N. B. APPLES WIN FIRST PRIZE

Good Showing Made by Province at Imperial Fruit Show.

Fredericton, Oct. 31—A cablegram received by A. C. Turney, provincial horticulturist, from the Daily Mail Imperial Fruit Show, at present being held in London at the Crystal Palace, announced that in competition with apples from the provinces of British Columbia, Ontario, Quebec and Nova Scotia, New Brunswick apples carried off first prizes and gold medals for McIntosh and Pannose, two of Canada's most famous varieties, and also third prize and bronze medal for Golden Russet and Princess Louise the latter falling in the open class for any other variety.

These exhibits were made by the Provincial Agricultural Department, together with the Fruit Growers' Association, and consist of six boxes of each variety in the overseas section of the competitive exhibit. The apples were grown by the New Brunswick Horticultural Society, and were graded and packed by A. C. Turney and members of his staff assisted by W. P. Fox, Dominion Fruit Inspector.

MURDER NOW IS SUSPECTED

Investigation of Circumstances Now Under Way by Officials.

It will be remembered that Mr. Joseph Roy of Charlott was very mysteriously shot dead at the edge of a lake near the shore of the town of Campbellton, on the morning of September 27th. At first it was thought that he had been shot in mistake for a moose but circumstances have arisen which point to possible murder and an investigation of all the circumstances is now under way. The Graphic understands that there are many points of evidence pointing to a certain man, and developments are expected.

Mr. Roy and Mr. P. W. Hamilton were hunting near the above lake when the shooting took place. Although Mr. Hamilton called loudly for help no one responded, although the shot was fired at only between one and two hundred yards distant.

When Governor Ellis visited the scene of the shooting, the foot prints of the man firing the shot were found in the mud on the shore of the lake in the afternoon, could not possibly be mistaken for a moose.

It is hoped that if a crime has been committed nothing will be left undone to bring the guilty party to justice.

PRIVATE COMEAU INTERRED HERE

Body Brought From France to Rest in the Family Lot.

The funeral of the late Private Armand Comeau of the American Expeditionary Force took place Saturday, Oct. 29th. The body arrived here on Oct. 27, accompanied by Sergeant Kranz of A. E. F.

Upon arrival the body was taken to the home of his father, Mr. James Comeau of St. Anne de Restigouche. The funeral, which was very largely attended, took place at 9:30 Saturday morning. The services in the Church of St. Anne de Restigouche were very impressive. Rev. Fr. Pacifique delivered a touching address on the glorious death of a soldier who dies in defence of his country. After the service the casket, covered by the American flag, was borne on the shoulders of the pall-bearers, Sergeant Kranz, Sgt. M. Dewar, Sgt. Russell and Sgt. Hachey to his last resting place, where Corp. Parker sounded "Last Post." The flags at the U. S. consulate and American vessel in the harbour were at half mast.

Pte. Armand Comeau enlisted with the A. E. F. in Boston, was transferred to Camp Upton; Company B. 305 infantry, 77 division and went overseas in May 1918.

He first was under fire at the battle of Chateau Thierry and at St. Mihiel. Private Comeau who was a sniper fell instantly killed by a shell fragment and was buried on the spot along with many others on the 3rd October, 1918.

About a year later his body was exhumed and buried in another cemetery in France. From there he was again exhumed by the Graves Registration Service and brought to Hoboken, N. J. on October 5th 1921 and thence to Campbellton.

CANDIDATES NOW TOTAL SEVENTY-TWO

Liberals Have Nine, Conservatives Eight and Progressives Five.

St. John, Nov. 2—A brief survey of candidates for the eleven New Brunswick seats in the House of Commons shows that the Liberal party already has nine men in the running, the Conservatives have eight official candidates and the Progressives number five. The government lacks candidates in Kent, Gloucester and Restigouche-Madawaska. Six former members, A. B. Copp, O. Turgeon Pius Michaud, T. W. Caldwell, A. T. Leger and R. B. Hanson, are offering again for reelection. Hon. R. W. Wigmore, Stanley E. Elkin, Major-General H. H. McLean, W. S. Loggie and T. A. Hart are not seeking another term.

In St. John-Albert Dr. W. P. Brodick, who was nominated at the Liberal convention, still is without a running mate. The Conservatives are depending on Hon. Dr. J. B. M. Baxter and Colonel Murray MacLaren, C.M.G. H. R. McLellan also has announced his intention of running.

Dr. D. H. McLintier, a former M.P., is the Liberal nominee in Royal Geo. B. Jones, M.P.P., is the government choice, and G. E. Perkins will stand for the Progressives.

In Westmorland, A. B. Copp who has represented the constituency for several terms, will once more represent the Liberal party in the fight. He is opposed by A. E. Trites, Progressive, and Col. S. Boyd Anderson has been offered the Conservative nomination.

In Northumberland, the Liberals have named Hon. John Morrissey to oppose E. A. McCurdy, Conservative.

In Gloucester and Restigouche-Madawaska, there is no opposition so far to the Liberal standard-bearer, O. Turgeon and Pius Michaud, who represent these constituencies, respectively in the last parliament.

R. B. Hanson, K.C., who was elected last spring in York-Sunbury, but never took his seat, is standing again as a conservative candidate. Lieut. Col. W. J. Osborne received the Liberal nomination, and E. W. Stairs was the Progressive choice, but the latter has not made known yet whether or not he intends to accept.

