CONSTITUTION

OF THE

UNION CLUB.

Name

I.—The association shall be known as the "Union Club. St. John. N. B."

()fficers

II.—The Officers of the Club shall consist of a President and Vice-President, to be elected by ballot at each annual meeting. In case of a vacancy in any of the above offices, the same shall be filled at a special meeting to be called for the purpose.

Annual Meeting III.—The annual meeting of the Club shall be held on the third Monday in January in each year.

Special Meetings IV.—Upon the written request of five members the Secretary-Treasurer shall call a special meeting to consider a specific subject, and notice of the time and purpose of such meeting shall be posted in the Club rooms seven days before the day of such meeting.

Quorum

V.—Ten members shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Club, and the result of any question submitted shall be determined by a majority vote of the members then present, except as otherwise provided by these rules. In case of a tie the presiding officer shall give a casting vote.

. 1

VI .- The President, and in his absence the Duties of Vice-President, shall preside at all meetings Officers of the Club: but in the absence of both President and Vice-President, a meeting of the Club shall elect its presiding officer. The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep the records of the Club, attend to all Club correspondence, keep the accounts of the Club and report thereon to the Committee of Management when required to do so. He shall also submit his accounts to the annual meeting.

VII.-The Secretary-Treasurer, by writ-Deputy ten authority to be posted on the board, Secretarymay designate any ordinary member to act as his deputy in his absence for all purposes except the receipt and payment of money.

VIII .- Sec. 1. The general concerns of Managing the Club shall be managed by a committee Committee of eight members, which committee shall consist of the President, Vice-President, and six other members to be elected by ballot at each annual meeting.

Sec. 2. The Managing Committee shall. at their first meeting after election, appoint a Secretary-Treasurer, who shall not be a member of the committee.

IX.-Sec. 1. The Managing Committee Duties of shall have power to fill vacancies in their Managing own body; shall take cognizance of all in-Committee fractions of the Club constitution and rules: shall have authority to deal with all matters

relating to good order and the conduct of members, and may recommend to a special meeting the suspension or expulsion of any member for improper conduct; and may make from time to time such regulations consistent with these general rules as they shall think necessary for the management and well-being of the Club. It shall also be the duty of the Managing Committee to purchase all supplies for the Club, and fix the prices at which the same will be sold.

Managing Committee Power to purchase Stock

Sec. 2. The Managing Committee shall also have power from time to time, as opportunity offers, to purchase shares of the capital stock of the Union Club Company at such rate as they shall decide on, and shall, either from their own number, or from the ordinary members of the Club. nominate and appoint three members as trustees, to whom any such shares so purchased shall be transferred, and who shall hold such shares in trust for the benefit of the Club. In case any trustee so appointed shall cease to be an ordinary member of the Club, he shall no longer be such trustee. The Managing Committee shall have power. and it shall be their duty, to fill any vacancy arising by the death or resignation of any such trustee, or by reason of any such trustee ceasing to be an ordinary member of the Club.

Trustees

Proposal of Members X.—Each candidate for admission must be proposed by one member and seconded by another. The candidate's name, place of residence, and occupation, together with the names of the proposer and seconder, shall be written on paper and handed to the Secretary-Treasurer, who shall post the same in the Club rooms seven days before the day of ballot.

XI.—The hallot for members shall take Balloting for place on every Saturday at ten o'clock, Members a. m., and shall remain open till ten o'clock. p. m. of the same day. A list, dated and signed by the Secretary-Treasurer, containing the name of each candidate to be balloted for, with the names of the proposer and seconder, shall be put up in a conspicuous place in the Club rooms seven days before the day of ballot, and each member voting shall register his name in a book kept for that purpose as having voted. Ballots containing the names of each candidate shall be prepared by the Secretary-Treasurer and handed to the steward, from whom they must be obtained by members wishing to vote. In case of the destruction of a ballot, a new one may be obtained from the steward upon return of the ballot so destroyed. The voter shall mark opposite to each name X or O: the X shall be considered affirmative; the O shall represent a negative vote. During the hours of ballot a notice to the effect that the ballot is going on shall be posted near the ballotbox with a request that members will vote.

Previous to use, the ballot-box shall be examined and secured by the Secretary-Treasurer; and after the balloting is over the box shall be opened and the votes counted by any two members of the committee. The result of the ballot as regards each candidate shall be immediately entered in the voting-book and signed by the scrutineers. Each candidate must have at least fifteen affirmative votes to constitute his election. One negative vote in six shall exclude. Any candidate who shall have been twice black-balled cannot be again proposed.

