see the wisdom of following the example of the Lodges named, and thus perpetuate their public enterprise by placing in this book a picture of their halls. It was found impossible to get the work completed in time for delivery at this session, as we had hoped to have done. I have, however, had one copy bound up (as far as the work is complete), one in each style of binding, which is now here for inspection, and any suggestions that may be offered. It is intended to have a full index, and tabulated list of Lodges, Officers, &c., as an appendix to the first volume. Inasmuch as it will make too large a volume to include all the years up to date into one volume, with the History added, I would suggest that Vol. I be completed with the year 1875; that only 500 copies of the years 1876, '77, '78 and '79 be printed and bound up as Vol. II, and sold at the regular advance as other supplies, and that hereafter say 800 extra copies of the Journal of each year be printed and stored away for binding when sufficient shall be had for Vol. III.

Your approval of my action throughout this matter is asked for,

as all changes from original plans have been done only upon consultation with the Grand Master and other prominent brothers.

Clause 14.—After repeated ineffectual efforts to get word from Tecumseh Lodge No. 182, at Otterville, which had not sent in their December returns, I finally got word from their last N. G., that he had removed from the village, and that the Lodge had not had a meeting for some months; whereupon I at once advised the M. W. Grand Master, who instructed me to request Bro. P. Campbell, D. D. G. M., of Tilsonburg, to go to Otterville and ascertain the exact situation of affairs, and, if deemed advisable in the interests of the Grand Lodge, to close up the Lodge and forward its effects, charter, &c., to me. He adopted this course, and sent me the effects of the Lodge; but some time after I received a visit from a deputation of the late Lodge, who desired to have it re-opened, and said that it was not their intention to have it closed, but that the times were against them, yet they had every reason to believe that they could now go on to success. I reported the facts to the Grand Master, who instructed me to return their charter and effects, which I at once did, sending them to Bro. N. B. Bowman, D. D. G. M. I have since received the returns for both terms, with capita tax in full, though Bro. Bowman reports that the Lodge is not progressing as well as he could wish.

Clause 15.—With a view to aid in the intelligent discussion of the question of Dues and Benefits, which is now attracting the attention of the Order to so great an extent, I have compiled a number of tables showing the rate of sickness and death amongst our members for several years past. Lodges cannot pay too much heed to this subject; its importance demands all the attention that careful study can give it. I find that in addition to the regular benefits allowed by some of our Lodges, a certain sum is paid members on the death of their wives; yet I do not see any assessment or portion of dues set apart for such a purpose. The quarterly dues charged to our members, as a rule, is only the sum necessary to warrant the payment of three or three and one-half dollars per week in case of sickness, without providing a fund out of which to pay the large amount of charity which is annually paid out in this jurisdiction, much less to meet the very extravagant "Current Expenses" which some Lodges show. It would seem that these Lodges do not look into the future and see that if they maintain their membership, the time will surely come when they will be entitled, if they should not need, the promised benefits; but if they keep on in the extravagant course they are now adopting, that promised relief will not be forthcoming; instead, a depleted treasury, if not a defunct Lodge, will be the result. It is quite evident that the number of weeks' sickness, as reported by Lodges, is not all the sickness which occurs amongst the membership; doubtless many members take sick who are just enough in arrears to debar them from receiving benefits; others who from other causes never report themselves, and so the exact number of weeks cannot well be arrived at, but these tables will be found accurate enough for general purposes:

Clause 17.—A communication, with the report of a Special Committee of the Lodges in London, in regard to amending the laws of subordinate Lodges, affecting the Benefits to Widows and Orphans, is submitted; and though the laws do not require any notice of motion to

amend the Constitution of Subordinates, yet I deemed the subject one of grave importance, requiring the most careful examination of Subordinate Lodges before being acted upon at Grand Lodge, therefore I included the amendments in a circular to Subordinates.

Clause 18.—An appeal, with certified papers, by W. G. Parkhouse, of London, vs. Dominion Lodge No. 48, is herewith submitted.

Clause 19.—The correspondence of the year, which has been very large, is herewith submitted. A number of letters have been written to the Grand Secretary which should have been sent direct to the M. W. Grand Master, inasmuch as they were questions on both law and usage which can only be replied to officially by the Grand Master. I have invariably forwarded the letters to that officer, and only refer to it now with the view to have Lodges understand to whom such letters should be sent, in order to avoid vexatious delays.

Clause 20.—On the 14th November, 1878, I received word of the death of our esteemed Past Grand Master, Wm. Bissell, a suitable eulogy on which event will doubtless be presented by the representatives from his Lodge. I would respectfully suggest the advisability of requiring all Lodges to officially notify the Grand Lodge on the death of any Past Grand, that a suitable memorial announcement may be made in the next annual Journal after such death.

Clause 21.—In December last word was received that a woman was imposing upon the Lodges in the eastern part of the Province, a number having contributed to her assistance. By the direction of the Grand Master, I issued a circular to all the Lodges, warning them against her and all other imposters, and advising, that if but ordinary precautions were adopted, there need be no reason why a Lodge should be imposed upon. We are not a "public charity," that Lodges or members should feel it a duty to assist every tramp who appeals for aid. The deserving needy who have a right to share our means and sympathy, can easily be known; and while Lodges are within such close hail of each other by telegram, the wonder is that a single cent is obtained by these unprincipled imposters.

Clause 22.—Many young Lodges, I believe, suffer from the want of proper By-laws, &c., to govern them from the time they are instituted until such times as, by experience, they are able to get up such a code of laws as may be deemed necessary for them. To remedy this I would suggest that the present Constitution of Subordinates, with the Model Code of By-laws, be printed, and each new Lodge supplied with, say 50 copies, at a slight advance on cost; they would thus have uniform Laws to begin with. The By-laws could be gotten up cheaply, and by getting 500 or 1,000 copies, they would certainly come much cheaper than any Lodge could get up a single hundred for. They could be printed, if thought advisable, on one side of the page only, leaving the opposite page for such amendments as might from time to time be adopted. To this end I have prepared the Constitution and By-laws and submitted them to the Committee on Laws of Subordinates, who will in all probability report on the same at this session.

Clause 23.—In response to the circular asking for contributions to the "Stuart Memorial" Fund, I received (\$108.50) one hundred and eight dollars and fifty cents, and, as promptly as possible, sent the same to Bro. P. Hall Sweet, Grand Secretary of the District of Columbia, whose acknowledgment of its receipt was duly received. The yellow fever scourge, and consequent calls for aid, which occurred just at this time,

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doubtless prevented a larger number of Lodges from responding to the call, many of which sent letters approving the memorial, and regretting their inability to contribute towards it in the meantime. The object is certainly a worthy one, and I trust all Lodges which feel able to do so will yet send in their mite. The details of amounts received are as follows, viz.:

Clause 24.—The Charters for the Lodges instituted last year, ordered to be sent at the last session, were promptly filled up and despatched by express to the several Lodges.

Clause 25.—Agreeably to report of committee, page 85, I prepared a form of register of membership, and sent a number to each Lodge, with a circular asking that they be filled up and returned as promptly as possible. Very many Lodges have replied, though the following have not as yet sent the return filled. Some object, inasmuch as the labor is considerable, and falls upon the Secretary, who requires compensation for the extra labor, which it would seem the Lodges object to. The book, which will be a valuable one, cannot be completed unless all Lodges comply. On account of the failure of the Lodges named to send in their returns, I have not been able to enter up and complete the Register, but will do so as soon as they comply. It will be necessary for some steps to be taken to secure the return from the Lodges named, as follows:

Cl. T. Campbell, P. G. M., from the Special Committee on History, submitted the following Report, which was on motion referred to a Special Committee, consisting of Reps. Hu. Blain, Chas. Packert and James Sutherland.

*To the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario, I. O. O. F.:*

Your Committee, appointed in accordance with resolutions passed at the sessions of this Grand Lodge, held in Kingston and Toronto, respectfully submit the following Report:

Having been authorized at the last session of Grand Lodge to draw on the Grand Treasurer for the means necessary to prosecute the work of collecting material for the early history of Odd-Fellowship in Canada, your Committee commenced operations immediately after the adjournment of Grand Lodge.

As there were no records prior to the organization of the Grand Lodge of Canada West, in 1855, which were available for public inspection, it became necessary for your Committee to enter into a patient and protracted inquiry among the few pioneers of Canadian Odd-Fellowship still living—scarcely any of whom are now connected with the Order. This involved a visit to Montreal and other localities; and an extensive correspondence with persons now resident in Great Britain and the United States, as well as in Canada. The result has been that we have succeeded in obtaining from private sources a large number of books, documents, etc., bearing on the transactions of the Order during the period referred to. Some of these, however, we have been enabled to retain, and have deposited them with the Grand Secretary. Among these are the Minutes and other books belonging to Victoria Lodge No. 6; Ontario, No. 12; Hope, No. 14; Burlington, No. 17; Home, No. 21; Phoenix, No. 22; Industry, No. 25; proceedings of some of the sessions of the Grand Lodge of B. N. A., and of the G. L. of Montreal; Constitutions and Laws of the Grand Lodge of Canada; By-laws and Constitutions of a number of Subordinate Lodges; dispensation for opening the first lodge in Canada, with report of the Special Deputy pertaining thereto; Reports No. 9 and 18 inclusive, together with a quantity of blank forms, letters, papers, etc. The records of Prince Edward Lodge, No. 11, Picton, are in the possession of Bay of Quinte Lodge of that town. A large collection of books, papers, charts, etc., of the Grand Lodge of B. N. A., were received from the old officials of that body; but those from whom they were received stipulated that after serving the purposes of the Committee they should be deposited with the present Grand Lodge of Quebec—which has been done. Some rituals, etc., pertaining to the Patriarchal Order, have been handed over to the officers of the Grand Encampment of Ontario.

In pursuance of their work in making a collection of the material necessary to a complete history of Canadian Odd Fellowship during the years 1845-55, your Committee are pleased to report that the full amount of the appropriation, \$900, has not been required; only \$180 have been expended; a small sum to pay for the results obtained.

Having collected the material, Your Committee proceeded with the other, and no less arduous, part of their work—the compilation of a connected history out of the chaotic mass of books and documents gathered. All of the material at their disposal was carefully read; full notes taken; doubtful points investigated; contradictory statements harmonized; and the result appears in a printed form of some 120 pages. This gives a comparatively full history of the Order throughout British America, from the institution of the first lodge on the 10th August, 1843, to the organization of the Grand Lodges of Canada West, and of the Lower Provinces, in 1855. Your Committee have not confined themselves to a bare record of facts; but have entered into a review of the various questions connected with both the rise and fall of the Order; have given personal sketches of many of the more prominent pioneers; together with a historical notice of all the lodges organized in Canada West, prior to 1855; as the following "table of contents" will show:

The pre-historic years. Lodges in Halifax in 1815 and in 1832; the Manchester Unity in Montreal; the American Order branching out into foreign countries. The first year—1843. John H. Hardie and Geo. Matthews; Prince of Wales No. 1; the Dispensation; Thomas Hardie; Queens No. 2. The second year—1844. Prince Albert No. 8, Hochelaga Encampment No. 1; The Grand Lodge of Canada; Wm. B. Hartley, G. M.; John Hardie in Quebec; Albion No. 4; Provisional Constitution of Grand Lodge; Commercial No. 5; adjourned session of Grand Lodge. The third year—1845. Sessions of Grand Lodge; Victoria Degree Lodge making the Degree work lively; application for Britannia Lodge refused; introduction of the Order into Canada West; Edmund Murney; Victoria No. 6; 'Oriental No. 7; annual session of Grand Lodge; *O. F. Record*; erection of an Odd Fellows' Hall in Montreal; Stadacona Encampment. The fourth year—1846. Grand Lodge Quarterly Sessions; a missionary tour to Canada West; organization of Lodges in Brockville, Kingston, Picton, Cobourg, Peterboro', Port Hope, Toronto, St. Catharines, Hamilton and Cornwall; Canada No. 8; Mercantile No. 19, Royal Mount and St. Louis Encampments; Grand Secretary Hamilton in Canada West; Ottawa No. 20; statistics of the Order; opposition to Odd Fellowship; annual session of Grand Lodge; Grand Master Hamilton and D. G. M. Montfarnbert; independence discussed in Canada and in the G. L. U. S., and approved by the Canadian Odd Fellows; the Grand Encampment instituted; Wellington and Mt. Hebron Encampments; application to the G. L. U. S. for a charter for a Sovereign Grand Lodge of British North America granted. The fifth year—1847. First session of G. L. of B. N. A.; address of Grand Sire Hamilton; Constitution and government of the Order in Canada; Tomfobi Encampment; Phoenix No. 22; the Provincial Grand Encampment; annual session of Grand Lodge; Grand Sire's address; Statistics; Dues and Benefits; the Odd Fellows' Platform; fraternal communications with the G. L. U. S.; Provincial Grand Lodge of Quebec; Wellington No. 23. The sixth year—1848. Beaver No. 24; Provincial G. L. of Montreal; John Dyde, H. E. Montgomerie; annual session of G. L. of B. N. A.; address of Grand Sire; statistics; visit of Grand Secretary Ridgely and P. G. S. Kennedy; communications with the M. U. The seventh year—1849. Signs of weakness; Provincial G. L. of Toronto; xford No. 25; annual session of G. L., B. N. A.; membership of the Order; convention of P. G.'s in Kingston; gloomy prospects. The eighth year—1850. Visit of Grand Secretary Scott to Canada West; condition of the Order in that Province; Provincial G. L. of Kingston; Industry No. 25; session of G. L.; B. N. A.; Christopher Dunkin. The ninth year—1851. The Order in the Maritime Provinces; Acadia No. 26, and Mamberton Encampment; session of G. L., B. N. A.; last address from a Grand Sire of B. N. A.; state of the Order. The tenth year—1852. Canada in the G. L. U. S.; Victoria No. 27; Collapse of the Order; causes of its decay. The eleventh year—1853. Convention in Brockville; appeal to the G. L. U. S.; state of the Order in British America; the G. L. U. S. considers the situation; visit of Grand Sire DeSansure to Canada; G. L. U. S. resumes jurisdiction over B. N. A.; revival of the Order in western district; Wm. Bissell; secession from the M. U. The twelfth year—1854. Institution of Rose No. 26, Chatham No. 29, Eureka No. 30, Morpeth No. 31, Elgin 32, Erie 33; the

Order in Canada East; progress in the Maritime Provinces: Eastern Star No. 34 and Cobequid No. 35; Gore 84. The thirteenth year—1835. Grand Secretary visit to Maritime Provinces; Grand Lodge of Lower Provinces; P. G. M. Ellison's Order under its jurisdiction; collapse of the Order in Canada East; D. D. G. S. McLaren; subsequent revival in 1870, and institution of G. L. of Quebec in 1878; progress of the Order in Canada. Appendix. List of the Lodges in B. N. A. up to 1855; list of Grand Officers of Canada; sketches of Lodges instituted in Canville, Brookville Kingston, Pi-ton, Cobourg, Peterboro', Port Hope, Toronto, Wood-Catharines, Hamilton, Cornwall, Ottawa, Oshawa, Wellington, Lloydtown, Woodstock, Haldimand, Caledonia, Amherstburg, Chatham, London, Morpeth, St. Thomas, Port Burwell, Brantford.

