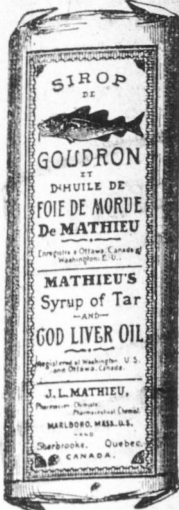

There is no doubt whatever but that there are many capable, worthy people born with a talent for managing, who could manage some of their shiftless friends' affairs far better than they themselves. Frequently these capable folks are generously willing to do this. And yet the shiftless folks are almost never willing to give over to others the managing that they do so ill themselves."

Isn't it queer?—I am thinking of the sad case of a woman who is a very capable housewife and a very skillful manager in every way. Rubber Industry of Peru Reveals Tales of Horror.

It is already known that the rubber merchants of Peru have exploited the Indians of the forest in the north-east of the country, and are forcing them to work by diabolical cruelty. Recently (writes a representative of The London Daily News) I heard from the lips of two young Indians who have escaped from this "Inferno in a paradise" a plain tale of the sufferings of their people, the Witota tribe. The elder, Omorino, is a young man of twenty, and he has come to England with a fellow tribesman, Ricardo, a lad of twelve. I met them in the studio of an artist who is painting their portraits, and found them in native dress, a loin-cloth of white bark. Their brown bodies are finely built, and their faces bright and intelligent. They may be savages; they are certainly gentlemen. Their home is a forest on the banks of the Igara Parana, a tributary of the Putumayo, in that wild tract of country in the North-East of Peru.

While in pursuit of this laudable ambition, the face of the thorn is as impassive as a brown study. The thorn tells not, neither doth he grin, but he has a wardrobe that would make J. Ham Lewis look like a ship-wrecked sailor. Where the thorn gets the money with which to charge a compartment trunk with tricolor hose and vociferous vests is a greater mystery to mankind than where Cain got his first wife: It is harder to reform a confirmed thorn than it is to break an Alpine goat to the plow. A well-trained thorn can wrap a manicured mitt around a new deck of cards and sort out an ace-high club flush with eyes fixed vacantly upon a premium chromo from the Fireside Companion. The man who sits in with a calloused thorn without having made his last will and testament stands about as much show as getting home with his carfare as the detachable cuff has of backing into polite society.

country was very happy before the white men came for rubber. Now it is very unhappy. I asked the interpreter what the title by which Omorino called me meant. "God," he said. "It is the word the Incas used for the Deity. The Indians are very simple, and they regard white men as supernatural beings to be obeyed implicitly." "Now," continued Omorino, "we are slaves. We are sent far, far into the forest to get rubber, and if we do not get it, or if we do not get it quickly enough, we are shot. That is how I lost my eldest brother. He was called Morujil, and he was shot by a Viracocha called Monto. Our father was flogged to death by a Peruvian called Sarote."

"Have you been flogged yourself?" "Yes. They took me to help manage the other Indians. So I became a muchacho (Spanish for "boy") and lived in a house with other young men who served the Viracocha. We had to beat the Indians who did not collect enough rubber. We had rifles. Some of us were sent into the forest with the Indians who were getting rubber, and we had to whip them to make them go quickly enough when they were bringing back the rubber. I was a bad muchacho, because I would not beat the Indians. They flogged me when I refused to ill-treat a kinsman."

"Little Ricardo interrupted. "My mother," he said, "was beheaded by a muchacho. I saw it done. The Indian was ordered to cut off her head by a man called Fonseca. He had not collected rubber. There were possibly a hundred people in my clan, and we all lived together in a great house. There are now only five left. All the rest have been killed. The chief of my clan, Gwanmy, was shot. Fonseca and the people he employed killed all the people, because they did not bring enough rubber, or because they did not have it ready at the proper time. I had a friend, called Dara; he was shot only a little while ago. One old woman was very brave; she told us not to collect rubber for the Viracocha. Therefore they cut off her head. A few months ago three members of the clan were shot by order of a Peruvian named Miranda, because they had taken cassava roots from his farm."

"They were very hungry," exclaimed Omorino. "Before the Peruvians came we were never hungry, because we had time to grow food and to hunt. The men we work for promise to give us food, but often they do not. So my people have got very thin and they have fallen down under the weight of the rubber they had to carry through the forest, and have died."