New Members

XII.—On the election of each new member, whether ordinary, privileged, or supernumerary, the Secretary-Treasurer shall notify the same to him and furnish him with a copy of the constitution. He shall also request him to remit the fees hereinafter provided to be paid on admission.

Entrance Fees and Yearly Dues XIII.—In the case of ordinary members the entrance fee—payable on admission to the Club—shall be fifty dollars, which amount shall be paid by every member within twenty days from the day of his election, and in case of failure to pay the same within the said twenty days, the election, so far as any such member is concerned, shall be void, and all his rights of membership shall wholly cease; but the committee shall have power to suspend the operation of this rule upon the presentation

of satisfactory reasons for failure of payment. The annual subscription shall be thirty-two dollars, payable quarterly in advance. Members elected on or before the first days of March, June, September and December, shall pay for the current quarter in which they are elected.

XIV.—The financial year shall begin on Financial the first day of January.

Year

XV.—No new member shall be admitted Qualification to ballot for a candidate, or vote on any for Voting occasion whatever, or enjoy any of the privileges of the Club, until he shall have paid all fees provided by these rules.

XVI.—No member who shall be thirty Arrears days in arrears for dues, or any other debt, shall be allowed to vote at a ballot or to act as a member of the committee.

XVII.—The name of any member whose Unpaid quarterly or other subscription shall not Subscription, have been paid for thirty days after the Supplies, etc. same shall have become due, or who shall fail to pay any other debt due by such member of the Cluh, for the space of thirty days after the same shall have become due, shall be put up in the Club rooms, and notice thereof shall be sent to him by the Secretary-Treasurer, and if such subscription or other debt shall not be paid within thirty days from the date of sending such notice, the defaulter shall cease to be a member, and his name shall be erased from

the list of members. But the Managing Committee shall have power to suspend the operation of this rule upon the presentation of satisfactory reasons for failure of payment.

Withdrawal

XVIII.—Any member, not in arrears, shall be at liberty to withdraw from the Club, on his written application to that effect sent in to the Secretary-Treasurer.

Privileged Members XIX.—Any ordinary member removing to any point distant twenty-five miles or upwards from the City of St. John, or any person residing at a distance of twenty-five miles or upwards from the City, shall, upon payment of an annual subscription of ten dollars in advance, be entitled to all the privileges of the Club, except the right to vote; provided, however, that no person not already a member of the Club shall be entitled to such privileges until he shall have been proposed and elected in the usual manner. Such members shall be known as privileged members.

Privileged Members desiring to become Ordinary Members XX.—Any privileged member who shall at any time hereafter become a permanent resident at any point within twenty-five miles of the City of St. John, or any privileged member residing at a greater distance than twenty-five miles from the said City of St. John, who shall desire so to do, shall, upon payment of the entrance fee, and of the full annual subscription, as provided by Article XIII, become an ordinary

member, and be entitled to all the privileges of the Club. Provided, however, that a privileged member who shall become a permanent resident within twenty-five miles of the City of St. John, as aforesaid, shall notify the Secretary, in writing, of his intention to avail himself of the provisions of this Article, and shall pay said entrance fee within three months after becoming a permanent resident.

XXI.—Clerks of any of the foreign banks supernumer-doing business in St. John, and other eligi- ary Members ble persons who shall satisfy the committee that their residence in St. John is temporary, may be elected in the usual way without payment of entrance fee, but subject to the payment of half a year's dues upon election. Such members shall have the same rights as privileged members, and shall be known as supernumerary members. The dues of such supernumerary members, at the expiry of their first half year of membership, amounting to forty-two dollars a year, shall be payable in equal instalments quarterly in advance.

XXII.—Any supernumerary member de-Supernumersiring to become an ordinary member may, ary Members upon notice in writing to the Secretary, desiring to and upon payment of the equivalent of the Ordinary entrance fee, and full annual dues he would Members have had to pay as provided by Article XIII, become an ordinary member, and be entitled to all the privileges of the Club.

Absent Members XXIII.—Any ordinary member leaving the Province for one year or more may, on written application to the Secretary-Treasurer, and on payment of an annual fee of three dollars, become an absent member, and during his absence shall be exempt from the annual subscription. He shall be liable, however, to the payment of his quarterly subscription for the quarter in which he departs from the Province, and for that in which he returns to it.