Your Committee have to acknowledge their obligations to a number of gentlemen and brethren for assistance rendered in their researches among the antiquaries of the Order. Among these, deserving of special mention, are H. E. Montgomerie, F. G. M. of London, Eng.; P. G. Sires, C. Dunkin, and K. L. Montzambert; P. G. Masters J. Dyde, A. H. David and Thos. Worthington; P. G. Secretary, Wm. Ewan; P. G., Dr. Barker. Of these now in active service, are P. G. Sec. Frazee and G. Treas. Taylor, of Lower Provinces; Grand Master Lee; Grand Sec. Murphy, and P. G. Sims of Quebec; P. G., Dr. Smith, of Detroit; P. G. M., Fitzsimmons, and P. G.'s J. F. Wood, R. M. M. Patton, T. G. Carson, A. McAfee, of Ontario, and Asst. G. Sec. Ross, of Baltimore.

In conclusion, your Committee would make the following recommendations: 1st. That "the history of Odd-Fellowship in Canada, under the *Old Regimes*" be published as a preface to the revised journal of Ontario, thus adding to the interest of the latter, while at the same time making it a more complete record of the transactions of the Order in this Province. With this object in view it has already been printed on the same quality of paper as the "revised journal," and is properly pagged for the purpose.

2nd. That 50 extra copies be bound separately for complimentary distribution, especially among those who have rendered gratuitous assistance to the work.

Prayer by the Grand Chaplain.

The Grand Conductor and Grand Marshal examined those present and reported them all duly qualified, whereupon the Deputy Grand Master, declared the Grand Lodge, duly open for the transaction of business.

The minutes of the last session, were read and confirmed.

Rep. Jas. Bell, seconded by Rep. Thos. Wiley, moved the following, which was not agreed to:

*Resolved*,—That all speeches, on questions to come up this day, be limited to (10) ten minutes each.

The following was read and stands as a notice, to amend the Constitution.

Rep. Bro. Geo. Digby, of Naomi Lodge, No. 116, gives notice of motion, that at the next meeting of this Grand Lodge, he will move that clause 57 of constitution of this Grand Lodge, be changed so as to read Bi-ennially instead of Annually.

The Roll of Lodges was again called for business, when the following questions were submitted, and referred to the Judiciary Committee: By Samaritan Lodge No. 85, Rep. J. R. Harris:

1st. A N. G. resigns his office, and his resignation is accepted by the Lodge. Is it legal to nominate, elect and instal another officer the same evening?

2nd. A Lodge being without a N. G., is it legal for such Lodge to meet and transact business?

By Constellation Lodge No. 85, Rep. H. J. Woodrow:

A brother applied for a travelling card, which was granted, and he went to the States. While there, he applied to his Lodge for two degrees, which were granted, he paying the fees. He was given a certificate and a letter to the Lodge where he was, asking that they confer the degrees on him. They refused to do so without they got one-half the fees. His Lodge would not agree to this. He came home and has been home about three years, and has not presented himself

to his Lodge for the degrees. Finally he falls in arrears, and is in arrears at the present time. At the last meeting of Constellation Lodge he made a demand on the Lodge for the four dollars which he paid for degrees.

Query—Would the Lodge be justified in applying this degree money on his dues, he being in arrears.

If not, what course would the Grand Lodge recommend Constellation Lodge to pursue, he having made a demand for the money.

By Chatham Lodge No. 29, Reprs. R. M. Patton and J. M. Parsons

To the Grand Master and Right Worthy Grand Lodge of Ontario :

We would respectfully, on behalf of Chatham Lodge No. 29, submit the following question :

Is a brother entitled to the weekly sick benefits under the circumstances following, viz :—He being a Brother in good standing, a farmer living several miles from the town, gets the small bone of his wrist dislocated, which prevents him from attending to all his usual duties, but still able to superintend his business; and able to drive into town. The Brother has been reported disabled, and complied with the Lodge By-laws and presented a surgeon's certificate, stating that he is incapable of manual labor.

The Lodge refused on the ground that he was able to superintend his business, and not laid up; using clause 173 of Digest. Were we right in so doing?

By Past Grand Harrell, of Walkerton Lodge, No. 84.

P. G. Harrell appeals to G. L., I. O. O. F., of Ontario, against the decision of D. D. G. M. Teasdale, of Walkerton Lodge No. 84, on the following: On the first and second nomination nights of last term, three Brothers were nominated for R. S. and two brothers for Per. Sec'y. On election night, June 27th, 1879, after electing N. G. and V. G. the N. G. declares one of the three brothers elected by acclamation for Recording Secretary, stating after he had declared the brother elected, that the other brothers in nomination were not qualified, being in arrears and that the brothers in nomination for P. S. were also not qualified for the same reason, P. G. Harrell challenging his ruling on the grounds that there was no law in Digest or Constitution and By-laws that he could find, preventing the brothers running for the offices, but in case of their not being good on the books of the Lodge when presented for installation, they could not be installed and therefore the brothers were eligible. The N. G. referred the question to D. D. G. M. Teasdale, who gave his ruling as follows:—That he could find no law bearing on the case but that a common sense view of it was that the brothers were not qualified, and his ruling was that the N. G. was right in dropping the brothers off the nomination papers. Upon which decision P. G. Harrell gave notice he would appeal to the G. L. of Ont.

By Albert Lodge No. 194, Rep. E. W. Barton.

Can a member wear his Encampment regalia in a Degree Lodge, or a Rebekah Degree Lodge?

By Minerva Lodge No. 197, Rep. O. S. Hillman:

A Lodge has a By-law (which has been approved) which states that it shall be the duty of the P. S., when any Brother is in arrears to the extent of twelve months to notify him of such fact, and should such communication not be responded to by the Brother, it shall be the duty of the N. G. within one month, to suspend the Brother from all the rights and privileges of the Order.

A member owes dues to the amount of \$7.88 (one year, one month, and one week), notice is sent him by the P. S., that unless such dues are paid within one month, he will be suspended. The brother in arrears does not pay within one month, and awaits further action on the part of the Lodge. The N. G. neglects to suspend him, and in the middle of the third quarter following the brother finds that the Lodge has still kept him on the books and continued charging him dues.

Query—Can a Lodge having such a By-law charge dues against a brother in arrears, for a longer period than 13 clear months? And if charged, owing to the N. G. having failed to perform his duty, can the Lodge compel the brother to pay all of the dues appearing against his name, over and above the thirteen months dues?

**By Dresden Lodge No. 124, Rep. W. Rudd :**

A brother of our Lodge being two years in arrears for dues was suspended and remained suspended for eight months after. The Secretary then (without notifying the Lodge) accepted and placed to his credit a part of said arrears, leaving \$1.50 still due. It then remained until the first of present term, arrears being \$4.50. The brother then handed in to the Secretary, through another brother, balance of dues in full, and was accepted by the Secretary.

Question—Is the Brother a member of our Lodge now, or must he be ballot ed for before he can be reinstated?

**By Waterloo Lodge No. 107, Rep. T. Vair :**

A brother is taken sick while in arrears; he pays up, and is so reported to his Lodge. He is attended by visiting committee and sometime during the 13 weeks in which he is not entitled to benefits, he is found by the committee to be attending as usual to his business and so reported to his Lodge, as well, and his name taken from the sick list. On the day following on which he was reported well he was again attacked by illness and is in that condition at the expiration of the 13 weeks which by the By-laws of his Lodge he was not entitled to benefits. Is he entitled to benefits at the end of 13 weeks, if his second illness is a continuation of his first attack?

**By Samaritan Lodge No. 85, I. O. O. F. :**

A member of our Lodge neglected to pay his dues on the first meeting in the term, he pays on the 15th of January, reported sick on the 12th of February. The By-laws of our Lodge require members to be paid three months in advance, and not entitled to benefits for six weeks after paying their dues after being in arrears.

Query—Is the brother entitled to benefits for the time he is sick after the six weeks have expired?

**The following were referred to the Committee on Legislation :**

**By Georgian Bay Lodge No. 219, Rep. J. C. Arnold :**

Is it necessary to cast a ballot when but one candidate is in nomination, cannot candidate be declared elected by acclamation by N. G. without any ballot whatever being cast.

**By Canada Lodge No. 49, Rep. A. W. Reckmeyer :**

A brother of Trenton Lodge applied to our Lodge for admission, he being in arrears to above Lodge at the time they surrendered their Charter.

Question.—How can we admit him?

**By Reps. David Martin and Jas. Richards :**

*Resolved*—That the Legislative Committee be instructed to inquire into and report on the expediency of legislating as follows :  
That where evidence has to be taken from persons who are not members of the Order, such evidence be taken by declaration before an authority competent to take such declaration. The accused being previously notified of the time and place of taking the same.

**By Durham Lodge No. 78, John Frick, N. G. Hugh Walker, Sec. pro tem,**

As the case of Bro. Jas. A. Montgomery has been revived here for his commitment for trial for forgery on his own plea of guilty, Durham Lodge No. 78, Port Hope, desires again to revive its claim for compensation against the Grand Lodge of Ontario, for the losses it sustained during its improper suspension on its petition to the Grand Lodge at the session held in Belleville in August, 1877, and published in the proceedings of that year, see pages 1929, 1990 and 1991, and also on the grounds set forth in the protest given to the D. D. G. M. at the time of the surrender of its Charter, copy of which is in the hands of our representative.

The officers and members of Durham Lodge believe they have not been justly dealt with in the action of the Grand Lodge at said meeting in refusing the prayer of their petition, and respectfully ask a full re-consideration of the subject by Grand Lodge at the present meeting, on the grounds above set forth and other documentary evidence which will be produced by our representative to the Committee this may be referred to.

It is unnecessary to enter into a discussion of the legal aspect of this case, as Grand Lodge at St. Catharines fully sustained the action of Durham Lodge, and we ask now to have added to this endorsement a fair and equitable appropriation to compensate the Lodge for the losses sustained during the period as above set forth.

The following were referred to the Committee on Petitions and Correspondence, viz:—A Circular, Petition from Garland Lodge No. 67, Hot Springs, Arkansas—setting forth at length their difficulties and appealing for aid. Said appeal being sanctioned by the R. W. Grand Lodge of Arkansas.

The following was referred to the Committee on Finance:

W. McGarvin, Rep. of Acton Lodge No. 204, begs leave to petition your Grand body that the fine imposed by the R. W. G. Secretary upon Acton Lodge, amounting to \$6.00, be remitted as the Lodge gave the amount for Capitation Tax and Supplies to the District Deputy Grand Master, who neglected to forward the same at the proper time.

Rep. J. S. McMahon moved to amend clause 88 of the Constitution as per the notice submitted by him at the session of 1878, as follows:

"Rep. J. S. McMahon gave the following notice of motion to amend clause 88 of the Constitution of the R. W. Grand Lodge, viz:

*Resolved*.—That the sum of fifty cents in clause 88, Constitution of this R. W. Grand Lodge, be stricken out, and twenty five cents inserted. And after the session of this Grand Lodge in 1879, all representatives shall be paid their mileage and per diem by their respective subordinate Lodges, the amount of such payment to be regulated by the said subordinate Lodges, and that all legislation in conflict with the foregoing be hereby amended to conform to the above."

Which was not agreed to.

Rep. W. Jaffray moved to amend clause 22 of the Constitution, as per notice given by him at the last session, 1878, viz:

"By Rep. W. Jaffray, of Grand Union Lodge, No. 97:

That I will move at the next Session of this R. W. Grand Lodge, that article 22 of the Constitution of said Grand Lodge be amended by striking out the words which follow the term "Grand Lodge" in the fourth line of such article, and substituting therefor the words, "and within which four or more subordinate Lodges may be in operation."

Which was, on motion, referred to the Committee on Districts.

Rep. James Bell moved to amend the Constitution, as per notice given by him at the session of 1878, viz:

"By Rep. James Bell, of Forest City Lodge, No. 88:

That I will move at the next meeting of this Grand Lodge, that Mileage and Per Diem be paid to:  
1st. Grand Officers;  
2nd. Representatives;  
3rd. The five members of the Committee on the Laws of Subordinates, and to none other."

Which was considered, and resolved in the negative.

Rep. Jas. Bell moved that the Constitution of Subordinate Lodges be amended as follows—which were declared by the chair to be out of order.

Report of a Joint Committee of the Lodges in the City of London appointed to consider and report upon the question of Widows' Benefits, submit the following, viz:—

That in our opinion the present mode of paying Widows' Benefits is not up to the times. And that, however well it may have worked in the past, it is very evident that some change must now be made, otherwise our Order must suffer,

and in fact is now suffering, as the spirit of the age requires us to devise more liberal things.

Therefore, be it resolved that in future all widows and orphans and funeral benefits be abolished, except that made payable to a Brother on the death of his wife, and that the following be substituted:

That upon the death of a Brother not more than six months in arrears, the Recording Secretary shall send a certified notice to the Grand Secretary, who will assess each Lodge in the jurisdiction at the rate of ten cents for each member as per last return.

Each Lodge shall forward the amount so assessed to the Grand Secretary within twenty days.

The Grand Secretary shall forward to the Lodge, of which the deceased Brother was a member, one thousand dollars (\$1,000) within thirty days of the date of the notice.

The amount over one thousand dollars assessed upon the order shall remain in the hands of the Grand Lodge until it shall amount to the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), when the Grand Secretary shall draw upon the Grand Treasurer instead of assessing as before provided.

That upon the death of a Brother not more than six months in arrears to his Lodge, the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) shall be payable to his widow within thirty-five days of the notice of his death, if there be no widow, then to his children if they have attained the age of eighteen years, if the said children have not attained the age of eighteen years, then the said sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) shall be held in trust for them by the Lodge and invested for the benefit of said children until they attain the age aforesaid, the revenue so derived to be paid to said children semi-annually.

Upon the said children coming of age, then the money shall be paid to said children share and share alike.

