





Western Star when the vessels now loading have sailed, the Gorton-Pew Company will have shipped 25 cargoes of cod from the West Coast, from Port aux Choix to Codroy, the present season. Twenty cargoes have already reached market. They have paid out for cod and herring \$200,000 in cash to date, besides goods, and have used 7,000 hogsheads of salt. Before the end of the season their outlay will have passed the quarter million mark. Up to the present they have about reached the total of any previous year. Their cod purchases from this coast amount to 4,000,000 pounds."

The W. S. also states that the Bay of Islands Fisheries Company have shipped one and one-half million pounds of codfish and five thousand barrels of herring to date. The Company has on hand yet two and one-half million pounds of cod.


