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

Incompetents Enforcing Military Service Act

Man Placed in Jail and Given No
Food for Twenty Four Hours
— Change Should be Made

That the enforcement of the Military Service Act in Northumberland county is in the hands of incompetent parties is being rapidly brought to light in the entirely unwarranted and thoughtless actions on the part of the officers, a glaring instance of which was given here on Monday of this week. On Sunday afternoon a young man from Nogue was arrested and brought to Newcastle and placed in the lock-up without being given any supper, neither were any arrangements made with the town authorities whereby he might be fed, and when the officer in charge of enforcing the Military Service Act did not put in an appearance to provide the man with any breakfast the Town Marshall endeavored to locate him and see what was to be done, but he was unable to do so, and finally about two o'clock a citizen took pity upon the unfortunate man and provided him with some dinner. The Military authorities finally showed up about three o'clock and took the defaulter to the wireless Garrison, and he was sent to St. John on Tuesday. There have been other instances where the men who are enforcing the Act have been neglectful of their duties, and while we have no sympathy for any man who refuses to do his share in this national effort, we must remember that we all are human, and that if the officer who has charge of the enforcement of the Military Service Act is negligent of his duties or uses methods like the above to show his authority it is high time that he was removed and a man with a sufficient quantity of common sense and judgment to properly fulfill the duties of the office placed in charge.

Hon. Mr. Veniot In- spects North'd Roads

Finds Going None Too Easy,
and Promises Some Repairs,
as well as the Establishment
of a Patrol System

Hon. P. J. Veniot, Minister of Public Works, who is paying an official visit to all parts of the Province inspecting the roads, arrived in Newcastle on Tuesday and was met here by a large delegation of auto owners and driven to Chatham Town Hall where the needs of the roads of the County were emphasized.

Mr. Chas. J. Morris, and W. B. Snowball drew the Ministers attention to the need of repairs on the Newcastle—Chatham—Loggieville road, on which some six hundred automobiles and 1000 teams pass each week.

Mr. W. A. Park, also reminded Mr. Veniot of his promise to repair the Chaplin Island Road.

Hon. Mr. Veniot said the road between Newcastle and Chatham was a hard one to keep in repair, but he would have some work done, providing the Dominion Government gave its sanction to another issue of bonds. It was the purpose of his department to establish a permanent patrol system between these towns, as well as from Chatham to Tracadie.

Mr. Veniot yesterday inspected the road between Newcastle and Blackville.

The object of this meeting is to lay before the people plans for a social service convention to be held in Newcastle next September.

Crown Lands Com- mission At Work

Archie Fraser and D. J. Buckley
are Members, and J. W.
Vanderbeck a Forester

The Crown Lands advisory Commission, consisting of Hon. E. A. Smith, together with the Deputy Minister of Lands and Mines, the chief forester and Messrs Archie Fraser, and D. J. Buckley, met on Tuesday Mr. Fraser representing the owners of granted lands and Mr. Buckley the lessees of Crown lands. The first work was the appointment of an examining board, to examine the qualifications of all employees in the forestry service. The chief forester is the chairman. The others appointed are Mr. McFadden, a forester of long experience, and Counsellor J. W. Vanderbeck, of Millerton. Already there is a long list of applicants for work in the service, and this board will presently hold sessions in Fredericton and Chatham to pass upon the applications.

The advisory commission has decided to proceed with the erection of watch towers for the early detection of fires, and four or five will be built this year on the highest points of the principal forest areas, commanding a wide survey of the surrounding country. These will be wooden structures of the most approved design. It was decided, also, to begin the cutting of forest trails and the building of telephone lines, and fire-fighting equipment will be purchased and located at various strategic points.

In the course of the meeting many practical suggestions were made by Messrs Buckley and Fraser, who will be most valuable members of the commission. The Minister of Public Lands and Mines feels that the province is going to secure a complete return of fire insurance and also reach a point, where the great menace of forest fires can be adequately dealt with. Hon. Dr. Smith estimates that although the lumber cut this year is likely to be only seventy per cent of last year's cut, the increased stumpage rate, will produce a revenue \$50,000 greater than that of 1917.

Progress of the War During Past Week

Enemy Making Very Little Gains
in the West, but Rapidly
Conquering Eastward

The battle on the French front has calmed down. The enemy drive is now against Italy. The Austrians have crossed the Piave river, but have not been able to make any further headway so far. In the east the Turks have completely conquered Armenia and have rejoyed the submission of Georgia. They are now marching on Baku, the great oil port of the Caspian. They have also occupied Tabriz, the chief city of northwestern Persia. They will soon be able to directly communicate with Russian Turkestan, the great Mohammedan country of Central Asia, whose people are related to the Turks and will probably welcome them. The capture of Turkestan will carry the Turkish frontier to those of China and Siberia.

There are now 800,000 Americans in France, there will be 1,500,000, by August, and 2,000,000 more under arms at home.

Italy has rejected Austria's offer of a separate peace.

First Steamer of Season In Port

The first steam vessel to enter the Miramichi this year, was the Car Ferry "Scotia" which came into port this morning and is now docked at the Railway wharf.

The "Scotia" will take a load of 20,000 Railway ties, which will be used in standardizing the Prince Edward Island Railway, which is now a narrow gauge.

After her return the "Scotia" will undergo repairs, such as will enable her to dock at Cape Borden and Tomatina, and be used as an auxiliary to the car Ferry "Prince Edward Island."

CRIME TO ROB BIRDS' NESTS.

A Dominion Order-in-council forbids robbing the nest of any useful bird. A close season for ten years is proclaimed for cranes, geans and nearly all shore birds, and close for five years on wood duck and eider-duck.

