WATER ORDER CREATES A STORM NO TYPHOID TRACED TO SUPPLY

Dr. Hutchinson Admits the City Is Practically Free of Disease.

BOARD OF HEALTH ARE VERY ANGRY

Members Says a Meeting Should Have Been Called Before the Sensational Story Was Spread.

Not a single case of typhoid fever in the city of London this year can be traced to city water. That was the statement of Dr. Hutchinson, medical health officer, to The Advertiser at noon today. So far as he could tell about dozen cases had been reported to him

during 1909. Superintendent Heard reports that 14 cases have been treated at Victoria Hospital. Six of them were local citizens, and the other eight were non-residents.

At St. Joseph's Hospital 7 cases have been treated. Two of these were from Cobalt, and one or two of the others may have come from the same

Dr. Hutchinson, has the infection been traced to city water. He goes further, and states that this year been remarkably free from typhoid fever and other contagious diseases. "I have reported, perhaps, a dozen said Dr. Hutchinson. "In none of them have I been able to trace the Infection to city water. We have been particularly free from typhoid this year; in fact, we are becoming better every year."

"It seems strange that many samples of well water were taken by Dr. Amyot and others, and there was no trace of infection," said a member of the board of health. "There have been many anxious to show that the water is infected, but up to this time no opportunity has been given. We should have fully investigated the facts before throwing the people into a panic, and not allowed such an order to given, until we knew definitely what were the

real facts of the case. How About the Children?

"The matter is not going to end here, If it is so necessary to boil the water at home, why is not some effort made to protect the children at schools? If it is bad one place, it is bad in the other. Witness in Hoine Case Shows Jury Where Orendorf Met His Death.

Detroit, Nov. 5 .- Second street dock was the scene of the greater part of yesterday afternoon's session of the crial of John R. Hoine, the young United States sailor charged with killing Charles Orendorf, of Ridgetown, Ont. It was on that dock that the fistic encounter is said to have taken place which resutled in Orendorf's death, and Judge Connolly took the jurors to the dock that they might more fully understand the matter.

The jury, judge, prosecutor, defend-int and his counsel and witnesses were loaded in two patrol wagons and taken from the recorder's court to the dock. Joseph Rybicki, the fisherman who was on the dock at the time Hoine is charged by the prosecution with having started a fight with Orendorf, was the leading witness in the out-of-door session,

First, he showed where he was sitting when Hoine is said to have come on the dock, and walking up to Orendorf, said: "Now I have got you. -." He declared that after Hoine struck Orendorf he jumped up, grabbed his lantern, and, running to Front street, turned toward the Michigan Central station in quest of an officer. Saw Man in River.

"I was unable to find an officer," he declared. "Then I went back to where I was fishing and sat down on the edge of the dock. I sat there for awhile, and then decided to pull in my lines to see if I had any bites. "When I pulled on the first line felt something very heavy and thought that I had a fish on the hook, I kept on pulling, but the load appeared so heavy that I looked down to see if I could see anything that was holding it. The moon was shining and I saw

Here Rybicki stopped and looked toward Hoine, who stood nearby handcuffed to an officer. "And what did you see?" questioned saistant Prosecuting Attorney Kil-

"I saw two feet sticking out of the continued Rybicki, looking away from Hoine and shuddering. Shows Little Concern.

After Rybicki told how he summoned several walters from the Wayne casino, one of whom sent in a telephone call for the coroner, the court journeyed back to the Municipal Building. During the trip to the scene of the alleged killing, Hoine conversed with a young lady in the patrol wagon and showed apparently little concern. Before the court went to the dock Charles Van Gordon, barber at 91 Jef-

ferson avenue, went on the stand and testified that about 11 o'clock, on the night of Aug. 28. Hoine and Taylor were in his shop and that Hoine made no mention of having been held up and robbed during the evening. "What did Hoine talk about while

in the shop?" was asked of Van Gor-"Oh, he spoke about his home in Milwaukee," returned the witness. 'And what did Taylor do?" asked the prosecutor.

"He went to sleep," smiled Van Gor-Court was adjourned until 9 o'clock this morning.






