EXPERTS SCOUT In Lake Michigan Gale POISON THEORY

A dispatch from Exeter to The Advertiser Major Duncan Stuart and Wife The Arcadia, Outward From Manistee, Mich., Founders From Symptoms Given Certain That Perkins Died of Kidney Disease.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Hamilton, April 23 .- At the Perkins murder trial this morning the first witness called for the defense was Dr. McKeown, of Toronto, who swore that Judging from the postmortem report Perkins died from acute Bright's disease, which would account for the symptoms before his death. The acute forms of this disease would cause chills such as Perkins had. The dead man the day before his death had a pulse of 16 and the expert said he neves knew of a record case of stychning poison where the pulse was so slow, Replying to a question of Mr. Johnston. he said:

"If I am to judge by the postmortem and the symptoms described by witnesses. I say positively there is not a solitary symptom of strychnine," he "And what caused death?"

"Strychnine, added to uremic acid, would cause an aggravation of the kidney disease. It would be poison added to poison.'

"Are strychnine symptoms clear?" "They are unmistakeable." To Mr. Anoldi witness said it would be impossible to kill a dying man with strychnine, because the poison woul!

"Do you thing this man had a load of strychnine on his stomach without having showed signs of it? "The symptoms were lacking," said the doctor.
