IN LABOR'S FIELD.

Thousands of Men Discharged from Massachusetts Mills.

Railway Companies Cutting Down Ex-penses by Reducing the Number of Their Employes.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 7 .- The Southern San Francisco, Aug. 7.—The Southern Pacific Company, in pursuing a policy of retrenchment, has discharged 1,000 employes and decreased its monthly pay roll not less than \$75,000, or at the rate of \$900,000 annually. The discharged men were on the Pacific system, or lines west of El Paso and Ogden and south of Portland. A reduction has also been made on the Atlantic system east of El Paso. This wholesale discharges of employes is in addition to recent reductions of daily hours of labor in the zarious chops of the system, where the men are paid by the hour, making a 10 per cent, reduction in time, said to be equivalent to the discharge one by a majority of 43 and the other by a time, said to be equivalent to the discharge of 600 men. The number of shopmen that have here discharged outright is not less than 250. Dismissals from the force of rackmen are on a wholesale scale, for not ess than 550 of these employes have been

less than 550 of these employes have been discharged.

The force of telegraph operators has also felt the official axe, for between ten and twenty of them have been discharged and several train dispatching offices have been abolished. The company has cut flown its daily passenger train mileage fully 1,500 miles. Economy in train service has caused the displacement of about 120 trainmen, including engineers, brake.

the has caused the displacement of about 12 trainmen, including engineers, brakemen and conductors. The number of trainmen now on extra or waiting list without pay is said to be over 250, the largest in the history of the company.

CONCRESS IN SESSION. Probable Features of the President's Message.

Unconditional Repeal of the Sherman Silver Act—Coinage to be Sus-pended Except for Subsidiary Purposes.

Washington, Aug. 7.—The Senate was called to order at noon. After the President's proclamation was read the oath of office was administered to senators.

From sources believed to be well informed, it is learned the message will recommend the unconditional repeal of the Sherman Act.

Pro-silver Democrats express themselves agreeably surprised at what they understand to be the moderation of the President's recommendations. They are informed that while he recommends the unconditional repeal of Sherman Act, he recognizes that repeal of Sheiman Act, he recognizes that sliver is one of the money metals of the country which must be maintained, but points out that with the present attitude of European countries the proper ratio between gold and sliver cannot be maintained by this country alone. Therefore he does not faver the coinage of sliver under present conditions except for subsidiary purposes.

He thinks the European nations who are now depressing the price of sliver can, by the suspension of its coinage in this country except for subsidiary purposes, be coerced into an international agreement more favorable than we have had heretolore. repeal of Sherman Act, he recognizes tha

He is in favor of silver on a parity with
gold, and stands by the platform of 1892,
but says that that platform cannot be

At 3:30 p.m. yesterday, as he had not been seen since the previous day, Mrs. Townsend became suspicious and forced an entrance into his room. She found him stretched out on the bed dead. A bottle which had contained landanum ler.

stretched out on the bed dead. A bottle which had contained laudanum lay on the floor. A gold watch was ticking on the mantel shelf and a roll of nine \$1 bank notes lay beside it. On the table was a letter, which was intended only for the cyes of the women to whom it was addressed:

Miss Martha Calthias, Toronto, Untario, Canada;

Ward No. 11, Toronto Insane Asylum.

Nothing is ascred, however, in the eyes of the police. The seal was broken and its contents devoured by a police sergeant before the arrival of the coroner.

This letter stated that the suicide was a German by birth, 35 years oid and the victim of an unhappy marriage. He became slightly demented and was confined in the Insane Asylum in Toronto. He fell in love with a pretty nurse in the woman's ward, and when his condition improved he accepted a position as attendant in the saylum so that he could be near her. He had not been divorced, however, and the fact that he could not marry her finally caused him to leave Toronto in despair, the came to New York and tried to forget the nurse, but in vain. In his letter he said:

It would be difficult to find a story of more atrocious inhumanity than one brought out at an inquest over the drowning of a and in the Surrey Canal on Friday. The evidence showed that several men watched the boy drown by the side of a canal boat, almost within arm's reach, without raising a hand to save him. It was then brought out that there is a standing reward of five shillings for recovering a dead body, but none for saving human life. Witnesses testified that it has happened several times that persons have been drowned while the canal men idly looked on. The latter have been heard to say:

"Let him go. We get nothing if we pull him out alive. We shall get a bit for recovering the body."

