Chief English Government Organ of Montreal Declares Borden Will Go To Country Over Compulsion Even If Union Ministry Be Armadale Sent Down While Formed.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Montreal, July 14.—The Gazette (Conservative) this morning prophesies an early election, and says that Sir Robert Borden's resolution calling for further extension of the parliamentary term "will carry in the House of Commons, but will be vigorously opposed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his anti-conscriptionist following. Many of the Liberal conscriptionists will support the resolution. It is not expected that if a union Government is formed the resolution will be forwarded to the Imperial Parliament, but that the House will dissolve and the new Government secure a mandate from the people.

WILL REICHSTAG STRIKE?

Press of Germany in the Dark as to Political Crisis at Berlin.

Copenhagen, July 14.—According to Berlin newspapers, the crown prince in interviews Thursday with Reichstag party leaders, including Herr David and other Socialists, interested himself chiefly in obtaining from the deputies the crown prince and policy of the capital was restored with few casualties. TRANSPORT IS SUNK BY SUB IN ATLANTIC:

Carrying Small Body of Troops.

London, July 14.—The British transport Armadale has been sunk by a submarine, it is officially announced. The statement announcing the

sinking reads "The British transport Armadale, with a small number of troops on board, was torpedoed and sunk by an enemy submarine in the Atlantic on June 27. Six soldiers, one passenger and four of the crew are missing, and it is presumed were drowned.

The Armadale was a merchant steamer of 6,153 tons gross, built in 1909 at Glasgow and owned by the Australian Steamship Company of London, She was 395 feet long 51 feet beam and 27 feet in depth.

WASHINGTON BELIEVES GERMAN REFORMERS HOLD THE WHIP HAND

Can Refuse War Credits Unless Autocracy Grants Concessions.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Washington, July 14.-There is no loubt in the mind of officials that the parliamentary revolt in Germany spreading. The seriousness of the situation, as Washington sees it, is that the reformists have control of the Reichstag. Thus they are able to post weres lightly wounded.
Chang Hun, who led the revolt of the imperialists, has taken refuge in the Dutch legation in order to obtain safe conduct out of the country. Premier Tuan Chi Jui will establish republican headquarters in Peking immediately, it was stated. pone or refuse a vote on the war credit's bill. Artillery Engagements at Verdun and Along Aisne Front,

Paris, July 14.—There was active artillery fighting last night near St. Quentin and on the Aisne front between Craonne and Courcy, the war office reports. German attempts to raid trenches south of St. Quentin were crushed. The French made a successful raid west of Navarin Farm. On the Verdun front at Hill 304, and in the Woevre the artillery was active. A German airplane dropped bombs near Nancy. Two women and a child were killed. LONDON NEVER HAD A BETTER OPPORTUNITY TO SECURE BIG INDUSTRY THAT ASKS NO **EXEMPTIONS OR FREE SITES**

The ratepayers of London will vote, on July 30, on the quesion as to whether they want the Ajax Rubber Company to build and maintain a plant in this city.

The company undertakes to locate in London under an agree- HUN CHANCELLOR, ment which relieves the city of any liability and which is, without loubt, all to the advantage of the city.

It will purchase a site, build a factory, equip it, employ at east 250 hands regularly, and pay at least \$250,000 annually in

AFTER THE PLANT IS BUILT AND EQUIPPED the city is to indorse the company's bonds to the extent of \$450,000 to provide working capital. To protect the city against loss, the company will deposit securities with a trust company in London in sufficient quantity to guarantee the payment of the bonds. These securities must be such as are approved by the Ontario Government for trust company investment. To guarantee the interest on the bonds, the company will give the city a first mortgage on its plant and other assets.

The city of London has never been offered a better opportunity to secure an industry. Evidently no risk is taken. The difficulty of floating industrial securities at this time is the only reason why the city's guarantee is required. In ordinary times the securities deposited to safeguard the city would be used to provide working capital. These securities, approved by the Government, can be marketed when normal conditions return, to take up the city's bonds.

The promoters of the new industry do not ask any favors except those based on strict business principles. They are not asking tax exemptions, free site or free water. If there are any ratepayers who are disposed to reject the proposal they should consider their viewpoint very seriously. London needs industries to help fill up the vacant lots within the city limits. The surest way of reducing the tax bills is by improving these lots. London must have development in order to hold its place as the metropolis of Western Ontario. It cannot afford to reject a business proposition which will be only to its benefit.

REPORTED RESIGNED

THE WAR SITUATION

Germany's serious internal crisis overshadowed the pending military operations in the news of the day. The reports from Berlin show that the Reichstag has go against the crown and the military party, apparently in the interest of a parliamentary system of govern-

a parliamentary system of government.