In the event of their being neither Widow, Children nor Will, then the persons entitled to receive the benefit or money aforesaid shall be the Father or Mother of said Brother.

In the event of there being neither Wife or Child, or Will, or Father or Mother known, as coming within the meaning of the aforesaid specifications then it shall be the duty of the Lodge to advertise once every three months for twelve months, and if no such claimant then appears the said money shall pass to, and become part of the general fund of said Lodge.

In the event of such claimant appearing, then the money shall be handed over without delay, less the amount due by deceased to his Lodge and other necessary expense incurred by advertising, funeral, &c.

All of which is respectfully submitted in Friendship, Love and Truth.

Rep. Hu Blain from the Committee on Finance, submitted the following Report, which was considered and adopted:

HAMILTON, Aug. 15th, 1879.

To the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario, I. O. O. F.:

We, your Finance Committee submit the following:

Clause 7—Grand Master's Report, Officers Bonds—We appreciate the motives of the Grand Master after consultation, in allowing the matter to stand for further consideration, on account of the sum being largely in excess of amount contemplated.

We, however are of opinion that it would be advisable in future to carry out the recommendation of last session, even at an increased premium, and that the amount of the Bonds be regulated annually, and premium paid by this Grand Lodge.

For the current year we would recommend that Bonds be furnished by the Grand Treasurer, in the sum of Six Thousand Dollars, and the Grand Secretary Two Thousand Dollars.

Clause 11.—Relief to the South—We join our Grand Master in his expressions of sympathy with our fever-stricken brethren of the South and recommend to the Grand Lodge the approval of his action in so promptly forwarding the amount

named, and also in causing an appeal to be made to the Subordinate Lodges in this jurisdiction for further assistance.

We therefore move the adoption of the following :

*Resolved*—That the foregoing be adopted.

To the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario, I. O. O. F. :

Your Finance Committee, to whom was referred part of Clause 6 and Clause 7, of the Grand Secretary's Report, submit the following :

Part Clause 6—Receipts Correct; Expenditure—The item of printing Journal, Salaries, &c., \$2433.25, should be \$2533.28; the total amount, \$6635.71, should be \$6735.81 and the balance in hand, \$5879.99, should be \$5779.96.

Clause 7—We are pleased to observe the active and laudable effort of our Grand Secretary in procuring relief for our southern brethren in distress, and his careful attention to the proper acknowledgement of the amount contributed by this jurisdiction. It is gratifying to know that the Subordinate Lodges responded so liberally to the call for aid.

With regard to the balance of \$105.90, in the hands of the Grand Secretary, we consider this amount too small to be returned to the contributing Lodges, and recommend that it be retained by this Grand Lodge, and placed to the credit of an account to be known as the "Subordinate Lodge Contribution Relief Fund," to be used in cases similar to that for which it was originally subscribed, and we would also advise that in future all similar contributions should be placed to the credit of this fund. Heretofore, all voluntary contributions by Subordinate Lodges have only appeared in supplementary reports, and not in the general statement of receipts and disbursements of this Grand Lodge. We find a typographical error in the amount received, \$1561.90, which should be \$1580.90.

J. Ham Perry, P. G. M., from the Committee on Appeals, presented the following Report, which was adopted :

HAMILTON, Aug. 14th, 1879.

To the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario, I. O. O. F. :

PARKHOUSE  
DOMINION LODGE, No. 48.

Bro. Wm. G. H. Parkhouse, a member of Dominion Lodge, was entitled to sick benefits, and the N. G. reported to said Lodge that the appellant, Parkhouse, refused a Lodge draft, drawn on the Treasurer, for a portion of said benefits. (On the N. G. making said verbal report, the Lodge by resolution declared that the refusal of Bro Parkhouse to accept of said draft on the Treasurer, "conveyed to this Lodge the impression that the said Treasurer is unworthy the honorable position he occupies," and also "conveyed the idea that the said Bro. Parkhouse had received a grievous injury at the hands of the said Treasurer." "Dominion Lodge therefore, desiring to see justice done to the said Bro. Parkhouse in the said premises, hereby orders and demands from the said Bro. Parkhouse a statement in writing of his complaint against the said Treasurer."

Second—Under the above imperative 'order' and "demand" of Dominion Lodge, the Appellant, Parkhouse addressed a letter to the Lodge, (January 15, 1879), but therein made no regular charge against the Treasurer, or any other person, for the purpose of charge and trial, and disposal thereof by the Lodge.

Third—On the contents and basis of said letter, Bro. Parkhouse "with conduct unbecoming an Odd-Fellow," on twelve distinct specifications therein named.

Fourth—The Trial Committee reported in favor of "severe censure," and on final action of the Lodge the report was amended, and Bro. Parkhouse was "expelled" on the second ballot.

Fifth—Against this action of the Lodge, Bro. Parkhouse, appeals to the Grand Lodge on the grounds.

- (a) That the action of the Lodge was illegal.
- (b) That the trial was unjust and unfair.
- (c) That sufficient time was not given to produce witnesses for the defence.
- (d) That the evidence did not warrant the finding of the Committee and the action of the Lodge.
- (e) That unfair and ungenerous measures were taken to obtain the letter mentioned in the second paragraph of this report, and upon which the charges and specifications were based.

Sixth—Without at this time, giving an opinion as to the mode and manner adopted to draw out from the Appellant, under the 'order' and "demand" of the Lodge of the said letter, your Committee find that the proceedings of the Trial Committee, and the final disposal thereof by the Lodge were "irregular" and "informal."

Your Committee therefore recommend.

First—That the appeal be sustained.

Second—That the case be referred back to Dominion Lodge for a new trial.

Third—That the sum of \$6.00 be refunded by the Lodge to the said Appellant, being the amount paid for copies of the proceedings required for this appeal (see Sec. 64, Constitution of Subordinates).

We therefore submit the following:

1st. That the several actions of the Grand Secretary be approved.

2nd. Your Committee beg to call the especial attention of the members to clauses 1, 11 and 14, and recommend a careful perusal.

3rd. Your Committee think the time has now arrived when uniformity should be had throughout this jurisdiction, and would strongly recommend that an addition be made to the salary of the Grand Secretary, so that his whole time and attention may be secured to the work of our Order, whose duty it will be to visit Lodges (when required, and if time permits), at least once each year, for the purpose of inspecting, correcting, and instructing in the work and procedure of a proper Lodge.

4th. We would further recommend that it be an instruction (to all installing officers) to enforce the law making it imperative for all officers to be thoroughly posted in their work, and have their charges and lectures memorized before installation.

HAMILTON, August 14, 1879.

To the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario, I. O. O. F.

We, your Committee, to whom was referred the several clauses of the M. W. Grand Master's Report, beg to submit as follows:

1. Clause 1—New Lodges.—We approve of the action of the M. W. Grand Master, and direct the issue of Charters to the several Lodges therein mentioned.

2. Clause 2—Condition of the Order.—Your Committee join in congratulating the Grand Lodge on the encouraging condition of the Order in this Jurisdiction, and think the remedy for keeping up our strength will be met by the suggestion in the report of this Committee on the clauses of the Grand Secretary's Report submitted to them.

3. Clause 3—Visitation.—We are glad to learn of the visits made by the Grand Master to different Lodges, and approve of these visitations being made as often as possible, as they tend to have a beneficial effect on the Lodges visited.

4. Clause 4—Change of Name.—We join in congratulating this Grand Lodge on the change of name of the Supreme Grand Lodge, and the thanks of this Grand Lodge are due to our Grand Representatives for their continued exertions in this matter.

5. Clause 5—Grand Lodge of Quebec.—We join in welcoming our sister Grand Lodge, and hope that every success will attend them in extending the Order in our Dominion.

6. Clause 10—Anniversary.—We approve of the Grand Master's action in this matter.

7. Clause 13—Duplicate Charters & } We also approve of the action of the  
Clause 14—Cards Granted— } Grand Master as stated in these clauses.

8. Clause 15—District Deputies.—We are sorry to learn that so few District

Deputy Grand Masters have sent reports to the Grand Master, and believe that the present system of appointing D. D. G. M's., when there is no Grand Lodge Instructor or Inspector, is a wrong one, and that the recommendation to appoint such Inspector mentioned in our Report to Clauses of Grand Secretary's Report should be carried out.

9. Clause 16—Charters Surrendered—We regret to learn that these Lodges have been compelled to surrender their Charters, and trust that at some future time they may all be resuscitated, and that in regard to Capital Lodge No. 141, Ottawa, we would recommend that the Grand Master be instructed to visit Ottawa, or if unable to do so, to send a Special Deputy at once to obtain possession of the Charter, and effects of said Lodge.

10. Clause 17—Dedications—We are pleased to learn that so many new Halls have been dedicated by the Grand Master during the past year.

11. Your Committee desire to accord great praise to the Grand Master for his labors during the past year, believing that he has done his utmost to advance the interests of our Order.

Resolved—That the foregoing be adopted.

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Rep. W. H. Blight, from the Committee on Returns, submitted the following Report which was adopted.

*To the Right Worthy Grand Lodge of Ontario, I. O. O. F. :*

Your Committee beg to report that they have carefully examined the returns, of the several Subordinate Lodges, for the terms ending Dec. 31st, 1878, and June 30th, 1879, and find errors and omissions as follows:—

Bröck Lodge, No. 9. The return for June 1878 shows 181 members, but the Secretary has carried into the next report 182 without giving any reason therefor. Membership is 117, not 118 as reported. Neither return signed by the D. D. G. M.

Phoenix, No. 22, no seal, December 1878.

Chatham Lodge, No. 29. The return claims that there is an error of 7 but does not give the names or any particulars.

Eureka, No. 30, no signature, D. D. G. M., December and June.

Gore, No. 34, no signature, D. D. G. M., December 1878, and no signature, N. G., V. G., D. D. G. M., and no seal, June, 1879.

Samaritan Lodge, No. 35, return of December 1877, report as suspended, 14, but only give the names of 13, consequently their membership is counted one too small; present membership is 140, not 139 as reported.

St. Mary's Lodge, No. 36, no signature D. D. G. M., June 1879.

Mount Zion Lodge, No. 46, no signature, D. D. G. M., December 1878.

Unity Lodge, No. 47, no seal, June 1879.

Dominion Lodge, No. 48, no signature, D. D. G. M., December and June.

Otter Lodge, No. 50, report 6 members as suspended, but same six were suspended last report, therefore, the membership is 107, instead of 101 as they have initiated, 2; reinstated, 1—total, 123; from which deduct suspended 6; present membership, 117, not 116 as they report.

Fidelity Lodge, No. 55.—Return of June 1879—membership per last report, 120; membership, 117, not 116 as they report.

Queen City Lodge, No. 56, no signature, D. D. G. M., Dec. 1878.

Friendship Lodge, No. 65, report 103 from face of ledger, which if correct will please state where error occurred, to the Grand Secretary.

Eketer Lodge, No. 67—Return of June 1878, shews 55 as present membership, but in December 1878 they carry in as membership per last report, 63; the present membership is 59, not 62 as reported.

The Toronto Lodge, No. 71. In the report for June 1878, two brothers appear as "Deceased," but only one is carried into the summary. The membership should be 87 not 88.

Bothwell Lodge, No. 74—Return of June 1878—Membership per last report, 49; should have been 50; this error has gone on ever since.

Warriner Lodge, No. 75, report 22 as suspended, but two of them were suspended and counted out in previous returns; also, they report 1 as withdrawn by card, but do not give his name; the present membership is 84, not 80 as they have it.

Nipissing Lodge, No. 79—Return of June 1877, report 1 as error in last return, but do not state the name or particulars; error has been carried forward ever since the membership is 72, not 71 as reported.

Belleville Lodge, No. 81—Return of December 1878, report 14 as dropped, 11 of which were suspended and counted out in former returns. Membership per last report 181; initiated, 8; admitted by card, 1—total, 140, from which deducted 1, expelled 1, suspended 15—membership, 123. Return of June 1879—Membership per last report, 123; initiated, 9; admitted by card, 1; reinstated, 6—total, 139, from which deduct suspended 3, withdrawn by card 3; present membership is 138.

Beaver Lodge, No. 82, no signature, D. D. G. M., Dec. 1878; not signed by N. G. or V. G., 1879.

Clinton Lodge, No. 83, no seal.

Walkerton Lodge, No. 84—Return of June 1877—Report as withdrawn by card, 1, but do not carry it into the summary. Membership then should be for next return 59, not 60. Return of December 1878, carry in as membership per last return 70, should have been 66, and in return of June 1879, do not carry in any number as membership per last return, but foot up the summary as 64; should be 71. Present membership is 71, not 64 as they report it.

Constellation, No. 85—Return of June 1878, counts one member suspended but gives no name. Would recommend the Lodge to give the name, as it is particularly essential to the interests of the Order that names of all suspended members be given.

Napanee Lodge, No. 86, no V. G. signature, June 1879.

Olive Branch, No. 88, no seal, December 1878.

Milton Lodge, No. 92—They report the names of two as admitted by card and only count 1 in the summary. The present membership is 88, instead of 87 as they report it.

Western City Lodge, No. 93. In the report for June 1876, appears suspended—3 brothers returned as ceased for N. P. D., but were not previously reported—thereby showing their present membership to be 41 not 44.

Nith Lodge, No. 96, no seal, June 1879.

Minto Lodge, No. 98. The return for December 1878 shows 1 admitted by card in the summary, but the name has been scored out of its column. June 1879, 4 are shown as expelled for N. P. D., 2 of them were suspended in December 1878 and 1 in June 1878, and all 8 counted out. Only one should have been reported and he as suspended not expelled.

Dosoronto Lodge, No. 102, no signature, D. D. G. M., June 1879.

Cataract Lodge, No. 103—Return of June 1877, shows the present membership as 49, but they only carry 48 into next report. Return of June 1879, give names of 4 members suspended, but one of these was suspended and counted out in the return of December 1878. The present membership is 44, not 42 as they report it.

St. Clair Lodge, No. 106—Return of June 1878, report as present membership, 79, but carry 82 as membership per last report in December 1878; the same error is carried in the return of June 1879. The return of June 1879, has no particulars or seal. Present membership is 77, not 80 as they report it.

Royal Oak Lodge, No. 108—Return of June 1878—Wm. Oak was suspended and counted out, and in return of December 1878, he was entered as expelled for N. P. D., and again counted out, this error of 1 has been carried on ever since. The membership is 67, not 66 as they report it.

Harmony Lodge, No. 115, no signature of D. D. G. M., December and June.

