# TEXT OF THEIR TROUBLES PRESENTED BY BURGHERS

Their Appeal to Court of Arbitration at the Hague—Charges Made Against England—Rules of Warfare.

Pierce, representative in the United States of the defunct Orange Free State, has received a copy of the appeal made by the Boers to the administrative council of the permanent court of arbitration at The Hague. The appeal, which is dated The Hague, Sept. 10, says in part:-"Now that this war has gone on for

nearly two years without any prospects of an end thereto, except in the way only recently acknowledged as being the most efficacious, and at the same time the most equitable means. of deciding international differences, desirability, mutually, for such peaceful termination cannot but become more and more acknowledged. The states represented by the under-signed therefore consider that they should repeat the proposal already made by them before the war, but rejected by England, to submit of arbitration the settlement of the difarbitration the settlement of the dif-ferences which gave rise to the war. In this way particularly we have in view the question whether England is right in alleging that any action was taken by the republic which had for its object the suppression of the Eng-lish element in or its expulsion from South Africa, and generally whether the regulation have made themselves the republics have made themselves guilty of any act which, according to internationally recognized prin-ciples, would give England the right to deprive them of their indepen-

Two Ugly Railroad Disasters-Wabash Passenger Train Smashed.

Omaha, Neb., Sept. 27 .- A through passenger train on the Wabash from St. Louis to Omaha, was wrecked today eleven miles southeast of Council Bluffs. The entire train, consisting of Trinity University, and Dr. George A. mail and baggage cars, two day coaches, a chair car and a Pullman sleeper, rolled down an 18-foot embankment, the engine alone remaining on the track. The engine stopped with the forward trucks on the edge of the bridge over Indian Creek. The train carried nearly a hundred passengers, Three people were perhaps fatally hurt and six others received minor

#### WAR CHEST FULL

Britain has Money to Pay all Boer War Bills I ill February.

London, Sept. 27. - Three Ministers attended the King's Council yesterday, but it was a formal function and offered no justification for rumors that there would be an autumnal session of Parliament for replenshing the war chest. Campaign expenses have been provided for until the end of January, and there is nothing to indicate any intention to despatch reinforcement on a large scale.





### POWER OF KINDNESS

The Spirit of Amity and Good Feeling Commended.

SOME ILLUSTRIOUS EXAMPLES.

tiful Subject, Showing Hew All Would be Gainers Were the Spirit of Kind. ness Sedulously Cultivated - Lessons Taught by St. Paul's Shipwreck,

Washington, Sept. 22.-In this discourse Dr. Talmage commends the spirit of amity and good feeling and mentions illustrious examples of that spirit; text, Acts xxviii, 2, "The barbarous people showed us no little kindness. Here we are on the Island of Mal-

ta, another name for Melita. This island, which has always been an important commercial centre, benicia, to Greece, to Rome, to Arabia, to Spain, to France, now belongs to England. The area of the island is about 100 square miles. It is in the Mediterranean Sea and of such clarity of atmosphere that Mount Aetna, 130 miles away, can be distinctly seen. The island is gloriously memorable because the Knights of Malta for a long while ruled there, but most famous be-cause of the apostolic shipwreck. The bestormed vessel on which Paul sailed had 'laid to' on the starboard tack, and the wind was blowing east-northeast, and, the vessel drifting probably a mile and a half an hour, she struck at what is now called St. Paul's bay. Practical sailors have taken up the Bible account and decided beyond controversy the place of the shipwreck. But the island, which has so rough a coast, is for the most part a garden. Richest fruits and a profusion of honey characterized it in Paul's time as well as now. The finest or-

anges, figs and olives grow there. When Paul and his comrades crawled up on the beach, saturated and hungry from long abstinence fro and hungry from long abstinence from food and chilled to the bone, the islanders, though called barbarians because they could not speak Greek, opened their doors to the shipwrecked unfortunates. Everything had gone to the bottom of the deep, and the barefooted, bareheaded apostle and ship's crew were in a condition to appreciate hospitality. About twenty-five such men a few years ago I found in the life station

