Fraser, Matheson Sweep In; Win Posts By Large Votes

Murray Fraser and Dave Matheson were the overwhelming choice of the campus in yesterday's elections for President and Vice-President of the Students' Council. In piling up a majority of 400 over his opponent, second year Law student Steve Harper, Murray won every faculty except two, while his running mate was equally successful, having a majority of 350 over Law student Frances Stanfield.

In other campus elections, Cleland Marshall narrowly defeated the passed two years. He is well coring in the race for the Presi-informed and interested in all the dency of the Dalhousie Glee and Dramatic Society by a factor of ten votes. Julia Gosling, on the other hand, had no trouble in capturing the position of Vice-President of DGDS. One of the highlights of the election was the close battle fought among Jane Griffin, Jean MacPhee and Sidney Oland who polled at press time 249, 246, 247 respectively in the race for Secrerespectively in the race for Secretary-Treasurer of DGDS.

After many years of trying, it finally happened. A referendum was passed in favor of an increase in the Students' Council fees of \$3.00. The vote was 429 to 369. The proposed increase, if approved by the administration, will boost the present rate of \$13.00, one of the lowest in Canada, to \$16.00. This extra money will enable the Council to increase its services to the students.

Lawyer Lew Matheson managed to nose out Carolyn Potter for the post of NFCUS Chairman. Carolyn however, was elected President of the Dalhousie Girls' Athletic Club, defeating Carrie Ann Matheson by 39 votes. Judy Bennet was elected Vice-President of DGAC and Janet Sinclair was elected Secretary Treasurer.

Another close race saw Murray Dewis defeat Don Hill for the Presidency of the Dalhousie Ama-teur Athletic Club by 310 votes to 297. Bob Dauphinee was elected Vice-President while Don Tomes is the new Secretary-Treasurer of

Murray Fraser and Dave Mathe-son, the President-elect and Vice-President-elect of the Students' Council were the Arts and Science and Commerce candidates and ran as a pair. Murray, a native of Halifax, is well suited for his new task having served on the Council

The two successful candiates campaigned on a platform which offered changes in Sodales, more interfac sports, greater cooperation with the University Administration, and changes in the DAAC. The only major changes made by the Council from the original brief concerned finances. It was decided that the Council must retain control of Gate Receipts and that the Council will vote a lump sum to the Athletic Board rather than passing the budget point by point as in the past. It must be pointed out that the DAAC and DGAC, under the new proposal, would submit their budgets to the Athletic Board which would consider them and then forward them to the Council for final approval.

The Council also decided Saturday to hold a referendum on the proposed three dollar raise in Student Council fees. The referendum took place yesterday along with the voting for the major offices on the campus. Members of the Council felt that students were aware that the referendum would be coming and that the best time would be during the elections when approximately 60 percent of the students could be expected to vote.