Naomi Lodge, No. 116—Return of June 1875, report 44 present membership, but carry into December 1875, 45 as membership per last report, and show but 45 members in December 1875, but carry 49 into next report. Present membership is 39, not 43 as stated.

Maitland Lodge, No. 119, report as suspended in December 1874, and not counted out, and 1 as suspended in June 1876, and not counted out, this error of 2 has been carried all the way up to date. The membership now is 61 instead of 63 as they report it. No names of officers elected, and not signed by D. D. G. M.

Palmerston Lodge, No. 123—Return of Dec. 1877, report as membership per last return 63, should have been 62. Return of June 1878, carry in 44 as membership per last return which should have been 45. Present membership is 56 not 54 as reported. Not signed by the D. D. G. M. in June 1879.

Dresden Lodge, No. 124—Return of June 1879, report 6 as expelled, 8 of which were suspended in December 1878, and counted out, and 1 in June 1878, they should only report 2 as expelled. Present membership is 76, not 72 as reported.

Livingston Lodge No. 180. Return of December 1877, report as present membership 193, but in report of June 1878 they carry as membership per last report 191, making an error of two. Present membership is 168 not 166 as they report it.

Orient Lodge, No. 184. Returns of December 1876 carry in as membership per last report 77, should have been 80 as per returns. In return of December 1878 report 7 suspended, 1 withdrawn (Martin Engell) but only count 7 out, return of June 1878. Membership per last report should be 72.

Peaceful Dove Lodge, No. 135. Returns of June, 1878, report as membership per last report 55, initiated 2, total 57, from which deduct withdrawn by card 1, suspended 8. Membership 48. In returns of December, 1878, they report as membership, per last report, 46, which should have been 48, leaving an error of 2 in membership. Also in return of June, 1879, they give six names of members as suspended, and only count out five. The present membership is 46.

Cobourg Lodge, No. 136. The December return of 1878 show 6 initiated, but 7 are entered into the summary. Error of 1 which is carried into the June return. Present membership is 55 not 56 as reported by the Secretary.

Concord Lodge, No. 142. The return for June 1877, shows membership 42, but they carry into the next return 41, without giving any cause for the lesser number. Membership is 45 not 44. No names of officers elected in December, 1878.

Ridgetown Lodge, No. 144. The return for June 1875 shows 43 members, but by a mistake 45 is carried into the December return as membership per last report. This error has been carried into the returns ever since. Membership should be 58 not 61 as reported.

Model Lodge, No. 147. The December 1874 return of this Lodge shows 1 more member than was shown in the previous return. Error carried on ever since. December 1878 they report 5 as expelled for N. P. D., but 4 of the same brothers were reported as suspended in June 1878. Present membership is 40 not 38 as reported by the Secretary.

Western Star Lodge, No. 149. Returns December, 1877, report 1 suspended and 1 withdrawn, only 1 counted out. Have carried as membership into next report 77 instead of 76, and have kept that one in error ever since. Present membership 78 not 79.

Bertie Lodge, No. 150. Return of December, 1877, returns show only 54 as membership, but in June, 1878, they carry in as membership per last report 55, and have not yet corrected the error. Their membership should be 62 not 63 as reported by them.

Thamesville Lodge, No. 157. Return of December, 1877, report 2 as suspended, N. P. D., but same two were suspended and counted out in June, 1877, this error of 2 has been carried on ever since. The membership is 31 not 29 as they report it.

Simcoe Lodge, No. 161. Return of June, 1878, reports 5 names of Brothers suspended, but carry 6 into the summary, making an error of 1 in membership. This making their membership 37 instead of 36. Error has been carried into subsequent returns. Present membership is 56 not 55 as reported in the return.

Oriental Lodge, No. 163, no names of officers elected December, 1878.

Romeo Lodge No. 164, no signature, D. D. G. M., June, 1879.

Beethoven Lodge, No. 165, returns of December, 1877, report R. Montgomery expelled, who was suspended in June, 1877, and counted him out twice, error has gone on ever since. Present membership 88 not 87.

Sutton Lodge, No. 168, return of June, 1879, they carry in as membership per last report 47 should be 36. Present membership 36 not 47 as they report.

Alliston Lodge, No. 171, return of December, 1878, reports 1 as expelled, but he was suspended and counted out in December, 1877; error of 1 was continued in next return. Membership is 53 not 51 as reported.

Emerald Lodge, No. 173, returns of June, 1876, shews 33 members, but carry as membership per last report into December returns, 34; 2 ceased and 1 suspended, and only count out 1. Membership, as they have it, 35, should be 33. Return of June, 1879, carry in as membership per last report 32, should be 33. Present membership is 33 not 32.

Dauncey Lodge, No. 176, return as died 1 in the summary but do not give name, age, date or amount paid, no seal on return. Return of December, 1878, carry in as membership per last return 49 should have been 48. Present membership is 23 not 24 as reported. No seal.

Montana Lodge, No. 177, Returns of December, 1878, shew as membership per last report 27, which should have been 30, from which deduct withdrawn by card 1, and suspended 4, which leaves the present membership 25 not 22, as they have it. Not signed by the D. D. G. M.

Wellington Square Lodge, No. 178, no seal, June, 1879.

Madoc Lodge, 179, no signature D. D. G. M., December and June.

Owen Sound, Lodge No. 180, no signature, D. D. G. M., June, 1879.

Teeswater Lodge, No. 185, return 28 as membership, should be 29. Geo. Parr was suspended in December, 1877, and counted out, also returned as expelled in June, 1878, and again counted out.

Cypress Lodge, No. 187, no name or number of Lodge, nor date on face of report, December, 1878; no signature, D. D. G. M.

Chorazin Lodge, No. 190, no signature V. G., June, 1879.

Howick Lodge, No. 192, Returns of December, 1878, they report as membership per last report 33, initiated 1, total 34, from which deduct withdrawn by card 5. Present membership 31 not 33, as they have it.

Florence Lodge, No. 196, returns of December, 1878, report two as withdrawn by card, but do not give the names, and in June, 1879, carry in as membership per last report 28, should have been 30. The present membership is 31.

Silver Star Lodge, No. 202, Returns December, 1878, carry in as membership per last report 21, should be 20, error of 1. Present membership should be 24 not 25.

Beacon Lodge, No. 201, no signature D. D. G. M., December, 1878.

Egremont Lodge, No. 207, no signature D. D. G. M., June, 1879.

Lilley Lodge, No. 211, no signature V. G., June, 1879.

In the examination of the returns, Your Committee have been surprised to find with what carelessness some of the reports have been made, not with a view to the correct performance of a very particular duty, but simply to get the report off their hands.

Further—Previous Committees have been constantly pointing out the same errors, and still they are continued in the reports.

Further—The blank forms are so arranged with headings which render the work simple if even ordinary care is used.

Further—In numerous cases the D. D. G. M.'s are most invariably to blame, as all the returns should pass through their hands, and if having even a local interest in the Lodges and for their own credit, and using the ability they are assumed to have, could have the returns corrected before leaving their hands, thus carrying out the performance of a part of their duty.

Further—The Grand Secretary, in order to have correct returns, has communicated with a number of the Lodges their errors and omissions with a view

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to remedying the matter. We would urge the necessity of the reports being sent in earlier to the above-named officer, so that he can compile his report.

Further—Your Committee would recommend that the representatives of the several Lodges whose returns are inaccurate, are hereby instructed to have the reports of this Committee read in their Lodge. And that they be requested to count the face of the Ledger to ascertain the number of members on the books unsuspended at the end of this half-year, and that to be the basis of the next return so far as members are concerned.

And that the Grand Secretary receive such, as correct, without reference to prior reports. This will then dispense with the tracing up of errors that have crept in regarding members, thus providing against other Committees having to go over the same work from year to year.

To the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario, I. O. O. F. :

Your Committee beg to refer back the subjoined accounts, inasmuch as the constitution of the Grand Lodge precludes the payment of accounts for D. D. G. M. services. (See Journal of Proceedings, 1877, p. 1954.



as follows, viz. :

1st Question of Jas. R. Harris.—A N. G. resigns his office, his resignation is accepted by the Lodge. Is it legal to nominate, elect and instal another the same evening?

Answer.—No. See Sec. 30 and 31, Constitution of Subordinates.

2nd Question, by the same. A Lodge being without a N. G., is it legal for such to meet and transact business?

Answer—Oh, Yes.

1st Question of Rep. Wm. Rudd—A Brother of our Lodge being two years in arrears for dues was suspended and remained suspended for eight months after. The Secretary then, without notifying the Lodge, accepted and placed to his credit a part of said arrears leaving one dollar and fifty cents still due. It then remained until first of present term arrears being four dollars and fifty cents. The Brother then handed in to the Secretary through another Brother balance of dues in full, and was accepted by the Secretary. Question—"Is the Brother a member of our Lodge now?"

Answer—Yes.

2nd Question by the same—Must he be balloted for before he can be reinstated?

Answer—No.

Question of Rep. E. W. Barton—"Can a member wear his Encampment regalia in a Degree Lodge or a Rebekah Degree Lodge?"

Answer—If the Brother is a member of the Degree or Rebekah Lodge he is not entitled to wear said regalia.

Question of J. C. Arnold.—Is it necessary to cast ballot when but one candidate is in nomination? Cannot a candidate be declared elected by acclamation by N. G., without any ballot whatever being cast?

Answer—Yes.

Question of H. J. Woodrow.—A brother applied for a travelling card, which was granted and he went to the States, while there he applied to his lodge for two degrees which were granted; he paying the fees, he was given a certificate and letter to the lodge, where he was asking that they confer the degrees on him. They refused to do so without they got one-half the fees; his lodge would not agree to this. He came home and has been home about three years, and has not presented himself to his lodge for the degrees, finally he falls in arrears, and is in arrears at the present time.

At the last meeting of his Lodge he made demand on the Lodge for four dollars degree money which he paid for degrees. Would the Lodge be justified in applying this degree money on his dues, he being in arrears? If not, what course would the Grand Lodge recommend his Lodge to pursue, he having made a demand for the money?

Answer—The Lodge would not be justified in applying the money on dues; but should hold it for the purpose for which it was paid.

Question of E. F. Kittson, of Minerva Lodge, No. 197.—A Lodge has a By-law (which has been approved) which states that it shall be the duty of the F. S., when any brother is in arrears to the extent of twelve months to notify him of such fact, and should such communication not be responded to by the brother, it shall be the duty of the N. G., within one month, to suspend such brother from all the rights and privileges of the Order. A member owes dues amounting to \$7.58 (one year, one month, and one week), notice is sent him by the P. S., that unless such dues are paid within one month he will be suspended. The brother in arrears does not pay within one month, and awaits further action on the part of the Lodge; the N. G. neglects to suspend him, and in the middle of the third quarter following the brother finds that the Lodge having such a By-law charge dues against a brother in arrears for a longer period than thirteen clear months, and if charged owing to the N. G. having failed to perform his duty, can the Lodge

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compel the brother to pay all of the dues appearing against his name, over and above the thirteen months?

Answer—Yes.—(see page 2046, Journal of Ontario).

Question of Reps. R. M. M. Patton and J. M. Parsons.—Is a brother entitled to weekly benefits under the following circumstances, viz.:—He being a brother in good standing, a farmer living several miles from town gets the small bone of his wrist dislocated, which prevents him from attending to all his usual duties, but still able to superintend his business, and able to drive into town. The brother has been reported disabled, and complied with the Lodge By-laws, and presented a surgeon's certificate, stating that he is incapable of manual labor.

The Lodge refused on the grounds that he was able to superintend his business and not laid up—using Clause 173 of Digest.

“Were we right in so doing?”

Answer—Yes.

We therefore submit the following.

Resolved—That the foregoing report be adopted.

To the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario, I. O. O. F.:

Your Judiciary Committee beg leave to report on the following questions submitted to them:

Question 1st—From Waterloo Lodge, No. 107.—A Brother is taken sick while in arrears, he pays up, and is so reported to his Lodge. He is attended by Visiting Committee, and sometime during the ensuing 13 weeks in which he is not entitled to benefits, he is found by the Committee to be attending as usual to his business, and so reported to his Lodge as well, and his name taken from the sick list. On the day following the one on which he was reported well, he was again attacked by illness and is in that condition at the expiration of the 13 weeks which by the By-laws of his Lodge he was not entitled to benefits. Is he entitled to benefits at the end of 13 weeks, if his second illness is a continuation of his first attack?

Answer—No.

Question 2nd—From Samaritan Lodge No. 35.—A member of our Lodge neglected to pay his dues on the first meeting in the term, he pays on the 15th of January, reported sick on the 12th of February. The By-laws of our Lodge require members to be paid three months in advance, and not entitled to benefits for six weeks after paying their dues after being in arrears. Query—Is the Brother entitled to benefits for the time he is sick after the six weeks have expired?

Answer—Yes.

Your Committee respectfully submit the following.

"Has a brother of a Lodge, not in this city any claim upon this Lodge for watchers in sickness? And can the brethren of this Lodge be required to sit up with such brother, he not being a member of this Lodge?"

Beg to report that in their opinion such brother is entitled to all the care and attention to which a member of Unity Lodge is entitled.

Your Committee on petitions and correspondence, to whom was referred Clause 2, Grand Secretary's Report, relating to the reduced rates by Railway and Steam Boat Companies, beg to congratulate the Grand Lodge at having such an efficient officer as Secretary to make such favorable arrangements with said companies, and recommend that he officially acknowledge the courtesy thus extended to the Officers and Representatives by the Railway and Steam Boat Companies.

Clause 19.—We have examined the large amount of correspondence which has passed through the Grand Secretary's hands, and have pleasure in acknowledging the thoroughly efficient and courteous manner in which that portion of his duties were discharged. We have found the letters and replies sent thereto carefully and systematically arranged. We are gratified at the evidences of continued prosperity contained in the correspondence. Many letters have been sent to the Grand Secretary and Grand Master, requiring information of a character obtainable by reference to the books and papers in possession of Subordinate Lodges, and in view of this fact we would earnestly recommend Subordinate Lodges to avail themselves more fully of the printed information in their possession, in preference to consulting the Grand Officers on questions of a trivial character.

Rep. J. S. McMahon, from the Special Committee on Relief for Widows and Orphans, made the following minority report :—

HAMILTON, Aug. 15, 1879.