near East Hampton, Long Island.
They had got ashore in
the night from the sea,
and not a hat or shoe had They found out, as Paul and his fellow voyagers found out. that the sea is the roughest of all robbers. My text finds the ship's crew ashore on Malta and around a hot fire drying themselves and with the best provision the islanders can offer them. And they go into Government quarters for three days to recuperate, Publius, the ruler, viting them, although he had severe sickness in the house at the time, his father down with a dangerous illness. Yea, for three months they

staid on the island watching for a ship and putting the hospitalities of the islanders to a severe test. But it endured the test satisfactorily. and it is recorded for all the ages of time and eternity to read and hear in regard to the inhabitants of Malta, "The barbarous people showed us no little kindness.'

Kindness! What a great word that is! It would take a reed as long as that which the apocalyptic angel used to measure heaven to tell the length, the breadth, the height of that munificent word. It is a favorite Bible word, and it is early launched in the book of Genesis, caught u) in the book of Joshua, embraced in the book of Ruth, sworn by in the book of Samuel, crowned in the book of Psalms and enthroned in many places in the New Testament. Kindness! A word no more gentle than mighty. I expect it will wrestle me down before I get through with it. It is strong en-ough to throw an archangel. But ough to throw an archangel. But it will be well for us to stand around it and warm ourselves by its glow as Paul and his fellow voyagers stood around the fire on the Island of Malta, where the Maltese themselves immortal in my text by the way they treated their victims of the sea. "The barbarous people

showed us no little kindness,' Kindness! All definitions of that multipotent word break down half You say it is clemency, benignity, generosity; it is made up of good wishes; it is an expression of beneficience; it is a contribution to the happiness of others. Some one else says, "Why, I can give you a definition of kindness; it is sunshine of the soul; it is affection perennial; it is a climacteric grace; it is the combination of all graces; it is compassion; it is the perfection of gentle manliness and womanliness." you all through? You have made a dead failure in your definition. It cannot be defined, but we all know what it is, for we have all felt its power. Some of you may have felt it as Paul felt it, on some coast of rock as the ship went to pieces, but more of us have again and again in some awful stress of life had either from earth or heaven hands stretched out which "showed us no little kindness."

There is kindness of disposition, kindness of word kindness of set.

There is kindness of disposition, kindness of word, kindness of act, and there is Jesus Christ, the impersonation of all of them. Kindness! You cannot affect it. You cannot play it as a part. You cannot enact it. By the grace of God you must have it inside you, an everlasting summer, or, rather, a combination of June and October, the geniality of the one and the tonic of the other. Dr. Van Vranken has been dead more than thirty years, yet I feel the touch of that magnificent old professor. Strange sensation was it when I received a kind message from Rev. Thomas Guard of Baltimore, the great Methodist orator, six weeks after his death! By way of the eternal world? Oh, no; by way of this world. I did not meet the friend to he gave the message until two months after Thomas had ascended. So you can whom Guard start a word about some one that will be on its travels and vigorous long after the funeral psalm has been sung at your obsequies. Kindness! Why, if fifty men all aglow with it should walk through the world me thinks they would almost abolish

Furthermore, there is kindness of action. That is what Joseph showed to his outrageous brothers. That is what David showed to Mephibosheth for his father Jonathan's sake. That is what Onesiphorus showed to Paul in the Roman penitentiary. That is what William Cowper recognized when he said he would not trust a man who would with his foot need-lessly crush a worm. That is what our assassinated President Lincoln demonstrated when his private secretary found him in the capital grounds trying to get a bird back to nest from which it had fallen and which quality the illustrious man exhibited years before when, having with some lawyers in the carriage of the way to court passed on the road a swine fast in the mire, after awhile cried to his horses, "Ho!" and said to the gentlemen, "I must go back and help that hog out of the mire." And he did go back and put on solid ground that most uninteresting quadruped. That was the spirit that was manifested by my departed friend, Hon, Alexander H. Stephen of Georgia — and lovelier man never exchanged earth for heaven — when at Washington. A senator's wife, who told us of the circumstances, said to him. "Mr. Stephens. come

and see my dead canary bird. And he answered, "No: I could not look at the poor thing without crying." That is the spirit which last night ten thousand mothers showed to their sick children coming to give the drink at the tenth call as ch fully and as tenderly as at the first

