



The Evening Chit-Chat

I was planning to buy a most beautiful willow plume for my summer hat.

Then I read the following interesting facts about the making of willow plumes.

These wonderful long fluted feathers are made by tying onto each little

feather of the ordinary feather another little one.

The tying is done with a weaver's knot—a complicated in-and-out tying of two strands.

That means that a worker, working all day long at this torturing task, can make about three dollars a week.

Many children do this work which means that that most beautiful fluted black plume that I wanted to buy might be strung with sightless baby eyes.

So on the whole I decided to be content with the old fashioned kind of plume, less beautiful but less suggestive.

Isn't this a fashion that merciful women would do well to place the ban of their disapproval upon?

A sad story came to me the other day of a woman who was knocked down by an automobile and taken unconscious to the hospital.

She had nothing upon her person by which she could be identified and as she remained unconscious for some

hours it was impossible to send for her people.

When she did come to herself and was told what had happened, she at once asked why her husband had not been sent for.

The nurse explained and the injured woman supplied the missing name and an address fifty miles away. All speed was made in notifying her husband but it took him an hour and a half to reach the hospital and by that time his wife had lapsed into uncon-

sciousness.

She was never conscious again.

The shock of her death was a most terrible thing to her husband and in addition he had to bear the nagging agony of the thought of that precious hour and a half of consciousness which he might have had if he could have been notified as soon as the accident happened.


The suggestion is so plain that I hesitate to point it out.

No, of course, it isn't likely that anything like that will ever happen to you, and of course it's inglorious to speak of such things.

But to say nothing of sudden illness there are all sorts of such accidents continually happening. I read but to-day that in the past year there was an average of ten violent deaths a day in New York city.

And surely it wouldn't be any great trouble to always keep a card with your name and full address on it in your pocket even if—as I most sincerely hope—you should never have the slightest use for it.

Household Notes.

A packed pint of chopped meat is a pound.

The last spoonful of jelly can be added to pies or cooked prunes.

A slice of lemon stewed with prunes gives a most delightful flavor.

If meat for soup is cut into small pieces more nutriment will be obtained.

When frying mush, dip the slices first in white of egg. This makes them crisp.

To peel tomatoes without scalding, rub them backwards with the blunt edge of a knife.

For the roast of cold lamb course, serve an egg salad, sprinkled with minced mint leaves.

Clean the glass of picture with whiting, as water is apt in time to mar the painting beneath.

When leather armchairs look shabby they should be wiped off with a soft cloth, dipped in olive oil.

In selecting beef, the pieces which are well mottled with fat will be found the richest and juiciest.

In making bread, do not fill the pans over half full. Bread should rise to twice its size before baking.

When the eyelashes are thin or inclined to stand out, rub them at night with vaseline or cocoa butter.

Wring a cloth in vinegar and wrap it several thicknesses around cheese to keep it from molding or drying.

Wooden breadboards are kept in better condition by rubbing them with sand than by simply using soap.

Odd pieces of fruit, such as one

banana, an apple or an orange, are mixed with lemon gelatine to advantage.

A little vinegar put into water in which eggs are poached will keep them white and prevent them from spreading.

In baking cake it is well to remember that a sponge cake requires a lower temperature than a cake made with butter.

Four peppercorns, four cloves and one teaspoonful of mixed herbs are the proper flavoring for one quart of water for soup.

White kid gloves should be rubbed gently with bread crumbs after each wearing and they will keep clean a long time.

A scented bag that will keep moths away is made as follows: One-half ounce each of cloves, nutmeg and caraway seed.

Add a teaspoonful of sugar of lead to the water in which fine silk hosiery is washed to prevent the delicate color from fading.

Old bread just now takes a new form in breadcrumb cake. Soak the bread in buttermilk and use flour to thicken the batter.

C. of E. ITEMS.

POUCH COVE.

