1,279 Special Trains On C. G. Railways

Up to March 1st 757,400 roops have travelled over Government Railways.

Thousands arrive each week at Halifax and are sent forward to

lisembarked her returned soldier passengers at Halifax 757.-400 troops have been carried on special trains over the Canadian Government Railways.

The first train which carried troops over the Government Railways the year the war was declared was numbered one and all special troop trains to and from Halifax since that time have been numbered consecutively. The last train from the Belgic on Saturday was No. 1279. Each train averages about twelve cars with an average of 50 men to a car, which figures up a total of 767,400 men carried. Of ourse in addition to this thouands of soldiers have journeyed between Montreal and Halifax by regular trains during the past
