FEW NAMES BEING ADDED

Registrar Had Only Ten Additions to List Up to Noon.

At the Referendum election there were scores of electors whose names were not on the voters' lists, and although notices have been published in local papers up to noon to-day, Mr. A. G. Adams had only added ten names to the town list.

Campbellton is an urban district and names can only be added by the Registrar up to Saturday evening, Nov. 6th. After that the Registrar, Mr. Colin McKenzie may add names under certain conditions, but it is important that all additions be made this week.

In the rural districts electors may vote by taking a certain oath, even if their names are not on the list, but it is better to have such names properly entered.

Every elector should see that his or her name is on the voters' list.

N. B. APPLES WIN FIRST PRIZE

Good Showing Made By Province At Imperial Fruit Show.

Fredericton, Oct. 31.—A cablegram received by A. C. Turney, provincial horticulturist, from the Daily Mail Imperial Fruit Show, at present being held in London at the Crystal Palace, announced that in competition with apples from the provinces of British Columbia, Ontario, Quebec and Nova Scotia, New Brunswick apples carried off first prizes and gold medals for McIntosh and Pannose, two of Canada's most famous varieties, and also third prize and bronze medal for Golden Russet and Princess Louise the latter falling in the open class for any other variety.

These exhibits were made by the Provincial Agricultural Department, together with the Fruit Growers' Association, and consist of six boxes of each variety in the overseas section of the competitive exhibit. The apples were grown by the New Brunswick Fruit and Vegetable Commission, Ltd. at the experimental station, and were graded and packed by A. C. Turney and members of his staff assisted by W. P. Fox, Dominion Fruit Inspector.

PRIVATE COMEAU INTERRED HERE

Body Brought From France to Rest in the Family Lot.

The funeral of the late Private Armand Comeau of the American Expeditionary Force took place Saturday, Oct. 29th. The body arrived here on Oct. 27, accompanied by Sergeant Kranz of A. E. F.

Upon arrival the body was taken to the home of his father, Mr. James Comeau of St. Anna de Restigouche. The funeral, which was very largely attended, took place at 9.30 Saturday morning. The services in the Church of St. Anne de Restigouche were very impressive. Rev. Fr. Pacifique delivered a touching address on the glorious death of a soldier who died in defence of his country. After the service the casket, covered by the American flag, was borne on the shoulders of the pall-bearers, Sergeant Kranz, Sgt. M. Dewar, Sgt. Russell and Sgt. Hachey to his last resting place, where Corp. Parker sounded "Last Post." The flags at the U. S. consulate and American vessel in the harbour were at half mast.

Pte. Armand Comeau enlisted with the A. E. F. in Boston, was transferred to Camp Upton, Company B. 305 infantry, 77 division and went overseas in May 1918.

He first was under fire at the battle of Chateau Thierry and at St. Mihiel. Private Comeau who was a sniper fell instantly killed by a shell fragment and was buried on the spot along with many others on the 3rd October, 1918.

About a year later his body was exhumed and buried in another cemetery in France. From there he was again exhumed by the Graves Registration Service and brought to Hoboken, N. J. on October 5th 1921 and thence to Campbellton.

Hon. J. B. M. Baxter Here Monday—Will Try to Procure Victim.

Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, Minister of Customs arrived here Sunday evening, after holding his Sunday meeting at Bathurst, and met a few of the faithful Monday morning, when it was decided to call a convention of the government supporters here on Thursday, Nov. 10.

Mr. Baxter was in a great hurry and had little time to discuss details, but he assured the faithful that if the necessary victim could be found, the "Sineux of war" would not be lacking.

MURDER NOW IS SUSPECTED

Investigation of Circumstances Now Under Way by Officials.

At first it was thought that he had been shot in mistake for a moose but circumstances have arisen which point to possible murder and an investigation of all the circumstances is now under way. The Graphic understands that there are many points of evidence pointing to a certain man, and developments are expected.

Mr. Roy and Mr. P. W. Hamilton were hunting near the above lake when the shooting took place. Although Mr. Hamilton called loudly for help no one responded, although the shot was fired at only between one and two hundred yards distance.

When Corporal Ellis visited the scene of the shooting, the foot prints of the man firing the shot were found in the mud.

CANDIDATES NOW TOTAL TWENTY-TWO

Liberals Have Nine, Conservatives Eight and Progressives Five.

St. John, Nov. 2.—A brief survey of candidates for the eleven New Brunswick seats in the House of Commons shows that the Liberal party already has nine men in the running, the Conservatives have eight official candidates and the Progressives number five. The government lacks candidates in Kent, Gloucester and Restigouche-Madawaska. Six former members, A. B. Copp, O. Turgeon Pius Michaud, T. W. Caldwell, A. T. Leger and R. B. Hanson, are offering again for re-election. Hon. R. W. Wignmore, Stanley E. Elkin, Major-General H. H. McLean, W. S. Loggie and T. A. Hart are not seeking another term.