Resignation or Expulsion

XXIV.--Any member who shall with-draw, resign, or be expelled, or cease to be a member of the Club, shall forfeit *ipso facto* all right or claim thereon, or in or to its property or funds.

Amendment or Alteration of Club Constitution XXV.—The Constitution and Rules of the Club may be altered, amended, or repealed at any annual meeting of the Club, or any special meeting called for the purpose, by a vote of the majority of the members present at such meeting. Seven days' previous notice of any proposed alteration, amendment or repeal shall be given in writing, signed by at least five members of the Club, by posting the same in a conspicuous place in the Club rooms.

Strangers

XXVI.—Any member shall be allowed to introduce a stranger, but no person residing within twenty-five miles of the City shall be eligible to be introduced as a stranger or guest of a member. Any mem-

ber of the Club, however, entertaining strangers in the private dining-room shall have the privilege of inviting persons residing within the said twenty-five miles to meet them at dinner or luncheon; but such residents shall, before either of such meals, have the privilege of the reception room only, but after dining may have the privileges of the Club generally while they remain in the building.

XXVII.-Any member wishing to intro- Honorary duce a friend temporarily visiting St. John, Members and not residing within twenty-five miles of the City, as an honorary member of the Club, must send in a written application for permission to do so to the Secretary-Treasurer; or he must obtain the signature of two members of the committee to his application as approving it. The application thus signed must be handed to the Secretary-Treasurer, who shall notify the person named therein that he has been admitted to the Club for fourteen days; and this privilege may be extended with the consent of the committee for the further period of one month. Every member to whom this permission may be accorded will be held responsible for the eligibility of his nomince, as well as for his observance of all rules of the Club. No stranger once introduced shall again be introduced unless in the meantime he has been absent from the city for three months, and no stranger can

be admitted under this rule more than twice in one year. The committee shall have power, however, to revoke at any time any privilege conferred under this Article.

Hours

XXVIII.—The Club shall be open for the reception of members between the hours of eight o'clock, a. m., and one o'clock, a. m., except on Saturdays, when all lights must be out and doors closed at twelve o'clock, midnight. On Sundays the Club shall be open from eight o'clock, a. m., till eleven o'clock, p. m.

Games

XXIX.—The game of poker shall not be played in the Club. Whist shall not be played for any higher stakes than ten cent points. Other games in the discretion of the committee may be played for limited stakes; the limit of stakes to be fixed by the Managing Committee.

Price of Cards

XXX.—Each person playing at cards in the Club rooms shall pay ten cents.

Whist Laws

XXXI.—The laws of whist, as set out in "Cavendish" and "Clay-Baldwin," are adopted by this Club (except in regard to the rubber points, which shall be four instead of two), and all points in dispute regarding the game of whist shall be settled by the authority of the above books.

Newspapers, Magazines, etc. XXXII.—No member shall take, or permit to be taken, from the Club rooms, on any pretence whatever, or shall injure or destroy any newspaper, book, magazine, or other article, the property of the Club.

XXXIII .. - Any infraction of the Rules Infraction and Regulations of the Club shall be taken of Rules immediate cognizance of by the committee: and in case the conduct of any member shall, in the opinion of the committee, or of any ten members of the Club, who shall certify the same to them in writing, be injurious to the character and interests of the Club, the committee shall be empowered to suspend such member for a term not exceeding three months or to call upon such member to resign; and if the member so called upon refuse to resign, then the committee shall be authorized to suspend him from the privileges of the Club until his conduct shall have been investigated and decided upon by a special meeting to be convened for that purpose, upon a requisition of five members, as provided by Article IV; and whenever any circumstances shall occur likely to endanger the welfare and good order of the Club, or whenever the committee shall think it expedient to submit the conduct of any member to the judgment of a special meeting, the committee shall summon a meeting, giving ten days' notice thereof; and in the event of it being voted at that meeting, consisting of at least twenty members, by two-thirds of the persons present, to be decided by ballot, that the name of any member shall be removed from the list of members, then in that case such member shall cease to belong to the Club. Such decision to be final.

And any member so expelled shall for ever after be ineligible to be re-admitted, or re-elected, a member of the Club.

Club Property

XXXIV.—None but ordinary members shall have any right or claim in or to the property or funds of the Club.

Rules and Regulations XXXV.—These Rules and Regulations shall be printed and a copy of them shall be delivered to every member of the Club, or transmitted to his address, and thenceforth become binding upon each member; but no member shall be absolved from the effect of these rules by reason of his not having received a copy.

