Boga rudi's Great Shoot.
(From the New York Herald.)
On the 16th, Captain A. H. Boga-
rudi, of Eikhart, Ill., champion wing
shot of the world, gave a wonderful
exhibition of his skill and endurance
of handling his gun, by breaking in
the air one thousand glass balls in 42
minutes. This feat was performed in
Gilmere's Garden, in this city.
There was such a general demand for
repetition of the shoot, that the Captain
consented to oblige his friends, but
modified the programme so as to limit
the time to 100 consecutive minutes,
during which he would endeavor to
break a thousand glass spheres.
Last night the attempt was made at
Gilmere's Garden, and the conclusion is
natural that it will not be surpassed
for many a day. The arrangements
for shooting were admirable. A high
board screen was raised at the Fourth
avenue end of the enclosure, which
was covered with all kinds of glass
balls. Upon this was thrown a calcu-
lum light. The two traps were
placed about thirty feet from the
screen. The Captain stood eighteen
yards from the traps, with a "tab" at
his right hand containing the vari-
ous ammunition. Mr. F. S. Harrison,
of New York, consented to serve as re-
feree; Dr. C. E. Sanborn, of Boston,
timekeeper; Mr. T. C. Banks, of the
Hod and Gun, official scorer; Dr.
Talbot, of New York, pulled the traps;
Mr. Austin, Appleton, of New York,
cleaned and cooled the gun barrels as
changed, and two particularly live
young men kept the traps filled. The
attendance was large and of a very re-
spectable character.
The Captain missed the first ball,
but then went on breaking them so
rapidly that in sixty seconds he had
scored 14; in 2m., 24; in 4m., 40, and
in 7m. 50s., he had shot at 103, of
which number 100 were broken, 87
being straight. In 10m. he had 130
to his credit, and in 15m. the second
hundred were broken, having fired at
105 balls. With unequalled nerve
he continued his work, and in 18m.
there were 240 smashed spheres to his
credit, 206 in 20m., and in 23m. 300
broken were marked. He had fired
307 and missed only 7. The Captain
started on the fourth hundred with
eight misses on his card. In 31m.
100 had been credited as smashed—
Up to this time only 7 had been mis-
sed. The next hundred were finished
in just 39m. from the start, making
"half the race" completed with 11m.
to spare. Three were missed in the
fifth hundred, making twelve in all
that escaped the unerring accuracy
of the shooter's aim. When the six-
hundred had been scored the watch
noted 47m. 50s. in all, 51m. 30s.;
the eighth hundred when 1h. 2m. was
noted, the ninth in 1h. 10m. 30s., and
the tenth or 1,000 in 1h. 17m. 40s.—
The last 155 were broken straight—
The Captain fired 1,028 shots without
rest, leaving as misses only 28 balls,
a record interesting as it is wonderful.
Up to this time only 7 had been mis-
sed, and close observation gives the aver-
age distance the balls were broken
about 25 yards, the traps springing
when the additional seven yards be-
fore they could be hit.

Times here are dull, as they are all
over the lower Provinces. Mr. Leod's
vessel is nearly ready for planking—

LOOKING UP—Times are improv-
ing in the United States. The "Chia-
go Herald Bulletin" says:—"Most of the
iron works in Pittsburg are running
on full time, and some of them, indeed
performing extra work. Lynn, Mas-
sachusetts, is said to be employing the
most complicated machinery ever in-
vented at present is estimated at
thirty-three per cent. greater than
at the same period last year. The as-
pect of foreign trade looks hopeful.
The exports at New York for Jan-
uary rose to \$67,000,000, currency, de-
clined increase, and the imports were
less than \$20,000,000.

Mr. Canfield Owen, who has been ap-
pointed Secretary to the Commission,

of His Royal Highness. The Exhibi-
tion will open on the 1st of May, 1878,
and close on the 1st of October—
Goods for Exhibition should be received
not later than 1st of January to 1st of March."

THE SPRINGFIELD COAL MINES—
Messrs. Gos, Fleming & Sons have
finished the repairs on the engines late-
ly damaged by fire at the Spring-
field Mines, and this morning despatched
them by train to their destination.
The damage done was considerable,
and it was necessary to build a large
portion of them. The work was push-
ed with much vigor, and has been
thoroughly done. Messrs. Robert
Patton and Char. McCarthy, workmen

The pay of the clergy in France,
even of the highest and governing
order, is comparatively speaking,

Archbishop of Paris only draws \$10,-
000 a year, which is less than the low-
est salary paid to any English Bishop.
Sixteen other Archbishops in France
only receive \$4,000 per annum; sixty
Bishops are paid \$3,000 each; two-
hundred vicars-general get only an
average of \$600; 645 curates of the
first class, \$320, 270 of the second
class, \$200, while 604 clergy of the
lower denomination receive \$240 and
20,920 only \$180 a year. The Arch-
bishop of Canterbury has, at least,
\$75,000 and the Archbishop of York,
\$60,000 a year. The Bishop of
Sodor and Man, who receives the
lowest salary of all the English pre-
lates, has \$12,000 a year.

There is a curious comedy of errors,
that came near being a tragedy, at
San Francisco recently. A sailor re-
turned from sea, and found his wife
fouling a baby. Without giving
her a chance to say that the child was
a neighbor's, he knocked her down,
and then tried to throw her from the
window. A crowd gathered below,
and the man stabbed his wife in the
back, jumped from the window and
escaped unhurt. But some of the
crowd had entered the house, and go-
ing to the wrong room, avowed a sleep-
er, who emptied his revolver on them,
but was dragged to the street, and was
just being hanged to a lamp-post when

by the mob. The woman was not

The Farmer's Corner.

Ashes and Iron for Flowers. The observation of practical and experimental gardeners seems to confirm the fact that to procure brilliant colors in flowers, it is necessary to supply the soil with an abundance of ferruginous constituents and silica.

Any person who cultivates only a few flowers in pots, or on grassy lawns, or on spacious patios, can readily satisfy himself of the exceedingly useful part the foregoing materials play in the production of beautiful flowers.

Even white flowers, or those that have petals nearly white, will be greatly improved in brilliancy by providing iron, sand and unbleached ashes for the roots of growing plants.

A dressing of quicklime will be found excellent for flowers of every description. It is also of eminent importance to improve the fertility of the soil where flowers are growing.

How to Apply Manure. When coarse manure is applied to a crop, it decomposes very slowly and we fail to get the whole benefit of it for the first crop and may lose it completely available before it is applied.