There is even a rumor, although entirely unconfirmed and little credited, that Emperor William has abdicated in favor of his sixth and favorite son, Prince Joachim.

PEACE CLAMOR GROWS.

The peace clamor is growing in both Germany and Austria-Hungary. Part of the trouble between the Reichstag and the governing class is over the Government's persistent declination to state Germany's peace terms on the basis of no annexation demanded by what now comprises a majority bloc in the Reichstag.

The war credit bill is being held up by the majority until the present crisis is settled. But more serious yet is the decision of the members not even to meet meanwhile for discussion in regular session or in committee.

discussion in regular session or in committee.

Apparently the crown prince is waging a fight for control on behalf of the militaristic interests. Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg is under fire from the crown prince and his supporters, the chancellor seemingly being too liberally inclined to suit the heir to the throne.

ALLIES' POSITION GOOD.

On the military side, the situation continues to bear a most encouraging aspect for the formidable group of nations ailled against the central powers, this generally being taken into consideration in dealing with the situation in Berlin and Vienna.

The Russian revolutionary armies in Galicia are still sweeping forward. Apparently there is little to stop them pouring through the breach in the lines in Eastern Galicia opened by Gen. Korniloff. They are pushing on north of the Dniester and west of the Lomnica, and generally proving victors in the fighting going on along a fifty-mile front.

On the Franco-Belgian front a waiting policy is being pursued by Gen. Haig on the British end of the line, and Gen. Petain in the French section. They has been only local fighting by either group of armies. New York, July 14.—The Tribune this morning publishes the following cable-gram from Arthur S. Draper, under London date: The kaiser's decree ordering the drafting of a bill giving equal franchise to Prussia may mean the settlement of the present political crists, but further developments are expected. expected.

"I am inclined to agree with 'hose who say it is a chancellor-made crisis." he began. "Probably the people have begun to learn that frightfulness costs dearly, and in order to fight the junk-ers, the advocates of frightfulness, the chancellor enlisted the support of

Frightfulness Fails. "What has frightfulness cost Germany? I venture to say that her greatest failure has been the submarine. If she had stopped her torpedoing I doubt whether the United States would be her enemy now; I doubt whether she would have lost her great markets in South America. No one who knows the submarine figures fears for a moment that Germany will win the war by the submarine. Loses All Friends. alienated her friends among the European neutrals to the point where I doubt whether 10 per cent of their population would now support her.

"Her air raids on England make it more difficult for her to come to peace. You know how furious the phlegmatic Englishman has grown over the killing of civilians, men. women and children. how he has been worked up to the point of white heat by this form of frightfulness.

"If the chancellor is a man of intelligence—and he is—he knows all this and probably he wants to find a way out.

Shortly before his appointment he was known to have been in command of troops in the Somme fighting.

IS CECIL'S OPINION

Spectacle At French Capital; Nation Celebrates Triumph Over Absolutism.

Paris, July 14.-France today elebrated its national fete with fervor and quiet joy unknown in many years. The Russian revolution has made Frenchmen realize more vividly the meaning of the great epoch which dawning in America in 1776 culminated in France in 1789 in a great revolution whose spirit after over a century is about to have its full fruition in the destruction of the last bastille of ab-

solutism by the forces of Allied democracy.
"It is a pity," says Paul Deschanel, president of the Chamber of Deputies, in a message to the Jour-nal, "that the Germans cannot see our national fete, they who believe us to be starving and at the end of our resources.

In the month of April, notwithstanding magnificent results, we did not realize our hopes. Since then a noble leader who has had nothing but success in this war, a great in-fantryman, wise, upright and clearminded, has been put at the head of our armies. Already the Russians are fulfilling their pledges, and here are the Americans bringing us their powerful support not only in money,

airplanes and ships, but in men and Victory Guaranteed. "America's intervention, while a decisive verdict on the justice of our cause, is a sure guarantee of

victory. It makes it more than ever our duty to hold on."

INSPECTION SHOWS AMATEUR GARDENERS - ARE DOING WONDERS

More Produce Grown Here Than in Fast 30 Years.

POTATOES ARE POPULAR

Nearly Every Citizen Has a Big Patch of Fine Spuds.

The first grand civic inspection of he vacant lot and community gardens of the city took place yesterday after-ioon, representatives of the Women's lardening Association being invited to

Gardening Association being invited to participate.

The procession, which started from the city hall at 4 o'clock, included one automobile, driven by the chaifman of the high cost of living committee of the council, Ald. Manness, and carrying as passengers Miss Carling and Mrs. David Williams, president and dirst vice-president respectively of the Women's Gardening Association, and two representatives of the press.

