E. L. Richardson, manager of the Calgary Stampede of 1923, held under the patronage of the Prince of Wales and Governor-General Byng, announces that, owing to the enormous success of the great rodeo July 9-14 it will be staged annually instead of at intervals of several years, as heretofore. The recent Stampede was attended by 137,800 people.

Only once in the history of Canada was the gold production record set in 1922 exceeded, and that was in 1900, when the Yukon placers reached the peak of their yield. During 1922, 1,263,364 ounces of gold were mined in the Dominion. The value is set at \$26,116,050, an increase of 36% over the previous year's figures. In 1900, 1,350,057 ounces of gold were mined and the value was \$27,908,153.

Canada's trade is climbing ahead. Total trade in the three months ending June was \$462,544,438, an increase of \$110,841,056 over the corresponding three months of last year. For June alone total trade was \$179,720,516, an increase of \$44,944,732 over last year. Domestic exports in the three months increased approximately \$50,000,000 and imports approximately \$61,000,000.

## CANADA AUSTRALIA TRADE AGREEMENT

### MUTUALLY ADVANTAGEOUS ARRANGEMENTS MADE.

### May Result in Wider Establishment on Canadian Soil of Foreign Manufacturers.

Negotiations which have been carried on for several months between Canada and Australia have at length reached a successful conclusion and trade arrangements mutually advantageous have been made by the two countries, to come into effect by proclamation of both countries on a date to be mutually decided upon. The agreement is of a reciprocal nature by which Australia grants the Dominion of Canada preference in many lines of export in exchange for which Canada extends equally favorable treatment to various Australian products. The treaty is expected to put trade between the two countries on the freest and most open basis.

At the time of writing complete details are lacking as to the terms of the agreement. The main terms have, however, been announced.

Certain goods of Canadian origin, including fish, gloves, machinery, and newsprint imported into Australia, will be given the benefit of the British preferential tariff, whilst others, consisting of iron and steel tubes or pipes, goloshes and vehicle parts, will enter under the intermediate tariff. The proposed British preferential rates render machinery free compared with ten per cent. under the present rates. Certain classes of printing paper also will be free, compared with the present rate of £3 per ton. Gloves (textile only) will be subject to ten per cent. ad valorem as compared with the present rate of 25 per cent.

#### Canada Grants Australia.

Regarding the other side of the agreement, Canada will grant Australia the British preference on fresh

meat, canned meat, lard, tallow, eggs, butter, cheese, onions, raisins, currants, dried fruits, canned fruit and vegetable glue, gelatine, bees' wax, pears, quinces, apricots, nectarines, honey and eucalyptus oil. Canada will amend her tariff on these items so as to increase the preference, and in addition will accord Australia the same rate as France on wines and brandy.

Australia has been particularly interested in getting her dried fruits, currants and raisins into the Canadian market, items which the Dominion imports very extensively from outside the British Empire, whilst Canada is a heavy exporter of agricultural machinery and vehicles of various kinds to Australia. The official announcement of the conclusion of the arrangement states: "It is anticipated that the agreement will do much to encourage trade along reciprocal lines and to cement further the cordial relations existing between these two ports of the Empire. This would appear to be of greater extent in Canada's favor since the Dominion is only a comparatively small importer from Australia whilst exporting to that country already at a very heavy rate."

#### Trade With Australia Increasing.

Trade with Australia has increased at a surprising rate of recent years, and is still growing at a healthy rate, and combined imports and exports have now reached a total of more than \$20,000,000 per annum. In 1912 Canada imported from Australia to the extent of \$431,701 and exported to a value of \$3,947,015. By 1916 this trade had increased to figures of respectively \$1,062,752 and \$7,773,209 respectively. Figures of import trade for the past three fiscal years have been respectively \$1,079,324, \$1,457,946, and \$1,037,451, and exports \$10,678,600, \$18,783,766, and \$19,923,997.

Canada is very rapidly becoming the Antipodes' source of supply for manufactured goods. One of the features of the trade of development of the Canadian Pacific coast has been the remarkable increase in Australia's demand for Canadian lumber products and for newsprint. Australia is one of the Dominion's best markets for automobiles, the Canadian product being almost exclusively in use there. In the past fiscal year Australia took \$3,000,000 worth of Canadian freight automobiles, \$6,000,000 worth of passenger cars, auto parts to the extent of nearly \$1,000,000 and \$40,000 worth of bicycles.

