The Great Mass Meeting in the Grand Opera House Last Night.

Splendid Reception and Sensible Address of the Citizen Candidate.

Honest John Dryden and Hon. Geo. W. Ross, the Silver-Tongued Son of Middlesex, Also Heard From-Exposure of the Contentions of Messrs. Marter and Howland-The Mowat Government Will Hold the Fort for Another Four Years-Mr. Marter Hopelessly in the Minority-Mr. Hobbs on the Foolish Bachelor Cry-The Minister of Agriculture on the "Peanut" Politics of Mr. Marter-Hon. G. W. Ross Dissects the "Three Mr. Esserys" Amid Uproarious Laughter-Unbounded Enthusiasm of the Audience-Hundreds Turned Away.

Before 7 o'clock last night tides of humanity began to flow from all portions of the city toward the corner of King and Richmond streets.

At 7 o'clock the tide had flooded a portion of King street at the main entrance of the Grand Opera House.

At 7:15 the torrent grew so broad and deep that it threatened to sweep the doors away, and when these floodgates were removed it surged through the corridors, filling the great interior and overflowing into the aisles and open passages and back into the street again. Hundreds upon hundreds were turned away; even the ladies found no vacant flooring for their tiny feet. They lined up by the hundred along the passageways, in the boxes and around the platform; every nook and cranny was filled. Not even at the great meeting last June, when the veteran Premier was welcomed, was the crowd greater than last night. It was an earnest, bright, intelligent audience, also, and the good points which the speakers made were warmly cheered. Even the interruptions were good-natured, and altogether the meeting was the most enthusiastic that has been held in the city for many days.

The speeches were good. The orators held the audience spell-bound from the time the chairman set the ball rolling till the last sentence of the last speaker, Mr. T. H. Pardom, was uttered. The opponents of the citizen candidate have been saying he could not talk; but the address which Mr. Hobbs made last night shows that he can talk as well as the best of them, always excepting the professionals. But Mr. Hobbs talks to the point. He said more in five minutes last night than his opponent said in half an hour when he appeared in the same place last week. Mr. Hobbs, however, recognizes that time is money to all busy people, and he does not use a million words to say what a busy man can say by using a thousand words. That Mr. Hobbs is a universal favorite was demonstrated by the deafening cheers with which he was greeted.

The visiting statesmen had an ovation, and their addresses left an impression in marked contrast with the speeches made by Mr. Marter and Mr. Howland last week. They did not tire anyone, and kept the audience in the greatest good humor. The speech of Hon, John Dryden, Minister of Agriculture, was that of a practical farmer-a successful man, a hard worker, an able administrator. His arraignment of the "peanut politics," surplus contentions and prohibition hedging of Mr. Marter was thoroughly enjoyed by the audience. The speech of the evening, in point of oratorical effect, was given by Hon. George W. Ross, Minister of Education, the honored son of Middleger, It was strongly argumentative, good-natured, conclusive in its points.

"This afternoon I had handed to me a document by two prominent citizens asking me to state my position in regard to temperance. The document reads as follows: "London, Nov. 12, 1891.

T. S. Hobbs, Esq., London, Ont.: "Dear Sir,-Will you pledge yourself in writing, and, if possible, on the public platform, that if elected to the Local Legislature, you will do all in your power, irrespective of party affiliations, to procure the restriction and prohibition by law of the manufacture, importation and sale of intoxicating liquors as a beverage to the extent of the powers vested in the Legislature? An immediate reply is requested for publication.

"Signed on behalf of the London and Western Ontario Prohibition Union. " F. W. DALY, Secretary.

"I may say that at the last election Mr. Daly sent me a document asking my opinion on this question, and that opinion I will now read to you as given then, and it has not changed since:

