Amnesty Postponed.

Amnesty for men arrested or accused by crown forces in Ireland has been insisted upon by intermediaries who have been at work trying to bring about an understanding between the government and the Sinn Fein. Mr. Lloyd George, however, holds that amnesty must await restoration of peace, and it is the impression that until such time there will be no interference with the men who are attempting to bring into court Sinn Feiners responsible for outrages.

Comment in this morning's newspapers relative to the government's Irish policy was, for the most part, restrained. The feature of the premier's speech that did not escape notice was the fact he was, in effect, holding an olive branch in one hand and the sword in the other. It evoked some questioning, but generally speaking was not regarded as banishing hope of success.

"Few will question the wisdom and propriety of the new policy," said the London Times. "If the government shows a true and settled purpose to encourage the forces making for honorable settlement. LEAGUE COMMISSION INVITES U. S. TO AID IN OPIUM CAMPAIGN

ithuania Not To Be Admitted to League During Present Assembly.

GRANTED PRIVILEGES

Will Have Permission to Par-'ticipate in Work of the Technical Bodies.

Geneva, Dec. 11.—Disarmament in three stages is the substance of the recommendation the committee on armaments of the league of nations assembly will make to the assembly as the result of its deliberations.

The first stage would be marked by an agreement among the powers to make no further increases in armaments.

The second stage of the recommended procedure is a gradual reduction in armaments. duction in armaments.

The third stage would be that of general complete disarmament, except in so far as arms were needed for police purposes.

M. Doret, delegate from Haiti, succeded in securing the adoption by the committee this morning of an amendment providing that the council of the league inaugurate a propaganda campaign for "disarmament minds," as he put it, meaning the preparation of the younger generation for the new order of things by proper education in the schools.

TWO HUNDRED KILLED, 15,000 ARE

Village of Tepeleni Completely Razed by Violent Disturbance -Shocks Reported As Continuing-Large Area Is Devastated-Many Places Destroyed.

Rome, Dec. 11.-All the villages in the Tepeleni district, Southern Albania, have been destroyed by a violent earthquake, according to an Avlona message to the Tempo today. Two hundred persons are reported killed, while 15,000 have been made homeless.

The town of Tepeleni itself was completely razed. The message reports the shocks are continuing.

Previous messages, originating in Avlona on December 5. reported earthquake shocks in the Tepeleni district, rendering thousands homeless, but made no mention of casualties.





CAUCHON TO ADVISE ON SUBWAY IN CITY

Elevation At Rectory Street.

Noulan Cauchon, expert railroad engineer of Ottawa, will be asked to come to the city immediately to ad vise on designs for a subway at the Ontario Garage Company, Chevrolet G. T. R. Rectory street crossing as a result of a meeting of the specia committee on level crossings Friday afternoon.

Mayor E. S. Little laid plans before the committee, which had been prepared by Chief Engineer Mountair of the Dominion railway board. They called for a six-foot track elevation at this point and a twelve-foot depres sion. The probable cost of the subway would be \$250,000 while the track elevation would cost an additional \$30,000. This would be an integral part of any grade separation plan carried out later, and would not be wasted, he pointed out.

One of the main points to be de-cided is whether there shall be a a per cent or a 5 per cent grade. The 5 per cent grade would be cheaper, but not as suitable for traffic. A compro-mise may be reached by having a f per cent grade on the south side of the tracks and a 3 per cent grade

on the other.

Mr. Cauchon is regarded as thoroughly competent to give advice on the subject, as he is a former C. P. R. engineer, and has also had experience with the Dominion railway board. It is probable, that he will be called to wree with the Dominion railway board. It is probable that he will be asked to present the city's case to the board, as he recently prepared an extensive report on the situation here.

Mayor Little expects that Mr. Cauchon can come here early next week.





SMOCKING

"Most people marry because they fall in love, don't they?" HOME ECONOMICS the weight of the material, and the amount to be gathered; the distance be-tween the rows varies likewise, from

three-eighths to three-quarters of an inch. The dots may be marked in pencil, measured and guided by a ruler, or transfer patterns may be bought for this purpose. For the gathering, strong hread, forty to sixty should be used; the gathering should be done on the wrong side with one little black stitch at the first dot to prevent the knot from slipping through the cloth. The needle should lift the cloth between dots, passing over just a few threads on each dot. When all the lines of gathering are in, the material should be drawn up to one-fourth its original width and fastened by each thread, wound on a pin, or by two threads tied together. Then on the right side of the cloth the gathers should be pulled evenly into place, exactly alike on each row. The decorative stitches are then put on with any embroidery cotton or silk on with any embroidery cotton or silk suited to the cloth, of the same or contrasting color. The first stitch always used at the top of any design is the outline, worked on the first row, the thread being allowed to drop naturally below the needle, and the tip of one plait taken up in each stitch.