#### Wide Variety of Exports.

The favorable reception of Canadian manufactured products is indicated in the wide variety of Dominion goods entering Australia. Important among the numerous items of import are candy, chewing gum, whiskey, rubber belting, canvas shoes, rubber hose, pneumatic tires, solid rubber tires, and other rubber manufactures, canned and smoked herring, dressed fur skins, unmanufactured leather, cotton underwear and clothing, manufactures of silk, manufactures of felt, corsets, gloves, hats and caps, all kinds of farm implements, hardware and cutlery, enamelware, manufactures of iron and steel, manufactures of aluminum, brass products, copper products, electrical apparatus, asbestos, clay manufactures, coal, glassware, coal oil, artificial abrasives and Portland cement.

The new trade treaty yet further facilitating export trade with Australia should not only benefit Canadian manufacturers but result in the wider establishment on Canadian soil of foreign manufactures interested in the British Empire markets. Merely one example of what can be accomplished has been the penetration of the Antipodes with the American automobile through using Canada as the depot of manufacture and this method of trade aggression offers a wide field for expansion.

#### A Peep into a Little-Known Industry.

Do you know how your wallpaper is made?  
No matter what the quality of the wallpaper may be, or the price asked for it, every design is first produced in water colors.

After the parts of the design to be printed in each color are separately drawn they are ready for transferring to the rollers. This may be done either by engraving the design on copper rollers or by taking wooden rollers and working out the design by means of small brass strips, the spike ends of which are driven into the wood.

Before the actual printing takes place the paper is given a background. This is done by passing the huge reels of paper through machines fitted with mechanical arms which brush the paper with a suitable coloring matter. The reels of tinted paper now pass to the dry-rooms, where the regulated heat removes every trace of moisture. In the meantime the machines are made ready by arranging the pattern and rollers around a large drum. As the paper is fed into one end of the machine, each roller prints upon it one of the colors that go to make up the complete design.

The coloring matter is applied to the rollers by means of endless woven belts which, passing through the color troughs insure supplies of the right color being applied to each roller. After the rolls of paper are printed they pass to the drying rooms. To give the wallpaper a superior finish it is passed through a machine with an engraved roller revolving against a soft plain one. In this way, the different markings or "grains" are pressed into the paper.

Thoroughly dried for the last time the paper is mechanically measured, rolled, and cut.

As the rolls are being wound, the machine marks off the paper into lengths. This mark, the operator looks for. When it appears, the machine is stopped for a moment, the paper is cut, and the neatly wound rolls are removed ready for use.

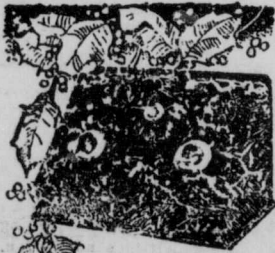

### Many-Eyed Insects.

Some insects are liberally provided with eyes. In general they have two kinds—simple and compound. Simple eyes are like our own, though less efficient, while compound eyes are composed of numerous facets and lenses.

Most people know how difficult it is to catch the common house-fly. This is not surprising when one realizes that fly's eye has 12,000 facets, and the more recently there is not much that is out of its line of vision. The dragonfly's eye has 12,000 facets, and the Mordella beetle's eye is made up of no fewer than 25,000.

While the compound eyes never exceed two, the single eyes vary in number from eighteen to twenty. They are situated in groups on each side of the head.

Spiders and scorpions have both single and compound eyes, though they appear to derive little benefit from them.

The Tree Planting Division of the Forestry Branch of the Dept. of the Interior in 1923 distributed some five and a quarter million trees to farmers in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, and since this work began, has supplied, free, some seventy-five million trees for shelter belts about prairie homesteads.

In the Province of Alberta there are eight forest reserves, the total area of which is about 18,620 square miles. These have been set aside with the idea of maintaining a timber supply and conserving the flow of the rivers.

### Sing a Song of Sixpence.

"Sixpenny worth of miracle," is a striking expression from George Gissing, the novelist. Mr. Kennedy Williamson writes a summary of a story that Gissing himself told. In a lonely spot by a woodland the novelist found a small boy leaning against a tree; his head was buried in his hands, and he was sobbing out his heart. The lad had been sent to pay a debt with sixpence and had lost the money. He was not so much afraid of facing his parents as he was sorrowful at the loss they sustained.

"Sixpence (twelve cents) dropped by the wayside and a whole family made wretched! I put my hand in my pocket and wrought sixpenny worth of miracle," said Gissing.