On Tuesday, the 21st ult., W. W. Blackall, Esq., B.A., Superintendent C. of E. Schools, visited our school and thoroughly examined some 70 children present. Mr. Blackall found things in as good a condition as circumstances would allow. The teacher, Miss DeGrish, is competent, bright, and interested in her work, but the old schoolroom is far too small, ill ventilated, and in many ways unsuited to modern requirements and the demands of education. Further, an additional teacher is needed as the present large number of children attending makes it impossible for one teacher to do full justice to her pupils. In the evening a meeting of the leading church people was held in the schoolroom, when Mr. Blackall addressed them, pointing out the utter unsuitableness of the present old building and emphasizing the absolute necessity of erecting a new schoolroom without delay.

A resolution was put to the meeting by the Chairman, Rev. T. G. Nelson, pledging all present to use every possible means to supply the much felt want and build a new schoolroom more worthy of the congregation and better suited to the health and education of our children, which was carried "nem con."

A large and influential building committee was appointed at the same time, consisting of men who mean business. Determined to follow the matter up, another meeting of male parishioners was held on Wednesday, Feb. 8th, which was largely attended both by old and young men.

Matters were decided as regards material, free labor and contributions in cash. Most satisfactory arrangements were arrived at. Each man undertook to provide so many sticks for the frame of the new schoolroom, give so many days free labor, and every man present put down his name or a liberal contribution in cash towards the erection. Plans were shortly after received from Mr. Blackall, providing for a building capable of accommodating 100 children, also including a comfortable room for our C. of E. W. Association, a most indelible body of church workers in the parish, who are now considered an essential part of church organization, and who will pay rent for their room.

At a meeting of the building committee the plans were received and adopted, and certain details as regards starting the work were discussed and arranged.

Adhering to the plans as drawn up by a competent architect, and sent us by Mr. Blackall, the C. of E. people at Pouch Cove will have a fine up-to-date schoolroom, bright, healthy and cheerful. With free labor, most of the frame cut here and supplied free of expense, the board from the old schoolroom, cash contributions given by our own people, and availing ourselves of the inducements now offered by the Government to assist in the erection of new schools by making loans on easy terms, our new school will soon be an accomplished fact.

A very pleasant social was held in the old schoolroom last Tuesday (Valentine's Day), under the auspices of the C. of E. W. Association. Besides the members of the Association, several of their friends were present. An excellent tea had been provided by the sisters, and after tea followed songs, recitations, dialogues, games, &c. 



Forced in Line.

The Leader of the Opposition, and the Opposition members and Press have scored a glorious victory in reference to two of the three positions they took up. They have forced the Government to adopt the precaution they advocated in reference to the guarantee clause in the Cold Storage Agreement, and the Premier to pledge himself and his Government that the articles which Messrs. Trefethen and Lord were obtained free of duty under the Agreement should be placed on the Free List for every body.

To safeguard the guarantee clause, Sir Edward Morris, as we suggested on Saturday week, moved an amendment. That amendment was put and carried. It is as follows:

"RESOLUTION 4. The amount payable by the Government under the clause five of the said agreement shall not, in any year, exceed five per cent. on the actual cash capital invested by the lessees in the said plants, and shall in no case exceed the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars in any one year."

Although the Government voted down the following amendment, they have accepted it virtually by pledging themselves to carry out its principle in the Revenue Bill:

2—(which was to be added to Resolution 3)—Provided always and it is hereby enacted that the admission of any or all such articles into this Colony free of duty, under the agreement hereby confirmed, or under this Act, shall only apply when and so long as the article or articles so admitted free of duty shall be included amongst the articles admitted generally into this Colony under the Revenue Acts for the time being in operation without the payment of any duty thereon.

Light on Dark Doings.

