### Crown Lands Commission At Work

Archie Fraser and D. J. Buckley are Members, and J. W. Vanderbeck a Forester

The Crown Lands advisory Commission, consisting of Hon. E. Smith, together with the Deputy Min ister of Lands and Mines, the chief forester and Messrs Archie Fraser, and D. J. Buckley, met on Tuesday Mr. Fraser representing the ownners of granted lands and Mr. Buckley the lesses of Crown lands. The first work was the opp intment of an examing board, to examine the qualifications of all employes in the orestry service. The chief forester is the chairman. The others ap-pointed are Mr. McFadden, a forester of long experience, and Council-lor J. W. Vanderbeck, of Millerton. Already there is a long list of applicants for work in the service, and this board will presently hold ses-sions in Fredericton and Chatham

to pass upon the applications.

The advisory commission has deeided to proceed with the erection of watch towers for the early detec-tion of fires, and four or five will be built this year on the highest points manding a wide survey of the rounding country. These will wooden structures of the most proved design. It was decided, also, to begin the cutting of forest trails and the building of telephone lines, and fire-fighting equipment will be purchased and located at various
