THE WIMBLEDON TEAM.

Great Success of the Canadians.—Col. Gibson carries off the Prince of Wales' prize—Canadian Cadets to be allowed British Commissions.

London, July 19.—At Wimbledon today Canada won a great success. Col. Gibson carried off the Prince of Wales' prize, consisting of £100 and a badge. He scored 94 points at three ranges, of two, five, and six hundred yards, the highest possible score being 105 points. The score next to Col. Gibson was 91. Corporal Gray, with a score of 80 points, wins a £5 prize. In the St. George's prizes Lieutenant Hunter with a score of 51 points, wins £3; Assistant-Surgeon Aiken, 27 points, £2. In the last series of extra prizes Private Ogg and Assistant-Surgeon Aiken, with a score of 33 points, took the thirteenth and fourteenth prizes respectively. On all sides the Canadians are congratulated. Col. Gibson's success is very pronounced. His score is a remarkably good one.

The Duke of Cambridge visited the camp today. Sir Leonard Tilley, Sir John Rose, Ladies Wharnclyffe and Macdonald were among those present. The Duke inspected the Canadian team, and expressed great pleasure at seeing them again. He congratulated them upon winning the Prince of Wales' prize, the second most important contest at the meeting. England, he said, did not grudge the Canadians the honor they won, for they formed part of the same empire, engaged in the same duty of defence. He concluded by assuring the Canadians that they would be always welcome here. Sir Michael Hicks-Beach joined in the congratulations offered by His Grace the Duke of Cambridge, and expressed the pleasure it afforded him to see the team again engaged in the contest. He took the opportunity of announcing that in future a certain proportion of cadets from the Military Academy of Kingston would be allowed to take commissions in the British Army.

LAWN TENNIS.—The new game of lawn tennis bids fair to become as fashionable on this side of the Atlantic as it already is in the aristocratic circles of England. Certainly there are few games, it is claimed, better adapted to the wants of modern society on its lawns and meadows, where it will rank almost as high as "Tennis" its ancestor, "The Game of Princes" and "The Prince of Games." It has less risk than archery and more variety than croquet, and it will prove a welcome change from these well-deserving standbys.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—Benj. Brown, aged 14 years, son of Jared Brown, farmer, residing on the Town Line of Stephen and Hay, 7 miles west of Exeter, met with a sad misfortune while out with his gun last Friday evening. He was seen to leave the house, gun in hand, and of course nothing more was thought of him until morning, when his parents, becoming anxious of his whereabouts, immediately went in search. He was found about 70 rods from the house, with the contents of the gun lodged in his left temple. He must have been killed instantly, as his body was quite cold and stiff when discovered.