Smocking is a pretty way of arranging and holding in place the fullness in various parts of garments, as across the shoulders or front of a blouse, or at the wrists or waist of a child's frock. The cloth to be smocked must be gathered with even stitches and drawn up to about one-fourth the measurement when plain, and the smocking then consists of ornamental stitches on the surface of the gathers.

The material should be chartered for gathering, on the wrong side, by horizontal rows of dots, the space between the dots, usually from one-eighth to three-eighths of an inch, depending on Newspaper Service.)



Mr. Drury emphasized the fact that in Ontario ordinary good citizens had proved themselves capable of carrying on the government successfully, and he arrived at the conclusion that the time had come when the people of Canada safely could take away matters of government from professional politicians and risk them with those whose qualification was citizenship. He claimed that his government was not working for any one class, but for the whole people, and he asserted that for this reason it has gained much support from all classes of the population. or by skill in evading the attacks. Constant watchfulness for wolves and prompt taking to a tree when they appear! This we do as a way of escape against disease when we stay away from sources of infection; but like the physician and the nurse, we may boldly front these attackers, yet evade them by skill in dodging. The savage could hardly dodge a wolf, meeting him face to face at close quarters. He must climb a tree or something. The wolf is too strong, too quick, too intent on his prey. But the physician and the nurse can and do often, through training, learn a technique of dodging infection so perfect that almost all escape. To such an extent is this true that it used to be commonly said—and perhaps this is believed even now by some people—that physicians and nurses "take something" that protects them. We all wish there were something we could take that would prevent these diseases! No one wants them—they are a dead loss to everyone. But alas, and except for the stuff one takes in being vaccinated, etc., as described above, there is nothing one can take; and even the different kinds of vaccination apply only to a few diseases.

AVOIDING INFECTION.

AVOIDING INFECTION.

This technique of avoiding infection is very simple in principle, but it requires a hard, long training to carry it out successfully. All it involves is so conducting oneself that the discharges of the patient—nose, mouth, bladder, bowel and pus or whatever it is, do not get into our bodies. Generally, anyone who goes near an infectious person (or any other person for that matter) has transferred to them some of the discharges of the patient—the mouth spray, saliva or other things. When the patient is infectious these carry the germs, of course. In all ordinary life this exchange of discharges goes on but does little harm unless someone with INFECTIOUS discharges enters the game. It is practically impossible to stop this exchange of discharges from one person to another unless we stop having anything to do with each other at all. Handshaking, for instance, is a perfectly obvious way in which discharges are exchanged. It is not practical to train everyone to conduct himself at all times towards everyone he meets as a doctor or nurse acts with an infectious

wards everyone he meets as a doctor or nurse acts with an infectious patient. So, as long as infectious germs are growing in some of us the rest of us are sure to get them

So it would seem that the only solutions that are at all practicable are universal armoring of everyone against every different disease germ there is—and we can't manage that now—or abolishing the germs themsalves

fectious persons, the germs of most of our diseases would dis-appear from the earth and become

Some day this will be done—just as wolves have been driven out from civilization, so will these germs be criven out, or better, killed out. Meantime, we must use "armor" where we can and skill in evading disease when we can; then suffer patiently, as we do, when these, our very imperfect present defences fail,

AVOIDING INFECTION.

Ontario, Canada. A Column Devoted to Public Health in All Phases. Questions Addressed as Above Will Be Welcomed.

There are three ways of protecting ourselves against attackers, whether they be wolves, bedbugs or germs. First and best is to destroy them so that there won't be any to attack us. That is what we have done with the wolves, what some places have done with mosquitoes, what has been all but done with yellow fever in South America. Once the wolf is gone, there can't be any more wolves—they become extinct as the dodo and it is impossible to breed another one. So when the last yellow fever germ in the world is killed, that disease comes to an end and we couldn't produce it again, never mind how hard we tried. That is the high ambition of modern public health—to kill off all PROTECTION AGAINST DISEASE. tried. That is the high ambition of modern public health—to kill off all the tubercle bacilli and other disease germs so that people CANNOT get consumption any more. Sounds hopeless? So did getting rid of wolves sound hopeless to our remoter ancestors, when they looked from their feeble weapons to the dark swarms of wolves all about their wild country. But the abolition of wolves is an accomplished fact here now. So some day tuberculosis will be abolished—not just reduced, but extinct. reduced, but extinct.

