


PIGEONS IN WARFARE. Were Used Extensively During the Boer War.

The birds brought messages from all the towns beleaguered by the Boer in-vaders, and when Sir George White's force was cooped up in Ladysmith winged messengers carried several de-spatches from that gallant officer to the men who were slowly fighting their way to his relief. The first war in which pigeons were

used as messengers was the Franco Prussian, and the birds carried news into and out of besieged Paris. A post was established at Tours, and right through the siege regular mails were carried between Paris and Tours by pigeons.


