Certain conditions, however, are laid down, and training will be required of the applicants along the following lines: Work on a farm under an approved farmer for the summer and early fall; take an agricultural course in some approved Agricultural College or similar institution for 1920 to 1921; work on a farm under an approved farmer for the summer of 1921, following which the Government would furnish the man with suitable loans on easy terms of repayment for the purchase of land, nt and stock.