"Did you go to collect rubber?" I asked Ricardo. "Yes," he answered, "I had to bring more than sixty pounds of rubber through the forest, fifty miles and more, on my back."

"Women have to work, too," said Omorino. "Sometimes a woman carries a hundred pounds of rubber. They fall down many times if they are old or ill."

"Each of the Indians has his wife, whom he loves," he continued. "The Peruvians take our girls and make them live together in a house to be their wives. But when they go away they do not take them."

"My father never worked rubber," said Ricardo. "He died when I was very young, before the white men came into the forest. He was a great hunter. We blow a poisoned dart through a tube, and you can kill a panther like that."

"They say," said Omorino, "that our

What is the Truth?

Before any judgment is formed as to the charges and counter-charges of atrocities and horrors committed at the theatre of war, it would be well to await further information. Turkish atrocities in the past have been well established as facts of history, and how England regarded it may be judged from the campaign against Turkish atrocities in Bulgaria, which the great Gladstone instituted some 20 odd years ago. Europe and America were aroused also on the question of atrocities committed in Armenia some few years ago. It would therefore not be surprising to hear of such outrages by Turks in the province of Tripoli. But the counter-charge of atrocities committed by Italians on women and children will be received with doubt and suspicion until it is confirmed. It is as unlike the action of soldiers of a Christian power that we cannot believe it, and we have read and re-read the message to see if Montague means that the Turks are committing the outrages and not the Turks. It may be that is his meaning and that the message has got mixed up. The message as it comes to us is abbreviated, and in parts is capable of ambiguity, while in others it is a definite charge against the Italians.

Police Court News

To-day five boys, whose ages range from 12 to 15 years, were at the bar charged with stealing candy to the value of 70 cents from the F. B. Wood stores. Three pleaded guilty and two others who denied the charge were also convicted. Before sentence was imposed, Inspector General Sullivan addressed the Court and expressed the sorrow he felt in being compelled to arrest and prosecute boys of such tender years. There was nothing else to be done, however, as these boys were constantly stealing the property of business people, and Mr. Sullivan regretted that there was not some other place besides the Penitentiary where such boys could be placed and reclaimed from a possible life of crime. His Honor Judge Knight agreed with the Inspector General, but there was no other course for him but to send them to the Penitentiary, the necessity for which he deplored. Three of them, who have exceptionally bad careers, were each sent down for 20 days and two others were each fined \$10 or 30 days.

Four boys summoned by Constable Kelly for disorderly conduct were warned and let off on paying costs.

Should be Stopped.

This forenoon several people driving carts and sleds from the eastern settlements in coming up over the King's Bridge Road took to the sidewalk, which is being badly torn up by the hoofs of the horses. There was plenty of snow in the middle of the road and there was not the slightest necessity for using the sidewalk. A gentleman who demonstrated with some of these people was roundly abused by them. The Council should take prompt steps and stop this proceeding.

Horse Killed by Electricity.

One of Mr. Charles Lester's horses was killed suddenly yesterday afternoon by electricity when crossing the rails leading out of the R. N. Co. Machine Shops. The horse was drawing a load of coal followed closely by two others also hauling coal. When the first one put its fore hoof on the rail it fell backwards on the street, and the second horse got a shock and fell backwards, but when the cart was removed the animal was found to be all right. The driver got a shock, too, and attributes his escape to wearing rubber overshoes. The electric shock is believed to have been caused by leakage from a wire in the machine shops near by where there are electric motors. A piece of wire falling on the rail would make the horse touching the charged rail give voltage enough to kill the horse. We understand the Reid Mfd. Co. will arrange the matter with Mr. Lester in a satisfactory manner should it be definitely proven that the horse was killed as said above. The authorities should inquire into the matter in the interest of public safety.

Attempted Suicide.

Alan Rhodes, son of the late Capt. Rhodes, of Waterford Bridge Road, attempted to cut his throat this morning. The man, who is 50 years of age, had been three times in the Lunatic Asylum. He had a fit of melancholia this morning again and going to his room got a razor and gashed his throat almost right across from ear to ear. It was only a deep flesh wound, however, and did not reach the jugular vein nor the heavy structure round the wind pipe. Dr. Tait was called and, hastening to the house, compelled the unfortunate man to go with him to the Lunatic Asylum, where, assisted by Dr. Dunbar, he dressed the wound. Dr. Tait says he will recover with care.