In Carleton-Victoria, B. Frank Smith, Conservative, will contest the seat against Thomas W. Caldwell, Progressive.

In Charlotte county, two candidates, Liberal and Conservative are in the field in a straight party fight. W. E. Todd carries the Liberal banner, and H. W. Grimmer, former M.P.P., is the Melgish candidate.

Five more weeks remain before polling day, which is on December 6.

NEW BRUNSWICK'S FISCAL YEAR CLOSED

Receipts from Motor Vehicle Licenses Up to Expectations.

Fredericton, Oct. 31.—New Brunswick's fiscal year closes to-day, and the Provincial Government will meet here to-morrow.

Receipts from licenses, under the Motor Vehicle Act, are among the sources from which the revenue has been up to expectations. The estimate for receipts from automobile licenses was \$275,000, and it is said the actual figures are somewhat in excess of that amount. That the receipts of stampage dues had been beyond the expectations of the department was all that Col. T. G. Loggie, Deputy Minister of Lands and Mines, would say.

DOES YOUR SOIL NEED LIME?

How many farmers can answer the question? Can you Mr. Reader? If so, the following may be of some benefit to show you how you can increase your crops by the use of lime.

The average soil in Northern New Brunswick is known to be more or less sour or in other words acid. This acidity tends to check the growth of plants in general because it furnishes a medium in which the micro-organisms of the soil cannot live or work properly. A neutralization of this acidity is therefore necessary in order to furnish the proper medium for the development of micro-organisms and bacteria which promote plant growth. Lime is the element used in general farm practice to bring about this change from a sour to a sweet condition as it acts chemically with the acids of the soil solutions and being itself a base or alkali it neutralizes the acids.

Another function of lime in soils is the physical change it brings about. It makes clay soils less sticky, loams crumbly and more easily cultivated; water passes through them more readily as the result of increased porosity, and such soils furnish more congenial conditions in general for the growth of plant roots.

When used on sandy soils, in small amounts preferably in the form of carbonate as ground limestone, it tends to act like a cement in holding soil particles together thus enabling the sandy soil to hold moisture more tenaciously.

From the above it can readily be seen that the application of limestone can be beneficial on practically all of our Northern New Brunswick soils. STRATEGIC MOVE BY FRENCH BLUEBEARD

Has Lunched Another Shrewd Effort to Obtain Three Months Delay in Murder Charges.

Paris, Oct. 29.—Henri Desire Landru, the French "Bluebeard," has launched another shrewd effort to obtain a three months delay in connection with the thirteen murder charges which were for him his title as a woman slayer. Although his case is set for trial at Versailles on November 8, it was only last Monday that the judges handed to him 50,000 pages of closely written evidence on which the State relies to send him to the guillotine.

Landru, however, insists that he has a right to study the evidence just quired four months to digest the dossier.

RUMORED GERMAN

Reported in Berlin That Billion Dollar Issue Has Been Floated to Apply to the Reparations Account.

Berlin, Oct. 29.—Unconfirmed reports that a billion dollar loan had been floated in the United States by Germany to apply to her reparations account, yesterday forced the dollar, which had soared to 189 back to 172, the disastrous fall of the mark as compared with the dollar has caused German official circles to estimate that maintenance of an embassy at Washington at the present rate of exchange will cost more than the operation of the entire home government.

TWO MEN SHOT, PROBABLY FATALLY

Hold-up Man Shot \$5,000 From Bank at Niagara Falls.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., Oct. 31.—Two men were shot, one probably fatally and five thousand dollars was stolen from the Niagara Falls Trust Company's Bank at Falls and First Streets at noon today by hold-up men armed with shotguns.

MEMORIAL FOR NEWSBOY HERO

Boston, Mass., Oct. 28.—A bronze tablet erected by the newboys of Greater Boston in memory of Albert Edward Scott, the fifteen-year-old Brookline newsboy who died beside his Chatham street office after having promoted or injured thirty-one Germans.

The memorial, which has been set into the wall near the entrance to the town hall, cost the newboys \$2,000. It is a reproduction of a painting by Gale Hoskins based on official photographs of the region where "Scotty" was killed, and shows the heroic new-boy lying on his gun after the battle.

Beneath the bronze is the inscription, "Newboys' Memorial to Albert Edward Scott, who died for his country in the Battle of Ypres, 1917."

President Harding and Vice-President Coolidge, who were invited to attend the exercises, expressed regret and testified to their approval of the memorial. President Harding, in a letter to the director of the Roosevelt Newsboys' Association, which had charge of raising the funds, approved of Mr. Bryan making the principal address in his stead, remarking that the former Secretary of State as speaker would assure a "most appealing address."

"Scotty's history is familiar to all who knew the story of the World War. Less than a month after he graduated from the public grammar school in Brookline, he enlisted in July, 1917, on Boston Common, in the Ninth Regiment, which later became a part of the 101st Regiment. He was in France in a few weeks, and at Ypres, on July 23, 1918, he volunteered for extra-hazardous service.

"See that path, 'Scotty'!" said his lieutenant. "That's your target; not a Hun must cross it!" "Yes, sir," said Scotty, saluted and took up his "sho-sho" gun. Single-handed he held the path while he killed or crippled thirty-one Germans before he died from his wounds.

LOAN IN AMERICA

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PROSPECTS FOR SEMI-PRO. HOCKEY

Banned Amateurs Taking the Jump into Faster Hockey.

KILLED IN FIGHT, THROWN INTO RIVER

Buffalo, Oct. 29.—That K. R.