THE SECOND METHOD. Meantime, the second great way to defeat attackers is to go armored against them. Picture to yourself the difference between a naked savage surrounded by a drove of wolves and a knight in full armor standing amongst the same pack! wolves and a knight in full armor standing amongst the same pack!

The poor savage is bleeding, down, a meagre mass of bloody bones, within a few minutes. The armored knight moves amongst the ravening mouths with perfect indifference. Their teeth can make no impression on him and he is free to slaughter them at his leisure. We can achieve this sort of protection against disease germs only in some against disease germs only in some diseases—against smallpox by vaccination, against typhoid by vaccina-tion and a few other diseases in similar ways. So a great modern king of science, Pasteur, saw that it could be done in the case of disease germs, but we haven't done it yet. Perhaps we are waiting for a bounty to be of-

fered.

SAVING GREAT LOSSES.

Well, the bounty is there, but not in cash paid out to those who help—it is in the form of saving the great losses we now endure.

Fancy the cost of the influenza

epidemic—the cost of the great war sinks into insignificance compared with what disease costs us.

We are waking up. The medical profession has taught and preached protection against disease without a hearing for generations. We were content to listen—to go on and suffer, then call on the medicals for relief—AFTER the damage was done.

Now we medicals are trying again, under much better circumstances, to secure action, for prevention as well as cure. The Ontario Medical Association for the province, the Western Academy of Medicine for this district, are definitely entered upon the attempt to support the efforts of the public health authorities of all kinds, dominion, provincial and local, in securing treatment for all who need it; and better still, the prevention of the need of treatment when that can be accomplished. Expensive, difficult, burdensome, yes; but not one-tenth as bad as the suffering and loss we now endure.

WHAT'S IN A BOOK?

How can we do this abolishing of germs? Only by finding the infectious persons, especially the sick ones, and keeping them from passing their germs over to others. After a time the disease germs in such persons usually die out. Then the infected person is no longer a breeding ground for them.





Says It Leaves Faulty Ones To Fool Other People.

CLEVELAND. Dec. 10.-Common Pleas Judge A. J. Pearson advocates absolute denial of divorces, regardless of what the alleged grounds for separation might be.

The occasion for the judge's positive stand arose when a man was cited for contempt of court for failure to pay alimony to his first wife. In explanamony would work a hardship upon his second wife and that he was not in a position to support two families.

"If I sentenced this man for contempt," said Judge Pearson, "I would be injuring two women. Had this man not been granted a divorce he could have supported his first wife as decreed by

the court.
"While refusal to grant a divorce may while refusal to grant a divorce may injure some persons who are deserving of a separation, there would be less injury to society in general if divorces were absolutely denied to all. "In my opinion divorces should be de-nied all persons regardless of the circumstances.
'.When a man who has failed to qualify as a good husband receives a divorce it permits him to fool some other wo-man and if the fault lies with the woman it permits her to fool some unsuspecting man. The result is that an other divorce case will be flied in the courts in a short time." 

The exchange has been established with the idea of preventing overlapping and seeing that every family is cared for. All help which will be rendered through the various organizations will pass through the exchange. That this is the best way possible to look after deserving families was the conclusion arrived at by a representative meeting of social workers Thursday.

It was also decided to form a committee to scatter good cheer to the poor during the Christmas season. The members of this committee have not yet been appointed.

LATTER DAY SAINTS WIN APPEAL AGAINST

Decision of Chief Justice Falconbridge Reversed-Plaintiff Given Costs.

Following an appeal instituted by the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints against Bishop R. C. Latter Day Saints against Bisnop R. C. Evans of Toronto, formerly of this city, in the appellate division at Osgoode Hall, the decision of this court reverses that of Chief Justice Falconbridge, and sustains the appeal. The case is a long-drawn-out tangle, and was first brought to public notice when the Peorganized Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter Day Saints, of which there is a congregation in this city, entered suit against Bishop R. C. Evans, formerly in charge of the lecal church, for an accounting of Sunday school religio, church buuilding sermon, theatre and Women's Auxiliary funds, the defendant having severed his connection with the church.

The case came up for hearing before Chief Justice Falconbridge and on January 14 last, his decision dismissed the action. An appea was immediately entered by the Latter Day Saints and was heard in the appellate division, composed of Justices Masten, Ferguson, Mulock and Sutherland at Osgoode Hall, Toronto. On November 18 last this division allowed the appeal on the Women's Auxiliary and other funds, excepting those of theatre and sermon, on condition that one person entersuit for an accounting of funds on behalf of the organizations involved. The plaintiffs were allowed the cost, thus reversing the decision of Chief Justice Falconbridge.