His Worship Mayor Stevenson and Controller Shaw were not amongst those present though the pleasure of their company was not given up until

gardens of the Women's Gardening Association. All were found in splendid condition, crops flourishing, evidences of thorough cultivation, and scarcely a weed in sight—the answer to the pessimists that the amateur gardeners would tire of their job as soon as the seed was well planted.

Ald, Manness, to whom a generous share of the credit is due for the success of the vacant lots gardening movement, estimates that about 170 citizens are cultivating either civio vacant lot gardens, or the community gardens of the Women's Gardening Association. He is able to keep tab on these, because he had the responsibility of looking after the plowing, and in the staking out of plots. In addition, the interest aroused in the vacant lot and community gardens has infected the whole town.

"Not for thirty years, at least," said Ald. Manness, "have so many people been growing their own vegetables, and I don't think that for a long time they will again be willing to go back to buyling them."

Many Potatees.

There must be 150 acres more ground under cultivation in the city this year than in previous years. The potato supply grown in the city alone should amount to five or six carloads, which means a good deal. In addition, there are all the other yegetables, and scheduly and the naughty little weeds were conspicuous by their many potations of the sandy nature of the soil, a little plot of ground on Ann street was considered by some planting time. True to the traditions of the sex and other regulating time. If potatoes aren't a reasonable price in London next winter, it isn't because of a failure in greater production. East, west, north and south, the sightseeing car made its way, from West London over the Wharncliffe road bridge, away out to Elmwood avenue, thence to Bellevue avenue, where civic plots were admired; then along an impossible slippery clay road on the way to Chelsea Green. Reading from the report of the Methodist social service department, he advocated a universal minimum living wage, eight-hour day, Government insurance and old age pensions. He also denounced the evils of speculation, referring in scathing terms to "any government that dared to give outright to any class of men hundreds of thousands of trees in the forests," and declared that land, timber limits and minerals should be held for the service of the people. "The large percentage of the Inspectors wink their eyes when they come face to face with the traffic," he added. "We have bad conditions in Gueiph, but we cannot cure it. Men are drunk on the streets every night, and liquor is sold almost openly."

He urged the people to be on their guard, and if they saw anything out of the way to communicate with the "Committee of One Hundred" in Toronto, which employed two men, "not for whisky detectives, but to see that those who draw fat salaries do their work."

In the early days many thousands of prisoners were taken, and the ultimate consequence of the first success was a retreat from Dubno and Lutsk to the line of the Stokhod River, a retreat of

11 Neutral Ships Will Try to Run Allied Blockade

Dash From U.S. Port Laden With Grain-To Escape Embargo.

AN ATLANTIC PORT, July 13. lleven neutral steamers loaded with grain and other cargo which could not be exported except under license after resident Wilson's embargo proclamaion becomes effective Monday, cleared from this post today for European ports without British letters of #ssurance, and will attempt to run the allied blockade.

Ten of the vessels are Dutch and the other Scandinavian. They have been lying at their docks here for some time while vain efforts were made to secure from British authorities the

secure from British authorities the usual letters of assurance which would permit their passage through the war zone to their destinations.

Besides grain, the vessels carry a great quantity of mealcake and other cattle feed included under the terms of the embargo proclamation. WESTINGHOUSE WANT

Must Sign for Ten Months "Imprisonment" To Make War Invention.

New York, July 13.—A special to the World from Pittsburg says: The Westinghouse interests here are seeking 1,000 men who are willing to sign an agreement to enter a new plant to be built for the manufacture of war munitions by a secret process and remain impris-oned for ten months, all communication with the outside world to be shut off.

Only picked men whose Americanism is unquestioned and whose skill in their respective vo-cations is of the highest will be employed.





REPUBLIC NOT YET SOLID

Hopeful Spirit Prevailing and Confidence in Government Increases.

RETROGRAD. July 13.—Arthur Henderson, member of the British ware council and the labor member of the British delegation now visiting Russia, in a brief survey of conditions in this country said today that he is much impressed with the more hopeful spirit prevailing among the Russian people. This unmistakable improvement, he believed, was largely due to the increase of public confidence in the Government, the resumption of the offensive on the battlefront, a hetter understanding of the actions, and intentions of the Entente Allies, and a realization that the beneficial possibilities of the revolution were needlessly placed in risk by the forces of disorder.

Mr. Henderson did not suggest that all danger was over for, unfortunately, there were many indications showing that politically, financially and industrially the position of the country was so uncertain and complicated as to require the most skillful handling if a permanent improvement is to be obtained.