To the E. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario, I. O. O. F. :

The Special Committee to whom was referred the matter of advising a better plan of working the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, beg to submit the following minority report :

We have carefully investigated the various modes adopted by Lodges of managing this fund, and the recommendations of this Grand Lodge, from time

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to time in regard to the same. We find that a very large saving could be effected, was this fund to be centralized under the control of one head, not only could it be better invested, but a greater uniformity in the payments would be secured. The Committee believe that the importance of the passage of some scheme similar to this is becoming more and more apparent in this jurisdiction, and the various jurisdictions working under the Supreme Grand Lodge, many of which have taken action in this direction, by approving of some plan of endowment or insurance relief, it is an acknowledged fact that many Lodges under the present system are unable to meet the calls made upon them for relief from this fund, Orphans, so that every member may feel assured that should he leave a widow or orphan at his death, a fund has been provided for their relief. In proposing the creation of a fund of this kind so as to avoid any uncertainty in granting relief to those who may be left after us, we would also recommend that all the widows and orphans now in the Lodges be provided for to some similar extent, shall compromise with them by paying to each family, where there may be a widow or orphan, a lump sum of not less than \$ out of their present Widows' and Orphans' Fund, in lieu of their claim in the Lodge. Those Lodges whose fund is not sufficient to pay this amount shall distribute the whole of their Widows' and Orphans' Fund pro-rata to each family and immediately report to the Grand Secretary the amount so paid, when the Grand Lodge may if desirable increase the amount out of the Grand Lodge Fund as proposed by this scheme to an amount that shall equal the sum above recommended.

We find that a relief of \$500 on the death of a member leaving a family in which there may be a widow or orphan, or a relief of \$250 to a family or im- mediate relative in which there is no widow or orphan, would not tax the mem- bers any more than they now pay into the Widows' and Orphans' Fund of their Lodges, or at any rate the additional amount would be so very small that it would never be felt by them. Assuming that we have a membership of say 15,000 members, then according to carefully gathered statistics by our R. W. Grand Secretary there would be 8,000 between the age of 21 and 30, 5,000 between 30 and 40, and 2,000 over 40 years of age. This would give the following result:

Aged 21 to 30.....	8000	Annual Payment \$2 00 each.....	\$16000
" 30 to 40.....	5000	" " " 2 80 ".....	14000
Over 40.....	2000	" " " 4 00 ".....	8000
15000 Members would pay annually.....			\$38000

Average deaths per annum, 1 in every 176, or 85 deaths to 15,000 members As near as can be arrived at, 60 would leave widows or orphans, or both. 25 would not leave any widows or orphans.

60 deceased members, widows or orphans receive \$500.....	\$30,000
25 deceased members families where there are no widows or orphans, receive \$250.....	6,250
85 families would receive.....	\$36,250

Leaving a surplus of \$1750 each year, which could be carried into a sinking fund to be used for the purpose of reducing the payments out of the general fund during epidemics, so as to average the number of payments for each year.

All Lodges which may desire to become connected with this scheme shall, after a majority vote (of which the members have been duly notified) be that effect signify the same to the Grand Secretary immediately thereafter.

The right to regulate this fund shall be vested solely with this Grand Lodge, three Trustees shall be appointed by the Grand Lodge, who shall give bonds each in the sum of \$— and who shall be invested with power to regulate the receipts and disbursements of all the moneys belonging to the fund subject to the approval of the Grand Lodge. The Grand Lodge shall furnish all blank forms and papers relating to the fund to Subordinate, and make a reasonable charge for the same. Subordinate Lodges which may become connected with this fund shall not be allowed to withdraw from it without the consent of the Grand Lodge, and for any violation relating to the laws that may be made by the Grand Lodge

for the management of this fund, the Lodge so violating shall be subject to such penalty as the regulations require. Every Lodge becoming connected with this fund shall keep a tabulated list of its members according to their age, which will be regulated in the printed instructions to Subordinates—the age to be taken at the time the Lodge unites with this fund—and the age of the members then in the Lodge shall form the basis of all future payments. Initiations and all admitted to the Lodge afterwards, shall be counted at the age when they joined the Lodge, provided they did not previously belong to some Lodge connected with the fund, in which case their age shall be counted as in the Lodge they left.

On the first of every quarter each Lodge shall remit to the Grand Secretary, their contribution to the fund as follows:—

For every member who was in good standing on the first night of the *previous* quarter, between the ages of 21 and 30—60 cents; over the ages of 30 and 40—70 cents; over the age of 40—\$1.00; the age to be at their age next birthday. The Grand Secretary shall immediately transfer the money so received to the Trustees, and the latter shall issue receipts to the various Lodges for the same.

On the death of any member who was in good standing in the first meeting night of the previous quarter, his Lodge shall at once notify the Grand Secretary of the same, and the Grand Secretary will submit the claim to the Trustees who thereto, remit the proper amount to the Lodge to be paid over to the family. On the death of any member qualified to receive benefits and who has left instructions to whom the money shall be paid, if he leave a widow, or any orphan child or children under the age of 21 years, the sum of \$500; but if he leave no widow or orphan child or children under the age of 21 years then the sum shall be \$250, provided always, members shall have power to dispose of the sum so accruing upon their death by will, or any authorized document he may leave with his Lodge regulating how he may wish the sum disposed of. The Lodge may in all cases, if they deem it advisable, expend or become responsible to the extent of \$50, to defray the funeral expenses, deducting the same on receipt of the benefit from the Trustees. We therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

*Resolved*.—That it is expedient to adopt some plan of centralizing the Widows' and Orphans' Fund for the better working of the same.

*Resolved*.—That the plan as foreshadowed in the foregoing report be adopted, and that the Trustees be authorized to prepare a set of By-laws in keeping with the same and all necessary blank forms as soon as possible, and to issue a circular letter to all the Lodges fully explaining the object and working of the fund, and ask them to unite with it.

*Resolved*.—That so soon as fifty Lodges have signified their intention of uniting in the same, the scheme commences in full working order and by the authority of this Grand Lodge.

*Resolved*.—That this whole matter be laid over until the next session of this Grand Lodge, so that all Lodges may become fully acquainted with the scheme.

The Special Committee, who have had under consideration the question of relief to widows of indigent or defunct Lodges, beg to submit the following report:

Lodges that are unable to render any assistance to a member's widow, we would recommend that where widows are actually in a distressed condition, in consequence of the death of her husband, that the Executive Committee of this Grand Lodge shall be empowered to grant from the funds of the Grand Lodge a sum sufficient in their opinion to meet the immediate necessities of such widows.

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## GRAND LODGE OF ONTARIO.

As to the widows of defunct Lodges we cannot recommend any action, further than should any property come into possession of this Grand Lodge, in consequence of any Lodge ceasing to exist, that the proportion belonging to the widows of such defunct Lodges, be distributed *pro rata* between them as soon as can be ascertained what the amounts would be, and we consider that where Lodges cease entirely to exist, that their membership is thereby cut off, and they have in fact no claim upon us.

Your Committee are of opinion that the Local Mutual Aid Association, in connection with the Order, would be a cheap mode of rendering temporary relief at death, and would recommend them to the consideration of the brotherhood. As to the question of relief to the entire widowhood of the Order in our jurisdiction, we do not wish to offer any suggestion at the present time and therefore ask to be discharged.

Rep. James Sutherland, from the Special Committee on the report of the Committee on History, made the following report. which was considered and adopted :

To the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario, I. O. O. F. :  
HAMILTON, Aug. 15th, 1879.

Your Special Committee to whom was referred the Report of the Committee on History, beg to report as follows :—

That they have examined the History of Canadian Odd-fellowship prior to the organization of this Grand Lodge, and find it to be a full and complete record of the transactions of the Order during the period referred to. As the old Grand Lodges, and all of the Subordinates but two, have been defunct for years, and their records mostly scattered and lost, the work of compiling the history at that time has been one of great magnitude. It has however been very effectually performed by the Committee appointed for that purpose.

The Grand Lodge may congratulate itself on being able to issue to the fraternity a history of a period which has been hitherto almost unknown to us. In a few years it would have been impossible to secure the information that has now been obtained.

The Committee on history recommend that the history be published as a preface to the revised journal, and that fifty extra copies be bound separate from the journal, and placed at the disposal of the Grand Officers for complimentary distribution among those gentlemen who have assisted the Committee by giving up such papers, etc., as were in their possession—we would endorse their recommendations, and advise their approval by this Grand Lodge.

Your Committee have also taken into consideration the great anxiety and loss of time occasioned to the members of the Committee during the past year and would recommend that the balance of the appropriation for this purpose, still in the hands of the Treasurer, be handed to the Committee as a slight recompense for their many arduous duties in connection with compilation and preparation of the history.

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EVENING SESSION.

FRIDAY, AUGUST 15, 1879.

The Grand Lodge assembled, pursuant to adjournment, at 7.30, and was opened in regular form.

Present: The Grand Officers, and a majority of the Representatives.

On motion, the calling of the roll of members was dispensed with, and by further resolution the reading of the minutes of the last session was also dispensed with.

Rep. Charles Greenaway, from the Committee on Mileage and Per Diem, submitted several alterations in the mileage account of their report, which were considered and adopted. (These corrections are made in the printed Report of the Committee on Mileage and Per Diem.—GRAND SECRETARY.)

Rep. S. Thorne, from the Committee on Petitions and Correspondence, made the following Report, which was adopted :

To the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario, I. O. O. F. :

We, Your Committee, to whom was referred the following communication of Willey Lodge, No. 21, Paris, Texas, viz.:

To the Grand Secretary of Ontario :

I am requested by our Lodge to write to various Lodges, and other parties to ascertain if a loan of money could be obtained, to assist in extricating itself from embarrassment. We have a lot 84x108, upon which is erected a two story brick building 16x18 feet story, 30x90 feet, valued at \$10,000, upon which we are carrying an insurance of \$5,000 at 1 per cent. per annum. We want to borrow

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\$3,500 for 12 months for which we will pay a fair rate of interest. If you have a Lodge in your jurisdiction, or if you know of any party, that can accommodate us would like to know at once. \$3,500 is all we are owing on the building."

Be leave to submit the following: That the Grand Secretary communicate to the above Lodge informing them that we do not know of any Lodge or parties in this jurisdiction who have funds at their disposal for such investment.

We, Your Finance Committee, to whom was referred the petition of Durham Lodge, No. 78, for compensation for loss claimed to have been sustained as set forth in the matter of appeal by J. A. Montgomery in 1877 would report as follows:

In our opinion the altered condition of the appellant's affairs could not be considered a sufficient reason for opening the matter afresh. This Grand Lodge having taken decided action in this case as required by the circumstances, as they then existed we deem it improper to revive a further consideration of the question.

With reference to Clause 10, Grand Secretary's Report, we would advise that a circular containing a synopsis of the act, and such other information as the Grand Secretary may deem advisable should be sent to the Subordinate Lodges.

The following was read, but was introduced too late to be considered by the Committee.

By Bro. Wm. Brown, P. G.

Article 5, Clause 4, of the By-laws of Livingstone Lodge reads thus:—Such payment (meaning \$1.50 quarterly dues) shall be paid at the commencement of

each quarterly term. Now suppose a Brother dies or is taken sick, he not having paid his dues in advance, and he is not 13 weeks in arrears; should the brother be entitled to benefits.

Article 7, Clause 6, of By-laws reads:—No Brother being three calendar months in arrears for Lodge dues shall become entitled to benefits until six weeks after such arrears shall have been paid up in full unless under special note of the Lodge to that effect. By answering the same you would oblige.

Rep. John Donogh, from the Special Committee on that subject, made the following report which was adopted:

*To the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario, I. O. O. F. :*

We, Your Committee, on Clause 15, and part of Clause 23 Grand Secretary's Report, beg to report as follows:

We have examined with care the tables compiled by the Grand Secretary showing the rate of sickness and death in the Lodges of Ontario during the last two or three years.

We highly approve of his action in this respect, and agree with him that the importance of a correct knowledge of the principles and facts bearing on this question cannot be over-estimated.

We would particularly urge upon Representatives the propriety of pressing upon the attention of the members of their Lodges as soon as possible after their return home, the remarks of the Grand Secretary in reference to the matter of current expenses, special charity, and benefits to brothers on the death of their wives, and as the question of dues and benefits is one of such vital importance and as without these statistics no progress can be made, Representatives should see to it that Lodge Secretary's be induced to aid the Grand Secretary in such ways as he may point out.

We recommend the Grand Secretary to continue his compilations from year to year, and that Lodges be directed to furnish all such information as may be required.

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REPORT  
OF THE  
**REPRESENTATIVES**

TO THE

R. W. Sovereign Grand Lodge of the I. O. O. F.

Session of 1879, held at Baltimore, Maryland.

To the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ontario, I. O. O. F. :

Your Representatives have the honor to report that they attended the annual session of the R. W. Sovereign Grand Lodge, commencing on Monday, the 15th, and closing on Saturday, the 20th September, 1879, and submit the following synopsis of the reports of the Grand Officers and the legislation of that R. W. Grand Body.

The Grand Sire reported the following table shewing the numerical and financial condition of the Order :

DECISIONS OF THE GRAND SIRE.

The Grand Sire made the following decisions during the year, viz :

I. A Subordinate Lodge cannot confer the Degree of Rebekah upon the unmarried daughter or sister of an Odd Fellow of the Fifth Degree, and a widow, who is such daughter or sister, is eligible to membership in a Rebekah Degree Lodge.

2. A Rebekah Degree Lodge can confer the degree upon a member of a Subordinate Lodge who presents the proper certificate, although he does not apply for membership in said Degree Lodge. The right to confer the degree is not taken away by the law of last session. The Annual and the Permanent P. W. of the degree alone are to be given in such case.

3. A brother or sister not a member of a Rebekah Degree Lodge, is not entitled to the Semi-Annual P. W. of that degree, nor can they visit such a Lodge within the jurisdiction to which they belong.

4. The Noble Grand of a Subordinate Lodge, in his capacity as Noble Grand, is not entitled to the Semi-Annual P. W. of Rebekah Degree Lodges. That P. W. is to be given only to members of such Lodges.

5. An elective officer of a State Grand Lodge was suspended for three months in his Subordinate Lodge, after trial and conviction, on charges of "conduct unbecoming an Odd Fellow." To the question, "What was his status in his Grand Lodge?" I answered that his office was vacated, and should be filled in the mode provided in the Constitution of said Grand Lodge, and that he would not be restored to his office at the end of his suspension unless the Constitution so declared.

6. The phrase in the first resolution of 1877 (Journal, 7462), "*who is in arrears for weekly or funeral dues for more than thirteen weeks,*" means "who owes thirteen weeks' weekly or funeral dues." Hence, a brother who had paid his dues to December 31st, 1878, was thirteen weeks in arrears on the 1st day of April, 1879, if he had made no further payment.