How little it sometimes takes to make a heart happy! The significance of the story becomes more apparent as Mr. Williamson takes a look behind the scenes of Gissing's private life as related in the Private Papers of Henry Ryecroft. Once in his days of struggle the novelist lived in a back bedroom on the top floor, but he changed to the front cellar of the same building; the cellar had a stone floor and contained a bed, a table, a chair and a washstand. He made the change because it saved him sixpence a week; with sixpence he could buy two meals.

Once he bought at an old bookshop a greatly coveted book and then lived on bread and butter for twenty-four hours in order that he might save the price—sixpence.

Writing his book, New Grub Street, in six weeks by toiling ten hours a day, he sometimes had to sell some of his own books to obtain the simplest food. One day, however, he found sixpence in the street. Long afterwards he wrote concerning it, "I had an exaltation which is vivid to me at this moment."

Gissing was able to sympathize with the impoverished boy because of his own grim knowledge of poverty.

An Italian newspaper correspondent in China gives some amusing impressions of the civil war now "raging" in that country.

He points out that blood is rarely drawn in battles. When General Tschan-Hun had been thirteen days in Pekin, the Republican generals, Taso-Kun and Tuan, marched against him. Each side was equipped with machine guns and aeroplanes, and a "battle" ensued. A bomb struck a house and killed a civilian and Tschan-Hun's army thereupon scattered.

The Chinese soldier of to-day is splendidly drilled in the European way, but if it begins to rain he stops fighting and opens his paper umbrella, which, with a fan, forms part of his equipment. There is rarely any fighting in China when the weather is bad.

## HEALTH EDUCATION

BY DR. J. J. MIDDLETON

A prominent business man of Toronto was recently found dead in his garage, with the engine of his automobile still running. On investigating the case, the conclusion arrived at was that the man's death was due to carbon monoxide poisoning. Carbon monoxide has become one of the commonest forms of gas poisoning. In the cities, it is now found that the deaths from this gas exceed those from any other poison. But deaths from carbon monoxide can happen anywhere. This gas can be just as fatal in small cottages out in the country through incomplete combustion in the coal furnace or stove. It can produce fatal results in a garage, as has been seen when the engine is left running and not sufficient ventilation provided. The danger involved in running a gasoline engine in a small closed space for any length of time should be recognized by all automobile owners. In recent tests on the exhaust of a small automobile engine, it was found that it discharged approximately twenty-five cubic feet of gas per minute, samples of which gave an average of six per cent. carbon monoxide or one and one-half cubic feet of deadly carbon monoxide gas every minute. Larger engines will, naturally give off more. A ratio of fifteen parts of carbon monoxide to ten thousand parts of air is considered a dangerous concentration to be exposed to for any considerable time, and a small engine in "warming up" and giving off only one cubic foot of carbon monoxide

per minute would contaminate the air of a garage 10 feet by 10 feet by 20 feet to the danger point in about three minutes.

It is not so very long ago that the newspapers contained an account of a young girl who, while taking a bath, was asphyxiated through having a small heating stove in the bathroom. These accidents occur so unexpectedly that it is well for the public to know the danger of hot water gas heaters becoming an important source of carbon monoxide in houses, especially where they are not properly connected to an active flue. Soot gradually collects in these devices, and may become incandescent, thus furnishing ideal conditions for the production of carbon monoxide, which, unless removed through the flue, may result in serious accidents.

The danger of carbon monoxide is that it is odorless and the victim has thus little warning of its presence until symptoms appear. The individual feels dizzy and complains of headache, with a feeling of sleepiness and sense of fatigue. Because of the great loss of motor power which the gas causes to the muscles of the body, the victim may be unable to escape even though he is aware of the danger. It is thus well to know something of the dangers of carbon monoxide and where it is liable to appear, for to be forewarned is to be forearmed. Proper ventilation is essential wherever there is danger from this poison.

### A Camera Pioneer.

The Royal Photographic Society has erected a tablet to the memory of Henry Fox Talbot, "the father of modern photography."

Before this tablet came as a reminder, it is to be feared that few knights of the camera had ever heard of Henry Fox Talbot, though his experiments in photography are not yet a century old.

In 1835 Fox Talbot, a Cambridge mathematician of distinction, made a simple box camera, with which he took views of his house on sensitized paper. Then, after the invention of the daguerreotype, he patented his calotype process. This was in 1841.

He brushed a solution of silver nitrate over selected paper, which was then dried at the fire and dipped into a solution of potassium iodide. "Gallo-nitrate of silver" was next brushed over the paper; then it was exposed in the camera, and developed. Wax was now applied, and the result was a "negative"—first called by this name by Fox Talbot.

How many amateur photographers of to-day would be willing to go to all this trouble before they could even start to take pictures?