The coroner said that formerly there was a reward offered for rescuing the drowning, and men used to push each other into the water for the sake of getting the

money. A Plague of Wasps. All the southern counties of England are almost in a panic over the plague of wasps. 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
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

President Hill Discourses to the Seniors

President Hill Discourses to the senters

on Complete Manhood.

President Hill opened the 43rd commencement of the University of Rochester, preaching the baccalaureate sermon in the Central Presbyterian Church. Dr. Hill chose as the text of his discourse the pasage from Colossians ii., 10: "And ye are complete in him, who is the head of all principality and power." Among other things he said:

The chief stimulus to human activity is the sense of our incompleteness. While development is a universal law of nature, self-development is a peculiar characteristic of man. All living things instinctively seek the preservation and expansion of life.

Every clod feels a sit of might. on Complete Manhood.

"Every clod feels a sir of night,
An instinct within it that reaches and
towers,
And grasping blindly above it for light,
Climbs to a soul in grass and flowers."
But man alone beholds the splendid vision
of self-perfection. He alone feels the thrill of moral obligation, the debt of emergent faculty to its new possibilities of duty. While other creatures are satisfied with

faculty to its new possibilities of duty. While other creatures are satisfied with mere being, he responds to the imperative voice of an invisible master and is filled with the sublime passion of becoming.

There is no period or condition of imman life in which this sense of incompletness is not felt. Childhood presses forward with eager step and keen expectation to the estate of manhood. Manhood is fertile in unattained ideals and its vigor is spent, when it is not wantonly wasted, in efforts to increase the wealth, the wisdom and the weilfare of the world. A SOCIALISTIS EXPERIMENT.

The monopoly of the liquor business which has been assumed by South Carolina is an experiment in State socialism, and therefore it will be generally useful as an object lesson. That State is making a beginning in the way of carrying out the Farmers' Alliance theory.

Theoretically the State will pay a large part of its expenses out of profits which formerly were reaped by private enterprise. It charges 50 per cent. profit on the liquor sold to the county dispensaries as its share of the gain. Then the dispensaries are required to sell the liquor at 50 per cent. additional profit, that a gain to be divided between the town and the county.

Moreover, as the State has a monopoly of the traffic, it will not be subject to the competition which under the laws of trade tends to the reduction of prices. It can charge 100 per cent. profit right along and take in the proceeds. As the demand increases, its gain will increase proportion ately, for it will furnish the whole supply. To figure up his profits at starting, Governor Tillman had only to estimate the cost of the liquor consumed in the State and add as much more.

That was the assumption; but the actual working of the State liquor traffic as a

cost of the liquor consumed in the State and add as much more.

That was the assumption; but the actual working of the State liquor traffic as a means of public revenue has been diappointing to its advocates thus far. Human nature has stood in the way. Of course the private liquor dealers who were to be driven out of business took pains to get rid of their stocks before the law went into operation; and the forced sales which were the consequences sent down the price to consumers, so that the people were tempted to improve the opportunity by laying in large quantities of alcohole beverages.

Hence the State's liquor shops begin business with the demand largely supplied for several months to come. At present the liquor investment is not paying. Mr. Tillman,'s estimate of profits has not yet been justified by experience. So far the monopoly has not proved valuable; and the preliminary circumvention of it gives warning of continued attempts to defeat it by taking advantage of prices regulated by the laws of trade instead of paying prices arbitrarily fixed by the law of the State to give up their practice of buying where they can get an article cheapest and to change totally their social habits at the same time.

That theory is that the State should have the monopoly of all business; and no better test of it could be made than by monopolizing the liquor traffic, as South Carolina has done. has done.