France Compensates Germany.

France, as compensation for the German recognition of her protectorate over Morocco, cedes to Germany about 250,000 square kilometers in northern French Congo, touching the German Kameruns. The territory ceded is inhabited by a million negroes and the commerce is valued at \$21,400,000 annually. The "accord" does not affect Togoland but Germany cedes her "Duck's Bill" extending from Chari River to Logone River. France and Germany agree to submit to the Hague Tribunal all difficulties. France agrees to safeguard economic equality and commercial liberty, for which provision is made in existing treaties.

Report of the Board of Trade.

The quarter just ended is the principal period of the year for catching fish. At the moment it looks as if the results of the Labrador would be satisfactory, considering the number of people engaged in it. The press abroad are of a fairly satisfactory character.

The shore fishery has been fairly successful, as has also the Bank fishery.

The Council have long been impressed with the fact that a certain supply of bait would be of invaluable service to the fishermen and visitors, and they are now making arrangements with a view of obtaining particulars on which to base recommendations to the Government, or others, for the purpose of establishing bait stations to be worked on commercial principles. It is, however, regrettable that the fishermen themselves have in several instances where efforts have been made to construct bait stations, been very indifferent to the

matter; and they have not only failed to supply bait fishes when they have been in abundance, but even when they have been offered them, they have refused to purchase them at cost price, although the obtaining of them would have resulted in very large profits to the buyers.

The advent of buyers of green fish is hailed with satisfaction and may be regarded as a sign of the times pointing to a near change in the method of marketing fish.

It affords the Council much pleasure to note that the vintage as well as the crops of olives and cereals in Spain and Italy are very satisfactory, and will doubtless be beneficial to Newfoundland by increasing the purchasing powers of the consumers of fish.

It is with regret that they note the state of unrest which prevails in Spain and Portugal and which militates against satisfactory business.

It is earnestly hoped that the war just declared by Italy against Turkey may not involve any other nations, for if it does it might prove to be very harmful to Newfoundland interests generally.

The average quality of Shore fish this year is, up to present, extremely satisfactory.

Efforts have been made by many of the merchants in the early part of this season to establish a cull of fish, but their efforts have been unsuccessful, because unanimity in the trade could not be obtained. The Council feel the realization of this is fraught with very great possibilities for the welfare of the Colony. The Talqual system does not offer to the man who cures his fish well any relative compensation for his efforts, as it is almost an invariable rule that the man with the inferior fish obtains the same price as the one with the good. If this system continues it must of course lead to a continuance of an inferior cure of fish in the future; and the Council view the same with great anxiety, and strongly urge all those interested in this matter to support them in their efforts to obtain a satisfactory settlement of this much vexed question.

The Council have again urged on the Government the necessity of having the harbor dredged, and it is with

sincere pleasure that they learn that the Government expect to have the dredger in operation in Newfoundland before April next.

The Hotel has been considered and efforts have been made to bring about a satisfactory arrangement for its construction, and negotiations are still going on with that end in view.

The Telephone system is more and more in disfavor. The Government have, however, assured the Council that they are carefully inquiring into the merits of several systems with a view to a new installation in the city and a connection with the Postal Telegraphs, so as to reach places of sufficient importance outside of St. John's and to connect them with the city.

The question of watering steamers has been taken up with the Municipal Council, and there is reason to believe

The native city of Shanghai has been taken over by the revolutionists. No resistance was offered by the authorities. It is reported that the rebels at Kin Kiang have seized the British tug-boat Sampson.

LONDON, Nov. 3.

The Pkin correspondent of the Times says that the National Assembly will insist upon the removal of all Manchu prerogatives; the disbandment of all Manchu Corps through the Empire; the abolition of Eunuchs; and the discarding of the queue and distinctive Manchu dress. Finally, the Assembly aspires to abolish all Customs laws and regulations which are incompatible with re-constitution on the British model.

BERLIN, Nov. 3.

The report that all the outer forts of Tripoli are in the hands of the Turks is confirmed. According to well-informed circles here, the Italians hold only the forts within the city proper.

LONDON, Nov. 3.

English correspondents' letters from Tripoli confirm the statement that the Arabs are perpetrating the atrocities which made the Abyssinian campaign a by-word of horror. Arab women are far worse than the men in their treatment of the wounded, and of prisoners of any white race.

