Germany's Peace Terms.



wide importance" of Germany's peace offer and her Chancellor's speech, which were together to have shaken this old earth to its absurdity and anti-climax only by the real importance of the replies it will have evoked. The whole affair has been elaborately prepared and staged and the curtain, after due and solemn warning, rung up to the pompous strains of the full German orchestra. Perhaps the outside world, occupying the seats of the audience, is a little grateful that it has been given time to vent its derisive laughter before the other actors make their bow quietly and speak something worth listening to. The first of these will be the British Prime Minister, who, almost as we write, is flinging Ger-many's insult back in her teeth. More momentous than his reply will be his outline of the new policy that justifies and explains it. Until it is made, there is no need of comment, but we can accept the judgment that it will share with Grey's speeches on the eve of the war the distinction of prime importance among British utterance since the storm broke.

The official note presented through neutral channels to her enemies by Germany contains nothing new be-yond the indication of her willingness to confer with them concerning peace: we cannot call new the bom bast and hypocrisy that pervade ev-ery line of it. This would leave things as they were if it were not generally known with fair accuracy what Germany's real terms are. 

He was saved from death on Saturlay evening by Patrick Collins, gate ender for the Lackawanna Railroad at the Kearny crossing of the Newark furnpike, the main automobile highvay between New York City and Northern New Jersey towns. Collins had lowered the gates as the Buffalo Express, coming from Hoboken, was approaching, and his attention was drawn to the man by shrill blasts of he locomotive whistle. Glancing lown the rails he saw the man standng in the full glare of the locomoive headlight, rigidly awaiting what eemed to be certain death.