7. At the Annual Communication of the Grand Encampment of Indiana, November 26th, 1876, John W. Smith was elected Grand Representative to the G. L. of the U. S., for the term of two years. He was admitted to the G. L. of the U. S. at its session in September, 1877, and remained a Representative until August, 1878, when he resigned. Peter S. Hoffman was appointed to fill the vacancy, and was admitted to the G. L. of the U. S. at its session in September, 1878. At the Annual Communication of the Grand Encampment of Indiana, in November, 1878, David Ferguson was elected to succeed Bro. John W. Smith. The Grand Patriarch of Indiana decided that the term of Rep. Hoffman expired at said Annual Communication in November, 1878, and that Bro. Ferguson's term of office began at the same time. I reversed that decision, and held that the term of Rep. Smith began when he was admitted to the G. L. of the U. S. in September, 1877, and would expire in two years from that time, and that as Rep. Hoffman was appointed to fill a vacancy his term does not expire until the beginning of the session of the G. L. of the U. S. in September, 1879, and that the term of Bro. Ferguson does not begin until he has been admitted to that Grand Lodge as a Representative.—*Journal, G. L. of the U. S., 6959, 6984.*

8. The Grand Lodge of Washington was instituted, and its officers elected and installed, November 26th, 1878. A Constitution was adopted fixing the Annual Sessions on the second Tuesday in May. On May 13th, 1879, new officers were elected for one year, but the Lodge adjourned to June 13th, 1879, for the purpose of installing the officers elect and for other business. On appeal, I decided that the election was void, and that the original officers held until May, 1880; because

between the institution of the Lodge and May 18th, 1879, the major part of the term of Grand Officers—one year—had not elapsed.

9.—The Grand Lodge of Illinois adopted an endowment plan like that reported to this Grand Lodge at the last session, but resolved that it should not go into operation unless the Grand Sire held the plan to be legal and legally adopted. I decided: 1. That no Grand Lodge had power to adopt such a plan until this Grand Lodge authorized it. 2. That the plan was an amendment of the Constitution of the Grand Lodge of Illinois, and could not be adopted without lying over one year. The papers, with my opinion, are filed with the Grand Secretary. As an appeal was taken to this Grand Lodge from the action of the Grand Lodge of Illinois, the whole matter will come up before the Committee on Appeals.

10. A law of the G. L. of the I. O. O. F. takes effect in each State jurisdiction from the time of its enactment, unless the law on its face provides otherwise; or unless, from the nature of the law, it necessarily requires legislation by the State jurisdiction to carry it into effect.

11. A Past Grand member of a Grand Lodge, and in good standing in his Subordinate Lodge, has the right to a seat and vote in his Grand P. W. of the current term.

The above decisions were all approved by the Grand Lodge, with the 6th so modified, that instead of being in arrears on the 1st day of April, he would be after that day.

#### ENDOWMENT.

The subject of "ENDOWMENT" is so pointedly referred to, by the M. W. Grand Sire, that we deem it best to quote at considerable length as follows, viz:

Life insurance, or endowment as it is termed, is attracting attention, and this Body must determine whether that shall become a principle of the Order. Opinions as to its wisdom vary. It has not yet been thoroughly considered. Times have been hard. The age is full of expedients. Men combine and organize for almost everything. For the cure of all diseases physical, mental or moral, there are patents. Men are restless; change is deemed improvement. Some insurance companies spend a large part of their premiums in commissions and unnecessary expenses; others have failed. Hence, Odd Fellows have started mutual aid associations as an adjunct to our system of benefits and charity. Other societies have arisen for the sole purpose of paying an insurance, usually about \$2,000 00, on the death of a member, but nothing as a sick benefit. The money is raised by an assessment of one or two dollars at every death. Most of these societies are young, and they have seemed to work so well that Odd Fellows in large numbers have joined them, and are now proposing to incorporate this feature of life insurance into our Order as a remedy for present apparent decline. My judgment is against this new plan. It is a fundamental change in our system. Fraternity, sick benefits and charity constitute Odd Fellowship. These are mixed up with the daily life of men. They go along with us while we work out our destiny. Fraternity is large and develops the soul; the benefit and charity flow from it like water from a spring. They are ever present, and their influence in moulding character during life is immense. This good will among

men, this care of the sick, this protection of the widow and orphan has bound and will forever bind Odd Fellows together. It is a living power in the heart always beating. As a rule, men are sick many times before they die, and need the aid of their fellows.

Life insurance, on the other hand, is in the future. It has no daily power. It waits for death, and then pays over its money. Which is better for the mass of Odd Fellows, to receive benefits each week when sick, and to be decently buried when dead; or, to get no benefits, no care when sick, but to leave \$2,000.00 at death, clearly the former. The question then is, Can these two different things be united in one system? I think not. Life insurance, in twenty years, would take all the fraternity out of Odd Fellowship, and then, what is left? Sick benefits and charity would soon go. Besides, we cannot carry both systems. Already these societies, which pay insurance at death, are learning that as time passes the assessments are collected with more difficulty. They are necessarily larger than the annual dues paid to our Lodges, and if brothers cease membership in these for non-payment of dues, much more will they cease membership in such societies for the same cause. In short, the mass of men will not pay the money essential to a sound system of sick and funeral benefits and to life insurance in addition.

A singular fact presents itself. Some Odd Fellows say we must add this life insurance to maintain and perfect our Order, and yet these insurance societies are discussing the propriety of adding to their plan our system of sick benefits. Thus early in their history have they found that *weekly sick benefits is the real want*. I predict that if they add to their institution our system of benefits, the one or the other will, in time, be abandoned. I do not discourage these societies. If based on sound financial principles, and covering sufficient territory, they may afford life insurance cheaper than it is now afforded by ordinary insurance companies, but there is great danger of failure through ignorance of the laws which control such institutions. Temporary success is deceptive. Each man thinks his society will survive him, and that is sufficient for his purposes.

#### ENDOWMENT BENEFIT ASSOCIATIONS.

*Resolved*, That the members of the Order in good standing in any or several, or all the Subordinate Grand Jurisdictions, may form themselves into one or more Auxiliary Endowment Benefit Associations upon the following general conditions: The machinery for working the association may be through the Grand Lodges of the respective jurisdictions and the officers of Subordinate Lodges, but no action of said Subordinate Grand Bodies and Lodges under their jurisdiction shall in any way bind the moneys or funds of either Grand or Subordinate Lodges for the purposes of carrying out the provisions which may be adopted by auxiliary endowment benefit associations hereinbefore mentioned. The only obligation the several Lodges shall be under is to secure without incurring pecuniary liability on their part, from their respective officers the faithful discharge of such duties as the said endowment benefit associations may impose upon them. Should two or several Subordinate Grand Jurisdictions desire to establish an auxiliary benefit association on the voluntary plan, arrangements for the same may be agreed upon by the Grand Lodges interested, in keeping with the provisions heretofore stated; and the Grand

Masters and Grand Secretaries of the jurisdictions concerned shall lend all necessary aid, in the way of correspondence, in their power. Any plan for an endowment benefit association, which may be adopted by one or more Subordinate Grand Jurisdictions, may exist and be controlled by such laws as may be sanctioned by the jurisdiction interested, *all within the terms of the provisions conditioned above.*

On the question of ENDOWMENT the Grand Secretary reports as follows, viz:—

Among the many subjects to which the attention of the Grand Lodge is invited at this time is that of "Endowment." A formal and elaborate report detailing a system under the management of the Grand Lodge has been presented, and has been referred to a special committee, under instructions to report at the present session.

This subject is all absorbing, and has awakened much interest in the Order on both sides. It has occupied public attention for several years, and is worthy of serious notice as one of great attraction to all beneficial societies, which are peculiarly concerned.

Endowment *per se*, considered as a source of capital, or means of wealth, is not very generally understood, as an abstract or independent proposition. The life policy is the pabulum or capital employed, for which a tax is paid, which represents the real capital. This capital it is proposed shall be managed by the Grand Lodge with its appropriate machinery and present officers, thus complicating the business of the body with the details of commerce, and its natural contingencies and business dangers.

#### GENERAL CORRESPONDENCE.

Several Grand Secretaries have expressed their views of the endowment plan, whose opinions will be found under the head of "General Correspondence." There has also been received in connection with this subject the detailed proceedings of the Grand Encampment of Maryland in circular form, transmitted by that Grand Body to every jurisdiction, challenging the measure of "Endowment" and protesting against its introduction into the Order, as fraught with danger to the institution, intimating insolvency and other business complications as likely to ensue from it. The paper, which is able and temperate, as herewith submitted by the Grand Secretary for what it is worth by way of information on the subject. He abstains from discussing the question; having been referred to a special committee, it is due to that committee to calmly await its report on the important subject, and to candidly consider it in all its bearings.

The Grand Secretary without having any special feeling on the question is desirous of shedding every practical light on so vital a matter, satisfied as he is, that nothing contributes more to the general prosperity than a solid and reliable system of finance. Opinion is greatly divided on this endowment question; and great care and prudent deliberation are therefore required to educe the truth from error.

The Order owes much of its prosperity and general health in the past, to its solid and reliable system of finance. Nothing is truer than that the general prosperity of an institution is connected with solid life and power and intimately associated with them. The finances therefore must be regarded as the life blood of our institution.

The Report of the Grand Treasurer shows the financial affairs of the Grand Lodge in a healthy condition.

The Report of the Grand Secretary contains extracts from the communications of the several Grand Secretaries and Scribes showing a decidedly more hopeful condition of the Order throughout the globe than for some few years past.

DUTIES OF SCRIBES AND SECRETARIES.

The following Reports and Resolutions embracing matters which it is thought necessary to bring more particularly under the notice of the members in this jurisdiction, were adopted.

"The Committee on Patriarchal Affairs respectfully report the following statement and resolutions :

STATEMENT 1. It has become quite common for Secretaries of Lodges to omit notifying Encampments of the suspension of members belonging to Encampments.

2. It is common for Scribes of Encampments to omit giving the cause of the suspension of members in their reports to the Grand Encampment.

3. It is also common for Scribes to omit informing Lodges of the admission of their members into the Encampment.

*Resolved*, That Grand Lodges be and are hereby directed to require Secretaries of Lodges to keep a register of the members of their respective Lodges who are Patriarchs of Encampments, and also to report to said Encampments respectively whenever a member of the same is suspended.

*Resolved*, That Grand Encampments be and are hereby directed to require the Scribes of Encampments to notify each Lodge whose member becomes a Patriarch on admission to the said Encampment, in order to promptly transmit, one to the other, reciprocal official notifications."

"The Committee on the State of the Order to whom was referred the question presented by Rep. Haskins, of New York, which is as follows :

Is it lawful for an Encampment to appropriate money from its regular funds for music at the funeral of a Patriarch ?

Your committee beg leave to answer No.

PERMISSION GIVEN TO UNITE WITH OTHER SOCIETIES.

"The Legislative Committee, to which was referred the resolution of Rep. Fessenden, of Massachusetts on the subject of allowing the members of the Order to connect themselves with the "Manchester Unity," have the honor to report that, in its opinion, the I. O. O. F., though its many excellencies and the devotion of its members to the broad and good principles of the Order, possesses a firm basis upon which to stand, and needs no protection in the way of prohibitory laws, with reference to joining other societies or associations, and consequently offers and recommends the adoption of the following resolutions, to wit :

*Resolved*,—That the members of the I. O. O. F. may unite with any society or association whatsoever, without severing their connection with the Order.

*Resolved*,—That all laws inconsistent with the above resolution be and the same are hereby repealed.

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*Resolved*,—That the foregoing resolutions shall take effect from and after their passage.

TEMPORARY ABSENCE.

The Committee on the State of the Order, to whom was referred the communication from the Grand Lodge of Rhode Island, concerning the interpretation of the words "temporary absence" occurring in the charges to the Right Supporters of the Noble Grand and the Vice Grand in the installation ceremony of the officers of a Subordinate Lodge, beg leave to report :

That in the opinion of your committee the words "temporary absence" as used in the charge to the Right Supporter of the Noble Grand, in the ceremony of installation of the officers of a Subordinate Lodge, must be taken to mean the absence of the Noble Grand from his chair merely, while he still remains in the lodge room or ante-room, which under the law constitutes a component part of the lodge room. Whenever the Noble Grand leaves the lodge room then the duty of occupying his chair devolves upon the Vice Grand.

And a like construction of the words "temporary absence" applies to the language of the charge to the Right Supporter of the Vice Grand.

PERMISSION TO MAKE TERMS ONE YEAR.

The Legislative Committee, to whom was referred the proposition of Reps. Miller, of New Jersey; Walton, of Oregon; Stebbins, of New York; and Pearce, of Florida; would beg leave to report that they see no objection to the legislation proposed, and therefore report the following :

*Resolved*, That State Grand Lodges are hereby authorised, in their discretion, to make the term of office in their Subordinate Lodges, one

AGED AND INDIGENT BROTHERS NOT ENTITLED TO BENEFITS.

Your Committee have considered the following submitted by Rep. Leech, of Iowa, viz. : "Do the laws of the Order provide that weekly benefits shall be paid to 'aged and indigent' brothers, as a right, the same as those who become disabled from following their usual occupation by sickness or accident? Or, is the question left to the several Subordinate Lodges to regulate the same for themselves, according to their several means or dispositions?" and beg leave to report that under the laws of the Order "aged and indigent" members are not *per se*, as a matter of right, entitled to benefits.

ERASING NAME FROM A CHARTER NOT ALLOWED.

The Judiciary Committee, to whom was referred the following question, submitted by Rep. Perry, of Ontario, to wit :

"If between the time of the institution of a Subordinate Encampment and the granting of a charter therefor, one of the petitioners for the warrant is expelled from the Order, can the name of said expelled applicant be omitted from the charter on the request of the Subordinate Encampment with the approval of the Grand Encampment?"

Beg leave to report that the charter of a Subordinate Encampment being a confirmation of matters of record as contained in the warrant it is not within the province of a Subordinate or Subordinate Grand

Body to change or vary the record of facts contained in said warrant when the charter is issued.

DEGREE OF REBEKAH.

The Committee on the Degree of Rebekah, to whom was referred the preamble and resolution of Rep. Sheppard, of Pennsylvania, which is as follows :

WHEREAS Subordinate Lodges are empowered, under their charters, to confer the Degree of Rebekah, but under recent legislation are restricted from conferring said degree upon certain classes that are, by law, entitled to receive it; therefore, in order that the chartered rights of said Subordinate Lodges may be fully recognized, be it

*Resolved*—That Subordinate Lodges be, and they are hereby authorized, to confer the Degree of Rebekah upon all persons that are qualified by the laws of the Order to receive said degree, and that all laws inconsistent with this resolution be, and are hereby repealed—

Committee reported adversely, but the Grand Lodge reversed the report and adopted the resolution of Rep. Sheppard.

