To the Township of East Garafraxa towards making the town line road between the township of Amaranth and Luther and East Garafraxa

ner mentioned, or any part thereof, was seconding to the last twised and equalized assessment rolls of the said County of Weillington, \$13.396,298.

And whereas for paying the interest and creating an annual sinking fund for the payment of the principal or the said turn of twenty thousand dollars it will require an equal annual special rate one-fourth of a mill in the dollar to be levied in addition to all other rates.

And whereas the amount of the existing debt of the Corporation of the County of Weilington is for principal the sum of \$99,649.00, and for interest the sum of \$90,680.32.
