



In Greater New York During the Past Year.

New York, Jan. 29.-In the twelve months of 1912 there were 2,712 nersons killed in Manhattan by shotting, stabbing, assaults, selfinflicted wounds or from injuries re ceived in falls and other mishaps. This made an average of more than figures are given in the annual report of Antonio d'Alessandro, chie

One hundred and forty-six persons tomobiles, or fifty-five more than in the previous year. There were 114 homicides by shooting and 198 homi




