OTTAWA, Sept. S.—The announcement of Sir Hector's resignation revives the interest in the decision of the Committee on Privileges and Elections upon his case. A report which has many believers is that the majority have taken hold of the less formidable horn of the dilemma, that they are willing to admit that the Minister was incompetent, but not that he was corrupt. The practical result would be that he would lose his position in the Ministry but not his seat in the House, which could be forfeited only by his corrupt receipt of money. The first part of this programme has already been carried out, and it is altogether likely that the majority of the Committee on Privileges and Elections will not go the length of recommending the expulsion of the ex-Minister from the House.

LONDON PRESBYTERY.

The State of Religion Is Discussed by Leading Clergymen

The Best Means to Raise Money Church Work-The Doctrine of Commended.

Monday at 3 p.m., in connection with the meeting of the London Presbytery in Park Avenue Church, a conference was held on "The State of Religion." Rev. Thomas Wilson occupied the chair, and Rev. James Bailantyne acted as secretary. "The Discouragements and Encouragements of the Pastor" was the first subject, ably introduced by Rev. W. S. Ball, London township. Among the discouragements the speaker slinded to those of the world which might be expected from the nature of things, and incidentally it was pointed out that discouragements arise from ministers not attending prayer meetings when abroad, thereby showing a poor example; also from ministers in conversation speaking slightingly of prayer meetings. Neglect by Christians of Christian ordinances while at watering places was also poor encouragement to pastors at such points. Another discouragement was when elders and managers fail to uphold their pastors by remaining away from prayer meetings and refusing to take part in them. Still another discouragement was when men who ought to do so give no help in bringing others into the fold, or when superintendents and clers never speak a personal word for Christ.

Among the encouragements the speaker, included success. To win even one soul is a success. Nothing keeps up a minister's heart like the winning of souls. The prayers and active sympathy of church members is a great encouragement. When men and women share in the work or spreading the knowledge of Christ, it is an encouragement. but the greatest encouragement is a strong faith in God, and this always affords solace to ministers in dark times.

One speaker complained that parishioners did not send word of sickness in their homes, and then sometimes complained if the minister did not call.

CHURCH CONTRIBUTIONS.

The best means for raising money for church work in congregations was introduced by Rev. Mr. Sawers, of Westminster, who mainly advocated the weekly offering system. It is considerably in vogue in city churches already, but is not regarded so workable in country parts; though why it should not be can scarcely be understood where markets are so near and change so convenient. But the envelope system is only tentative, and back of it must be inculcation of the true view that all wealth belongs to God. Education is needed as to responsibility for the talent of wealth. Ministers must give themselves, for precept without example means nothing. The ideal way of the future was to have one sufficient fund for all purposes kept full by the educated conscience of the people. An interesting discussion followed, and in closing the debate Mr. Sawer strongly pressed the doctrine of systematic giving and suggested how the doctrine might be made a practical reality.

TYPHOID FEVER ON CRAIG STREET.

The Matter To Be Thoroughly Sifted a Next Friday's Meeting.

Next Friday's Meeting.

Ald. Skinner (in the chair), Dr. Hutchinson (acting secretary), Dr. Gardiner, Health Inspector Bell, Aldermen Wyatt, Ivey, Thomas, Wilkey and Mr. Heaman were present at Monday afternoon's meeting of the Board of Health. Dr. Hutchinson stated that the principal object of calling this meeting was with reference to the tyyphoid fever outbreak on Craig street, South London. He said it was probably caused by the filling up of the drain at the foot of the hill, as the drainage all collects in small ponds, while at present there is a scum lying on the top of these. Another suggestion made was that the odor from gravel recently laid along there caused the outbreak. There were then four houses placarded, and as many more cases were expected in a day or two. Dr. Gardiner stated that there were about a dozen and a half cases of fever which he considered all typhoid. A six-inch drain should be laid to carry off the refuse.

Ald. Thomas thought it would not cost more than \$100 to drain the sewerage from the pond, and \$25 a year would keep it in repair.

Dr. Hutchinson was instructed to bring

in a definite report with respect to who is emptying sewerage into the flats on Craig street, and also who is using city water and who well water. 





Harrison dared Genius to touch the grain. There was an interchange of passionate words, and suddenly Genius put his gun to his shoulder and leveled tight his brother, who was two rods away. The heavy charge of shot struck Harrison on the neck and the left breast, inflicting frightful wounds. The shooting was witnessed by two men, a third brother and a halfbreed, who were working in the field. They at once took flight and notified neighbors of the terrible occurrence. Genius, when he saw his brother bedeing on the ground, carried water to the wounded man who had been the victim of his rage, and laved his neck and shoulders with the hope of undoing what he had done. When he saw neighbors coming he left. He made no attempt to escape from the district, and submitted quietly to arrest when found shortly afterwards. There are four Webb brothers living near Balder, three of whom live together, Geni-ra living by himself, unmarried. Their father lives in London, Ont. where he is a well-known builder.