HERE IS THE DAY YOU REGISTER

ON June 22nd, Saturday, every man and woman, resident in Canada, who is 16 years and over, must attend at one of the places provided for registration, between the hours of 7 a.m. and 10 p.m., and there truthfully answer all the questions set forth upon the registration card. Upon signing the card, vouching for the accuracy of the answers, the man or woman will receive a Registration Certificate, as shown below, which must be carried upon the person thereafter.

Why the Certificate is so Important

For failure to register a maximum fine of \$100 and one month's imprisonment is provided, also an added penalty of \$10 for each day the person remains unregistered after June 22nd.

Persons remaining unregistered cannot lawfully be employed, and cannot draw wages for work done after June 22nd. Employers who keep unregistered persons in their employ will be liable for fines equal in amount to those recoverable from the unregistered employees.

Unregistered persons cannot lawfully purchase transportation tickets, and may find themselves barred from travelling on railroads, steamboats, etc. Similarly they may be denied board and lodging at any hotel, restaurant, public house or boarding house.

In a word—All persons remaining unregistered, and all persons having dealings with unregistered persons, knowing them to be such, incur heavy penalties under the law.

The Lounsbury Garage

Headquarters for Autos and all Auto Accessories a Great Convenience to the Miramichi

One of the most important additions recently made to the business establishments of Newcastle is the Garage of the Lounsbury Co., built last September. The main building, 64 feet front by 75 feet deep, is two stories high. An elevator, with a carrying capacity of more than 5000 lbs lifts the cars to the upper story, where there is room to store some 40 cars, and also a paint shop and vulcanizing plant.

The ground floor contains the retail department, where automobile accessories of all kinds are kept in stock, the show room holding four or five cars, and room outside for some twenty more. Back of the show room is a large well lighted office.

The E.H. is a one-story building 35 feet front by 50 feet deep. In it is the workshop where assembling of parts and all kinds of repair work is done.

An oxy-acetylene welding plant adds greatly to the efficiency of this department. All kinds of welding and lead burning are done here.

In the work shop a big stock of auto parts is carried, including springs of all standard cars.

The buildings are of reinforced concrete. Next fall the basement will be cleared adding another room 64x75 feet to this thriving business.

The manager of the garage with all its auxiliary departments is Mr. J. Russell McKnight.

The recent extension of the Lounsbury business has proved a great convenience to the people of this county.



OUR STREETS

As economy is everywhere the order of the day it behooves us to exercise an intelligent economy—to not be "penny-wise and pound-foolish." One of the best means to really save time and labor, and thus materially increase the national effectiveness, is to see that our highways are in the best of condition. The leveller and smoother the road the greater the load can be handled over it and the greater the speed attained. These are important items and we commend them to the earnest consideration of the Public Works Committee of our town.

The main highway of Newcastle all the way through the town—from French Fort Cove to the Northwest Bridge—is in a bad condition, and especially that portion between the forks of the Old and New Highways and the Railway Crossing. Very little attention seems to have been given to this road for years, although it is one of the main thoroughfares of the county, no other portion of road carrying so much traffic in spring it is a continuous mudhole and in summer is of very uneven surface, to say the least. Another important thoroughfare which is in bad shape is Jane Street, between the Newcastle—Chatham Head bridge and the C. G. R. Station, especially the lower part of it.

At the close of a rain these streets should be rounded up with the split log drag, and steps should be taken to pave them with something colder than mud. Good streets will encourage the farmers of the prosperous country districts to increase their already heavy business with Newcastle, and will in every way work out to the good of both town and country. Will the Town exert itself to make these two Newcastle thoroughfares a credit to the Miramichi?

TEACHERS' SALARIES

There is now a tendency in New Brunswick, noticed none too soon to, increase the salaries of school teachers, of whom some two thousand are patently tolling with considerable success, in the various districts of the province. The town of Sussex, which is smaller than Newcastle and not more than half the size of Chatham, has increased the principal for its schools at a salary of \$2000 a year—double that of Newcastle's Principal and much larger than that of Chatham's—with an annual increase of \$100 promised for the next five years. Backville, in order to hold its Principal for another year, raised his salary by \$500. St. John City has given an increase of \$100 a year to each of its lady teachers who is not a Principal, and many other places are doing likewise. At Fredericton there were nearly 100 less candidates for Teachers'

Leslie, and the Misses Clare Lawlor, Jennie McMaster, Annie McCombs, Margaret J. Dunnet, Jennie M. Fellows, Maud Atkinson, Marjorie L. Davidson, Louise Manny, Lyle McCormack, Margaret Irving, and Ella Gray.

Registration on the 22nd will be in the Armory and Bule School House, from 7 a. m. to 10 p. m. Joseph H. O'Beirne, Deputy Registrar for Douglastown, Nordin, Ferry Road and Back Lots has secured locations for Registration day June 22, at the following places: Douglas-town—Associated Lodges Hall and School House; Ferry Road—School House; Nordin—Residen-

ce of J. H. O'Beirne. In addition, the school house at Back Lots has been placed at the disposal of the Deputy Registrar and will be opened on some evening proceeding the 22nd. Advantages should be taken of this by residents of that vicinity. The District includes all that territory lying between French Fort Cove and the Dominion Pulp mill. Foreigners in Rome Urge Italian Government to Take Over Burial Ground Owned by Germany.

More than a century ago Prussia was the only non-Roman Catholic power represented at the Vatican. Therefore, it was Prussia which obtained the concession for a cemetery to be used for the bodies of those not of the Roman faith, and the property still remains in the hands of the German government.

Prominent foreigners now are urging that the Italian government should take over the cemetery and place it under British protection.