Kindness to all! Surely it ought not to be a difficult grace to cultivate when we see towering above the centuries such an example that one glimpse of it ought to melt and transform all nations. Kindness brought our Lord from heaven. Kindness to miscreants, kindness to persecutors, kindness to the crippled and the blind and the cataleptic and the leprous and the dropsical and the demoniacal characterized him all the way and on the cross; kindness to the bandits suffering on the side of him, and kindness to the executioners while yet they pushed the spear and hammered the spikes and howled the blasphemies. All the stories of the John Howards and the Florence Nightingales and the Grace Darlings and the Ida Lewises pale before this transcendent example him whose birth and life and death are the greatest story that the world ever heard and the theme of the mightiest hosanna that heaven ever lifted. Yea, the very kindness that allowed both hands to be nailed to the horizontal timber of the cross with that cruel thump, thump, now stretches down from the skies those same hands filled with balm for all our wounds, forgiveness for all our crimes, rescue for all our serfdoms. And while we take this matchless

kindness from God may it be found that we have uttered our last bitter word, written our last cutting paragraph, done our last retaliatory action, felt our last revengeful heart throb. And it would not be a bad epitaph for any of us if, by the grace of God, from this time forth we lived such beneficient lives that the tombstone's chisel could appropriately cut upon the plain slab that marks our graye a suggestion from the text, "He showed us no little kindness." But not until the last child of God has got ashore from the earthly storms that drove him on the rocks like Mediterranean Euroclydons, not until all the thrones of heaven are mounted, and all the conquerors crowned, and all the harps and trumpets and organs of heaven are thrummed or blown or sounded and the ransomed of all climes and ages are in full chorus under the jubilant swing of angelia baton, and we shall for thousands of years have seen the river from under the throne rolling into the "sea of glass mingled with fire," and this world we now inhabit shall be so far in the past that only a stretch of celestial memory can recall that it ever existed at all, not until then will we understand what Nehemiah calls "the great kindness," and Isaiah calls "the everlasting kindcalls ness" of God.







### The Household

Plum table jelly-Stew the plums in a little water, strain out the juice, in a pint of which soak a box of gelatine. Sweeten to the taste, add a quart of boiling water, strain and cool. It is to be made the day before it is wanted for use.

Dried plums-Plums may be dried with the stones in, to retain the full plum flavor, or the pits may be removed and the cavities filled with Put them on plates in the sun, sprinkling with sugar and turn-ing often. The finish may be made in a right cool oven.

Stuffed baked potatoes-Bake until done five large smooth potatoes. With a sharp knife cut from the flat with a sharp knife cut from the flat side an oblong piece of the skin, scrape out all the potato, mash and season, adding a teaspoonful of finely chopped parsley; put back into the skin, not returning the cover, place again in the oven until the potato in the opening is browned.

Orange shortcake-Two-thirds of a cup of sugar, two-thirds of a cup of sweet milk, one egg, piece of butter sweet milk, one egg, piece of butter the size of an egg, one teaspoonful of baking powder, one scant cup of flour. Bake in two layers. Peel, seed and slice four or five oranges. Add one-third cupful of sugar. Whip half a third cupful of sugar. Whip half a cupful of cream, with which spread both layers, then lay on the oranges and put the layers together.

Cream puffs-One-half cup of butcream puffs—One-half cup of but-ter melted in one cup of hot water. Put a small tin pan on the stove to boil. Stir in one cup of sifted flour while boiling, take off and let cool. When cold, stir in three eggs, one at a time without beating them. Drop on buttered tins and bake in a hot oven twenty or thirty minutes.
Filling-One cup of milk, one egg, one-half cup of sugar. Thicken with corn starch and flavor with vanilla.