SEMI-ANNUAL P. W. FOR DEGREE OF REBEKAH LODGES.

The Committee on the Degree of Rebekah, to whom was referred that portion of the Grand Sire's report bearing upon this degree, would respectfully report : That they are aware of the misunderstanding which has existed in relation to the legislation of the last session, the language being perhaps not as specific as it might have been, and for the purpose of fully setting forth the intentions of the committee would recommend the adoption of the following resolutions :

*Resolved*, That the Grand Masters of State, District or Territorial Jurisdictions in which Rebekah Degree Lodges have been or may hereafter be instituted, be required to make a semi-annual password for the Degree of Rebekah, which shall be a test of good standing in a Rebekah Degree Lodge, and shall be used at the outer door of such Lodges to obtain admission to the ante-room.

This semi-annual word shall only be used in the jurisdiction to which it properly belongs, and shall be communicated privately to all persons entitled to receive it.

*Resolved*, That the annual password shall be given both in Subordinate Lodges and in Rebekah Degree Lodges, and used as a further proof test of membership in the degree, as well as to enable all members having the degree to visit Subordinate Lodges when open for the purpose of conferring the degree. This annual password shall also be used in conjunction with a card issued by a Rebekah Degree Lodge when visiting a Rebekah Degree Lodge in jurisdictions other than the one to which the visitor belongs, unless the Rebekah Degree Lodge shall otherwise provide.

*Resolved*, That Rebekah Degree Lodges shall confer the Degree on those persons only who may apply for membership in such Lodges.

*Resolved*, That all legislation not in conformity with the foregoing be and the same is hereby repealed.

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## NEW FUNERAL CEREMONY TO BE HELD IN THE LODGE ROOM.

Your committee appointed "to prepare an appropriate Funeral Service, to be held in the Lodge room," beg leave to submit the following:

(The Lodge being called to order.)

**NOBLE GRAND.** Brothers: We are assembled on an occasion of mournful interest. Often have we been reminded, in the solemn ceremonies of our Order, of the great truth that we are born to die. Mor-tality has been presented to our view, that we might the more earnestly seek an immortality beyond this fleeting life, where death comes no more forever. We are reminded by the sad and mournful funeral knell that another spirit has taken its departure for a new state of existence. A brother has been summoned and has responded to the call. The burning taper of life has been extinguished and a brother is dead. All that remains of him lies mute before us. The light of the eye has gone out, and the lips which once breathed the language of fraternal greet-ings, are silent. The strong man is powerless, and lost to us forever this side the grave. The silver cord is loosed—the golden bowl is broken. The dust must return to the earth as it was, and the spirit has gone to God who gave it. We pay our mournful tribute of affec-tion this day and bury our dead out of our sight. It is meet and right at such time, while in the presence of the dead, that we may gather con-solation and that lessons of wisdom and instruction may impress upon our minds the importance of a suitable preparation for the last great change which must pass upon us all.

Let us be reverently attentive while our Chaplain reads from Holy Writ.

**CHAPLAIN.** "Thine hands have made me and fashioned me together round about; yet thou dost destroy me. Is there not an appointed time to man upon the earth? Are not his days also like the days of an hireling? If a man die shall he live again? All the days of my appointed time will I wait till my change come. What man is he that liveth and shall not see death? Shall he deliver his soul from the hand of the grave? One generation passeth away and another cometh. The days of our years are three score years and ten, and if by reason of strength they be four score years, yet is there strength, labor and sorrow, for it is soon cut off and we fly away. For he knoweth our frame, he remembereth that we are dust. For we are strangers before thee and sojourners, as were all our fathers. Our days on the earth are as a shadow, and there is none abiding. When a few years are come, as a I shall go the way whence I shall not return.

"Lord, make me to know mine end and the measure of my days what it is; that I may know how frail I am. So teach us to number our days that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom. There the wicked cease from troubling and there the weary be at rest.

"Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with all thy might, for there is no work, nor device, nor knowledge, nor wisdom in the grave whither thou goest. But man dieth and wasteth away; yea, man giveth up the Ghost, and where is he? So man lieth down and riseth not, till the heavens be no more.

"The righteous is delivered out of trouble, and the wicked cometh in his stead. Let me die the death of the righteous, and let my last end be like his. For I know that my Redeemer liveth, and that He shall stand at the latter day upon the earth; and though after my skin worms destroy this body, yet in my flesh shall I see God, whom I shall see for myself, and mine eyes shall behold, and not another."

CHAPLAIN. Help, Lord, for the faithful fail from among the children of men.

RESPONSE. Help us, O Lord.

CHAPLAIN. The righteous cry and the Lord heareth, and delivereth them out of all their troubles.

RESPONSE. Hear us, oh Lord.

CHAPLAIN. The Lord is nigh unto them that are of a broken heart, and saveth such as be of a contrite spirit.

RESPONSE. Be nigh unto us, oh Lord.

CHAPLAIN. But God will redeem my soul from the power of the grave.

RESPONSE. Redeem us, oh Lord.

NOBLE GRAND. Our brother was a faithful and true Odd Fellow. He has fallen amid life's struggles, at the post of duty, full of honors. Let the record of his virtues and worth be indelibly inscribed upon our hearts, and his memory cherished forever. God of the universe, into Thy hands we commit the departed spirit.

RESPONSE. The will of God be done.

The following hymn will be sung :

WATTS.—C. M.

"A thousand ages in thy sight  
Are like an evening gone;  
Short as the watch that ends the night,  
Before the rising sun.

The busy tribes of flesh and blood,  
With all their cares and fears,  
Are carried downward by the flood,  
And lost in foll'wing years.

Time, like an ever-rolling stream,  
Bears all its sons away;  
They fly, forgotten as a dream,  
Dies at the opening day.

O God, our help in ages past,  
Our hope for years to come;  
Be then our guard while life shall last,  
And our perpetual home.

REMARKS.

The following prayer (or an extemporaneous one) will be offered by the Chaplain :—

God of all graces and mercy, in this dark hour of sorrow, we humbly lift our hearts to Thee in prayer. Grant unto us, we beseech Thee, that light which cometh down from above. Thou hast mercifully assured us in Thy Word that the bruised reed Thou wouldst not break.

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Remember us in mercy, O Lord, before Thee now. [Be Thou in this sad hour the Father of the fatherless and the widow's God. Administer to them, we pray Thee, in this hour of grief the consolations which Thou only canst give.] As we look to the hopes which lie beyond the grave, may we forget these sad scenes of frail mortality, and be bound yet closer together in the ties of Friendship, Love and Truth.

As we behold the frailty of mankind, and are reminded of the uncertainty of our continuance in life upon the earth, and of our own mortality, may Thy Grace and Thy Spirit lead us to turn our thoughts to those things which make for our everlasting happiness. Put our minds in proper frame, we beseech Thee, to improve the admonitions of Thy providence, and may our thoughts be fixed more devotedly upon Thee, the only sure refuge in time of trouble. And when our earthly pilgrimage is ended, "when the silver cord is loosed and the golden bowl is broken" with us, grant, we humbly pray Thee, Merciful Father, in that moment of mortal extremity, Thy Presence, and comfort us. May Thy rod and Thy staff support us as we enter the dark valley, and we at last gain admission into the ineffable glories of a home in Heaven. Amen.

RESPONSE. Amen! Amen!

#### REPORTS ON APPEALS.

##### MT. CARMEL LODGE *vs.* GRAND LODGE OF OHIO.

"The Appeal Committee, No. 2, to whom was referred the appeal of Mount Carmel Lodge, No. 190, from the action of the R. W. Grand Lodge of Ohio, beg leave to report that this is a case where a member of said Mount Carmel Lodge was cared for when sick by Spencer Lodge, No. 347, and for watching twenty-six nights, a bill of fifty-two dollars was presented to Mount Carmel Lodge, which said Lodge declined to pay. Whereupon said Spencer Lodge appealed to the Grand Lodge of the State. The matter was referred to the Committee of Grievance. The Report of said committee, after relating the circumstances of the case in detail says:

"It also appears that Spencer Lodge provides a fund by assessment of the members for the purpose of paying nurses, so, on the 7th day of July, 1877, Spencer Lodge sends a bill for twenty-six nights' watching with said Bro. Leitz, at \$2 per night, \$52, to Mount Carmel Lodge which they positively refused to pay, on the ground that they do not have a fund in their Lodge for the purpose of hiring watchers or nurses, but simply take care of their sick by detail of their members as per law. It is the opinion of your committee that there is no law of the Order which will compel said Mount Carmel Lodge to reimburse Spencer Lodge No. 347, and would ask to be discharged from the further consideration of the same."

This report was amended by striking out so much as exonerates Mount Carmel Lodge from liability, and by inserting that Mount Carmel Lodge be required to reimburse Spencer Lodge in the amount claimed. The report, as amended, was adopted, and from this action of the Grand Lodge of Ohio, Mount Carmel Lodge appeals to this Grand Lodge.

Your Committee find that the Constitution for Subordinate Lodges makes provision for a draft upon the members for watchers for trans-

ent brothers, and affixes a penalty for neglect or refusal to watch when so drawn.

This is all the law bearing upon this subject which has come to the knowledge of your committee, and this, it is clear, does not authorize the claim of Spencer Lodge upon Mount Carmel Lodge. On the contrary, and in the absence of any special authority from Mount Carmel Lodge to incur any expense for the care of its sick members, it was plainly the duty of Spencer Lodge to provide watchers by a draft on its members, as provided by the Constitution; and when they hired watchers it was without authority. They therefore have no legal claim on Mount Carmel Lodge for reimbursement.

Your committee therefore recommend that the appeal of Mount Carmel Lodge be sustained.

G. H. PLATNER, vs. ROCKFORD ENCAMPMENT, No. 44, ILLINOIS.

The facts in this case appear to be as follows: George H. Platner was Scribe of Rockford Encampment No. 44, for six terms and up to June 30, 1874, and during that time credited himself with his dues in payment of services as Scribe. From July 1, 1874, until January 1, 1877, his dues were regularly paid and he took receipts therefor. Bro. Platner alleges that his books were examined each term by the auditing committee and reported correct, but we have no official evidence of this. It was afterwards claimed that Bro. Platner had no right to credit himself with dues for services, and a demand was made for the same. These he refused to pay, and he was suspended for such non-payment. The Committee of Appeals of the Grand Encampment report that the papers in the case show that he "credited himself with services to the amount of his yearly dues without authority of law of the Encampment, or by its consent," and sustained the action of his Encampment in suspending him for non-payment of dues. The Grand Encampment adopted this report, and he appeals therefrom.

Bro. Platner had no right to credit himself with his dues without authority of his Encampment. Though the auditing committee passed his accounts and reported them correct, there is no evidence that their attention was called to the particular matter in question. Even if it was called to their attention, it is not perceived how this would bind the Encampment, unless the facts were communicated to it. We offer the following:

*Resolved*.—That the appeal of George H. Platner from the action of the Grand Encampment of Illinois be dismissed, and the action of said Encampment in this case be sustained.

COLUMBIA LODGE No. 10, PA. DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA.

"The Appeal Committee, No. 1, having considered the appeal of Columbia Lodge No. 10, I. O. O. F., District of Columbia, from the action of the Grand Lodge of said jurisdiction, and find that it appears from the records of Columbia Lodge No. 10, I. O. O. F., that Bro. T. M. Grant had been sick continuously from May 21st, 1874, drawing weekly benefits from the Lodge, until August 28rd, 1877, when the Lodge failed to make provision for the payment of the weekly benefits.

"On December 6th, notice of an appeal from the action of the Lodge was given. This the Grand Lodge sustained, and directed bene-

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fits to be paid the brother from August 23rd, 1877, and upon receipt of this order the Lodge paid the brother sixteen weeks' benefits (\$64.00) to December 18th, 1877, the day the brother declined to receive the officers officially.

"The records of the Lodge do not show that the officers visited him for a considerable length of time, until the new Noble Grand paid him a visit for the first time, upon which occasion he (the Noble Grand) was received by Bro. Grant in a manner that was considered discourteous and insulting. This fact being reported to the Lodge, it was decided to demand an apology.

"In a communication to the Lodge, bearing date August 8th, 1878, Bro. Grant disclaims any intention to insult the officers, and regrets having incurred the displeasure of the Lodge and asked that benefits be allowed him. The Lodge, deeming the apology insufficient, directed the Secretary to return Bro. Grant's letter and inform him that the Lodge required a proper apology. It does not appear from the records that the brother ever offered another apology.

"The brother continued sick, was not visited by the officers, and no weekly report as to his condition was received by his Lodge.

"Article VIII, Sec. 1, Constitution for the government of Subordinate Lodges in the jurisdiction of the District of Columbia, provides that, when a brother is sick and unable to pursue his ordinary occupation or some other business whereby he may obtain a livelihood, he shall be entitled to and receive from the funds of the Lodge the sum of four dollars per week during his disability.

"The question as to his right to receive benefits does not appear to be involved further than his refusal to receive the Noble Grand, for which act of discourtesy he disclaims any intention to insult him or the Lodge.

Article V, Sec. 3, By-laws of Columbia Lodge, reads as follows: "It shall be the duty of the Visiting Committee to visit all brethren who may have been reported sick, to render such assistance as the laws allow, and as their cases may require, and to continue to visit them once a week until they are restored to health." This the officers failed to do in this instance.

"Your committee are of the opinion that the Lodge should have directed the officers to visit the brother in accordance with the law, and in case of his refusal to receive them in a proper manner, steps should have been taken to have him in contempt before the Lodge, and, if guilty, should have punished him therefor.

"The Lodge having thought best to quietly evade the enforcement of this, one of the most important laws of our Order, viz: visiting the sick, have fallen into a grave error. Your committee therefore recommend that the decision of the Grand Lodge of the District of Columbia, in requiring Columbia Lodge No. 10, of said jurisdiction, to visit and pay Bro. Grant weekly benefits, be sustained, and the appeal of Columbia Lodge No. 10, of the District of Columbia, be dismissed.

JOHN COLSON vs. GRAND LODGE OF INDIANA.

"The Appeal Committee, No. 2, to whom was referred the appeal of Bro. John Colson against the Grand Lodge of Indiana, would respectfully report that it appears from the record in this case, that in Mag-

nolia Lodge No. 80, of the jurisdiction of Indiana, the following charges and specifications were preferred against Bro. John Colson:

Charge 1. With "Lying."

