Only 150 Serbians With Rifles Held Back Oncoming Germans.

By Special Wire to the courler. Paris, Nov. 5 .- "There Monsieur with that you can go and see how Serbia is going to die," exclaimed Jovanovitch, minister of the interior, handing a letter of recommendation to the general staff to Albert Londres, special correspondent of The Petit Journal.


Armed with this letter, M. Londre made his way far beyond Palanka, through retreating ox wagons and endless herds of sheep plodding through the mud of the Morava valley without panic, escaping from the Teu tons, whose voices were heard in th distance.

"At a cross road," writes M. Lon-dres, "a Serbian captain, who was waiting for me said: 'I was asked by Col. Terzitch, commanding our divis ion to take you to our last position We walked side by side in silence an then came on a plateau. 'That is ou last position, monsieur,' said the Serb ian officer. "I saw debouching from a little wood one by one, with dignity that brought tears to my eyes the 150 men who, on this great plateau, Serbia had opposed to embattled Germany. "On retreating from Vobarotz, an hour ago,' said the captain, 'those 150 hid in the wood. Now they are com-ing out to face the enemy." "The lieutenant in command took few steps into a corn field and shouted a command to his men. They lay down on the edge of a field with out a word or a sidelong glance and deliberately raised their rifles. 'Look monsieur,' exclaimed ingary. If Greece Had Taken the Field Early Bulgarians Would Have Lost.

Athens, Nov. 4, vit London, Nov. -One of the statements of M. Venizelos, which attracted especial attention was that Great Britain's offer to cede the Island of Cyprus to Greece was independent of the result of the war while other promises of concessions were conditional on the success of the allies, Greece, he said, was to acquire part of the Vilayet of Brusa and Bulgarian Thrace, while Bulgaria was to be shorn of the ter ritory she gained as a result of Balkan war. All this, he declared, would be obtained by Greece at a small cost since the proposals of the entente powers required only the assistance of smaller units of the Greec

Referring to the allegation that Serbia had failed to send against the Bulgarians -150,000 men in accordance with the provisions of the treaty of alliance, Venizelos said she actually had 300,000 troops opposed to the Bulgars. If Greece had taken the field the former premier asserted, her army would have been within a short distance of Sofia and Serbia would have devoted her energies to hold back the Austro-Germans whose numbers were less than had been report-

Many of the present Munisters, including Mr. Viviani himself, it is said, will have posts in the new Cabinet. General Gallieni, who replaces Mr. Millerand as Minister of War, is one of the most distinguished officers in the French army. Though he had reached the age limit when the war began he was named Military Governor of Paris and saved the capital by massing a new army on the flank of General von Kluck's forces. 




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

M. Venizelos has more than once clashed with the monarch. Not long ago, after the second Balkan war he had a plan worked out to rebuild the Balkan League and bring them with a united front to the support of the Allies. He stated that he had the approval of the King in this regard to give Kavala to Bulgaria. His enemies declared that he had no such au. thorization. Venizelos appealed to Constantine to clear him from this charge and the latter replied that his Prime Minister had misunderstood him. Then Venizelos resigned.

A short time later as the result of a general election his supporters were again in a big majority and ar was recalled to office. He once more urged co-operation with the Allies, but the King turned a deaf ear and once more he resigned, he and his supporters still remaining in the house in their former numerical strength. The King called upon M. Zaimis to become Premier and how he has been defeated on a straight vote of want of confidence. What will happen next is a matter of conjecture. Constantine may attempt a patched up ministry or there may be a dissolution with no possible election for two months. Whatever results the fact is self evident that M. Venizelos and his adherents are strong for the Allies and are backed by a large portion of public opinion.