"London, Ont., June 15, 1894. "F. W. Daly, E.q., 536, Dufferin avenue,

"Dear Sir, -I have your communication, in which, as secretary of the London and Western Ontario Prohibition Union, you ask my attitude respecting prohibition and

the license question. " 'In reply I may say: First, in general terms, that, as you are aware, the Premier of the Province has promised, if the courts decide that he has the jurisdiction in the matter, to bring in such prohibitory legislation as will comply with the voice of the people as embodied in the plebiscite vote of last January. I should certainly feel it my duty to heartily support the honorable the Premier in carrying out to the full every pledge he has given, and I need scarcely add that my principles would not change if there should be a change of Government. "As to the proposal to go back to some form of municipal control of licenses I consider it a very important question and,

if elected to the Ontario Legislature, I will do all I can to prevent the transference of the control of the liquor traffic, and the responsibility for the enforcement of laws relating to it, from the Provincial Government to any local body. To do so would be to demoralize every municipal council in Ontario. It would not be fair either to license-holders or to temperance people, "I am of opinion that as a license law the Crooks Act is the best that has yet been devised. Respectfully yours. "THOMAS S. HOBBS."

"That was my reply to the temperance people of that date, and it is my reply today. (Cheers.) Gentlemen, I may say in conclusion that I have not sought political honors. I have been chosen to contest London, and I will do all I can to win it fairly, and if I do win I will endeavor to serve you faithfully." (Loud cheers).

HON. JOHN DRYDEN.

The clever Minister of Agriculture was received warmly and made a brilliant speech. He said it was the first time he had addressed a London audience, and he was perfectly delighted with it. He dis-

Dryden, and then introduced the candidate particular party which he chooses; but I do object when in his long speech there is not one word declaring what his policy is for the improvement and upbuilding of the country. The only thing he has to say is: 'Whatever I can do for my party I am ready to do willingly, cheerfully and honthere is no difference between parties. I repudiate this doctrine, and no man who studies the history of this country can come to such a conclusion. You have in the first place Mr. Mowat. His record is written plainly in the statute book. There has been no subject too difficult for him to deal with." Mr. Dryden then alluded to Sir Oliver's masterly management of the municipal loan fund, the public works, culminating in the magnificent parliament buildings.
"Of course we looked for something great when Mr. Marter came here the other night to propound his policy. New brooms sweep clean, the ladies say, and we expected a clean sweep. What did we find? Mr. Marter's speech was fully six years old. (Laughter.) For six long years I have heard the same tale. There is not a (Cheers.) Why? Because he found the position of the Government impregnable. So he told the old, old story, and asked that Mr. Mowat be put out. There were only two reasons for this in Mr. Marter's speech: First, the Government was not economical; second, it was untruthful and dishonest. The speaker had always been an economist. There was a great need of it in Dominion consistent now, and let him declare that he will put anybody else out who is not econ-

omical. "There was a similar cry a number of years ago, but it was not 'economy'-then it was 'prosperity.' They asked the farmer if he did not want to get higher prices for his produce, and asked the workman if he did not want higher wages. 'Yes,' they all answered. 'Then,' they were told, 'the only way to get it is to turn out Alexander Mackenzie and put in the other fellows. And the people said: 'Yes, we will,' and they did, and have been burdened with this prosperity ever since. You will get just as much economy by turning out Sir Oliver Mowat and putting in Mr. Marter as you got prosperity by turning out Mr. Mackenzie. Talking about economy Mr. Marter does not say that we have put up too many places, that the public buildings have cost too much. He does not say that works all over the country have cost too much, but he did say there are certain officers in some public institutions who have men consuming too many eggs. And, by the way, I want to tell any of Mr. Marter's friends who are here that he must not say that again. That is going to offend the Patrons in the House. They want to inerease the consumption of eggs. (Laughter a half too much a bottle, and somebody has dirtied too many handkerchiefs. He confessed that these were small things, but he need not have said soeverybody knew that. (Applause.) I have heard on the other side of 'peanut politics,' but I didn't think it would strike this country so soon. When Mr. Marter appeared in this section I expected to hear the tread of heavy artillery and the rumble of great cannon. And what did we hear? Why, the noise of popguns instead." (Ap-