Small sponge cake-Put the yolks of three eggs with one-half cup of sugar, in a bowl, stir fifteen minutes; sugar, in a bowl, stir fifteen minutes; beat the three whites until very stiff and add to the yolk mixture; add one teaspoonful of lemon juice and a little grated rind, sift in half cupful of flour, stir the flour in lightly; butter some small forms and dust with flour, fill them half full with the preparation and bake in a slow oven. These are nice for supper eaten warm.

Egg Plant, French style-Boil a large egg plant in salted water un-til tender, drain, peel and mash smooth. Add one level tablespoonful of butter, one scant teaspoonful of salt, one-quarter of a teaspoon-ful of pepper, two hard-boiled eggs chopped fine, one teaspoonful of finely chopped onion and two tablespoonfuls of fine dry bread crumbs. Mix well, turn into a buttered baking-dish, sprinkle with buttered crumbs and brown in a quick oven

Plum cake-An equal weight of butter and flour, a quarter of a pound of cut peels and citron, double the weight of butter in currants, the grating of three lemons, and the juice of one, half a nutmeg, half an ounce of pudding spice, and the same quan-tity of eggs as the weight in butter, heat your butter as for pound cake, out in a few chopped sweet almonds Paper and butter a hoop, bottom and sides, then put in your mixture, bake in a slow oven for some time, try it if done, take off the hoop but not the

Tomato croquettes-From now on for a good many weeks to come tomatoes are best eaten raw. A receipt for tomato croquettes will be useful only if it is liked to stew the vegeonly if it is liked to stew the vege-table occassionally, as a way of using what may be left over from this ser-vice. To a pint of stewed tomatoes add a thin slice of onion, three cloves, and a good seasoning of salt and pepper. Unless objected to, about a tablespoonful of sugar is an improvement. Heat through in a saucepan and thicken with two tablespoonfuls of corn starch rubbed smooth in a bit of butter. Stir this in, adding an egg just before taking off the stove. Coffee jelly-Roast a quarter of pound of the kernels over a moderate fire to a fine yellow, take it from the fire, set aside the eighth part of it, and throw the rest into three glasses of nearly boiling water, cover it close, and let it cool. In the mean-time boil half a glass of water and pour it over the small portion of cof-fee, which should be ground, and a little isinglass, when perfectly clear, pour it to the other mixture. Having strained it through a silk sieve, filter the whole, and mix it with three quarters of a pound of clarified sugar, and one ounce of isinglass.

Cucumber salad cups-Choose three medium sized cucumbers, pare carefully and cut off the two ends, cut them in halves lengthwise, take out the seeds and put the cucumbers into ice water for two hours. When ready for use wipe the cucumbers dry, set them on a bed of asparagus leaves or other pretty greens, and fill the shells with cold boiled asparagus or vege-table salad, mix with mayonnaise bofore stuffing and put a little more on top afterward. Left-over vegetables or cold fish can be used to advantage in making this dish.

Chicken en Casserole-Dress a young chicken and cut in pieces for serving. Melt three tablespoons of butter in an omelet pan, add an onion and a small carrot, each cut in skices, add the chicken and cook until delicate-ly browned. Remove to the casserole, add one and one-half cups of white stock and a bit of bay leaf. Cover and let cook an hour or until nearly tender, then add some potatoes cut in slices and a few mushrooms saut-! ed in butter, season with salt and pepper and cook until tender. Add three tablespoons of sherry and serve at once.

Apple pudding-A much easier way than baking pies, especially where there are several to cook for, is to make a pudding with your apples. Take three or four eggs, beat, buttermilk and soda enough to make it foam, some salt, stir in flour enough to make a batter, then add the apples; half a jar or all, if you wish. Have your breadpan on the stove, the grease must be hot; pour in pudding and bake till done; try if done as for cake. This can be made to be eaten first if you like. Have your cream all ready, sugared and flavored. Serve in dishes while hot with plenty of cream.

· Pigeons potted-Be careful they are fresh, clean and season them with salt and pepper and lay them close together in a small, deep pan, for the closer they are put the less butter they will take. When cold, put them to drip in pots that will hold two or three each, and pour butter over them, using that which was baked as some, mind the butter should be thick over them.