LONDON, Nov. 3.

The Constantinople correspondent of the Telegraph says that a sensation has been caused by the revelation that Hakkı Bey ex-Grand Vizier, if impeached for neglect in the defense of Tripoli, will declare that the German Ambassador repeatedly assured him that Italy would never send a regiment or a ship to Tripoli. For that reason, his Cabinet had not considered it necessary to despatch troops or war material to Tripoli.

PARIS, Nov. 3.

The Franco-German agreement officially announced to-day shows that Germany recognizes the right of France to establish a protectorate in Morocco while both nations engage to obtain the adhesion to this accord of the other signatories to the Algeiras agreement.

Council Meeting.

Present at last night's meeting: Mayor Ellis, Councillors Martin, Mullaly, Myrick, Coaker and Ryan.

A letter was read from Mr. J. P. Blackwood, acting for Cochrane St. Methodist church trustees asking that claim for damage to property at Flavin Street be settled as the lease to the Council is now expired. Councillor Mullaly expressed the opinion that the rock cruiser should not have been placed there, seeing that the lease was so near its limit. Further discussion was deferred.

Mr. C. Bowden asked that Moore Street be extended. Council will make improvements there next season.

Thos. Hallett again asked that the water service be extended to Walsh's Square. Mr. Hallett intimated that it was necessary to have a "penny" in order to get such work done. Councillor Mullaly warmly repudiated the suggestion in strong terms. Mayor Ellis said that the Council had arranged about the work but was, owing to unforeseen circumstances, obliged to postpone operations. It was ordered that Mr. Hallett be written to and his insinuations indignantly repudiated.

The Nfld. Produce Co. wrote of having started to erect an iron covered shed on their wharf. They sent in no plans and as it was against the law to build without doing so the work was stopped and the owners apologized. Councillor Mullaly said that he had seen the shed and was told it was to be shipped to the northward. He believed that this was the case, but it was certainly strange that plans were not sent in or asked for till the building was nearly completed. He thought that it was about time to put an end to this practice of allowing people to build without permission. Reid, Harvey and Crosbie had had to be stopped and asked for plans. But why should they have been allowed to start building at all without complying with the law? People living on the back streets are prevented from making small repairs to the galleries, porches and storm doors, while others seem to be able to do as they pleased. Council officials are now so plentiful that if a brick were thrown in the street one of them would be hit. Still the work was going on and nobody knew it. He himself had to report in Harvey's case while others were paid for doing the work. There is evidently negligence on the part of some of the officials. He suggested that a copy of the law be published. Mayor Ellis agreed with this idea and thought that a foot note should be added to the effect that a penalty of \$25 be enforced.

The request of W. F. Butler to build on the site east of the Museum was deferred.

Staff-Capt. Cave was given leave to repair S. A. Barracks, Livingstone Street. Harvey & Co. will be sent a special vote of thanks for the use of their hose for watering vessels.

The Engineer reported that it would cost from \$260 to \$300 to put a hydrant on Job's premises. Council will go on with the work if Mr. Job is willing.

The Engineer will report on cost of extending water pipes down Quidi Vidi Road.

Monroe & Co. will erect a gate at waterside premises.

Inspector Bambrick suggested that Mr. Prowse and Mr. Harvey who own dilapidated structures on the South Side be asked to make repairs thereto.

The question of buying land on Hamilton Street was deferred.

Plan of house for Geo. Day was approved.

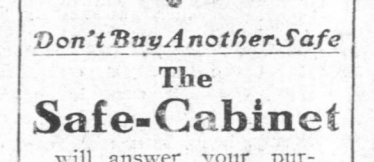
On motion of Councillor Ryan, \$30 was granted for repairs to Portugal Cove Road.

Cottage Hospitals for Newfoundland.

All hospitals are either privately endowed and supported by public subscriptions, as they are in England, or else they are paid for out of city taxes, as most are in America. In England we prefer the former plan as we believe that the selection of the staff is then less likely to be a perfunctory matter, and in matters connected with the care of the sick we consider it of vital importance that the staff should be selected only and solely for their qualifications for filling the post.

