LONDON, May 9.—In regard to the fire at Scott's Hotel a later dispatch says fifteen persons were sleeping in the place. The building was entirely gutted. The four bodies recovered were those of wait-resses who were on the top floor and sought to make their escape by means of a window, but they found it impossible to get it open. While they were struggling with the sash the fire cut off their escape. Their shrieks and cries for help could be heard on the street, but it was beyond human power to aid them. The lower part of the restaurant was a roaring, seething mass of flames. The other eleven persons saved themselves by rushing to the roof and reaching an adjoining building.

Make a Note of It.

LONDON, May 9 .- The coroner's jury at Fulham returned a verdict of manslaughter against Susan Clark, wife of a workingman, for causing the death of her stepdaughter, aged 9 years and 10 months. Mrs. Clark, like Mrs. Montagu, was actuated by "a sense of duty" to starve and beat the child. She had no dark room in which to imprison the poor little martyr, but she found a satisfying substitute in the stair banisters, to which the child was semetimes tied for seven hours at a stretch. It will be interesting to see whether common Mrs. Clark will be let off with twelve menths' imprisonment spent in a comfortable infirmary and allowed to wear her own clothes like aristocratic Mrs. Montagu. The probabilities are that the workman's wife will spend at least eighteen months in prison at hard labor and clad in a convict garb, which will add emphasis to the complaint recently made by a London police magistrate, that there appeared to be one law for the rich and another for the poor in this favored land.

THE LONDON ELECTION STEAL CONDONED.

Last night Sir John Thompson called upon his followers in the House of Commons to vote down the following motion, proposed by Mr. Lister, M.P.:

"That a copy of the petition laid upon the table of this House from Thomas Hobbs and others, complaining of the conduct of William Elliot, Eq., county judge of Middlesex, in relation to the revision of the Middlesex, in relation to the revision of the voters' list for the electoral district of the city of London, be forthwith furnished him for his information, and to enable him to make such statement or answer to the clurges therein contained as he may deem proper, and that the said petition and any such answer as the said judge may make be referred to a special committee of this House to inquire into the truth of the several ellegations therein, with a view of finding whether such charges should be investigated by a commission."

To any one acquainted with the facts of the case, and willing to consider them in an impartial manner, this action must be regarded as altogether unwarranted. The Judge Price, Kingston motion had for its foundation the belief of over one-half of the people of London that the seat in the House of Commons now occupied by Mr. Carling was stolen from Mr. Hyman, who was elected by a majority of 22 of the legal votes cast, and it was supported by sworn stestimony that Judge Elliot, whose action after the election con summated the outrage, had acted the part of a partisan. The petition to Parliament recited these facts, which were indorsed by Mr. Lister, on his responsibility as a member of Parliament, and yet even the simple preliminaries to an investigation are denied. The only interpretation that can be put upon this burking expedient is that Sir John Thompson and Mr. Carling know that they dare not risk the holding of an impartial inquiry.

The defenders of the outrage in Parlia ment have not attempted to meet the facts. They have contented themselves with busing the reputable citizens who, for the purposes of getting the case before Parliament, signed the petition for an inquiry. We tell the advocates of this scandalous transaction that those citizens of London are fully as respectable as either Judge Elliot, Mr. Carling, or the special pleaders who rose in the House to oppose investigation. We tell them further that their view that there has been a gross failure of justice in this capable of amendment. city, by the direct connivance of Judge Elliot and Mr. Carling, protected by the set that decision, as the law explicitly co infamous Franchise Act which gives no appeal to a higher court from the county judge, is supported by over one-half of the people of London, as well as by the judgment of two county judges and six Superior

Court judges. With these facts before them, the honest public will be astounded at the decree of Sir John Thompson, and at the servile attitude of his followers. That they may keep Mr. Carling in a seat to which he is not entitled, these men are contented to leave the grave charges against a judge uninvestigated, and to show that they care neither for the independence of the bench nor for the welfare of the common

We leave it to the independent electors of Canada to say whether this method of smothering up accusations so grave, so circumstantially made, so strongly supported, is in accord with the view that the public interests shall be paramount in the administration of justice, and that no charge against officers of the Crown shall be left uninvestigated.



DEATH-DEALING FLAMES.

Yesterday they imbibed too treely, and about 9 o'clock in the evening they are supposed so have upset the lamp. At any rate Mrs. McNeil, attracted by the shrieks of the old woman, went to see what was wrong, and was horrifed to find the rear of the house in flames. Mrs. McNeil was excited and did not know where to go to give the alatm. She told some men who were passing and box 31 was pulled. The firemen were soon on the spot, and in a few minutes had the blaze extinguished. The building is a total wreck.

During the progress of the fire the old couple were in a small bedroom. A young man named Harry Sweet noticed Mrs. McIonis leaning against the window, and with timely presence of mind he kicked in the frame and pulled her out. She was unconscious and badly burned about the arms and back. P. C. Thomas Howise telephoned for the ambulance and the woman was taken to the hospital. The physicians say she will recover.

An Eight-Tailed Comet.

New York, May 10.—In a letter to the Heraid Prof. Barnard, of the Lick Observatory on Mount Hamilton, Cal., says on April 10 he secured a photograph of Swift's comet in which eight tails were shown. The comet, he states, is still a naked-eye object and will be easily seen as soon as the moon withdraws from the morning sky. It is passing a short distance west of the great Square of Pegassus. The head is as bright as a star of the fourth magnitude. Photographs will be made at the observatory regularly of the comet as long as it remains visible. In the photo the lens was made to follow the comet in its motion among the stars. Each star has therefore trailed its image on the plate, producing a short line of light representing the motion of the comet during the exposure. The most remarkable of these is the one made April 7, where a unique phenomenon of the comet's tails is shown in the southern track of the trail as a projection. The pictures show the rapid changes that take place in the tails from day to day.