The Corkum incident and the rejection of the bait amendment by the Government throw light on their bait policy. It must be remembered that the Bait Act is a peculiar Act. At any time the Government may permit Americans to purchase Bait. The Cold Storage Agreement is a virtual permission to Messrs. Trefethen and Lord by the Government to purchase caplin, herring and squid for all time, unrestricted as to its destination and unrestricted as to the purpose for which they may sell it. The omission of the clause of the 1904 Agreement, restricting the sale of bait to Newfoundland fishermen, the giving-up of the clauses of the 1910 Act by which the Governor in Council was to retain control of the classes of fish exported and their destination, as in the Bait Act, are in line with the section of the Government last night in refusing to accept an amendment which would prevent Messrs. Trefethen and Lord selling bait to the foreign fishermen who catch cod and compete with us.

The only conclusion that can reasonably be drawn from the rejection of the following amendment by the Government is that Messrs. Trefethen and Lord are to be permitted to trade in bait fishes with foreigners:—

1. Resolved—The agreement here-

by confirmed is subject to the following conditions and limitations, namely:—

(a) The lessees shall not during their continuance of the said contract sell herring, caplin, squid or other bait fishes to any fishermen except those bona fide resident and domiciled in the Colony.
 (b) The provisions of Cap. 129 of Consolidated Statutes, 1892 (Second Series), entitled "Of the exportation, sale and of Bait Fishes."

The Bait Supply.

NOTICE OF QUESTION.

Sir Robert Bond—To ask the Hon. the Premier if any American vessel was allowed to take a cargo of herring at White Bay in the autumn of 1910. In answer to this the Premier said:—

In November, 1909, one George Duggett, a resident of Newfoundland, applied at the Customs at Nipper's Harbour for a license to export herring for food purposes. This application was refused by the Sub-Collector there, and Duggett telegraphed to the Minister of Justice. The Minister of Justice authorized the Department of Marine and Fisheries to instruct the Sub-Collector at Nipper's Harbour to issue a license, under the provisions of the Bait Act, to export herring for food purposes, in accordance with the provisions of that Act.

In reply to another question the Minister of Fisheries said that the letter referred to in the answer given by the Premier was the only one he had received as to a bait license.

The House of Assembly Turned Into a Beer Garden

BY MORRIS AND CROSBIE.

An attempt is made in the Daily News this morning to cover up the disgraceful exhibition of incapacity, cowardice and street-corner politics of the Morris party in the House of Assembly yesterday by columns of misrepresentation. Cornered at every point in their American fishery fraud by the Leader of the Opposition, Sir Robert Bond; whipped into an ignominious retreat from the positions they took up when introducing their policy, the Government became desperate, and yesterday passion took the place of prudence and common decency. Sir Robert then proceeded with an exhaustive argument against the American Agreement, and in the course of his speech brought out further evidence respecting the Corkum incident which we publish in another column.



Scene in House.

SIR ROBERT BOND INSISTS ON ENFORCING RULES.

The close of the afternoon sitting yesterday was marked by a scene in the House which was due to the weakness and partisanship of the Chairman.

Rule 37 sets forth: "If at the hour of half-past six of the clock in the evening, the business of the House, or of a Committee of the Whole, be not concluded, Mr. Speaker or the Chairman, as the case may be, shall leave the chair until half-past seven."

This rule is in practice sometimes relaxed to permit a member to finish his speech, as was the case a little time ago with Sir Robert Bond, but it is an unheard-of course for a Chairman to permit a member to commence a speech at 6.30, and especially one which was not on the subject but personal and abusive, and calculated to cause disorder and bring the proceedings of the House into contempt.