Because the People are Tax-Payers and receive no benefit whatever from the large grants made towards the hospital in St. John's, to which of course they pay taxes. But we do not consider it right that the Government should pay the whole grant to one hospital, for those living in districts that do not benefit have then to pay towards the richer centre, whether they like it or not. When, therefore, some eighteen months ago a deputation of fishermen from Green Bay came to me at St. Anthony concerning the possibility of a hospital for Green Bay, we had to consider the following circumstances. First, there is no hospital between St. John's and St. Anthony. Secondly, there is no doctor between Twillingate and Tilt Cove. Thirdly, last year nearly three hundred patients from Green Bay sought treatment at St. Anthony. Fourthly, many of these patients were unfit for so long a travel, some made a quite needless journey, and a

Great Deal of Unnecessary Suffering was inflicted. Pilleys Island was selected as the place from which the deputation came, as being central and a very large district, and as not calculated to interfere with any single local practitioner with whom it might conflict unfairly. The possible resources of income were the people and the Government, there being a few wealthy local people on whom such a scheme could count for voluntary support. We considered it fair that the Government should be asked to pay dollar for dollar with the people. In order to give the scheme a start it was necessary that someone should make a move, and the Deep Sea Mission undertook to give that start, it being perfectly understood by the people themselves that the permanence of the effort would depend entirely on their own loyalty. As the people must have some medical services at their homes and as they are accustomed to pay \$5.00 a year to an ordinary practitioner it was agreed that they should guarantee that sum from every family

doctor could attend to such a large and scattered practice and at the same time manage a hospital and do any justice to either. The Mission always has two, as a rule three, doctors at its hospitals at St. Anthony and Battle Harbor that up-to-date scientific work may be possible and that the clinic may in any way compete in efficiency with the work of an English and American hospital. The necessity of this will commend itself to every doctor in the country who is familiar with the infinite minutiae of a modern diagnosis and treatment. It therefore became obvious that we must have two first class men with their headquarters at the hospital, and that we must have a minimum of two nurses where night and day work is of course essential. To get good results at least one of these must be just as highly trained as modern teaching can go if a surgeon is to expect a certainty of the best results from delicate operations. The very least that such a hospital could possibly be run, even if only

One of the Doctor's is to be Paid, is \$6,000. To keep a man of the calibre that we need, when the lives of our loved ones are in his hands, we want \$2,000 at least and also \$4,000 for the nurses, food, upkeep, etc. For my part I have had considerable experience in starting hospitals and I am sure that for a hospital efficiently to run even after it is equipped can when drugs are paid for at cost, and food, which is a very important item, also at cost, it would be impossible to run at less. When, however, one considers what an efficient up-to-date hospital means to a people whose bread winning capacities depends entirely upon their physical abilities, when one considers this price is being paid for intimate services to the homes of our people, one must consider that a sum of \$6,000 a year for the relief of anxiety and suffering, or for saving capabilities and for the preservation of life, is a mere bagatelle. It is less than the price of half a mile subsidy to a mill-race. To start the ball rolling, the Mission has found

Two Absolutely First Class Men who will be situated at Pilleys Island for eighteen months. They have a doctor's house and a building which they have fitted for an hospital, they are sending one qualified nurse, a sufficient hospital outfit to have a good operating room and an out-patient department with ten beds in the wards, and they are going to supply a fast motor boat to enable the doctor to go to his calls. The hospital, it is hoped, which is now under reorganization, will be opened within a fortnight. The following are some of the arrangements which may be interesting in view of the experiment being copied in the other Bays, as we hope it will be. All heads of families subscribed \$1.00, single men 50c. The following privileges:—Free medical advice on this island or a monthly call to their homes when the subscribers amount to twenty or more in one locality. This is free and will be made as regularly as circumstances permit. Subscribers not able to visit the doctor in the winter, and who can get one elsewhere, will have half their fee refunded. Subscribers receive hospital treatment at absolute cost. Which, if Duties are Removed, is Very Small.