In St. John-Albert Dr. W. P. Brodick, who was nominated at the Liberal convention, still is without a running mate. The Conservatives are depending on Hon. Dr. J. B. M. Baxter and Colonel Murray MacLaren, C.M.G. H. R. McLellan also has announced his intention of running.

Dr. D. H. McAllister, a former M.P., is the Liberal nominee in Royal Geo. B. Jones, M.P., is the government choice, and G. E. Perkins will stand for the Progressives.

In Westmorland, A. B. Copp, who has represented the constituency for several terms, will once more represent the Liberal party in the fight. He is opposed by A. E. Trites, Progressive, and Col. S. Boyd Anderson has been offered the Conservative nomination.

In Kent, A. T. Leger, the recent member is running for the Liberals, and Alex. J. Doucet received the Progressive nomination.

In Northumberland, the Liberals have named Hon. John Morrissey to oppose E. A. McCurdy, Conservative.

In Gloucester and Restigouche-Madawaska, there is no opposition so far to the Liberal standard-bearers, O. Turgeon and Pius Michaud, who represent these constituencies, respectively in the last parliament.

R. B. Hanson, K.C., who was elected last spring in York-Sunbury, but never took his seat, is standing again as a conservative candidate. Lieut. Col. W. J. Osborne received the Liberal nomination, and E. W. Stairs was the Progressive choice, but the latter has not made known yet whether or not he intends to accept.

In Carleton-Victoria, B. Frank Smith, Conservative, will contest the seat against Thomas W. Caldwell, Progressive.

In Charlotte county, two candidates, Liberal and Conservative are in the field in a straight party fight. W. E. Todd carries the Liberal banner, and E. W. Grimmer, former M.P., is the Melghen candidate.

Five more weeks remain before polling day, which is on December 6.

DECLARES LAURIE REFUSED A PEERAGE

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux Reveals Some Inside History in this Connection.

Shawinigan, Falls, Que. Oct. 31.—That a scheme to secure that portion of the Government Railway system formerly known as the Canadian Northern, of the incus debt, is being hatched by a group of Chicago, New York and Toronto, was one of the declarations made here yesterday by Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, in addressing a meeting on behalf of Hon. Jacques Bureau, Liberal candidate for Three Rivers-Sr. Maurice constituency. Incidentally, Hon. Mr. Lemieux revealed some inside history in connection with Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who he said had twice declined a peerage. The first offer was made in 1897 by the late Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, Secretary of State for the Colonies, and the second a little later by Lord Minto, then Governor-General of Canada.

All through last night the physicians attending Lady Laurie had expressed the fear that the end was at hand. Lady Laurie was in her eightieth year and caught a chill while out walking recently. Sir Wilfrid Laurie died February 17, 1919.

Halifax, Oct. 30.—There passed away yesterday morning at 3.30 o'clock at the Ladies' Home, Halifax, N. S. Mrs. Isabella Chisholm, widow of Archibald Chisholm, of Dalhousie, N. B. About two weeks ago the deceased lady had a rather serious fall and had almost recovered from the effects of it when, on Friday afternoon, she was seized with a severe heart attack. Mrs. Chisholm was born at Chatham, N. B., and after her marriage made Dalhousie her home. In the fall of 1913 she returned from a lengthy visit to Vancouver, B. C., to Campbellton, coming to the Ladies' Home in April, 1914, where she has enjoyed real home comforts. She had made herself genuinely beloved and having been unusually alert for her advanced years, was of comfort to these not so generously blessed. She was a member of St. John's Presbyterian Church and devoted great comfort and pleasure from her association with that religious body. A funeral service was held this afternoon in connection with the usual Sunday afternoon gathering, and there were present a large number of the ladies who have been the deceased's constant associates for several years, and who naturally mourn the loss of their friendly companion. The remains will leave on the Ocean Limited on Monday morning for Dalhousie, N. B., to be laid beside those of her husband.

KILLED IN FIGHT.

THROWN INTO RIVER

Buffalo, Oct. 28.—That K. R. Losey, twenty years old, student at Wesleyan University, Middletown, Conn., was stabbed dead during a fight and that his body was later thrown into the Niagara River, was the opinion expressed by Dr. Earl G. Danzer, county medical examiner, after an inquest. The body believed to be that of Losey was found floating in the river Thursday night.

The inquest disclosed that Losey's right elbow had been dislocated and the muscles of the arm torn, apparently in a struggle. The condition of the lungs and other organs showed that the young man was dead before he was thrown into the water, the medical examiner said.

Detectives canvassed hotels, rooming houses and railroad stations in a vain effort to get information on the movements of Losey while he was in this city. Theatre seat checks, found in the pockets, indicated that he had attended performances on October 14 and 15, while railway rebate check showed that he had been to Niagara Falls on Sunday, Oct. 16. After that there is no trace of his movements.
