

London, Aug. 17 .- According to information in possession of diplomats, there is no reason at this moment to fear danger because of the differences between the powers in respect to Maceexchange of notes regarding the situ-

ation said today: "The powers are acting harmoniously. Nothing has developed to indicate any suspicion or cause for suspicion of the motives underlying the demands made by Russia upon the Porte. A full exchange of views has occurred between the powers interested. War between Turkey and Bulgaria might lead to complications of such a grave character that every effort is being made by the powers to maintain peace

between those countries. "I have no information regarding the exact destination of the Russian squadron which has been ordered to the Turkish waters, but within 48 hours it will reach whatever point has been selected. There is no doubt that the sole object is to make Turker understand that Russia is in earnest, and that her demands must be complied with without delay. "I have confirmatory advices as to the general character of the revolution. Turkey has a free hand so far as the military operations within her own territory are concerned; but the suppression of the revolt is not a matter of a week, and the longer it drags on the greater is the danger of international complications, which all the powers are zealously laboring to



THE BIG FISCAL FIGHT IS NOW ON

Cobden Club Opens the Campaign Against Chamberlain at Manchester.

London, Aug. 18. - The fiscal fight now raging strongly. The Cobden Club has opened a campaign at Manchester and elsewhere against Mr. Chamberlain's proposals. The Standard publishes an interview with John Charlton, M. P., who, discussing the preferential question, says if Britain is prepared to give Canada a preference for grain, flour, butter, cheese, meat, and other farm produce, that would be a tangible preference calculated to confer great benefit on the Dominion Canada could then make large concessions in return. If the idea of a preference is confined to breadstuffs, the proposal would not strike Canadians as very important. Mr. Charlton added that the free admission of Canadian wheat into the United States would be of more importance to Canada than a British preference of 11/2 shillings per quarter.