Mr. Dryden then dealt in a masterful manner with the finances of he Province. If they had saved as much money as Mr. Marter wanted them to they would now have about twenty-two ode million dollars lying idle. The Opposition would then have a stronger case then they have now, and would have asked the people to turn out the Government because it did not know enough to invest the capital of the Province. "I don't deny," said Mr. Dryden,

that we have increased the expenditure. It has been largely made up of three thirgs: We have increased our expenditure in regard to hospitals, asylums and so forth some \$700,000 since the time of John Sanfield Macdonald; we have increased the expenditure in connection with education some three hundred odd thousand dollars, and we have increased the expenditure in agriculture during the last four or five years considerably. What I want to know s whether we have been right in doing this? Mr. Marter savs we do not tell the truth, and deceive the people. I want to deny it. I won't say that Mr. Marter is a liar, because that would be unparliamentary. (Laughter.) But I will say that if Mr. Marter speaks truth, then I am a liar. (More laughter.) He says we have not got a surplus. I say we have. He says the facts are not as stated by us, I say the facts are exactly as they are stated by us. (Applause.) He says if there is any surplus he will ask Mr. Essery to resign and my friend Mr. Hobbs will be elected by acclamation. am going to demand that that be carried (Cheers.)

Producing the Provincial Treasurer's report, Mr. Dryden went on to show that there was a surplus of over \$6,000,000. It consisted of debentures, moneys held by the Dominion Government, upon which interest is annually paid to the Province, and bank balances held in the banks at the time the treasurer makes up his report. Mr. Dryden ridiculed Mr. Marter's method of arguing that a government was bankrupt because it had not enough cash on hand to meet liabilities falling due 25 or 30 years hence. By the same reason he would prove every man a bankrupt. Mr. Marter forgot that, like a business concern, the Government depended on moneys accruing from year to year to meet liabilities falling due. and if the expenditures of years to come was to be considered, the income of those years should be taken into account.

"We not only have a cash surning," said Mr. Drvden, "but we have a cash surplus in reality more than Sanfield Macdonald had before he left office." (Cheers.)

"With regard to prohibition, Mr. Marter first says to the licensed victuallers: I am the man who placed your licenses in ecpardy. I am the man who brought this hont. I sowed the seed which is now bringing forth fruit. I was the man who introduced a bill in the House, which didn't pass, but it has forced the question on us, and you find you are in your present predicament. Therefore, I don't think I can get any votes from you.' Then he says to the prohibitionists: 'I want you to sup-(Continued on Page 3.)



But the water commissioners are not now on trial. The man on trial is Mayor Essery. And he will not denv:

1. That Mr. Essery pledged himself and the Council to the Legislature that not a cent of the \$50,000 would be spent unless voted by the taxpayers.

2. That Mr. Essery has broken this promise, and permitted the money to be spent and the future of the taxpayers mortgaged without a vote of the people. 3. That Mr. Essery has eigned a petition

to the Lieutenant-Governor in Council asking to have the will of the people ignored and the money granted in spite of them.

4. That unless Sir Oliver Mowat comes to the rescue of the city and permits Mr. Essery to break the law the citizens will have immediately to put their hands in their pockets and pay the \$50,000 in increased and four months at hard labor. He taxation.

Eat Their Fellow Men. NEW YORK, Nov. 13 .- The Herald's Vancouver, B. C., special says: According to latest advices from Australia by the steamer Miowara word has been received at Sydney from the Bisbay Archipelago MR. ESSERY'S OPINION OF THE that a native uprising has taken place on all the islands near New Guinea, and that the European settlers have all been murdered by the Kanakees. The steamer Three Cheers, of Sydney, reports calling at Admiralty Island

and New Ireland with supplies, and finding the trading posts in ashes and white men nowhere to be found, while the trading Tories knew as much about the Bible schooner was also burned to the water's edge. On the approach of the vessel to Admiralty Island the natives fled to the hills, until not a soul remained in the villages. They feared that the white men ONE HUNDRED PEOPLE KILLED had come for vengeance. On landing the first tears of the cartain were realized. Traces | Disastrous of a cannibal feast of recent date were found. Without doubt all the inhabitants of the trading posts had met with the most horrible of deaths, being tortured and violent shocks of earthquake along the afterward devoured by the cannibals. Carlsen and Miller, two of the victims, were prominent citizens of Sydney, and in that city a movement is on foot to ask the Government to allow a company of volunteers to visit Admiralty Island and avenge the death of their fellow citizens. At New Ireland the Australian trading post was burned to the ground. A prominent white trader named Rodjohn was missing, while it is feared the entire white population have all met with a horrible death at the hands of the man-eating natives, As massacres are reported on other islands, it is thought the natives stole the liquor at the trading post, which was burned to the ground. The effect on their semi-civilized natures was to convert them again into the wild native state from which they had so