XXXVI.—The Managing Committee shall have power to provide for the affiliation of this Club with any other Club or Clubs.

HOUSE RULES

Steward.

He shall have custody of Supply Cellar, Plate, Cutlery, China, Glass, Linen, and all Furniture and Provisions of the Club. He shall have general control and superintendence of the Cook and men and women servants, and will be responsible for their conduct and cleanly appearance, and in case of misconduct, shall report the same to the Secretary or Committee.

He shall have charge of all Wines and Liquors in the bottling and supply cellar; and shall issue the same to the Wine Clerk, and will be charged with all deficiencies that may occur in the stock of Wines, Liquors, or other property placed in his custody.

He shall account daily to the Secretary for all receipts of moneys, prepare Bills of Fare, after consulting the Secretary as to tariff charges, etc., and shall send each day to the Secretary the Bill of the preceding day.

He shall see to the good order of the House generally. He shall cater for the Club, keeping Pass Books with approved tradesmen, and entering in similar Pass Book, at the time of purchase, all supplies bought in market. These books to be made up weekly and left with the Secretary.

He shall check daily supplies to and withdrawals from the Wine Cellar. He shall examine and check tradesmen's books and bills, seeing that charges are reasonable and in accordance with goods received.

He shall enter in the Order Book everything necessary to be purchased by the Club, and all necessary repairs, for the sanction of the Committee before further action. He shall see that no friend of any servant enter the Club House, except by his permission, and in no case by the front door.

He shall also add up and receive from members the amount of their bills for meals. He shall be governed by all Regulations of the Committee affecting his department, and shall render all possible assistance to the Secretary.

Hall Porter.

He shall enter in his book once a day the name of every member coming into the House, and will see that members introducing strangers write their name and address, with that of the introducer, in the book kept for that purpose.

Strangers calling to see members of the Club will be shown by him into the Reception Hall, or other room set apart by the Committee for that purpose, and intimation of their arrival immediately sent by him to the member enquired for, if in the House. If a letter for an absent member be called for by any other member who may wish to forward it, the latter will be required to pay the postage (if any), and to sign an acknowledgment in the Porter's book of his having received the letter, in case of future question. He will have charge of the Lavatory on the first floor, Cloak Room, and fires in the Morning Room.

He will render all possible assistance to the Steward, and perform such other duties as the Committee may from time to time direct.

Waiters.

The Waiters and other servants in the establishment will be subject to the orders of the Steward, and will perform such duties as he may prescribe.

General Servants' Regulations.

No servant will absent himself or herself from the Club House, except on business, and the Servants are strictly prohibited from receiving visitors, except as hereinbefore provided, or followers.

No Servant will receive, under penalty of dismissal, any present whatever from the members, guests, or tradesmen of the Club.

Servants while on duty will not talk to each other except on matters connected with their business, and no servant is permitted to address an individual member in the house on matters personal or relative to the concerns of the Club—all communications of the latter kind to be made through the Steward to the House Committee.

If any money or articles supposed to be the property of members shall be found by the servants in the Club House, they shall be delivered to the Steward.

The servants' entrance in the rear will be under lock, and the key thereof be in the custody of the Steward, and servants must not enter or go out of the Club except by servants' entrance at the rear of the building.

No large boxes or articles of luggage belonging to members will be admitted in to the hall.

No application for reinstatement of a servant, who may have been dismissed on the representation of a member, will be read or taken into consideration unless it comes through and be recommended by the member by whose representation he or she was dismissed.

Servants will be held responsible for breakage and loss of and damage to the property of the Club.

No servant of the Club shall be sent out of the house on any errand or pretence whatever, unless upon Club business by the Steward, Secretary, or member of Committee, or to post letters at stated periods.

Dining-Room.

Breakfast may be served from 8 until 10 o'clock, a.m. Hot Lunches and Dinners from 1 to 2.30 p. m., and from 6 to 8 p. m.

Hot Suppers up to 10 o'clock, p. m., on giving notice before 8 o'clock.

No Wine or Liquor shall be served to any member in the Dining-Room, except with Breakfast, Lunch, Dinner, or Supper.

Members will fill up their Bills for meals themselves, and must on no account employ the waiters to do so.

No hat, cap, stick, or umbrella shall be taken into the Dining-Room.

Articles of glass, earthenware, etc. which may be broken by the members, either in the Dining-Room or elsewhere in the house, will be paid for by them at prices to be fixed by the Committee.

Private Dining-Room.