The subscriber will call the doctor in any time at half rates, 50c. a mile; 50c. will be subtracted from their annual fee for every five miles distant from the hospital to those in communities of which seventy-five per cent of the people have subscribed. The only extra charge which a subscriber is liable to are medicines at cost. These must be paid to prevent indiscriminate sending for medicines. In the hospital subscribers will pay \$3.00 weekly, and will have to meet the cost of other, dressings, medicines, etc. No charge is made for such patients requiring surgical operations not requiring expensive dressings. Patients coming to hospital and not being able to pay the prices must bring a Magistrate's order to that effect or else such cases after investigation by the staff shall be paid for by the Poor Commissioner on the doctor's order. The Mission with its heavy financial responsibility while furnishing the staff and assistants is not willing at present to assume

Any Further Financial Responsibility. The people must look to the Government for help, they putting up, as I have suggested, half of the total expense. At present 500 subscribers have agreed to pay \$5.00. Extra fees will come to about \$200. As we have already said the cost of surgeons with an efficient hospital, the motor boat, will come to about \$6,000. At present the Government has promised \$1,000 a year, but if this grant cannot be increased it seems to be probable the scheme will fall through unless the people are prepared to pay three times as much as was ever required of any people in support of their hospital. This means without outside help, such a scheme in our estimation in no way is possible. They will likely appreciate it because their own money has gone into it, and it may be the means of starting a similar policy in the other Bays if the inception is fostered by the wealthier people, such as could no doubt easily be done in a district like Trinity Bay, Conception Bay and Bay of Islands. One plank in the platform of the present Government was to have started the formation of Cottage Hospitals. A free discussion in your paper, Mr. Editor, on a subject of such vital importance may lead to something of advantage. Meanwhile, believe me, to remain. Sincerely yours, WILFRED T. GRENFELL.

To-Day's News.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-Day. The agitation against alleged atrocities by Italians at Tripoli, received a fresh impetus through a telegram received from Lieut. Montague of the British Army, serving in the Turkish army. Montague telegraphed:—'I feel it my duty to send you the following telegram and beg you in the name of Christianity to publish it throughout England. As you know already about the ferocious resistance which Turks and Arabs are offering the Italians, I will only express my admiration for their bravery and fortitude which would warm the heart of any Englishman or any true soldier in the world. Imagine my feelings when on entering and driving Italians out of Arab houses which they had fortified and were holding, we discovered the bodies of some 120 women and children, with hands and feet bound, mutilated, pierced and torn. Later on we found a Mosque filled with the bodies of women and children, mutilated almost beyond recognition. We could not count them, but there must have been 400. In this European war are such crimes to be committed, and cannot England do something to stop such horrors. In our civilization and times you can hardly believe it, but it is true nevertheless. I have seen it, so I know it. Even now we are getting news of further massacres of women and children, who were discovered on different farms lately occupied by Italians. The idea of the Italians when they slaughtered the innocents obviously was one of revenge for their heavy losses in battle.' Montague's message is dated Nov. 2nd.

Special to Evening Telegram. OTTAWA, To-Day. Sir Wilfred Laurier yesterday was served with papers protesting against his election at Soulanges.

Special to Evening Telegram. PEKIN, To-Day. The National Assembly yesterday completed a draft as a basis upon which it is proposed to construct a new constitution for China. It was submitted to the Throne and accepted immediately. The tentative plan provides for the perpetuity of the Manch dynasty, but the power of the Emperor is to be closely restricted, under the written constitution, by the National Assembly. The constitution will be subject to amendment by Parliament. An official despatch from Hankow says here hand to hand fighting is taking place in the streets. The Imperialists are wholly in the control of the officers and are killing every one they meet.

A Chapter for the Young Housewife. If it were not for the perfection to which gas appliances have been brought, the position of any housewife without a servant would be a very difficult one. Imagine having to undertake the cooking for even the smallest family, if it were not for that delightful gas cooker! To take one item alone, namely, the fetching of coals. This is essentially a job for which one needs help and a servant in an average middle-class household; but with the cooker, one strike of the match is all one has to do when cooking is the order of the day. It is now only necessary to light the cooker just a little while before starting operations, for amongst the virtues of gas is the speed with which dishes can be prepared for the table. Besides this, cooking by gas is such clean work. When one's hands were plunged in pastry under the old regime, it might just happen to be that at this particular moment the stove might need stoking; but having once raised the temperature of the oven to the desired height, there is nothing else about which to trouble now that gas does all that is necessary to ensure successful results for our culinary operations. Then, again, gas is so reliable: there are no nooks to contend with as in the case of a coal-heated range, when sometimes a good deal of coaxing is required before the fire will condense to put a bright face on things. Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-Day. The agitation against alleged atrocities by Italians at Tripoli, received a fresh impetus through a telegram received from Lieut. Montague of the British Army, serving in the Turkish army. Montague telegraphed:—'I feel it my duty to send you the following telegram and beg you in the name of Christianity to publish it throughout England. As you know already about the ferocious resistance which Turks and Arabs are offering the Italians, I will only express my admiration for their bravery and fortitude which would warm the heart of any Englishman or any true soldier in the world. Imagine my feelings when on entering and driving Italians out of Arab houses which they had fortified and were holding, we discovered the bodies of some 120 women and children, with hands and feet bound, mutilated, pierced and torn. Later on we found a Mosque filled with the bodies of women and children, mutilated almost beyond recognition. We could not count them, but there must have been 400. In this European war are such crimes to be committed, and cannot England do something to stop such horrors. In our civilization and times you can hardly believe it, but it is true nevertheless. I have seen it, so I know it. Even now we are getting news of further massacres of women and children, who were discovered on different farms lately occupied by Italians. The idea of the Italians when they slaughtered the innocents obviously was one of revenge for their heavy losses in battle.' Montague's message is dated Nov. 2nd.