Mr. Crosbie was allowed, we repeat, to commence a speech by the Chairman. Sir Robert Bond, however, drew the attention of the Chairman to the time, and pointed out that the Committee should rise until 7.30. The Chairman said he would not rise the House until 6.55 o'clock. Sir Robert replied that the course would prevent him from replying to the attack Mr. Crosbie was making on him, and that on the occasion he was permitted to go on after 6.30 he was finishing a speech with the unanimous consent of the House. He called on the Chairman to do his duty and rise the House till 7.30. While Sir Robert was speaking to the point of order, the Minister of Justice rose to a point of order. Sir Robert immediately pointed out the inconvenience of another member rising to a point of order before the first was disposed of. The Minister subsided. At intervals Mr. Crosbie endeavoured to proceed but Sir Robert was ever vigilant and called upon the Chairman to keep to the 6.30 rule. Eventually Mr. Crosbie sank to his seat beaten, but the Chairman repeated he would permit Mr. Crosbie to make his speech, and would not rise the Committee till 6.55. Sir Robert said the proceedings showed an attempt to aid and abet Mr. Crosbie, and that he would insist on the Chairman doing his duty, and that he was prepared to stay there all night if necessary to see the rules of the House enforced. Sir Robert remained on his feet till five minutes to seven, explaining to the Chairman his duty in the matter of enforcing the rules of the House. Mr. Parsons felt himself beaten and rose from the chair. Those present in the House showed their approval of Sir Robert's tenacity in upholding the dignity of the House by prolonged applause.

About midnight Sir Robert adverted again to the preservation of the order and dignity of the House and called attention to rule 130, which lays it down as the duty of Mr. Speaker to resume the chair if any sudden disorder arise in committee.

Euphrates Driven Off.



American Bait Supply AND THE GOVERNMENT'S POLICY In Respect Thereto Exposed

During the debate yesterday afternoon on the Cold Storage Resolutions Sir Robert Bond said: It will be remembered that when I was last debating this question I drew the attention of the Government to an article that appeared in the Evening Telegram under date the 14th February, in which it was alleged, that Captain Corkum, an American fisherman, had 300 barrels of herring shipped on the schooner "Coronation," the fish being secured at St. Jacques and English Harbor, and I asked the Minister who represents the Customs Department in this House if the allegation was correct, for if correct it manifested either negligence or connivance on the part of Customs officials. The House will remember the exceedingly rude manner in which I was answered by the Minister. I was told it was a lie, and it was not the first time that the Evening Telegram had published since then I have turned up the back files of the Daily News, the principal organ of the Government, and under date the 27th January I find it alleged in that paper, that Capt. Zimmerman, of Gloucester, had shipped a cargo of herring from Fortune Bay a few days previous. This is the paragraph from the Daily News:

"TWO HERRING CARGOES FROM FORTUNE BAY.

"Within the last few days two cargoes of herring have been shipped from Fortune Bay, one by N. & M. Smith, of Halifax, and the other by Zimmerman, of Gloucester, who had a Canadian vessel chartered. Both were cargoes of the frozen article, and were taken at Renouveau, where the fish are very plentiful, and the largest ever seen at that place. Besides these cargoes, the fishermen are freezing large quantities for the banking fleet, and it is expected that other schooners will arrive from Canada within the next few days to secure cargoes."

Was that an incorrect statement, I would ask? If not, then it points to either negligence or connivance on the part of the Customs authorities.

Again, in the Daily News of date the 31st of January I find published a communication from Inspector O'Reilly to the Assistant Collector of Customs, dated the 28th January from St. Jacques, in which he informed the Customs Department that Capt. Corkum, of Gloucester, was there purchasing frozen herring which he was storing and intended to ship to Gloucester in the schooner "Coronation,"

owned by Tibbo of Grand Bank. This is the communication:—

"CAPT. CORKUM BUYING HERRING

"The following message was received yesterday forenoon by Mr. H. W. LeMessurier:—

"St. Jacques, Jan. 28th, 1911.

"Assistant Collector, St. John's.

"Captain Corkum, of Gloucester, is here purchasing frozen herring at two dollars a barrel, which he is storing and will charter the schooner Coronation, owned by Tibbo, of Grand Bank, to take them to Gloucester. The schooners Pearl Evelyn, J. D. Young and Renown, of Lunenburg, are ready to sail, the former two with frozen and the Renown with salt herring. The Gladys B. Street, of Burgeo, has cleared for Halifax with a cargo of frozen also. Three locals with frozen western shore herring for bait have left Bonaventure. The Jennie May, of Lunenburg, the Hispaniola and Ex-celsa, for Job Bros. & Co. are awaiting cargoes. Herring are fairly plentiful for nets, but only one seine has any now. Will wire from Placentia Bay.