The Private Dining-Room or a Card Room may be engaged by a party of not less than four for their exclusive use during the evening, by giving notice to the Steward on the morning of the day on which the room would be required, and on such terms as the Committee may direct.

Ladies' Rooms.

The two Dining-Rooms in the Ladies' Section are reserved for the entertainment of ladies by members of the Club: one room as an Ordinary, the other, as a Private Dining-Room. The latter may be reserved for a party of not less than four.

A member entertaining ladies must accompany them.

Non-members may be invited, but are not to be introduced to other parts of the Club.

A member desiring to entertain at Supper or a Private Dinner, should previously notify the Steward.

Billiard Room.

The following regulations will be in force in this room:

1st. The Game of Pool shall have choice of tables, and take precedence over Billiards and Pyramids, and may be played in consecutive games.

2nd. For Billiards and Pyramids the tables can only be engaged for one game of 50 or 100 points. Precedence in playing and choice of tables given according to entry of names on the marker's slate. Players of Billiards should intimate to the marker whether they intend to play a game of 50 or 100 points.

The charges will be as follows:

Pool.—Five cents per ball. Stars to pay extra.

Pin-Pool.—Two cents per cue. No extra charge for bursts.

Black Pool.—Ten cents per cue per hour.

Billiards.—Ten cents for a game of 50. Twenty cents for a game of 100 points, or two consecutive games of 50.

Pyramids.—Ten cents per game.

The marker is instructed, on the conclusion of each game, to present to the loser a check for the amount of the game.

Any member may use any of the Billiard tables for practice, paying for such privilege twenty cents an hour, or ten cents a half-hour—no charge being less than ten cents—provided that no member shall be allowed to use any table for practice to the exclusion of

two or more members who may desire to play a game of Billiards or Pool; and if any player be so practising he shall at once cease doing so, if two or more members desire the use of the table.

Smoking.

Smoking will not be permitted in the Dining-Room.

Miscellaneous Rules.

No servant shall be reprimanded or in any way punished by the members. In the event of fault being found in any department, it shall be stated in writing to a member of the Committee in whose department the fault exist, who shall take measures for correcting it, communicating the result for the satisfaction of the party complaining.

A member shall be responsible for any debt to the Club incurred by any strangers he may have introduced.

No Wines, Liquors, or Refreshments shall be furnished in the Reading Room, and no conversation shall be carried on therein.

The Local Daily papers are on no account to be taken out of the Reading Room during the day or evening of publication, nor any other papers for one day after they are laid on the table.

Sandwiches or Biscuits may be served to members in the Reception, Billiard and Card Rooms up to one-half hour before the hour of closing.

The Wine Room shall be closed every evening one-half hour before the hour of closing the Club.

Supplies must be paid for immediately upon presentation of checks for same.

Writing Materials will be provided for the use of

members in the Reading Room and in the Reception Room.

The Steward is forbidden, under penalty of dismissal, to furnish supplies to any member of the Club who has been posted for the period of one week for non-payment of any sum other than quarterly or annual dues, until such indebtedness shall have been paid.

No game other than Whist and Cribbage shall be played in the Whist Rooms.

No games will be played in the Club on Sunday.

Dogs will not be allowed within the Club House.

No Rubber of Whist shall be commenced after 12.45 o'clock, a. m.

The word "Arrears" or "Dues" shall be construed to mean all sums due the Club from any member.

Complaints of any deficiency in the service of the Club, of overcharges, mischarges, mistakes, or defects, must be made in writing to the House Committee.

No pamphlet, advertisement or notice of any kind shall be allowed to be laid on the table or put up in the Club by a member.

No one who has been up for election, and who has been black-balled, shall be eligible to be introduced as a guest or as an honorary member of the Club, unless and until his name has been submitted to the Committee of Management, and their permission for such introduction first obtained.

Games.

Whist, Bridge Whist, Euchre, All-Fours, Hearts, Ecarte, Cribbage, Forty-Fives, Nap. Rilliards, Chess, Checkers, Dominoes, and Backgammon only can be played in the Club. No Dice shall be used in the Club except at Backgammon.

Members shall not have at stake, directly or indirectly, more than the following amounts on any of the abovementioned games, and any member violating this rule will be liable to suspension:

Whist-Ten cent points.

Bridge Whist-One cent points.

Euchre, Forty-Fives, All-Fours, Ecarte and Cribbage—Twenty-five cents per game.

Nap-Ten cent limit.

Hearts-Ten cents a card.