Because responsible government was denied us; because a family compact trampled under foot the principles and independence of the people. True to our Saxon teachings in the art of government we insisted that responsible government introduced into England by the revolution of 1688 should be transferred to this great colony, and as the result of that revolution we got it for the Province of Ontario. (Cheers.) We honor those who secured this result. As Canadians we cannot honor them too

highly for this NOBLE ACT OF PATRIOTISMthis noble act of patriotism which gave us what in the Province of Ontario is perfect liberty as citizens to manage our own affairs, which is perfection of political liberty. For the best system of secondary education, of which the London Collegiate Institute was one of the highest types, the award was given to Ontario. (Cheers.) For the best system of trained teachers Ontario received the award. (Cheers) That was not all. For the best text-books and the best system of preparing text-books Ontario also received the highest award. (Renewed cheers.) "Our orponents say that we should have a chief superintendent of schools instead of a Minister; but a system conducted by a minister that gave you such results you will not change quickly, no matter how it is administered. We have beaten the world; there is nothing else to beat. (Cheers.) Like Alexander, we have conquered the world, and there is no other world to conquer, and we stand by that record, for we cannot fall. (Cheers.) Our opponents say we administer the system for political purposes. We defy them to the issue. Mr. Meredith, with all his ability, has been challenged in the House, and has never been able to point to an instance where political favoritism was shown, It cannot be done." (Cheers.)

THE FRANCHISE. Mr. Ross concluded with a rousing appeal for the support of the Liberal Government. They gave the franchise to every man in the country 21 years of age who behaved himself. They gave the franchise to woman in municipal elections. They gave the workingman beneficial laws. gave mechanics a lien for their handiwork. They gave them the Factory Act. They gave the Province a license law that strove to protect the young men against the evils of drink. Other good enactments of the Mowat Government were named by Mr. Ross, who hoped the electors would rise to the importance of the situation and to their responsibility as citizens. The Minister of Education made a brilliant peroration, and sat down amid another ovation.

You can search the world over and you will not find a better system of education or administration of justice than you can see in the Province of Ontario."

Continuing, Mr. Purdom stated a great deal had been said, and the Conservatives had claimed that they were the only guardians of the British flag in this country. Where could a man be found who more dearly leved that flag than Sir Oliver Mowat? (Cheers.) His action in the case of Elgin Myers, who was dismissed from public office for advocating annexation, was strong proof of his loyalty. Sir Oliver had also laid the foundation of civil and his (Mr. Purdom's) mind that the minds of the people were made up as between the Government as it existed today and the Opposition. On the one hand they had a solid, compact Administration; on the other, a disorganized few who scarcely knew what they wanted. If the Government was to be displaced, who would he

put in in their stead? Mr. Purdom then went on to pay tribute to the late Hon. C. F. Fraser, who for some years occupied the position of Minister of Public Works, and who was noted for his honesty, integrity and liberality of views. "I trust," concluded Mr. Purdom, "that you will support the Government of Sir Oliver Mowat in the administration of provincial affairs. There were many important questions to come up.



Two of the largest importers say that the deception has been worse during the past season than in former years. Importers propose to make it compulsory for shippers to mark the exact date of the month and year on all cheese imported.

Great Britain Suffers From Floods London, Nov. 12 .- Recent heavy rains in several districts of Great Britain have caused floods, which have done damage to property to the extent of many thousands of pounds. Fortunately, however, no loss of life has been reported. In the Isle of Wight, Devonshire and Cornwall the damage has been most severe, The railway station at Ryde was flooded, and at St. Ives in rescuing the people from their houses.

Sheebeens Sold Out. LONDON, Nov. 12.—The campaign against the illicit liquor sellers of Cardiff, described early in the year, has been completely successful. The police say that not one sheebeen is left in the district. The termination of the fight against the law-breakers was celebrated this week by an auction sale at the town hall of the sheebeeners' outfits seized in the various police raids. These included many bottles of spirits and no fewer than 155 casks of beer.

Moscow, Nov. 12.—The body of Czar Alexander III. was taken from the Kremlin at 10:20 today and conveyed to the railway station en route for St. Petersburg.