"(Sgd.) O'REILLY."

Was that an incorrect statement, I would ask? If not, then there was clearly connivance on the part of the Customs Department in a breach of the Bait Act, which says, "No person should export, or cause or procure to be exported, or assist in the exportation of, or purchase, or sell, for the purpose of exportation, or sale, or purchase for the purpose of sale, any herring, &c., without a license." "Every person guilty of a violation of any of the provisions of this Act shall be liable to a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars, and in default of payment of any such penalty, to imprisonment for a period not exceeding six months, and in addition to the penalties provided in the 5th Section of the Act, shall be liable to have his vessel, or the vessel used by him, seized and sold."

Now, Inspector O'Reilly is a most judicious official; a detective officer by training, and a man who would be particularly careful not to transmit to his superior officer an incorrect or misleading statement. Mr. O'Reilly declared that Capt. Corkum was purchasing frozen herring in St. Jacques on the 28th of January. He was doing so, as we know, without a license and in contravention of the Bait Act. Mr. O'Reilly also declared that Capt. Corkum was then storing the herring and intended exporting them in the

schooner "Coronation," chartered from Tibbo of Grand Bank. The Minister of Customs in reply to a question from me said that Capt. Corkum did not receive a license from the Government to export these herring, but that a license was granted to Capt. Tibbo. This Capt. Tibbo was master of the schooner "Coronation" which Inspector O'Reilly had warned the Government that Capt. Corkum proposed to charter. By granting a license then to Tibbo the Customs was aiding Corkum in exporting the herring he had unlawfully purchased. I say unlawfully purchased because he could not lawfully purchase them without a license, and as I understand the Government in the first instance, when applied to by Capt. Corkum for a license to purchase herring in Fortune Bay, had refused to grant him one. Now, then, is it possible that this wily American skipper hoodwinked the Customs, or was Inspector O'Reilly entirely astray as to Capt. Corkum's doings in Fortune Bay? There is not the slightest doubt in my mind as to the accuracy of Inspector O'Reilly's report to the Customs Department. Put, as if to put the question beyond all possible doubt, I have the testimony of another witness.

On Friday afternoon last I received a letter from Capt. John F. Young, of St. Jacques, who was then in town, in which he declared that Capt. Corkum had purchased herring in Fortune Bay; that he employed men to freeze them; that the herring were stored in St. Jacques and at English Harbor; that he had got about 300 barrels; that he, Capt. Young, had complained to the Customs Officer about Corkum being permitted to purchase herring for export; that he complained to Capt. Corkum because he, Capt. Young, had to "go short of bait"; that Capt. Corkum chartered the "Coronation" and took on board the herring he had purchased; that he then proceeded around the bay to buy more herring, and failing to get any returned to Belleoram and took in salt bulk fish to the amount of about 300 qts., part of which was his, Capt. Young's, all of which he says he is prepared to swear to as absolutely true. This is the letter:—

(Copy) St. John's, Feb. 17, 1911.