If wrongly billed since the land was leased he (Newman) should have informed the Council of the change of ownership and had the appraisal set right in the Court of Revision. Councillor Mullaly said that two appraisals had been made on the property—one to McKay who owned all the land, and the other to Newman. The mistake, he thought, arose from the fact of the appraiser seeing the Newman landmark in the vicinity and he set the value down under Newman's name as it was 25 years ago. Councillor Ryan said that the case should be fully looked into, as it would be manifestly unjust to have two taxes collected on the same land. The Mayor expressed the dictum that the Council should take the position of not being responsible to refund money even though the land be wrongly assessed. Newman did not own the land as should not have paid taxes. Councillor Mullaly said that he believed the Solicitor did not have all the facts of the case, and when he did he would no doubt alter his decision. There was a mistake, and it should be rectified at once. The details were probably not given to the Solicitor in the report. The work of the appraiser was in this case a farce, because Newman's ownership of the land ceased in 1897 when McKay leased it. The Mayor said that McKay leased it to Newman, and that Newman was the praiser should have looked for information from Mr. Newman, the latter should have made the correction when the bill for taxes came to him. With reference to appraisers' mistakes, Councillor Mullaly said that as the Newman marks were on the Water Street property; if these indicated the ownership the property should have also been assessed to Newman. The appraiser must have enquired of some one in this instance. Why did he not do so in the other? The Mayor said, "Likely he got his information from Mr. McKay." Councillor Mullaly, "No doubt it was." Mayor Ellis then said that Newman should be informed that the Council was not obliged to refund. Councillor Mullaly asked that the Solicitor be requested to reconsider his report. The Secretary stated that he had given the Solicitor the information which he asked and no more, also a copy of claimant's letter. Both parties were assessable, Councillor Ryan said that there was certainly an irregularity. Two charges had been collected on the same property, and he was fully decided to make further enquiry and again consult the Solicitor.





ST. JOHN'S MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.

The following is published for the information of the public:—

St. John's Municipal Act, 1902.

Section 36. No person shall build or erect in any place in the town of St. John's, whether on the site of a former building or not, any house, stable or other building, unless he shall have first submitted a plan of such house, stable or other building, to the Council, and such plan shall have been approved of, and consent to the erection of such house, stable or other building shall have been given by the Council, and any house, stable or other building erected without such plan having been submitted and approved of, and consent given as aforesaid, and any house, stable or other building erected otherwise than in accordance with the plan so submitted and approved of as aforesaid, shall be a public nuisance, and the like proceedings shall be had in respect of the same as are provided with respect to other public nuisances; Provided that the Council may, whenever they may think fit, decline to approve of any plan submitted to them, and may refuse their consent to the erection of any house, stable or other building, unless and until they shall be satisfied that the lines of such house, stable or other building, entirely coincide with the lines of street upon which the said house, stable or other building, may front or abut, that such house, stable or other building will not from any cause whatever be a source of danger to the neighbouring houses or buildings, that such house, stable or other building, will not be prejudicial to the health of the inhabitants of the town or any of them, and also that the style and manner of construction of such house, stable or other building, shall conform as nearly as possible to other buildings, either erected or about to be erected on the same street.

NOTE: If there are any breaches of the foregoing after the publishing of this notice the penalty will be put in force.
