 Railway Commiscion as a result of the Western Freight Rates Enquiry，are now in force and Ale principal changes are shown in a table ＂huch appears on another page of this issue It will be observed that cousiderable re fuetions have been made in the rates to all four Western provinces．Manitoba gains the east．but that is becanse the old rates to Mamitoba points were，in proportion，lowe han to the provinces further West．The new rates will affect considerable savings for the farmers of the West，for besides paying freight indirectly on a great many things which they buy locally，thee are today，thru their various ooperative agencies，paying large sums to the railways themselves．Apples from the East and Whest，flour，sugar，coal and indeed almost if mot all the goods which the co－ operative grain growers are buying thru their rgamizations will eost less beecanse of these new freight rates．This sticeess stoould be a real emeoragement to the farmers of the West to continue their work of organization， education and agitation．The inguir，＇which esulted in these reductions was the first real investigation of railway freight tariffs erer made in Canada．The investigation was， course，strongly resented by the railway companios，who appeared to doeverything in their power to prevent the real truth from being kndwn，but public opinion was so strong that the insestigation had to be held and a measure of re＇ief had to he given．It forming and expressing public opinion，the Grain Growers＇Asmexiations and the Inited Farmérs of Alberta did their part，along with the hoards of trade and other hodies，and the erganized farmers，therefore have a right to feel that they have again helped to accomplish something that is for the ben－fit of the people as a whote．The Railway Commission，and particularly the Chairman，II．L．Drayton， K．C．．is deserving of the thanks of the Weat for the measure of relief which has been given but warning should also be wiven that the farm－ ers will mot be satisfied until Western rates are redueed to the level of those in foree is the East．THIS YEAR＇S LESSON