"Dear Sir Robert Bond,—I am Captain J. F. Young, of St. Jacques, Fortune Bay, and owner of the banking schooner "Norman O." I have been a herring and cod fisherman all my life, and I am acquainted with Capt. Corkum's doing in Fortune Bay. I know that Capt. Corkum bought herring there in January last. He bought herring in my presence at St. Jacques. He paid two dollars a barrel imperial measure. He said to the herring fishermen he would take all the herring he could get, if money could buy them. He had men to freeze them and the herring were stored in St. Jacques. Some were bought and stored in English Harbor. In all he got about 300 barrels. He wanted 1,000 barrels. I heard him say he wanted to secure all the herring he could come at. I complained to the Customs Officer against Capt. Corkum being allowed to purchase herring for export while we were baiting. I met Capt. Corkum on the road and complained about having to go short of bait. He offered to exchange with me fifteen barrels I had in English Harbor for fifteen barrels from his stock in St. Jacques. I had said before I would not take herring from a foreigner if I could not buy them myself for baiting in my native land. He tried to charter a vessel at St. Jacques for the herring and failed. I asked him afterwards what he was going to do with the herring. He told me he had the "Coronation" chartered and she would arrive soon. When the "Coronation" arrived he went on board at St. Jacques and sailed to English Harbor. He took on board the herring he had purchased before the charter. He returned in the "Coronation" to St. Jacques and took on board all the herring he had there. He proceeded round the bay to try and secure more herring.

There was none to be got. He returned to Belleoram and commenced taking in salt bulk fish. Last Tuesday he sailed in the "Coronation" to St. Jacques and took on board about 300 quintals of fish, part of which was mine. At St. Jacques everybody knew the herring belonged to Captain Corkum. On several occasions when I approached fishermen to buy their herring for my baiting, they refused to sell to me, telling me they were going to give them to Capt. Corkum. He even got the fifteen barrels I had secured in English Harbor, and the "Norman O." had to sail fifteen barrels short. I am prepared to swear that this statement is absolutely true.

I am, sincerely yours, (Sgd.) JOHN F. YOUNG.

Now, then, it must be quite apparent to the House that there is "a nigger in the wood pile" somewhere. Let us try and get him out, for this matter, as I shall presently indicate, may have a material connection with the fishery outlined in the Resolutions before the House. Capt. Corkum applied to the Government for permission to purchase a cargo of herring in Fortune Bay. He was refused permission, but in defiance of the Government, apparently, went there and, according to the testimony of Inspector O'Reilly and Capt. John F. Young, purchased a quantity of herring and exported them in a schooner chartered from Tibbo of Grand Bank. Tibbo was granted a license to take on board and export these herring. Did Tibbo make an affidavit that the herring were his and as to the purpose for which he was exporting them? The Bait Act calls for that to be done before a license issues. Is such a declaration was made, could the Customs Department in view of Inspector O'Reilly's statement accept it as a correct declaration?

Was it the intention in granting a license to Tibbo to permit Corkum to get away with the herring?

If so, was such permission the Act of the Governor in Council? If it was, then we have a reversal of the policy of the Bait Act, and it is part and parcel of the policy that I contended is embodied in the Resolutions before the House. The Government has denied that such policy is embodied in their Agreement with the American firms mentioned in these Resolutions. I propose to put their intentions to the test by the amendments I have tabled.

It is the duty of the Government standing in loco parentis towards its subjects to see that no person shall suffer through its legislation. Therefore, if they mean what they say they will not object to my amendments.

Mr. Clift Defends Sir Robert Bond.

Mr. Clift stated that whilst he was prepared to give the Premier every credit for his sincerity in the matter of this Cold Storage Agreement, he was unable to support this Agreement as it did not accomplish what he desired. From the observations of the Premier one would be led to suppose that the chief object of this measure was to preserve our fresh cod chiefly in cold storage and export same to the American markets, thereby relieving our present markets of so much fish and consequently increasing its price, a laudable object in which all would concur, but are we not paying too much for that privilege under the present Agreement. I think we are. But, sir, from the opinions expressed by other hon. members on the Government side of the House one would imagine that the chief and only object of this Agreement was an undertaking by the Contractors to supply the fishermen of this Colony with bait at all times and at all places where they happened to be. Indeed, sir, not only would one imagine that they were going to supply our fishermen with bait, but that they were going to carry their benefactions to the extent of putting it in their hooks for them. Now, sir, there is nothing whatever in



First Day's Debate on the Veto Bill.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Feb. 22.