Specification. That previous to going into "voluntary bankruptcy," he promised several brothers of the Lodge, and others not members, to pay in the aggregate, about \$2,000 of his indebtedness out of the sale of hogs, which he knew would not bring him over \$400.

Charge 2. "Fraud and misrepresentation."

Specification. Calling his creditors together with the avowed purpose of arranging his indebtedness, but, instead of doing so, going to Indianapolis and into "voluntary bankruptcy."

Charge 3. "Conduct unbecoming an Odd Fellow."

Specification. Going into bankruptcy, thereby making his sureties to the Lodge pay the amount due the Lodge, and also telling certain parties that he was glad they had to do so.

Upon these charges and specifications Bro. Colson was regularly tried by his Lodge, and on separate ballots each charge was declared sustained, and the brother accordingly expelled. From this decision Bro. Colson appealed to the Grand Lodge of Indiana, and upon a review of the case in that body the action of Magnolia Lodge No. 80, in expelling Bro. Colson was sustained, from which action of the Grand Lodge of Indiana Bro. Colson appeals to this Grand Body.

Your committee have carefully examined and considered the evidence presented in the record, and we are clearly of opinion that the preponderance of evidence on each charge is in favor of the accused, and that upon such evidence Bro. Colson should have been acquitted by his Lodge on each charge and specification thereof.

It appears that the charges and specifications in this case grew out of, and were based upon, certain pecuniary obligations due from Bro. Colson, and upon promises made by him to pay some of those obligations from the proceeds of certain property which he soon expected to sell, and also from certain funds he expected to obtain from other sources.

Your committee cannot too strongly condemn the practice on the part of some Lodges in holding members of the Order amenable to its penalties for a failure to comply with promises to pay pecuniary obligations. Such obligations are generally honestly incurred, and promises to pay them made in good faith, and a failure to do so is more the result of financial misfortune, over which the debtor has no control, than of intentional wrong. All grievances of this character are properly referable to the courts of competent jurisdiction for a full and complete remedy. An attempt to collect debts, or to enforce any kind of pecuniary obligation, through the instrumentality of our code of trials is subversive of justice, and against the spirit and teachings of our Order; unless, however, the obligation was incurred through some false pretence, or the transaction involves some act of personal dishonesty, subjecting the offender to a prosecution and conviction under the laws of the land. We therefore recommend for adoption the following resolution:

**Resolved.**—That the appeal of Bro. John Colson, from the action of the Grand Lodge of Indiana, be sustained.

BELFAST LODGE No. 41 vs. GRAND LODGE OF MAINE.

"The 'Memorial of Grievance of Belfast Lodge, No. 41, under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Maine,' represents that the Grand Master, whilst visiting Belfast Lodge No. 41, on the evening of the 3rd of January, 1879, for the purpose of installing the officers elect, failed to instal said officers, and gave no reasons for not proceeding with the Grand Master of Maine, accompanied by the Grand Marshal, demanded, of the Lodge, placed locks of his own upon the doors of the Lodge room, and put it in possession of keepers; that he gave no reason for doing so, not communicating with the Lodge in any manner.

The memorial also protests against the action of the Grand Lodge of Maine at its special session called by the Grand Master, and held March 5th, 1879, to try Belfast Lodge, No. 41, as illegal; that its action should be declared null and void, and that the Grand Lodge of Maine should be directed to return to Belfast Lodge, No. 41, its charter, books and property.

The call of the Grand Master in summoning the G. Lodge to special session, states that it is "to try Belfast Lodge, No. 41, on the charges of communication to the Grand Lodge at special session," &c. In his action in suspending the Lodge by stating that "the good of the Order clearly required it."

The By-Laws of the Grand Lodge of Maine, after specifying the various causes for which a Lodge may be suspended or dissolved and its property forfeited to the Grand Lodge, contains the following proviso; "But the charter of the Lodge shall not in any case be forfeited until the Lodge shall have been duly notified, and an opportunity offered to answer the charges preferred against it."

The Grand Master took the charter, books and funds on the 8th of January, 1879, and convened the Grand Lodge on the 5th of March, 1879. And there is no claim, nor any paper in evidence before the committee, that any charges were preferred against Belfast Lodge, No. 41, nor that any opportunity was offered said Lodge to answer to charges if they had been preferred.

The committee are of the opinion that the action of the Grand Master in failing to install the officers elect on the 3rd of January without giving any reasons for such refusal, was illegal, as the law gives power to Grand Master to arrest the Installation Ceremony only when objections are raised at the time. The Grand Lodge of Maine provides that officers shall be elected at the last regular meeting in each term and shall be installed at the first meeting of the succeeding one. The Grand Master had plainly no authority to ignore that law.

That the action of the Grand Master in taking away the charter, books, and funds of Belfast Lodge, No. 41, without charges being preferred against said Lodge, and an opportunity offered to the Lodge to answer to such charges, if they had been made, was not justifiable; that the action of the Grand Lodge of Maine in sustaining the extreme course of the Grand Master, does not receive the sanction of this Grand Lodge.

The committee recommend that the charter, books and property of Belfast Lodge, No. 41, which were removed by the Grand Master of Maine, on the 8th of January, 1879, be returned to said Lodge.

Your committee states that testimony, upon which the special committee appointed at the special session of the Grand Lodge of Maine, before mentioned, and upon which they based their support of the action of the Grand Master, in the premises, has not been presented to us.

The committee recommend the following resolution :

*Resolved*—That the Grand Lodge of Maine be directed to send this Sovereign Grand Lodge the record in the case of Belfast Lodge, No. 41, and in the meantime the Grand Lodge of Maine be directed to restore Belfast Lodge to full fellowship, and to return to it all the property, funds and effects taken from it by the Grand Master.

SAMUEL BLACK vs. GRAND ENCAMPMENT OF KANSAS.

The Appeal Committee, No. 2, begs leave respectfully to present the following in the case of the appeal of Samuel Black against the Grand Encampment of Kansas.

At a regular meeting of an Encampment there were three applications for membership ; the same were referred to committees for investigation and reported upon at the next regular meeting, at which time, a ballot being taken, one of the applicants was elected and two rejected ; after same had been taken it was discovered that four Patriarchs in the room had voted who were not entitled to (being over thirteen weeks in arrears) ; a new ballot was then taken (all voting at that time being in good standing), which resulted in the rejection of the one previously elected and the election of the two previously rejected.

The applications were voted on separately, and there were at this time in the Encampment enough members in good standing to constitute a quorum, all present voting. The General Law of the jurisdiction requires two black balls to reject.

The Grand Patriarch decided that the first ballots were void and the last legal. The Judiciary Committee of the Grand Encampment reported that the first ballot was void as to the two persons rejected and valid as to the one elected, and this was sanctioned by the Grand Encampment. We think this decision was correct, but not alone, if at all, for the reason given by the committee. It is a general principle in legal procedure that no error or informality will reverse a decision, unless the error *may have affected the result*. The rule may be stated thus : If the error be such that it can be seen that it *could not by any possibility* have affected the result the decision will not be reversed, because the error has done no harm, but if it *might* by any possibility have affected the result, there is an error, and the decision will be overturned. In the case of the one elected, the illegal votes could do no harm, because all the votes, or at least all but one, were one way, and even if one ball was black, the candidate was still elected notwithstanding the black ball, and he was certainly voted for by a quorum of those entitled to vote. In the other cases the ballots were void for the reason that the disqualified brothers *may have voted* against the candidate, and thus changed the result from what it would have been had they not voted.

The Grand Patriarch of that jurisdiction also rendered the following decision, which was reversed by the Grand Encampment, viz :

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"The following question was asked: Is a withdrawal card issued at a meeting where there are eight Patriarchs present, four of whom are in good standing, and four over thirteen weeks in arrears, valid:

*Answer:* No. If a card was issued under such circumstances it should be returned to the Encampment issuing it, and the Patriarch would still hold his membership in said Encampment."

In this case we think the Grand Patriarch correct. Seven members are required to constitute a quorum, and we think they should be qualified members. Of course the acts of an Encampment meeting thus illegally constituted might be valid where the rights of third parties are involved.

We offer the following:

*Resolved,* That the decision of the Grand Encampment of Kansas in the above case of balloting for candidates be affirmed, and that the other decision as to voting upon the granting of the clearance card be reversed.

#### DUES AND BENEFITS.

The Special Committee on Dues and Benefits reported at length on this important subject, giving statistics from several of the jurisdictions, shewing the average of sickness for each year. The statistics demonstrate the fact that when a Lodge has passed the age of a single generation—say 40 years—it will have to calculate in paying one and one quarter weeks' benefits per year to each member. In regard to the proper system of dues, the committee report as follows:

"The opinion is held by many, however, that our present system is unsound in principle, as well as faulty in details. Lodges generally place all their members on an equality as to dues and benefits, regardless of age. Statistics show conclusively that with increased age, sickness increases just as certain as life grows shorter. If it be an admittedly sound principle held by all insurance organizations, that to secure a certain amount at death there must be periodical payments graded according to the age of the party when insured, why is the principle not equally sound when applied to insurance against sickness?"

"In other words, to establish a system of dues and benefits on a sound basis, the dues should be graded according to the age of the brother when admitted to membership.

"Your committee have referred to this matter in previous reports, and have expressed approval of the soundness of the principle suggested. It does not seem that arguments should be required in proof of the position. Lodges already admit the principle that the older man should pay into the treasury more than the younger, by charging him a higher initiation fee. But, in order to meet the just requirements of the principle, they must charge him very much more than he is at all likely to pay. The only feasible method is to spread over a number of years the extra sum which the older man should justly pay, for the purpose of placing him on an equality with the younger.

"There may doubtless be difficulties in the way of an adoption of this system, especially in some older and larger jurisdictions, but its practicability has been demonstrated by the fact that several thousand organizations in different parts of the world are now working under it. The Manchester Unity of Odd Fellows, and other friendly societies in

England, have for several years, in accordance with the laws of that country, charged dues upon a graduated scale. In our own Order the system has also been tried to some extent. In Australia, graduated dues are charged similar to those in force in England. In the jurisdiction of Ontario, where the entire subject has been under consideration for some years, a large number of the older Lodges have adopted a graduated scale of dues."

The Committee then quote approvingly the table of "graded dues" in force in many of the Lodges in Ontario, and found in a minority report of a Committee of our Grand Lodge on Dues and Benefits, considered at the session of 1877, and recommend this to the favorable consideration of the fraternity. The Report was adopted by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, and the Committee continued.

#### BASIS OF REPRESENTATIVES.

The remarks of the M. W. Grand Sire on the subject of "Basis of Representation, Taxation, and Biennial Sessions," are full of thoughts worthy of the gravest consideration. While the entire statement is too lengthy to copy here, the attention of the whole Order in this jurisdiction is earnestly directed to the matter, as it will be found in the Journal of the Sovereign Body.

#### NEW LEGISLATION, &c.

##### DORMANT MEMBERSHIP.

*Resolved*, 1. That hereafter, suspensions from membership for non payment of dues in Subordinate Lodges and Encampments be from active to dormant membership.

2. That a member who shall be in arrears for one year's dues shall be considered a Dormant Odd-Fellow, and as such be debarred from the benefits (both pecuniary and attentive), but his name shall be retained on a list for such class, provided that before any member can be dropped from active to dormant membership, notice of such contemplated action shall be given him.

3. That a Dormant Odd Fellow may be restored to active membership upon application made in open Lodge or Encampment by a member thereof, which shall be held over until the second meeting thereafter, the Secretary or Scribe reading the same at each meeting, and be determined affirmatively, on a ballot by a majority of the votes cast, and upon the payment of such amount as the By-Laws of the Lodge or Encampment may prescribe.

4. That all members heretofore dropped or suspended for the non-payment of dues are hereby reinstated to a dormant membership in the Order, from which they will be subjected and privileged to the condition herein-before stated.

5. That a Dormant member, of either Lodge or Encampment, shall in no way be subject to a per capita tax to be paid by Lodges or Encampments for any purpose whatsoever.

6. That a Dormant Odd-Fellow shall be subject to trial, suspension or expulsion from the Order for cause, under the law, the same as an active Odd Fellow.

- 7. That all law inconsistent with the foregoing resolution be and the same is hereby repealed
- 8. That these resolutions shall take effect from and after their adoption.

*Resolved*, That all laws of this Grand Lodge upon the subjects of suspended membership, restoration of suspended members, and of the granting of dismissal certificates, not inconsistent with the action of this Grand Lodge at the present session upon the subject of "Dormant Membership," be and the same are hereby declared to be in full force and to fully apply to dormant members.

CONCLUSION.

Your Representatives have great pleasure in being able to report, that the name of "SOVEREIGN GRAND LODGE" has been adopted, a name fitting for the institution, and one that will not soon require to be changed; and when in connection with this it is added that the invitation of the Grand Lodge of Ontario to the Sovereign Grand Lodge to hold its session of 1880 in Toronto, was cordially and nearly unanimously accepted, we may be permitted to say that our labors (pleasant labors) have not been altogether in vain for the benefit of our loved Order in this Jurisdiction.

The whole is respectfully submitted.

## IMPOSTERS.

Special attention of Subordinate Lodges is called to the following resolutions, adopted by the Grand Lodge of the United States, at the session held at Atlanta, Ga., in Sept., 1874:

## IMPOSTERS TO BE EXPELLED.

*Resolved.*—That a member of the Order in good standing, evidenced by holding an unexpired Visiting Card, issued in conformity to the laws of the Order by his Lodge or Encampment, and having the A. T. P. W., being in distress, or pretending so to be, and needing money, and who having asked for and received from a Lodge or Encampment, or a member thereof, a sum of money under the assurance and promise that he will return or repay the same within a given time, or so soon as he returns home, but who shall neglect so to do after a reasonable time thereafter, without a satisfactory excuse being rendered, shall be deemed guilty of conduct unbecoming an Odd Fellow; and due notice of such facts having been officially communicated to his Lodge by the Lodge or Encampment so loaning him the money, it shall be the duty of his Lodge to notify him of such indebtedness or loan, and to demand payment thereof, and if he then refuse or neglect to pay the same, his Lodge shall prefer charges against him, try him, and if found guilty, and without sufficiently mitigating circumstances, to expel him from the Order. If there be such mitigating circumstances, then to impose such penalty as the Lodge may deem best.

*Resolved.*—That the respective State Grand Lodges cause the foregoing resolution to be embodied in their proceedings, and the attention of the Subordinate Lodges and Encampments especially called to it.



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
