SIX MONTHS OF WAR

A FRANK FRENCH RETROSPECT

The plans of General Joffre are set forth and explanations are given as to how and why they could not be carried out. It has in fact been carried out in a far-reaching manner and it may be said that it has embraced all the grades of the military hierarchy from commanders of brigades to commanders of armies.

V—REJUVENATION OF FRENCH ARMY

THE review of the report, beginning his review on February 1, states that the condition of the French Army was such that it was not possible to quote textually.

RECOGNITION OF ABILITY

Ability proved on the field of battle is now immediately recognized and utilized, and in this way it has been possible to provide in the most favourable manner for the vacancies created by the changes in command which were considered necessary in the first weeks of the war.

HARDENED TROOPS

The quality of the troops has improved perceptibly since the beginning of the war. The men have become hardened and used to war, and their health—largely owing to the excellence of the commissariat—is extremely satisfactory.

WORK OF THE TRANSPORT SERVICE

The report next passes to the transport service, which has worked with remarkable precision since the beginning of the war. Its first great task was the transport of the "troupe de couverture"—the troops sent to the front to meet the first shock of the enemy and enable the mobilization of the main armies to be carried out undisturbed—and then the mobilization and concentration transports.

NO LACK OF OFFICERS.

The losses in the junior commissioned ranks have naturally been highest in the infantry. There is, however, nothing like a want of officers in this arm. Many Captains and Lieutenants who have been

north of Solsoons, where their success was due to the flooded state of the Aisne and the carrying away of our bridges. Our attacks on the other hand, have yielded important results and have been carried out with plenty of spirit, although without the imprudence which cost us such heavy losses in August.

The cavalry has made remarkable progress. Throughout October the cavalry was called on to take the inadequate numbers of the infantry and showed itself perfectly adapted to the necessities of fighting on foot.

The artillery has displayed a superiority in use of its admirable matériel, which is recognized by the Germans themselves.

VI—ASCENDANCY IN ARTILLERY.

BEGINNING with the famous 75 gun, the compiler of the French official report dwells on its power, rapidity of action, and its incomparable precision, which make it an implement of war of the first order.

The methodical and complete exploitation of the resources of the artillery, organized since the beginning of the war, has enabled us to accumulate a considerable stock of fresh munitions, and an increasing rate of production is henceforth assured.

Our heavy artillery was in process of reorganization when the war broke out, with the result that we were indisputably in a position of inferiority in respect of this arm during the first battles.

Of the work of the commissariat department some idea is gathered when it is remembered that each of the 2,500,000 men at the front daily receives the campaign ration consisting of 1½ lb. bread, 1 lb. tea, and a third of a litre of wine a day.

The summary of the Army supply services gives an idea of the commercial prosperity of the country. The transport of goods by railway and sea proceeds with an activity unknown in the most prosperous times.

News in Brief

Mrs. Meyer and her two sons, Henry and Conrad, were committed to the Montreal House of Detention on a charge of murdering the woman's husband by hanging him in the barn of his home.

Father Ledochowski, General of the Society of Jesus, and known as "Black Pope," arrived in Montreal on Monday in the Canton of Schwyz, Switzerland, May 19, from Rome. It is stated that he will remain at the monastery until the end of the war.

The jury at Syracuse, N. Y., on May 21, in the Barnes-Roosevelt libel suit gave a verdict for the defendant. When the roll was called eleven of the jurors said they were in favor of a verdict for the defendant, but the twelfth said: "I am for the plaintiff."

A cable to the Prime Minister, Ottawa, on May 20, announced that royal assent had been given to the address to the British Parliament asking for an amendment to the B. N. A. act providing for an increase of the number of members in the Commons to Prince Edward Island.

Emil Karik was found guilty of theft under the speedy trial act in St. John on May 20, by Judge Forbes and sentenced to serve two years in Dorchester penitentiary at hard labor. Karik, 25, was arrested with a charge of stealing \$80 from Peter Kiriloff of East St. John a month ago.

Antonio Di Lena paid the extreme penalty of the law on May 21 at Bordeaux jail. He was convicted for the murder of Giuseppe Greco, at Cedar Rapids, last September. Although he went to the scaffold with a calm and collected mind, he was rendered faint by the fact that the condemned man was struggling for life for several minutes after the drop fell.

The body of Daniel Jennings, brakeman of Dartmouth, was found floating in the ferry dock at Halifax on Monday morning May 19. From the appearance of the body it evidently had been in the water for some time. The coroner's inquest was held on Wednesday.

On Wednesday May 19, J. H. Burritt of McAdam, charged with padding C. P. R. pay lists was sentenced at Fredericton to six months imprisonment. Judge Wilson said that the prisoner was liable to seven years but on account of mitigating circumstances the penalty was made light. It seems that Burritt had got into the habit of padding pay lists for a long time, and that he had committed the offence on several occasions.

Judge Choquet, Montreal, handed down his decision in the new case of the publishing case of M. E. Nichols, of the Mail Publishing Co., against Arthur Leithhead, secretary-treasurer of the Montreal Printing Company, declaring the evidence did not support the charge of conspiracy and that the company was not liable for the loss of Nichols and his associates.

The price court in London, on May 21, decided that the German steamer Ophelia, captured in the North Sea by the British destroyer HMS. Onyx, October 18, 1914, was a lawful prize.

Germany protested that this act of capture was in violation of the Hague convention, declaring that the Ophelia was a hospital ship. The British government contended that the Ophelia was not a hospital ship, and that, as a matter of fact, she was masquerading under false colors.

A new warning for mariners has just been issued by the British Admiralty. It cancels previous notices and announces the establishment of the new sets of mine fields on the east coast of England, and provides for the movements of ships around either the northern or southern ends of the British Isles. It provides for both the southern route and the use of a new northern route to the west coast of Ireland to the Faroe Islands, and thence by a route north of the Shetlands to the North Sea.

In the course of his remarks in St. Stephen's Church, Milltown, N. B., on Sunday, May 16, Rt. Rev. Mgr. E. Doyle, D. D., made a vigorous protest against the Ophelia case. He roundly denounced the fashion as borrowed from the stage and the rising generation of young women he counselled to dress in plain, simple, and practical attire. He said that he would not tolerate the entrance into the church of any young woman whose dress did not conform to the rules of strict modesty.

Eight of a crew of fourteen were lost when the government steamer Christine was rammed Tuesday evening, May 18. She sank in three minutes. The crew was unable to launch a lifeboat or don life-preservers, but six were saved by the other vessel. Captain Kennedy is suffering from a broken leg. The Christine was formerly Lord Strathcona's private yacht, but owned by J. S. Thom of Quebec, was chartered by the naval authorities and performed the duties of an examination steamer.

Marine officials will conduct an enquiry into the sinking of the Christine. It is said she was rammed by another government boat that should not have been in the vicinity.

To a reporter, who showed Hon. W. S. Fielding a recent article in the Globe expressing regret at the reported announcement of his retirement from public life, Hon. Mr. Fielding said:

I have not authorized any announcement, nor have I seen the report to which the Globe refers. Since the last general election I have had numerous requests from my old friends to allow myself to be again nominated. For personal reasons, which I explained to those most concerned, I have not felt free to comply with their request. This, no doubt, accounts for the report. I have been less inclined toward political activity lately because I am reluctant to engage in party strife at this time. I have a strong belief that the country will not have to be disturbed this year by the turmoil of a general election, and a strong hope that such conditions will arise as will enable both parties to restrict, if not wholly suspend, their activities in the direction of elections.—St. John's Globe.