The first day's debate of the Veto Bill, introduced into the Commons by Asquith, while it failed to indicate definitely the fate of the measure in the hands of the Lords, left little doubt as to the attitude of the Leader of the Opposition. Mr. Clift's speech was the great event of the day, in which he would admit of the Veto Bill passing the Lords without obstacles, provided it was accompanied by the reform of the Upper House, but he declared he would consent to no changes in the constitution which would allow the Parliament to pass a Home Rule Bill, without this Bill having been voted on by the electors. In other words he would not acquiesce in the Home Rule question being submitted to a Second Chamber differing only from the existing House of Lords in being bereft of its absolute power. Balfour declared he would stand against a resolution on which the people had not been consulted and which was being carried out, not at the bidding of the real majority of the House, but at the bidding of the Nationalist minority. The other chief speakers in the debate will be Churchill, Wyndham and P. E. Smith. Balfour held a conference with Lord Lansdowne. It is uncertain what line the Peers will take.

First Reading of Veto Bill Passed House of Commons.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Feb. 22.

The House of Commons last night passed the first reading of the Veto Bill by 351 to 227, a majority of 124. The dominant note of the debate throughout the speeches of the Unionists was an invitation to the Government to settle matters by agreement. George Wyndham urged the Government to accept the invitation and settle the question by agreement, otherwise the Opposition would sooner or later repeal the Bill. Winston Churchill, the Home Secretary, concluding the debate for the Government, replied that Ministers would not have 50 supporters left if they agreed to enter upon such a conference now. He contended that as compared with the Referendum, the

Government's moderate proposals were the veriest Toryism, and that no steps would be neglected to carry the Bill swiftly into law. The Government did not fear the Referendum as a check upon progressive legislation, but regarded it as a vicious system, especially unsuitable to this country. Its adoption would lead to Jacobinism, Caesarism and anarchy.

At the close of Churchill's speech came a scene. He had stated that among the legislative proposals to be submitted in addition to Home Rule would be a measure for creating a fair and evenly constituted second chamber. There was a chorus of shouts from the Opposition, "When" Churchill, momentarily embarrassed, sought refuge by declaring that he could not reveal the Government's intentions.

Thirty years ago the name of the firm of "Shirran and Pippy" was a household word in all the homes of Newfoundland. The senior partner, Mr. Alex. F. The deceased was born in Macduff, Banffshire, Scotland, and came out to Newfoundland as a clerk to Philip Hutchings, Esq., in the year 1852. A few years afterwards he joined the clerk staff at Ayre and Marshall's. In 1860 he joined in partnership with W. G. Pippy and started business under the title of "Shirran and Pippy." Their store was in the building on the corner leading down to Stubb, Bow & Co's and for a quarter of a century the firm was one of the most popular and prosperous dry goods stores in the city. In 1899 both Mr. Shirran and Mr. Pippy became interested in the Bell Island ore, and with Mr. Butler, of Topsail, their names will go down in history as the pioneers of Bell Island Mines now one of the biggest industries in the Colony. They then dissolved partnership closed up the business and devoted all their time to mining affairs. Mr. Shirran enjoyed good health up to a few years ago when he was attacked by bronchitis which weakened his constitution. While attending Mrs. Berriagan's funeral on the 14th inst. he collapsed and had to be taken home. He took to his bed then and gradually lost strength till the end came yesterday afternoon. Mr. Shirran was a good citizen in every sense of the word and was of a kindly and cheerful disposition. He kept up his youthful spirits and enthusiasm till his last illness. He was an enthusiastic member of the Methodist College Institute where his youthful spirits were a source of inspiration to the members who gathered there. He was a member of Gower Street Church, and his death is a great loss to the congregation. He was always prominent in church work and was one of the oldest members of the Masonic Society. He leaves one son, Mr. W. Shirran, of Milley's employ, and one daughter, Mrs. D. H. Sclater, of this city, and two sisters in Banffshire, Scotland. The funeral will take place to-morrow afternoon.


